Two little girls, whose name we failed to learn, but who live in our county, also delighted the audience with a duet.

A PLEA FOR THE CEMETERY ASSOCIATION

The Haskell Cemetery Association wishes to make this explanation through your paper to those persons who do not understand why we are taking in the ground east of the cemetery. This ground was set aside by the owners for Cemetery purposes when the town was organized and the reason we did not enclose it when we purchased our fence was because we have always been in hopes that we would not have to use this portion of it. However we have come to the point where we are compelled to have more ground and after trying in vain to get other ground, our City Council advised us to enclose the balance of the Cemetery grounds, which is already plotted on our map.

Now we wish to ask this question of the public: Do you think we would have the right to move our Cemetery grounds from where they have been laid off since the town was organized and put in a new one by the side of some other person's property just to please someone who owned a home in another portion of the town and who sold that home and voluntarily purchased one adjoining these grounds? Neither should that person try to compel us to do it.

The Cemetery Association sent a committee before the City Council before taking in these grounds and told them we had no more lots in the present enclosure to sell and told them it was up to the City or some Fraternal Order to get more ground unless we enlarged our Cemetery by taking in the rest of the grounds set aside

for Cemetery purposes. They advised us to do what we have done after trying for months to get other grounds, and now if the people do not stand by us in this transaction we will be compelled to throw the responsibility upon you to provide a place for burying our dead.

The Cemetery Association has worked very hard to keep our City of the Dead in as perfect a condition as possible and we are glad to say that our work is appreciated by those who know and understand what it takes to carry on this work. If you appreciate what we have done we ask you to co-operate with us and give us your moral support. In the meantime don't forget that we need your financial assistance as well.

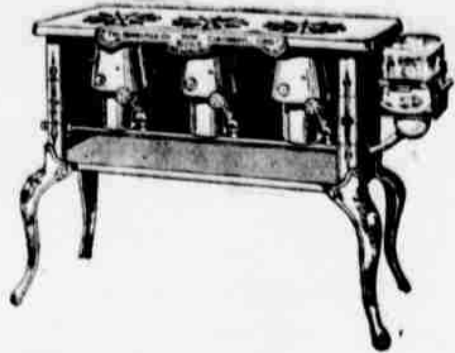

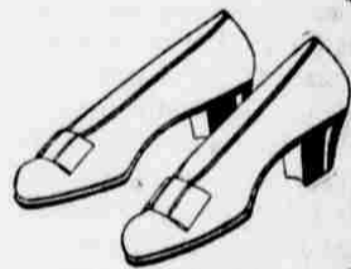

Missionary Notes

The Methodist Missionary Society will meet on Monday May 18th at four o'clock. The lesson is the tenth and eleventh chapters of John, Mrs. Turrentine teacher. Every member is urged to be present. At the last meeting the society voted unanimously to tithe for the next two months in order that the society may be able to meet the note due on the parsonage the first of July. The members who go away to spend the Summer are requested to send their tithing money to the Treasurer not later than the first of July.

In Foreign Missions the quadrennium now ending has been a building Era, the total amount invested for buildings in all our fields, being \$306,065.92. The Board of Missions have been able to send some reinforcements to our foreign fields.

The total number of missionaries sent out during the quadrennium, is forty six; of whom twenty three are evangelists, fifteen for educational, five for medical and three for industrial. While this number is encouraging from every point of view it is not an average of one a year to each field, and occasionally makes up the loss by death and otherwise.

There are 124 foreign missionaries, 342 native helpers supported by the women's department.

The Board of missions has received, March, 1910 to Dec. 1913, \$1,910,798.21, of which amount, the sum of \$109,626.00 has been expended for buildings.

The income of the home department during the last four years, was \$58,883.00 which does not include the amount spent by local boards of ministers, of annual conferences for missionary work in the home field.

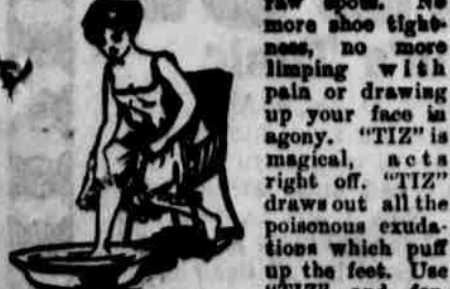
