**Council conduct is main topic of meeting**

Acting City Secretary Jean Upchurch read a grievance letter to the called meeting of the Bogata City Council on Monday night, September 20 "regarding conduct of Council members Tracie Osborne and W.T. Harbison," provoking heated debate and several disorderly outbursts.

Upchurch asserted that the two Council members had interfered with her work and subjected her to tensions that she "could not and would not" be able to endure. Their frequent requests for information on short order, made without regard for the routine demands of her job, had involved "yelling and carrying on" and "chaos" in the presence of citizens wishing to conduct business with the city.

Both Osborne and Harbison defended the appropriateness of their conduct and criticized Upchurch for having failed to provide information and assistance to which they were entitled.

The Mayor defended Upchurch's position and declared that the city administration simply "cannot function" when its hard-pressed staff is subjected to the pressures of the sort reported. He suggested that all requests for information from the staff be made in writing and answered at meetings of the City Council.

Other members of the Council, a part-time city employee and the Chief of Police joined the discussion, as did several individuals among the public citizens filling the Council chamber. The audience twice cheered remarks supportive of the Acting Secretary, notable when Councilman Randy Kennedy challenged her critics to "get yourself under control or step off the Council."

The debate ended passage by a three-to-two vote of a resolution providing that requests to city staff for information be submitted in writing

and up to ten days allowed for reply.

Routine city business was dealt with in orderly fashion. The Council decided to buy a John Deere tractor, a heavy-duty shredder and a "Grasshopper" mower and to dispose of items of machinery at auction.

The Council agreed to honor charges totaling \$3,428.00 from 3-G Construction for replacement of the roof of the fire station.

In anticipation of a further called meeting to be held on September 27, the Council approved workshops on an employee handbook, employee wages and benefits and job duties. The workshops were scheduled for September 24.

Approval of a new tax rate for FY 1999-2000 was deferred, with the issue to be addressed in the September 24 workshop and at the September 27 meeting. The FY 1999-2000 waterworks and general fund budgets were adopted as published following the previous week's workshop.

As new business, Councilman Harbison proposed and Councilman Spencer seconded a motion that separate heads be named to the Street and Waterworks Departments. The motion was defeated by a 3-2 vote.

Payment in the amount of \$374.10 to Kathy Stewart for court clerk training and updating municipal court records was approved, as was acceptance of a bid proposal for water storage inspections now being required.

Mayor Garretson agreed with citizens who spoke of the need for Bogatans to be informed of tax auctions involving properties in Bogata, as local awareness of the auctions might increase the auction income to Bogata and other taxing entities. Under current rules, the auctions are only advertised in the Clarksville newspaper, which has relatively few readers in Bogata.

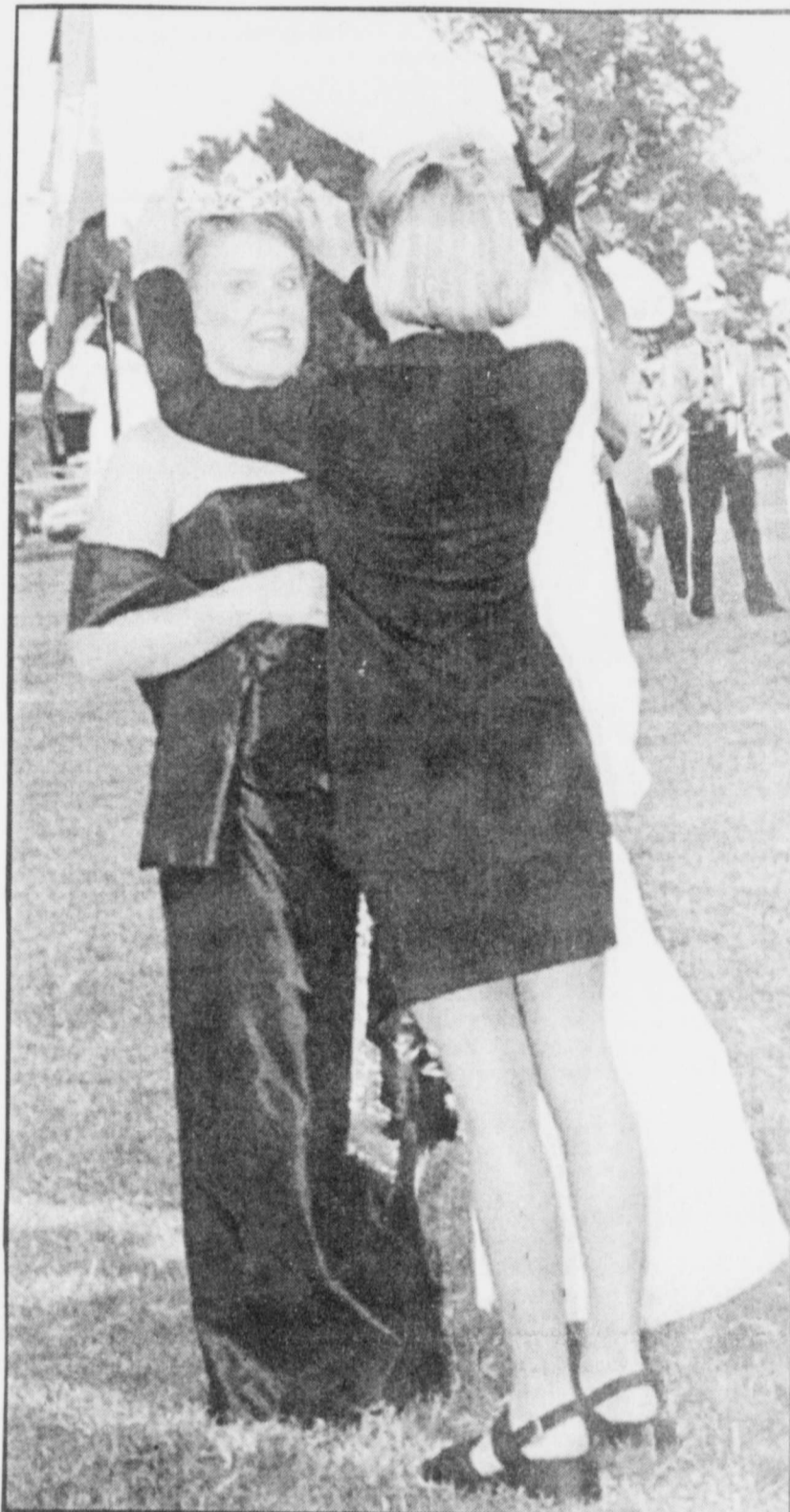

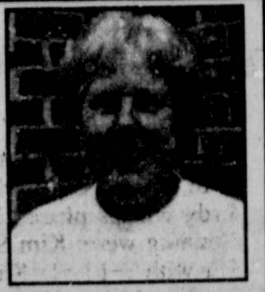

Our recipes this week deal with sweets! Cookies and such! Now that the weather is cooling off, light that oven and get to work!

**Queen of Puddings**-someone asked me last week for a bread pudding recipe and here it is!

**Skillet Cookies**-I had this recipe a long time ago and have been looking for it and makes a great Christmas cookie!

**Almond Butter Cookies**-these cookies are great and give that nutty flavor along with the almond flavor!

**Crispy Clusters**-a mixture of marshmallows, nuts, coconut, Rice Krispies and chocolate...wow!

**Lemon Bars**-this bar recipe is delicious if you like lemon and they are dusted on top with powdered sugar.

**Lemon Pecan Dainties**-this recipe can be made ahead of time and refrigerated for later use.

## September 23, 1999 Cookie Recipes

### Queen of Puddings

8 cupfuls toasted bread crumbs  
4 eggs  
1 pint milk  
nutmeg  
1/2 cup sugar

Toast until bread is dry. Roll into fine breadcrumbs, using rolling pin. Grease deep cake pan. Add bread crumbs. Beat eggs and add milk and sugar and nutmeg to crumbs and mix thoroughly. Sprinkle top with nutmeg. Bake at moderate heat until firm or browned.

### Skillet Cookies

1 package dates-cut fine  
2 eggs-beaten  
2 cups Rice Krispies  
1 stick margarine  
3/4 cup sugar  
1 cup chopped dates

Put dates, butter, eggs and sugar over low heat. Cook 15 minutes, stirring often. Remove from heat. Stir in Rice Krispies and nuts. When cool, make into balls and roll in crushed Rice Krispies.

### Almond Butter Cookies

1 cup butter  
1/2 cups sugar  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 cups flour  
1 teaspoon almond extract

Cream butter and sugar. Add salt, flour and extract. Mix well. Chill dough until easy to handle. Form 1" balls and roll in sugar. Stamp with cookie stamp if desired or use bottom of glass dipped in sugar. Bake at 350 degrees 12-15 minutes or until browned around edges.

### Crispy Clusters

4-1/2 cups miniature marshmallows  
1-6 ounce package semi-sweet chocolate morsels  
1/2 cup chopped nuts  
1 cups shredded coconut  
5 cups Rice Krispies  
1/2 cup margarine

Melt marshmallows and margarine over low heat. Stir until smooth. Add cereal, coconut and nuts. Mix well. Drop by tablespoons onto waxed paper. Top clusters with melted chocolate and chill.

### Lemon Bars

2 cups sifted flour  
1/2 cup sifted powdered sugar  
1 cup butter  
4 eggs  
1/3 cup lemon juice  
1/2 teaspoon baking powder  
2 cups sugar  
1/4 cup flour

Take first three ingredients of flour, powdered sugar and cut into butter til it resembles meal. Press into pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes until slightly brown. Beat eggs, sugar and lemon juice together. Sift flour and baking powder together and add juice and egg mixture. Pour over crust and bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes. Sprinkle with powdered sugar. Cool and cut into squares.

### Lemon Pecan Dainties

1 cup finely chopped pecans  
1 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon lemon flavoring  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
2/3 cup shortening  
1 egg  
1 tablespoon grated lemon peel  
2 cups flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt

Cream shortening and sugar; add egg, lemon peel, juice and flavoring. Beat well; add sifted dry ingredients and stir in nuts. Shape into 2 rolls and wrap in waxed paper and chill until firm. Slice very thin and bake on ungreased cookie sheet at 350 degrees for 12-15 minutes.



## Emergency farm loans being accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for damages and losses caused by extreme fire hazards occurring August 1, 1999 and continuing in Titus County are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency in Mt. Pleasant and Clarksville.

Titus, Morris, Camp, Franklin and Red River are included in the Texas counties recently named by Secretary of Agriculture, Dan Glickman, eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from extreme fire hazards.

Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75%.

Applications will be accepted until May 1, 2000, but farmers should apply as soon as possible.

FSA offices are open from 8 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

\* Advising individuals to withdraw their money out of banks, credit unions, or other financial institutions and turn it over to them for "safekeeping"

### Tips and warning signs to guard against fraud

\* NEVER give out account information or credit card numbers to someone unless you're certain they are trustworthy. Thieves can appear very sincere and friendly. And they can be very persuasive. All they need is your account number to empty all the money out of your account.

\* Don't enter into a deal if you're being pressured to act immediately.

\* Be wary of people posing as bank officials, police officers, or other government agents who ask you to assist them in an investigation or audit of your financial institution. You may be asked to withdraw cash or give out your account information. No legitimate official would ask a consumer to participate in this type of investigation.

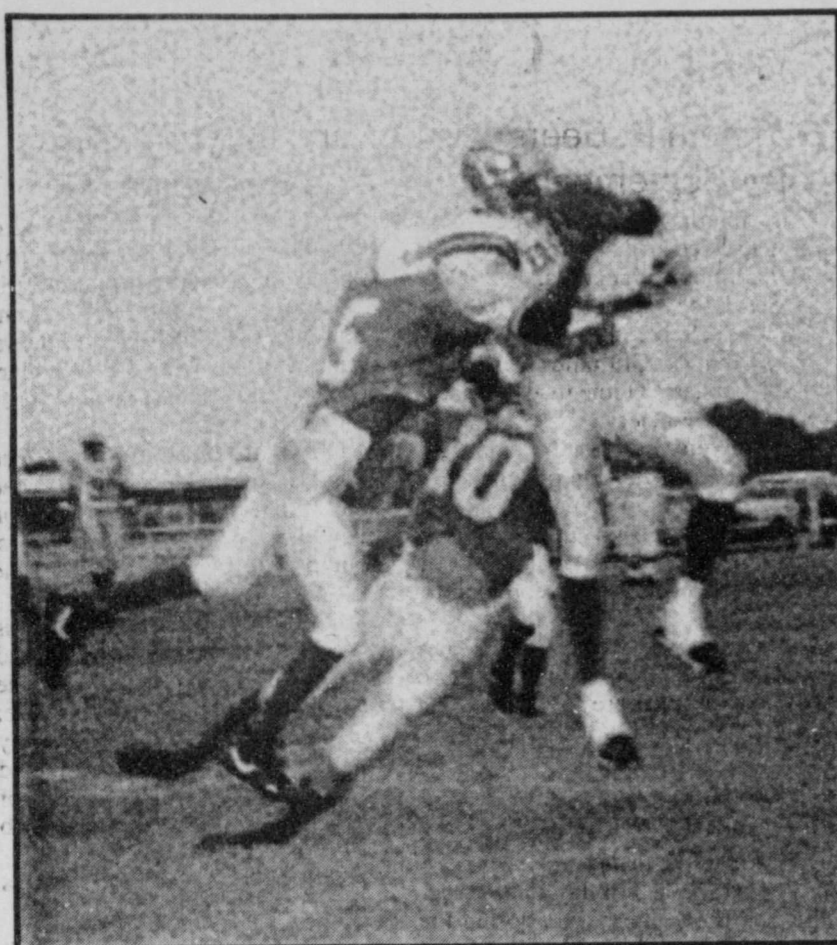

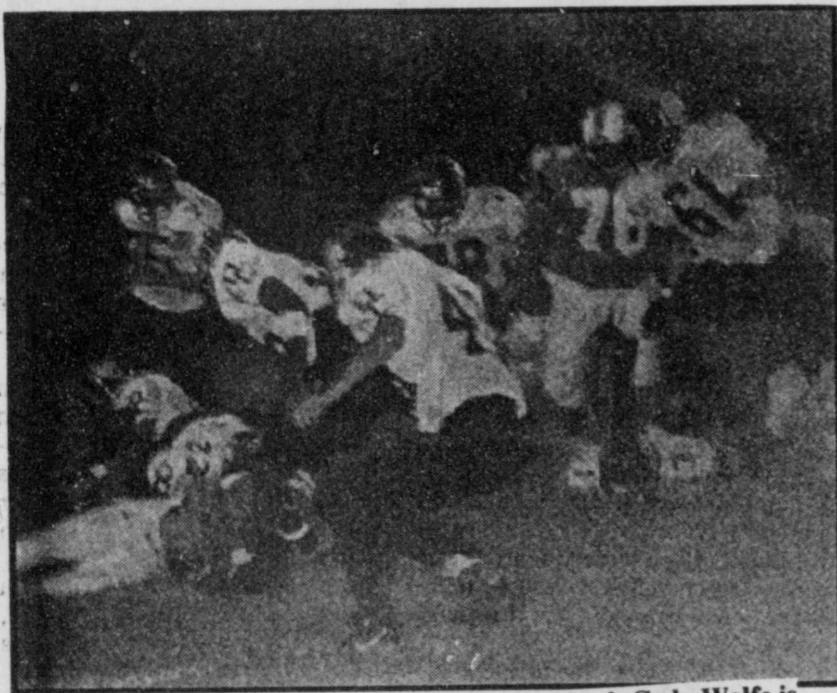

### Rebels win Homecoming game

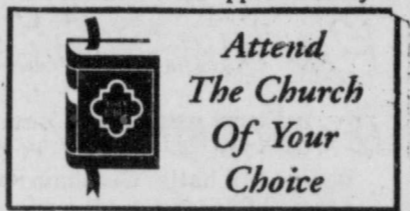

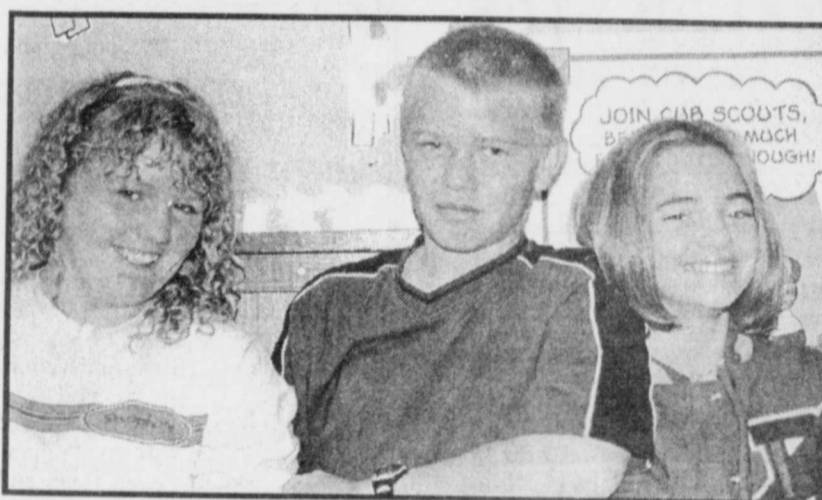

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## Agricultural PCA and North Texas PCA announce merger

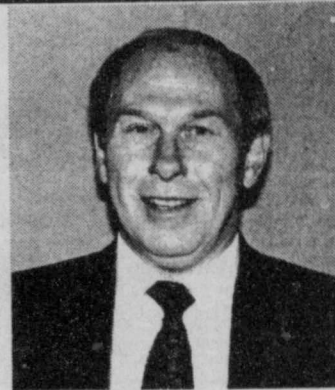

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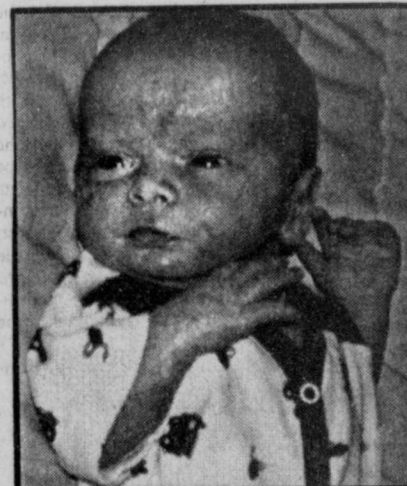

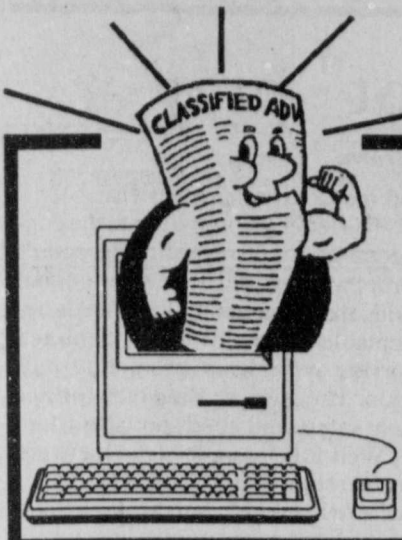

ORDINANCE #153 REGULATING WATER AND SEWER SERVICE AND ESTABLISHING WATER AND SEWER SERVICE CHARGES, AND PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES FOR VIOLATORS

WHEREAS, the City of Detroit, Texas has provided facilities for the collection and treatment of wastewater to promote the health, safety and convenience of its people, and WHEREAS, to insure the proper operation of the water and sewerage works the City shall levy fees for the use thereof and provide for the enforcement thereof.

NOW, therefore be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Detroit, Texas:

Section 1. In General

Section 1-1: Contract for Water Service. City water and/or sewer service shall be delivered pursuant to and only upon a written contract signed by the consumer or purchaser, providing for a term of not less than one month.

Section 1-2: Application and Fee for Water and Sewer Taps (a) Standard Tap Fee: Each tap, Water \$200.00; Sewer \$150.00.

(b) The fees prescribed by subsection (a) shall apply to a 5/8" x 3/4" water tap and a four (4) inch sewer tap within the right-of-way and streets of which the City is responsible for maintenance. The fee for larger water and sewer taps shall be determined by the City based on the actual cost. A deposit based on estimated construction cost will be required in advance for such larger taps.

Section 1-3: Unmetered Water Service

The City shall not provide water service to any user or sell any water to anyone without the volume of water used by the user being properly measured by an approved type device which registers the quantity of water used.

Section 1-1: Water and Sewer Service Charges

The cost of supplying, treating and distributing of all portable water and collecting and treating all wastewater received by the City shall be defrayed by the following users cost recovery system:

(a) User's Charge to be paid monthly by all users;

(b) An Excessive Strength Sewer Surcharge will be paid monthly by users whose average wastewater discharge exceeds 300mg/l BOD5 and/or suspended solids exceeds 300 mg/l. This charge is in addition to the user charge.

(c) An Industrial Sewer Recovery Charge is to be paid annually by all industries as identified in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, 1972, Office of Management and Budget, as amended and supplemented; provided their use exceeds 25,000 gallons on any day in the year.

Division A-Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing

Division B-Mining

Division D-Manufacturing

Division E: Transportation, Communication, Electric, Gas and Sanitary Services

Division I-Services

This charge shall be paid in addition to the Users Sewer Charge and/or in addition to the Excessive Strength Sewer Surcharge (if applicable).

"User's Sewer Charge"

This charge shall recover all annual costs incurred by the City in the operation and maintenance of its water and sewerage. These costs shall include, but are not limited to, all operational costs, maintenance costs, replacement costs of existing facilities, and annual revenue bond debt service requirements. The Sewer charge will be based on per unit of wastewater discharged by the user at a strength not to exceed 300mg/l BOD5 and 300mg/l SS.

The charge will be composed of a minimum monthly bill with an allowable usage to be paid by all users, and a rate per unit of volume in excess of the minimum allowable. If a sewer user can furnish satisfactory evidence

that on an annual basis, in excess of twenty percent of the volume of water delivered to him is not returned to the city sewer, his unit volume of wastewater discharges shall be adjusted by the amount of said non-returned water. The burden of proof shall lie with the user.

Section II-2 Water Rates

(a) Charges for water furnished by the City are hereby fixed at the following rates per gallon per month, for all classes of users, as registered by the user's water meter: \$15.00 for first 2,000 gallons (minimum bill); \$2.50 per 1,000 gallons over 2,000 gallons minimum.

(b) The following minimum monthly charges for water furnished by the city, based on the size meter or tap, are hereby fixed: Meter or Tap Size: 5/8" (2000 gallons allowed) standard. Minimum Bill: \$15.00

(c) Where a water tap is used solely for standby fire protection from an approved water sprinkler system having audible alarm, and where no water is used or consumed from such tap for purposes other than fire protection, no minimum fee shall be charged under subsection (b), nor shall water used for fire fighting be charged for.

Section II-3 Sewer Rates-For Customers Using City Water

(a) Charges for sewer services furnished by the city to customers who are also users of city water are hereby fixed at the following rates for all classes of users, based on the water used, as registered by the users water meter:

\$12.00 for first 2,000 gallons (minimum bill); \$1.30 per 1,000 gallons for all over the minimum bill

(b) The charge for sewer service for a single family residence only shall not exceed \$19.25 per month, regardless of metered water consumption.

(c) Users desiring to discharge sewerage into the city's sewerage system, the strength of which sewage exceeds 275ppm 5 day BOD and/or 300ppm of suspended solids, and which is acceptable under the city's Sewer Use Ordinance may do so upon written permission of the City and by paying the monthly user's charge and the excessive strength surcharge.

(1) "Surcharge", Attachment 2. The user's surcharge shall recover the pro rate share of all the annual cost incurred by the city in the operation and maintenance of its sewage treatment facility. These costs shall include, but are not limited to, all operational costs, maintenance costs, replacement revenue bond debt service requirements. Should the sewage treatment cost, then the cost of the sewage treatment is set and fifty percent (50%) of the total cost of operating all city sewerage facilities.

The charge shall be based on the unit volume discharge of the user at the user's discharge strength and suspended solid content of the user's wastewater, but not less than "normal". The surcharge shall be a factor, never less than 0.0, which is to be multiplied times the operating and maintenance unit volume cost (user's charge) times the user's volume of discharge based on one of the following formulas:

(i) separate collection and treatment cost not maintained Surcharge= (users charge x 50% (BOD-300+SS-300) 300 300

(ii) separate collection and treatment cost maintained (Q&M Treat. Pl.) Total Pl. Flow (BOD-300+SS-300)V+Surcharge 300 +300

where BOD is the discharge strength (not less than 300 in mg/l), SS is the discharge concentration (not less than 300) in mg/l, and V is the users wastewater pollution grants received by the city amortized over a 30 year period, without interest charges, in accordance with the following formulas:

(EQCIV + (EGT)50% V + (EGT)50% V) RC=CDVxA TDVxA TDSxA where RC=users recovery cost in \$ FGC=federal grants for collection system in \$ FGT=federal grants for treatment plant in \$

CDV=collection system design volume in MGD TDV=treatment plant design volume in MGD TDS=treatment plant design strength in pounds of BOD5+TSS A=30 years V=users volume MG per year S=users strength per year in pounds of BOD5+TSS, however, in no event will either the user's BOD5 or TSS be less than the equivalent of 300 mg/l and 300mg/l respectively.

An example calculation is shown

in Attachment No. 2 hereto.

The city shall retain fifty percent (50%) of the recovery charge to be used solely for expansion or reconstruction of the sewerage facilities. The funds may be reinvested by the city in obligations guaranteed as to principal and interest by the U.S. Government or any agency thereof (Federal Register Vol. 39, Number 29-Monday, February 11, 1974, and its amendments) so long as the interest so earned is accumulated to this fund.

The city shall return fifty percent (50%) of the recovery charge to the U.S. Treasury on an annual basis.

Section II-4: Sewer Rates-For Customers Not Using City Water

(a) Single family residence sewerage customers, who are not also water customers of the city, shall pay a flat rate charge of \$13.00 per month for sewerage service. All other classes of sewerage customers, who are not also water users of the city, shall pay a monthly rate to be determined by the city based on the user's estimated maximum contribution of wastewater to the sewerage system.

(b) Any occupied structure within the city limits which has city and/or sewerage available to it and said service abuts upon adjacent to said property on which the structure is located, shall pay the minimum sewerage charges whether said structure is connected to said service or not.

Section II-5: Computation When Meter Fails to Register

In cases where a water meter shall fail, from any cause, to register water usage and consumption for any month or portion thereof, the city, in its discretion, shall compute the estimated actual usage and make charges for water and sewer service on the basis of an average of the metered or registered usage during the three (3) months immediately preceding.

Section II-6: Adjustment for Water Lost or Wasted

No deduction or adjustment of the charges made for water and sewer service shall ever be made on account of any water lost or wasted, as a result of leaks in fixtures, frozen pipes or other causes, unless such deduction or adjustment shall be directed by the City Council following a thorough and complete investigation of the circumstances surrounding such loss or waste.

Section II-7: Deposit to Assure Payment

(a) Each purchaser or consumer of city water and/or sewer service at the time of making application for said service, shall make a deposit with the City in the amount of \$75.00.

(b) The charges for water service and sewer service established by this article shall be chargeable as a lien and legal charge against the deposit made pursuant to this section.

(c) User deposits shall not bear interest.

Section II-8 Billing: When and Where Payable

(a) The City shall render bills for water and sewer charges prescribed by this article in monthly cycles, as may be convenient, and the monthly bills shall be due and payable at the City Hall as follows:

(1) All bills and accounts shall be billed on the next succeeding 1st day of the month following the period for which such service was rendered, and such bills and accounts shall be due and payable on the 10th day of following month.

(2) Accounts not paid in full when due shall be subject to a \$5.00 late charge.

Section II-9: Discontinuance of Water and/or Sewer Service for Failure to Pay

If any person shall fail to pay the bill for water service or for sewer service rendered to such person by the City before the expiration of ten (10) days after the date on which such bill is due and payable, the water service of such person shall be discontinued, and such services shall not again be resumed until such person shall have paid the delinquent water and sewer bill in full, including late charges, together with a reconnecting fee of \$25.00. It shall be unlawful for any person, other than a duly authorized employee of the City, to reconnect such service.

Section II-10: Water and Sewer Rates for Customers Outside of the City Limits

The water and sewer user charges outside the city limits of the City of Detroit shall be fixed as 125% of the rates herein.

Section II-11: Failure to Pay

In addition to sanctions provided for by this ordinance, the city is entitled to exercise sanctions provided for by the other ordinances of the city

for failure to pay the bill for water and sanitary sewer service when due.

Section II-12: Severability

If any provisions of this ordinance, or the application thereof to any person or circumstances be held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the Ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end, the provisions are declared to be severable.

Section II-13: Effective Date

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, recording and publication as provided by law.

## Let us "not" pray

Organized prayer at football games and other school activities is now not permissible according to a letter my husband, who is president of the Rivercrest ISD school board, received recently from the TASB Legal Services.

TASB has long advocated school districts' ability to allow student-led, student-initiated, nonproselytizing, nonsectarian prayer at school activities. But last February, the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals held that a district policy allowing such invocations and benedictions at high school football games violated the Establishment Clause of the United States Constitution. Doe v. Santa Fe Indep. Sch. Dist., 168 F. 3d 806 (5th Cir. 1999). The court made clear that a school district violates the Establishment Clause if it allows someone to recite a prayer over the loudspeaker at a football game. It does not matter whether the person leading the prayer is a school district employee, a member of the clergy or a student. Because the Fifth Circuit Court has jurisdiction over Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi, this decision is binding on all Texas school districts. Although the decision has been appealed to the United States Supreme Court, all school districts must comply with the Fifth Circuit's ruling unless the Su-

preme Court rules otherwise.

The letter goes on to state the consequences of disregarding the court's order which could be very serious but adds that a moment of silence is acceptable as long as it is not enacted for the purpose of promoting religion. The purpose should be for student safety and good sportsmanship.

Well folks, I understand there are many religions and those who do not believe in religion but if I understood my history lessons of way back when, communism was fought in more than one war. I also understand the communist system did not include freedom of worship regardless of the type. I believe everyone has their rights, it is the American way, but when law suits are filed to stop a simple prayer which is nondenominational things have gone to far. Even though everyone may not belong to the same religion or none at all, this is about respect. If you choose not to bow your head, don't, if you choose not to listen and believe, don't, but a little respect for others who do doesn't physically or mentally hurt anyone. What is next? Taking "In God We Trust" off our money?

I encourage everyone to write their congressman, senator or even Governor, George Bush and express your opinions on this ruling.
