I remembered sitting on sunwarmed steps in Lucerne, Switzerland, while swans sailed majestically past a 400 year old covered bridge.

What about the sight of a snow covered meadow, trees stark black, outlined in white and everything looking like it was created just for a Christmas card?

Fabulous Texas sunsets, blazing through the color spectrum have been witnessed in uncounted numbers, punctuated by lakes, ponds, hillsides, windmills and fences.

Incredibly clear, blue-green water reflecting awesome snowcapped mountains in Canada, incredibly clear, bluegreen waters filled with coral reefs and tropical fish in clouds of brilliance in the Caribbean make memories of two very diverse beauties.

Beautiful scenes from all the seasons, from cold to hot came to mind.

Purple thistles outlined by a rising son as purple as they are fixed in my memory from years

And what about the sound, the smell, the feel of a summer rain, pounding down in July, or pattering in April?

The time in the machine flew by as I began to try and isolate the single most beautiful scene have ever been privileged to witness.

Pine trees and dogwoods in the piney woods near Clarksville, masses of daffodils on sandy land, newborn calves resting in the spring sunshine, children running through a field of bluebonnets flitted through my rewinding memory.

Finally I settled on one scene from several years ago. We had taken a jeep ride from Telluride, Colorado high, high up into the mountains where ordinary vehicles cannot go.

After struggling over sliding gravel and staring popeyed down gorges 10,000 feet deep we dropped down onto an Alpine meadow and stopped.

There, spread before us was a meadow of columbine, backed by those breath-taking, snow capped mountains. And everywhere, by the hundreds, were hummingbirds. The air was alive with them, the columbine was brilliant in purples and lavenders, pinks and yellows. The silence was complete....the only manmade sound was made my ourselves. It was perfection beyond belief.

Having settled on that as a simple, yet lasting memory of beauty I realized one thing. We are surrounded by beauty always. All we have to do is lift up our eyes and take note of it instead of going through life with our heads tucked down, too busy to notice the sunrises, sunsets, wildflowers and beauties around us. Even when confined in a CPM machine that beauty is still there for me to take. And that makes it's pursuit so worthwhile.







In Texas, child abuse and neglect includes specific acts or omissions. The Department of Protective and Regulatory Services investigates reports alleging abuse or neglect by a person responsible for a child's care, custody or welfare.

Services for foster children include clothing, school supplies, medical and dental expenses, enrichment activities, educational expenses, birthday, allowances, transportation, nonreimbursable child care and child abuse prevention projects.

All proceeds from the fish fry will go towards projects for the county's children.




