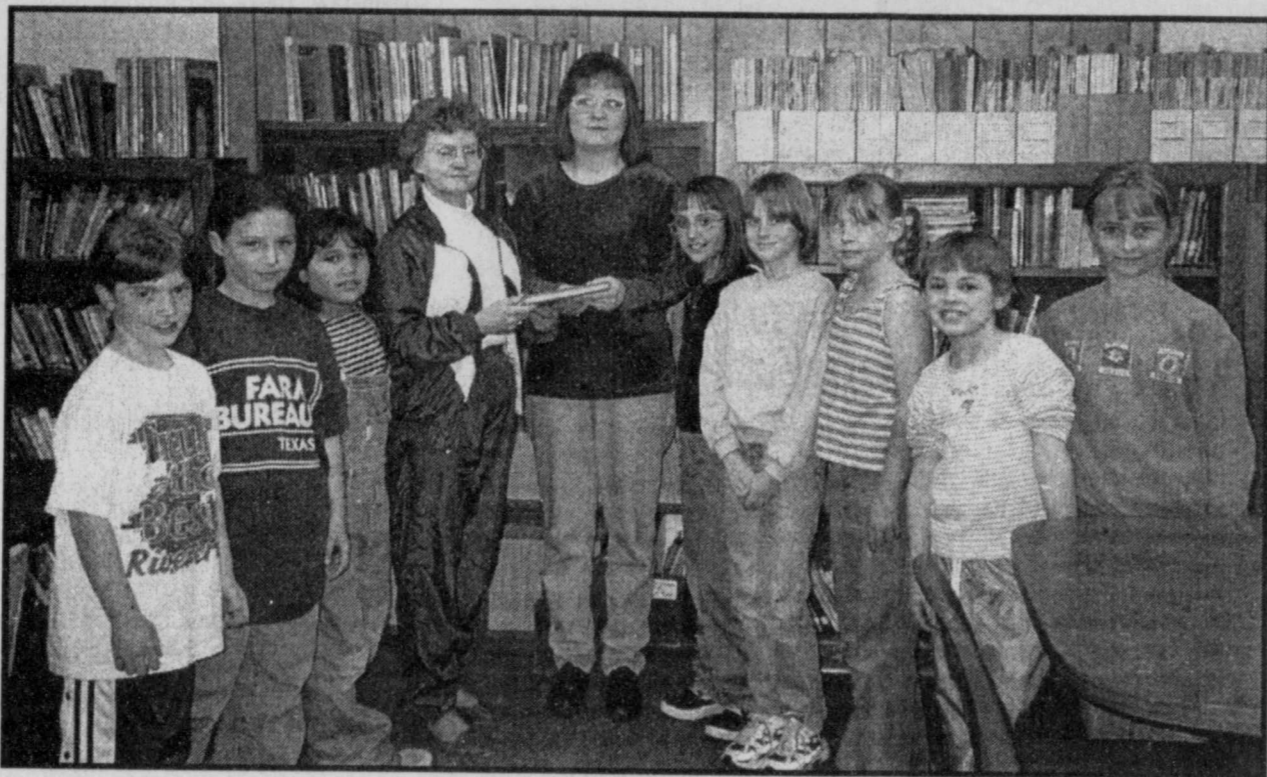

Water Supply Corp. to hold election for three directors

The Board of Directors of the Red River County Water Supply Corporation held their regular monthly meeting on Monday, March 8.

After president Clovis VanDeaver declared a quorum, the regular business of approval of minutes, bills and financial reports were read and approved.

In the manager report, John Ragsdill discussed the 10-year perfect safety record, the continued growth of membership and the financial stability of the corporation.

Other items discussed was the Jolntown extension that is pending TNRCC approval and the Y2K situation.

The directors were advised by Ragsdill that all company computers were Y2K compliant and the only concern expressed was with the (s) power companies who serve Red River County Water Supply.

All of the power providers who were contacted expressed confidence

in their readiness but all admitted to the possibility of problems.

With 19 locations requiring electricity to keep 1800 meters and nearly 900 miles of pipeline full of water, the corporation is also concerned.

The last item discussed, since there was no need for executive session, was the three directors who have expiring terms. The directors are: president, Clovis VanDeaver; Mike Boulware and Billy Mauldin.

All three of these directors expressed the desire to be placed on the ballot and continue to serve the members as they have in the past.

Numerous other names were submitted by the nominating committee and approved by the directors.

The ballots will be mailed to the membership on or before April 1 and everyone is asked to mark the ballot and please return them by the date marked on the ballot.

With no other business before the board adjournment was at 7:56 p.m.

February was another good month for us. We were able to get a lot of odd and end jobs done. This month we hauled 3 loads of white rock to the yard and 18 small loads to several different mud holes in order to get them patched up. We also hauled 7 small loads of red rock and 9 small loads of state material and 5 small loads of railroad rock. We hauled 2 big loads of railroad rock to the yard and 16 loads of railroad rock to Rosalie area and Detroit area. We were able to haul some more material from the state and we hauled 32 loads to a couple of different roads. We also installed 1 culvert this month and began trying to clean up a little around the shop by carrying some things to the auction.

In Commissioner's Court this month we approved a request from Suzanne Norwood of the Census Bureau to establish a Complete Count

Committee. This is something I may be talking to some about if you have any questions regarding this please call me or come by. We also heard presentation from Steve Smith about the Natural Resources Service, approved appointments to Red River County Historical Commission for 1999-2000, approved resolution requesting assistance from the state to limit county liability for capital murder trials, approved resolution requesting the state legislature to allocate a portion of the motor fuel tax to Texas counties to support the county road system.

We also approved resolution to sell struck off property of East Main Street in Clarksville, approved bids on gravel hauling, approved granting Red River Valley Girl Scouts use of building north of the courthouse, approved going out for bids on grant roads and approved nominees to the board of trustees for the Red River County Library.

When the James Wood family of Bogata looked up last Wednesday morning they had something strange looking hanging on their highline wires. After investigation, it seemed to be some kind of weather balloon, but it was a strange looking one, so they began trying to find out its origin. After exhausting all their resources, they finally took it to Bogata School to Science teach, Don Easterling, so that the students might benefit from it. Mr. Easterling got on the internet and found that it is a Radiosonde. A Radiosonde is a weather measurement instrument that measures upper air profiles of pressure, temperature and humidity, when launched into the upper atmosphere on a weather balloon. It had ascended to the upper atmosphere for about 1 1/2 hours to an altitude of 20 to 30 km. During its ascent the radiosonde transmitted data on weather conditions to the ground station, until the decreasing atmospheric pressure made the weather balloon larger and larger and it burst. After this the radiosonde and the balloon naturally fell down. He learned that a Vaisala radiosonde does not contain environmentally hazardous materials that would require special treatment. The Vaisala radiosonde was made in Vaisala, Helsinki and if it had been launched from Helsinki, it could have been sent back for a refund, but it was decided that this particular gizmo was probably launched in Oklahoma. This week's Cook's Corner comes to us from one of my favorite magazines... *Woman's Day*. These magazines are published monthly and can be found in local grocery stores, convenience stores and other places that sell books and magazines. They are inexpensive and loaded with lots of ideas, recipes, facts and stories. I began collecting them back in the 1960's. I say collecting, because I saved recipes, crafts and other ideas from them.

Peanut Butter Recipes

Peanut Butter Ham Squares

1/2 cup peanut butter
2 teaspoons grated onion
6 thin slices boiled ham
1 beaten egg
2 tablespoons water
1/2 cup fine, dry bread crumbs
1 cup vegetable oil

Mix peanut butter and onion. Spread mixture on half of ham slices. Top with remaining ham. Wrap in wax paper and chill for about one hour. Then cut into 1" squares. Mix egg and water. Dip squares in egg and then in crumbs. Fry in hot oil 2 minutes or until brown. Makes 60.

Peanut Loaf

1 cup crunchy peanut butter
1 cup cooked rice
1 cup soft bread crumbs
2 cups milk
1 beaten egg
2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper

Mix all ingredients until well blended. Pack in well greased 9x5x3 loaf pan. Bake in moderate oven at 350 degrees for 45-50 minutes. Turn out on hot platter and cut slices to serve. Makes 4-6 servings.

Peanut -Stuffed Tomatoes

4 ripe tomatoes
1/3 cup peanut butter
2/3 cup soft bread crumbs
3/4 teaspoon salt
dash pepper
1/4 teaspoon powdered oregano
1 tablespoon minced onion
1/4 cup finely diced celery
chopped parsley

Cut a thin slice from the top of each tomato. Scoop out pulp and chop. Mix with remaining ingredients, except parsley. Fill shells and put in shallow baking dish. Bake in hot oven at 400 degrees for 25-30 minutes. Sprinkle with parsley. Serves 4.

Peanut Butter Fruit Salad

1/3 cup mayonnaise
1/4 cup peanut butter
1 cup diced pineapple
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup raisins
1/3 cup mandarin oranges-drained
lettuce cups

Gradually stir mayonnaise into peanut butter. Add remaining ingredients, except lettuce and toss lightly. Chill and serve in lettuce cups. Makes 4 servings.

Peanut Butter Potato Salad

1/4 cup vinegar
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
3 cups diced hot cooked potato
1 cup diced celery
1/4 cup chopped green onion
1 cup diced cooked ham
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup peanut butter

In bowl mix vinegar, oil, salt and pepper. Add potato and mix lightly. Chill. When ready to serve add celery, onion and ham. Mix mayonnaise and peanut butter. Add to mixture; toss lightly. Serves 4-6.

Peanut Butter Garlic Bread

1/4 cup peanut butter
1/4 cup soft margarine
1 clove garlic-crushed
1/8 teaspoon salt
1 medium loaf French or Italian bread

Mix first 4 ingredients. Slice bread in 1" slices not quite through bottom of loaf. Spread peanut butter mixture between slices. Wrap in foil and bake in hot oven at 400 degrees for 10-15 minutes.

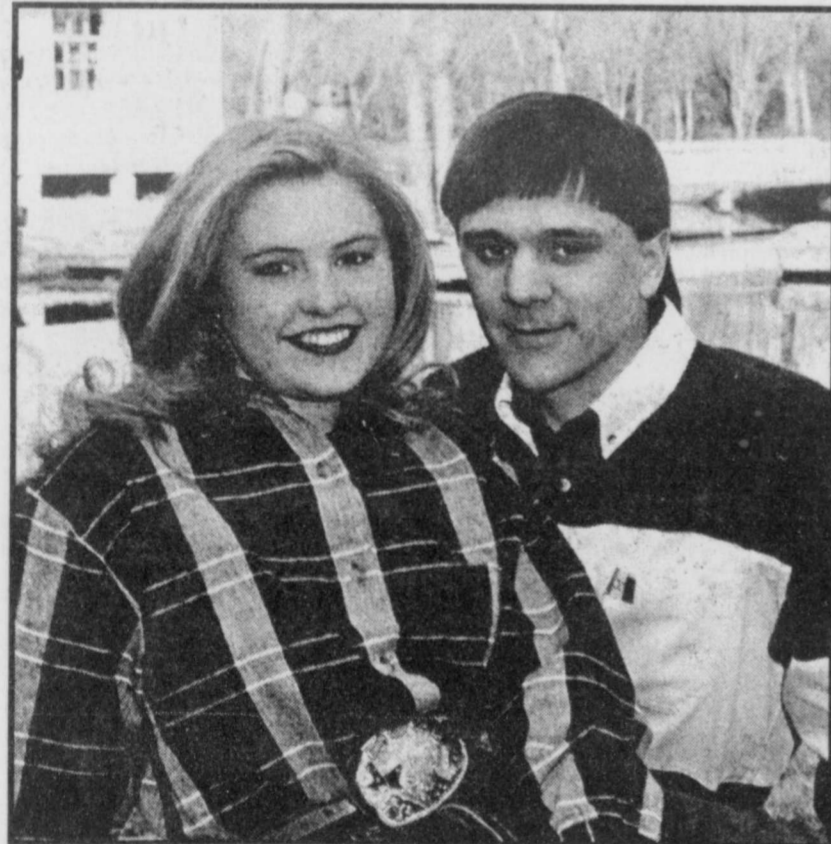

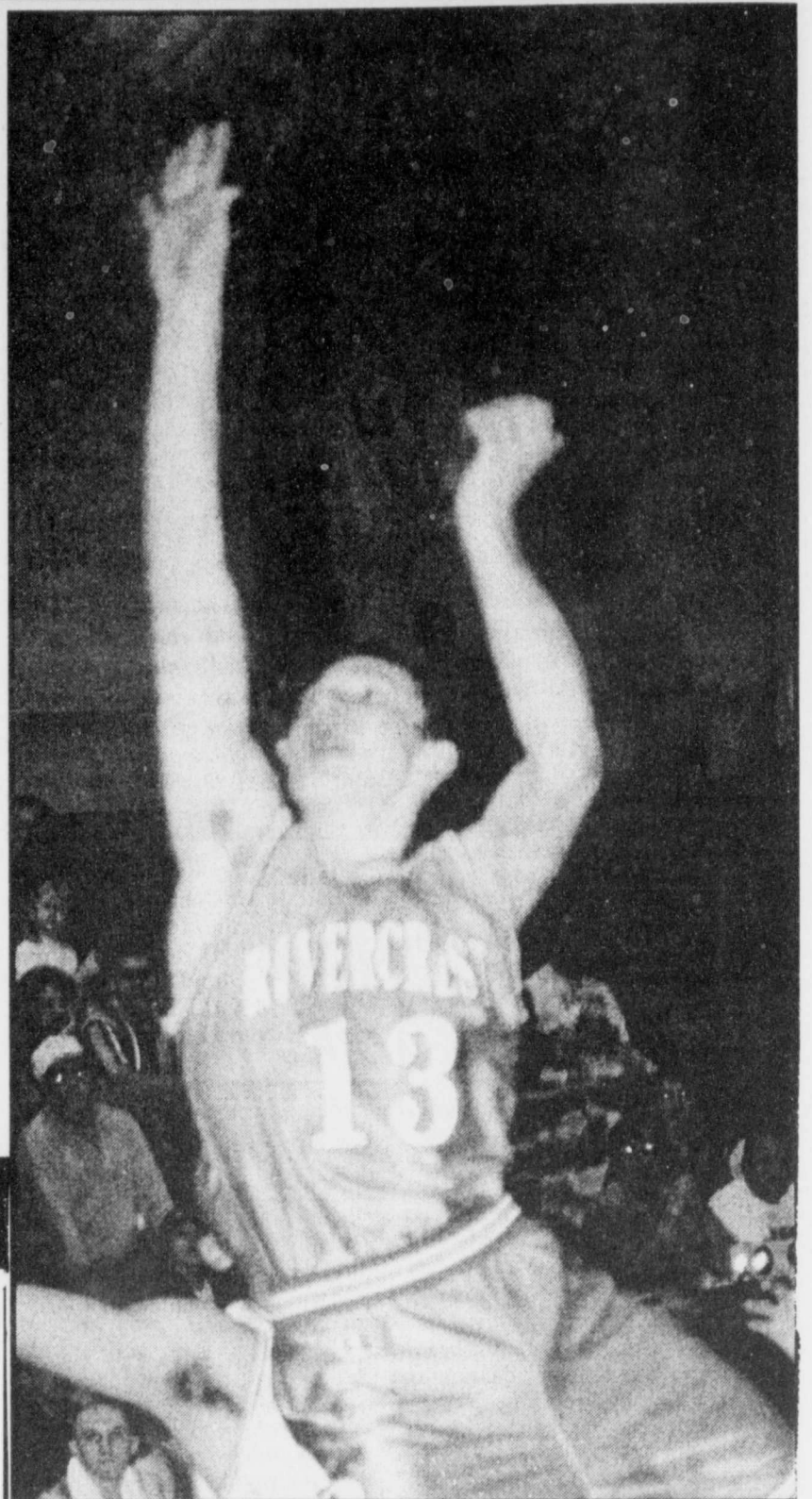

Conservation Program Sign Up

Farmers and ranchers may apply for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) through March 31, 1999. The conservation program, a result of the 1996 Farm Bill, offers a limited number of producers who have serious soil, water, and other natural resource problems with technical, financial, and educational assistance.

According to Steve R. Smith, District Conservationist for USDA Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS), EQIP is not like the former Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) or Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP). This program is extremely limited and is for persons engaged in livestock or agricultural production who would provide the greatest environmental benefits at the least cost to the program.

"Applications will be prioritized after March 31, according to specific criteria," Smith continued. "After the Farm Service Agency (FSA) deter-

mines producer eligibility, NRCS conservationists and the producer will make an inventory of the natural resources, identify natural resource problems and concerns, determine treatment needs, and agree upon the land management and structural practices the producer will install." Smith added that the extent of the conservation practice, fields and acres to be treated, and cost-share rate and incentive payment levels the producer will accept, as well as the total program payments, are included in a ranking formula.

Acceptance into EQIP will require a 5 to 10 year contract, even if only one year of cost-share is needed. Contracts are for a maximum amount of \$50,000.00 with a maximum 75 percent cost-share.

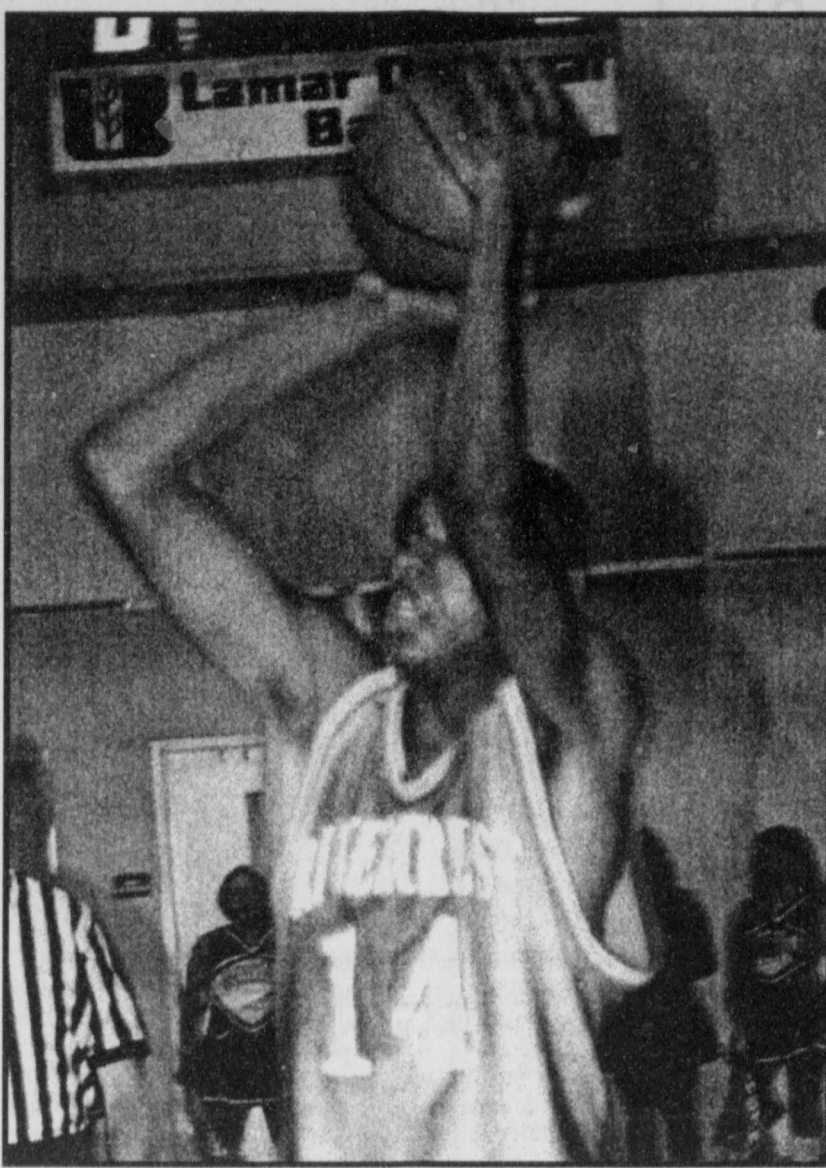

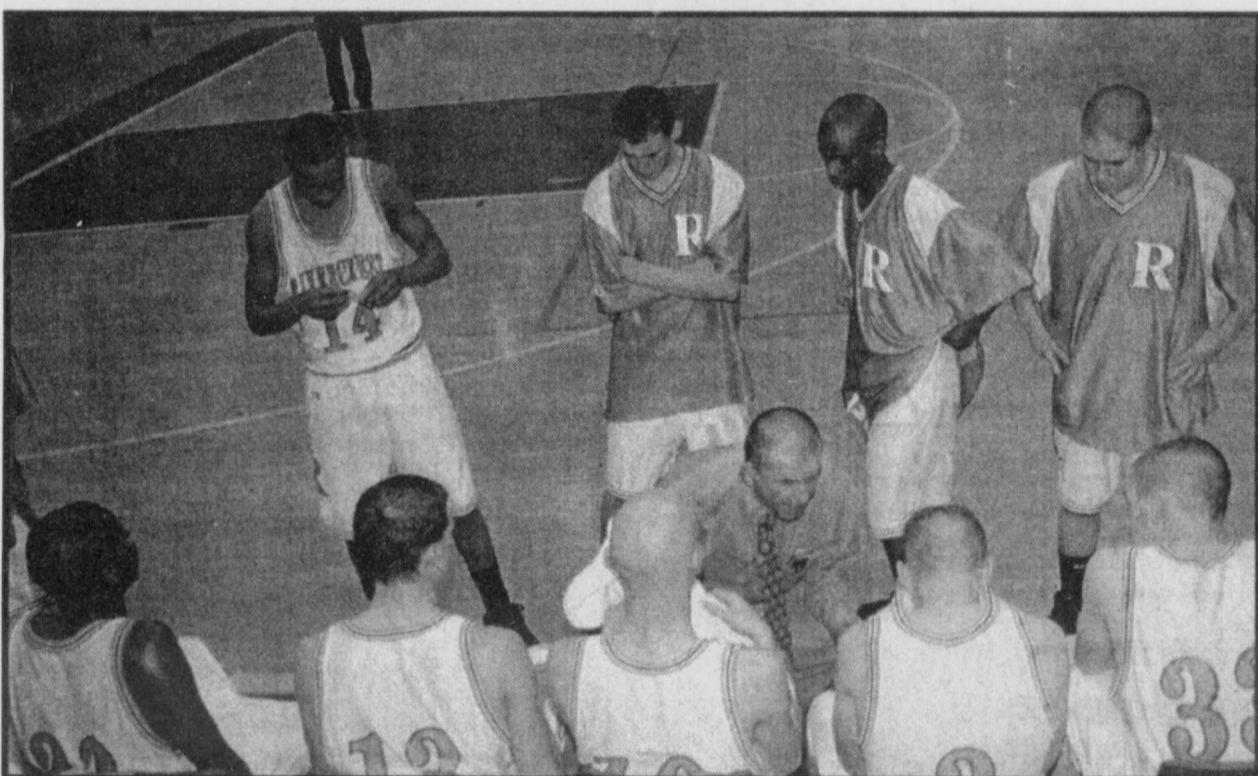

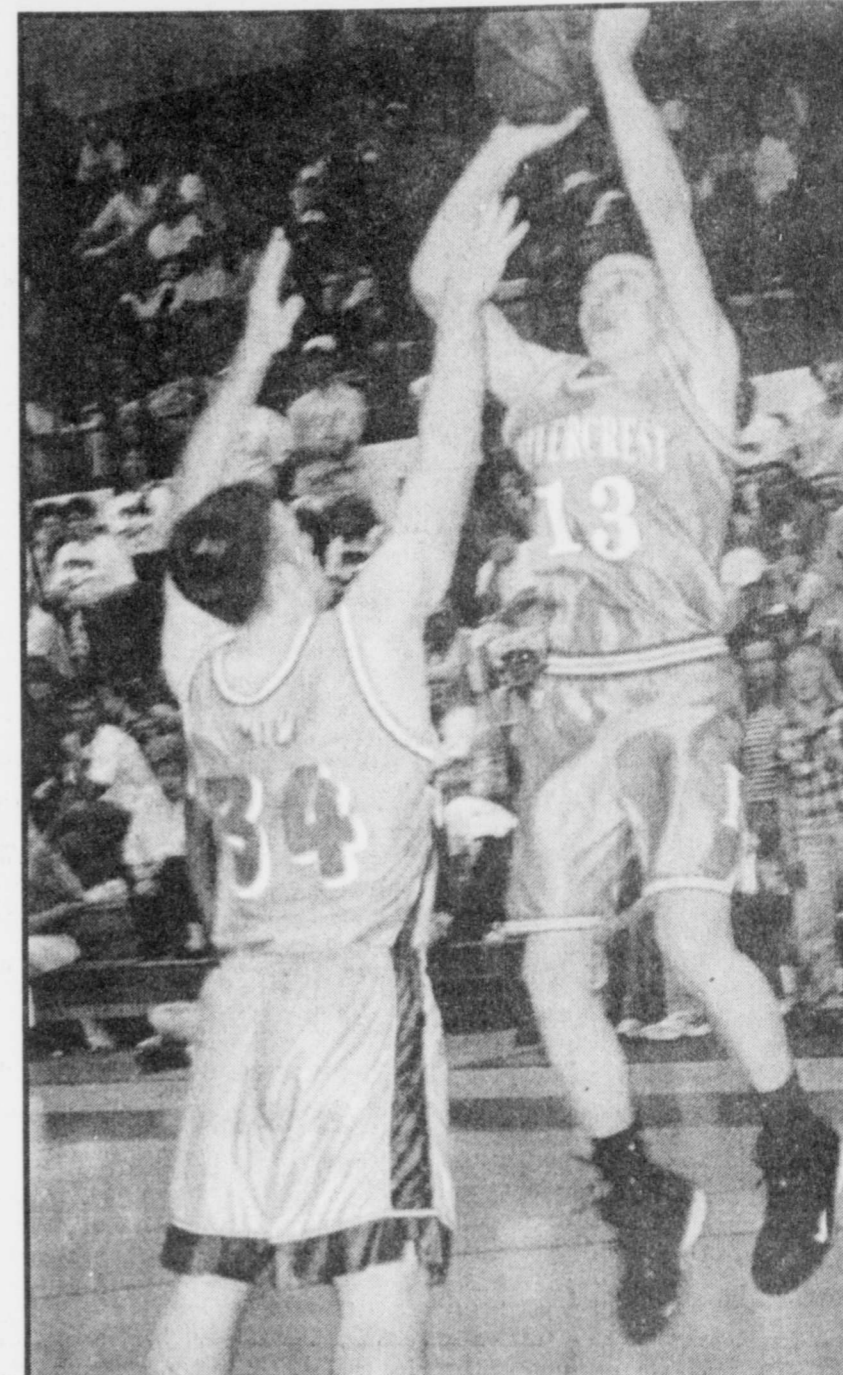
