limbed gait. I adore the mind boggling scenes of starfighters attacking a space station, or skimming low




Scott Denny performs at Hopkins County Civic Center

This week's cook is the MIGHTY TOMATO! Thats right, the tomato. This time of year, gardens are abound with these rich, ripe, round, flavorful, wonderful, fruit, vegetables....or whatever you choose to call them! They can be used in a wide variety of dishes.

Did you now that there are "Green Zebra" tomatoes that are green with yellow stripes? These tomatoes are sweet and yet have an acid flavor and look like to elongated Roma variety.

Did you know that there are "Cherokee Purple" tomatoes or "Brandywine"? They are slightly squat, with thick pulpy interiors and a thin pale pinkish skin.

How about the "Black Krim" or "Black Prince"? They look more chocolate than black and have an excellent acid-to-sugar ratio.

There is also the "German Striped" that is hollow inside like a bell pepper and has the same shape and can be stuffed as well.

What about peeling a tomato? This can be your preference. If it has a thick skin-peel it! If you have the time...by all means . . . peel it! But only if you want to. The quickest way to peel a tomato is to make an "X" in the base of the tomato with the tip of your knife and lower it with a slotted spoon or tongs for about 20 seconds into a wide pot half filled with boiling water. The skin along the "X" should start to peel back. Remove the tomato from the water and let it sit on a plate until cool and slip the skin right off!

Maybe you want to store some for later use. Never refrigerate tomatoes or place them onto a sunny windowsill to ripen. Why not you ask? Re-

frigerated tomatoes become mushy and tasteless. Sunny windowsills can make them rot. If they are underripe, place them into a brown paper sack and store them in a cool, dark place. Tomatoes give off ethylene gas (which speeds the ripening process) that the paper bag will help to trap. Otherwise they may be stored in a tray or bowl at room temperature, away from direct heat or sun.

How to core a tomato? Use the tip of a small, sharp paring knife or grapefruit knife. Cut around the core or stem end in a "V" shape and then lift it out. So easy! Now you are ready to make these delicious recipes listed below and we hope you enjoy them! See you in the kitchen!

Chilled Tomato, Corn and Avocado Soup with Toasted Cumin

pounds ripe tomatoes-peeled teaspoons ground cumin cup canned reduced-sodium chicken broth or tomato juice cup fresh corn kernels cup peeled, pitted, diced avocados 1/2 cup thinly sliced scallions 2 tablespoons fresh lime juice teaspoon seeded, minced jalpeno' teaspoon kosher salt freshly ground black pepper cup plain low-fat yogurt or sour cream

cup chopped cilantro leaves-fresh

Core the tomatoes and cut into quarers. Place a strainer over a large bowl and scoop the insides of the tomatoes into the strainer. Press down with spatula to extract juices' discard seeds. Reserve the juices in bowl. Chop tomato solids and add to the bowl. There should be about 6 cups. Place ground cumin into a small skillet and heat, shaking pan until it is just heated d fragrant, about 20 seconds. Stir in chicken broth and then add this mixture to tomatoes in bowl. Add corn, avocado, scallions, lime juice and jalapeno', salt and pep-per. Stirto blend. Refrigerate until cold at least three hours. In large, heavy skillet, combine lemon sections, tomatoes, sugar and ginger. Using potato masher, combine, mash and mix well. Let stand for at least I hour. stirring occasionally. Bring mixture to a boil over medium-high, stirring often Reduce and cook, stirring occasionally prevent scorching, until thickened around 30-40 minutes. Remove white foam with metal spoon and ladle into jars to preserve

Oven-Roasted Tomatoes and Summer Vegetables

2 pounds plum tomatoes-cored and quar

2 small zucchinis-trimmed and cut into I red bell pepper-remove stem and seed and cut into small strips I red onion-cut into wedges

I small eggplant-trim, peel and slice 1/2 cup extra-virgin olive oil kosher salt

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Spread tomatoes, zucchinis, pepper, onion and eggplant onto a large sheet pan. Drizzle with oil and sprinkle with salt. Roast turning occasionally with a wide spatula and redistributing the vegetables so that they brown evenly for about 35 minutes. Add garlic to blend. Continue roasting until they are nicely brown for about 25 minutes longer. Remove and add herbs and pepper and stir to blend. Add vinegar




