This past Sunday I attended the 125th anniversary of the 1st Presbyterian Church in Deport. What I began thinking about will apply, almost without fail, to any church or community, however.

As I sat there in the pew I could almost feel the presence of my parents, grand parents, even the great-grandparents and great-great-grandparents that I never actually knew there beside me.

The present minister and former ministers each had their say, and when Rev. Sam Rice began to speak he absolutely hit the nail on the head. He said that he and Margie had lain awake one night and began counting the members of the church who had died during the 25 years Sam pastored the church. They got up to 48, then into the 50s, and then, later, they spoke with other church members and brought the total to 70.

Seventy church members, dead and gone to their reward! Seventy members, pillars of the church, serving as teachers, elders, deacons, faithfully attending Sunday after Sunday.

Sam said "if anyone had told me that this church could survive with the loss of those 70 people I would have said 'no way, no way'".

And, I realized, I would have said the same thing.

Yet, here we sat, still going strong, still active, still firm in our foundations!

And it hit me that every generation must think the same thing.

Back in the 1800s, when those pillars fell, those succeeding them must have thought that things just couldn't go on without them.

Generation after generation, we must have all felt the same thing.

And yet, churches everywhere, communities everywhere have existed generation after generation as those we think cannot be replaced are.

It was such a comforting thought, such an inspiring thought to realize.

Things do go on, in their natural, progressive order. All is as it has been, is now, and shall be in the future. Isn't that wonderful?

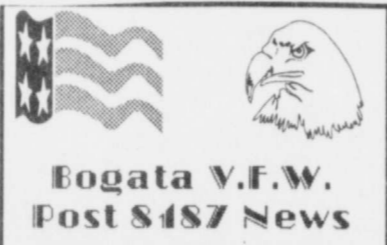
Ruth Chipman-Sweet Potato Pecan Pie-look out Thanksgiving, here we come!

Orange Slice Cookies
Juanita Sparks

(13 ounce) bag orange slice candy-cut in thin slices
1 cup white sugar
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup shortening
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup coconut
2 cups flour
2 cups oats
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cream shortening and sugars. Add eggs and vanilla. Add remaining ingredients. Mix. Shape into 1-inch balls and bake 10-12 minutes. Makes 6 dozen.

Chicken Pot Pie
Juanita Sparks

4 cups cubed chicken
1 (10-1/2 ounce) chicken broth
1 (10-1/2 ounce) cream of chicken soup or cream of mushroom
1 cup English peas
1 cup diced potatoes
3/4 cup diced onion
1 diced carrot
salt and pepper to taste

Topping:
2 cups biscuit mix
1-1/4 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon celery seed
1 teaspoon garlic powder

Cook ingredients, except chicken, in small amount of water for 10 minutes. Add chicken. Pour into oiled casserole dish or individual custard-type dishes. Make a batter of the topping ingredients. This will be thin. Pour over chicken mixture. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake at 350 degrees for 30-35 minutes.

Chicken and Dressing Casserole
Jauvane Carpenter

4 cooked chicken breast
1 can creamy chicken mushroom (8 ounce) sour cream
1 package corn bread dressing mix
8 ounces chicken broth

Chop up cooked chicken and spread in bottom of 9-inch casserole dish. Combine soup and sour cream; pour over chicken. Sprinkle dressing mix on top and pour chicken broth over mix. Cover with foil. Cook at 375 degrees for 40-50 minutes.

Baked Spaghetti
Jauvane Carpenter

1 cup chopped onion
1 cup chopped green pepper
1 tablespoon butter
1 (28 ounce) can tomatoes with liquid-cut up
1 (4 ounce) can mushrooms-drained
2 teaspoons oregano
1 pound ground beef-brown & drain
12 ounce spaghetti-cook & drain
2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese
1 (10-3.4 ounce) can condensed cream mushroom soup
1/4 can water

1/4 cup grated parmesan

In large skillet, saute onion and green pepper in butter until tender. Add tomatoes, mushrooms, olives and oregano. Add ground beef, if desired. Simmer, uncovered for 10 minutes. Place half of the spaghetti in greased 13 x 9-inch baking dish. Top with half of the vegetable mixture. Sprinkle with 1 cup cheddar cheese. Repeat layers. Mix soup and water until smooth; pour over casserole. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake uncovered for 30-35 minutes at 350 degrees or until heated through.

Firecracker Casserole
Marianne Ladd

2 pounds ground beef
1 medium onion-chopped
1 (15 ounce) can black beans-rinse & drain
1-2 tablespoons chili powder
2-3 teaspoons ground cumin
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 flour tortillas
1 (10-3/4 ounce) condensed cream of mushroom soup
1 (10 ounce) can diced Ro-tel
1 cup (4 ounces) shredded cheddar cheese

In skillet, cook beef and onion until meat is no longer pink; drain. Add beans, chili powder, cumin and salt. Transfer to a greased 13 x 9-inch baking dish. Arrange tortillas over the top. Combine soup and tomatoes and pour over tortillas. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake uncovered for 25-30 minutes at 350 degrees or until heated through.

Chocolate Brownie Cookies
Marianne Ladd

6 squares semi-sweet baking chocolate
4 squares unsweetened baking chocolate
6 tablespoons butter
1-1/4 cup sugar
3 eggs
2 teaspoons vanilla
1 cup flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 cups toasted chopped walnuts

Heat oven to 325 degrees. Microwave chocolate and butter in bowl on HI for 1-1/2-2 minutes, or until chocolate is almost melted. Stir in sugar until well blended. Mix in eggs and vanilla. Stir in flour, baking powder and salt. Stir in nuts. Drop by rounded teaspoonfuls onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 12 minutes or until set. Do not overbake. Cool 5 minutes and store in airtight container. Makes 3 dozen.

Pretzel Chicken Nuggets

4 boneless skinless chicken breast halves
1/4 cup all purpose flour
1/4 cup fat-free egg product or two egg whites
1 tablespoon yellow mustard
2 cups fat-free mini-pretzel-twists-crushed barbecue sauce or sweet and sour sauce

Rinse chicken with cold water and pat dry with paper towels. Cut each breast into 6-8 bite-size pieces. Place flour in large plastic bag. In shallow dish, blend egg and mustard. Place crushed pretzels in separate shallow dish. Add chicken nuggets to flour in bag; shake to coat evenly. Then dip nuggets in egg mixture and coat evenly with pretzels. Place on greased baking sheet. Bake at 400 degrees for 9-11 minutes or until chicken is done. Serve with warm sauce of choice.

Sweet Potato Pecan Pie
Ruth Chipman

1 pound yams or sweet potatoes-cook & peel
1/4 cup butter
1 (14 ounce) Eagle Brand milk
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 teaspoon grated orange rind
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
1/4 teaspoons salt
1 egg
1 (16 ounce) graham cracker crust
Pecan Topping:
1 egg
2 tablespoons dark corn syrup
2 tablespoons firmly packed brown sugar
1 tablespoon melted butter
1/2 teaspoon maple flavoring
1 cup chopped pecans

Beat together egg, syrup, sugar, butter and flavoring. Stir in pecans.

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. With mixer, beat hot yams or potatoes with butter until smooth. Add remaining ingredients except crust and pecan topping; mix well. Pour into crust. Bake 20 minutes. Meanwhile, prepare Pecan Topping Recipe. Remove pie from oven; reduce heat to 350 degrees. Spoon pecan topping on pie. Bake 25 minutes longer or until set. Cool. Serve warm or at room temperature. Garnish with orange zest (twist if desired).

Broccoli Cornbread
Martha Glover

2 sticks oleo
1-1/2 cups small curd cottage cheese
4 eggs
2 boxes Jiffy cornbread mix
1 (10 ounce) box frozen chopped broccoli

Melt oleo in 9 x 13 pan. Mix beaten eggs, cottage cheese, drained broccoli and melted oleo. Then add cornbread mix. Cook 40 minutes at 425 degrees.

Pineapple Dream Pie
Martha Glover

1 small container Cool Whip
1/4 cup lemon juice
1 small can crushed pineapple-drained
1/2 can Eagle Brand milk
1 cup chopped pecans
1 graham cracker crust

Mix all ingredients and pour into graham cracker crust. Chill 1-2 hours. If desired use whole can of milk and double the ingredients to make two pies.

He was a retired farmer and rancher and a veteran of World War II, serving in the U.S. Army.

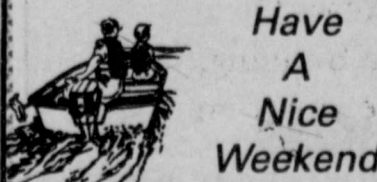

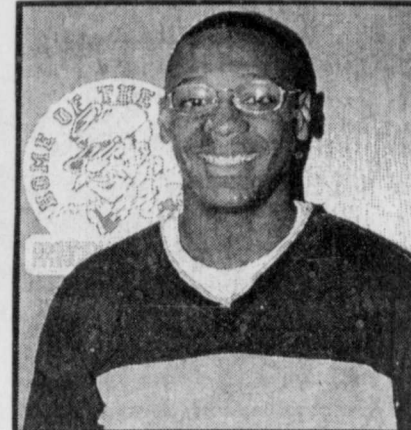

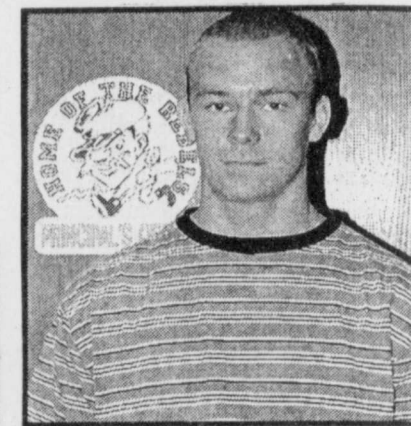

Rivercrest Rebel teams take 3 of 4 games

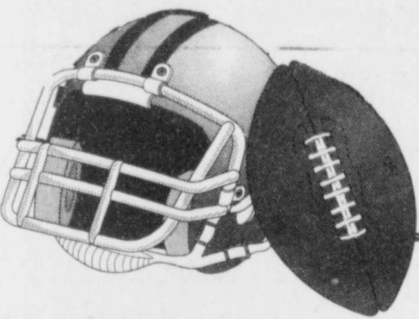

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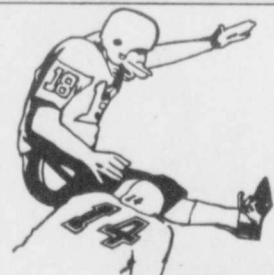
CC teams compete in Mt. Pleasant

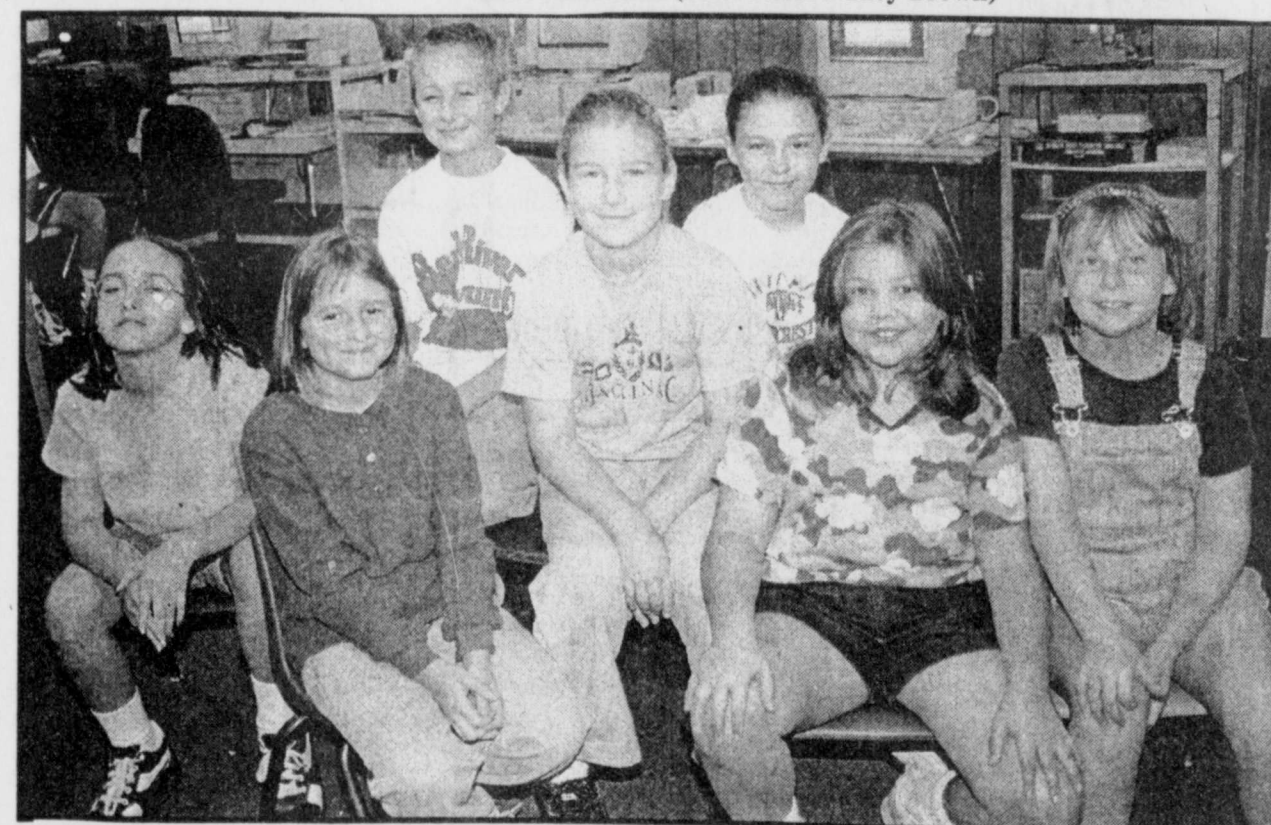

"Notch" Reform

(NAPS)—There could be good news for the estimated ten million Americans born from 1917 through 1926.



Congress is considering how to help older Americans short-changed by Social Security because of when they were born.

Although these people, "notch babies," as they are known, currently get up to \$1,000 a year less in Social Security benefits than other recipients, concerned legislators are working on ways to end the discrepancy.

Three bills, H.R. 148, H.R. 568 and S. 390 offer these people a choice between a lump-sum payment of \$5,000 in four annual installments or four years of larger monthly payments.

"TREA Senior Citizens League (TSCL) has long supported, and in fact originally proposed, the type of cost-capped solution represented by these three bills," says TSCL Executive Director Michael Zabko.

His organization is a national group of active seniors protecting earned retirement benefits.

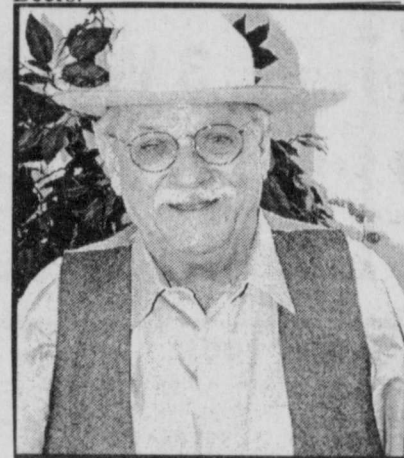
