



The total number of missionaries sent out during the quadrienium, is forty six; of whom twenty three are evangelists, tifteen for educational, five for medical and three for industrial. While this number is encouraging from every point of view it is not an average of one a year to each field, and occasionally makes MAY 15ht AND AFTER up the loss by death and otherwise.

There are 124 foreign missionaries, 342 native helpers supported by the womans department.

The Board of missions has recieved, March, 1910 to Dec. 1913, \$1,9101,798.21, of which amount, the sum of \$109,626.00 has been expended for buildings.

The income of the home department during the last four years, was \$58,883.00 which does not include the amount spent by local boards of ministers, of annual conferences for missionary work in the home field.




