1, it will be to elect 4 City Council members. In the general election there will be five candidates vying for 3 two year terms. In the special election there will be 3 candidates running for one 1 year term. The candidates and their draw order for the three 2 year terms are Jack Crane, Randy Kennedy, Tracie Jeffery Osborne, Kevin Binion and O.E. (Edd) Spencer. In the special election W.T. Harbison, Merle Hughes and Sherri Sessums will compete for the unexpired term vacated by James Lawson. Merle Hughes was appointed to hold the seat until election time and now she will be competing with the other two candidates to be able to keep the seat.

The Bogata News spoke with each of the candidates and asked for a brief summary of their platform and a brief biography. The following is the result in the order of the draw, with the general election candidates first.

years my husband has been offered several promotions with his company and in each case it included a move to a new town, and we passed it up each time so we could stay in Bogata to raise our children and make a home and just enjoy the pleasures of a small town. I have attended 14 City Council meetings and special meetings in the past year making myself familiar with the present budget and the process in which our local government operates. Projects I would like to see addressed are the improvements of our city streets, taking advantage of State and Federal Grants available to cities of our size and for the Bogata Police Department to be a part of all the citizens of Bogata's lives by gaining the respect of our young adults, teenagers and youth so they can look to them to assist and help with peer pressure and the high demands being put on our youth of today. I would also work to get the most out of each and every tax dollar paid to the City of Bogata. It would we a honor to be elected as a public servant for the City of Bogata, to work to keep our town the best place anyone would want to live.

It was after showing interest at the council meetings that I was asked to serve the unexpired term of James Lawson. It is my belief that the Mayor should run the day to day operations of the city and answer directly to the council. I believe the council should act as a unit with no one seeking his or her own agenda with the employees. Being a senior citizen I am an unconditional supporter of the Bogata Police Department. Our School zone is much safer now. As is our park. Local merchants know their businesses are safer with a police patrol. With the new highway on the horizon there will be much more traffic. Problems are certain with this new industrial four lane in our backdoor. We must look down the road and build our police Department to its optimal level with monies that are available. "If we are to seriously address the use or uncertified teachers, then parents need to be told when an uncertified teacher is teaching their child, so that they can rally with us to fix the problem," said Amy White, state president of the 94,000 member group. Parents may not be aware that the problem affects them unless they are notified.

ATPE convention delegates also would like to see strict limits placed on how emergency teaching permits are issued for uncertified teachers.

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

A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on January 1st (and used it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower their school taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium, or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

Are other exemptions available?

If you are disabled--or if you are 65 years old or older--you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you are also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.) The over-65 homeowner's exemptions and school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. Over-65 homeowners also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's over-65 school tax ceiling, to a new home.

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 1998, you won't need to reapply for 1999 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home--or if you've moved to a new home--you'll need to file for an exemption for 1999. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the over-65 exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you become disabled during 1998, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption.

"Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber, not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 1999 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.


Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.
