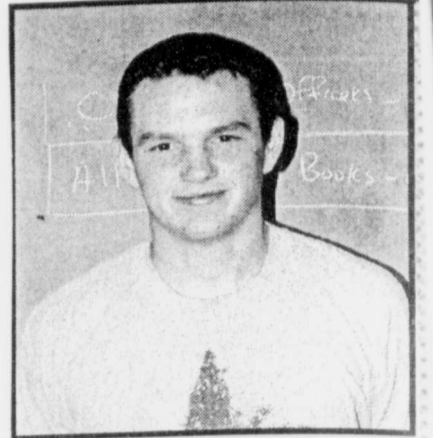

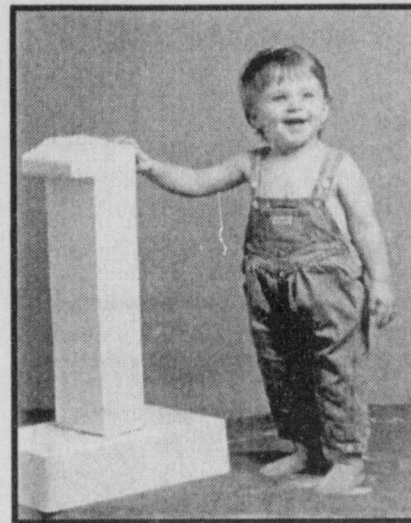

The NPT is the only land conservancy dedicated to preserving America's national system of parks, wildlife and historic monuments.

By helping fund park land purchasing by environmental groups and encouraging the government to buy land inside its parks as well, Americans can be part of the solution.

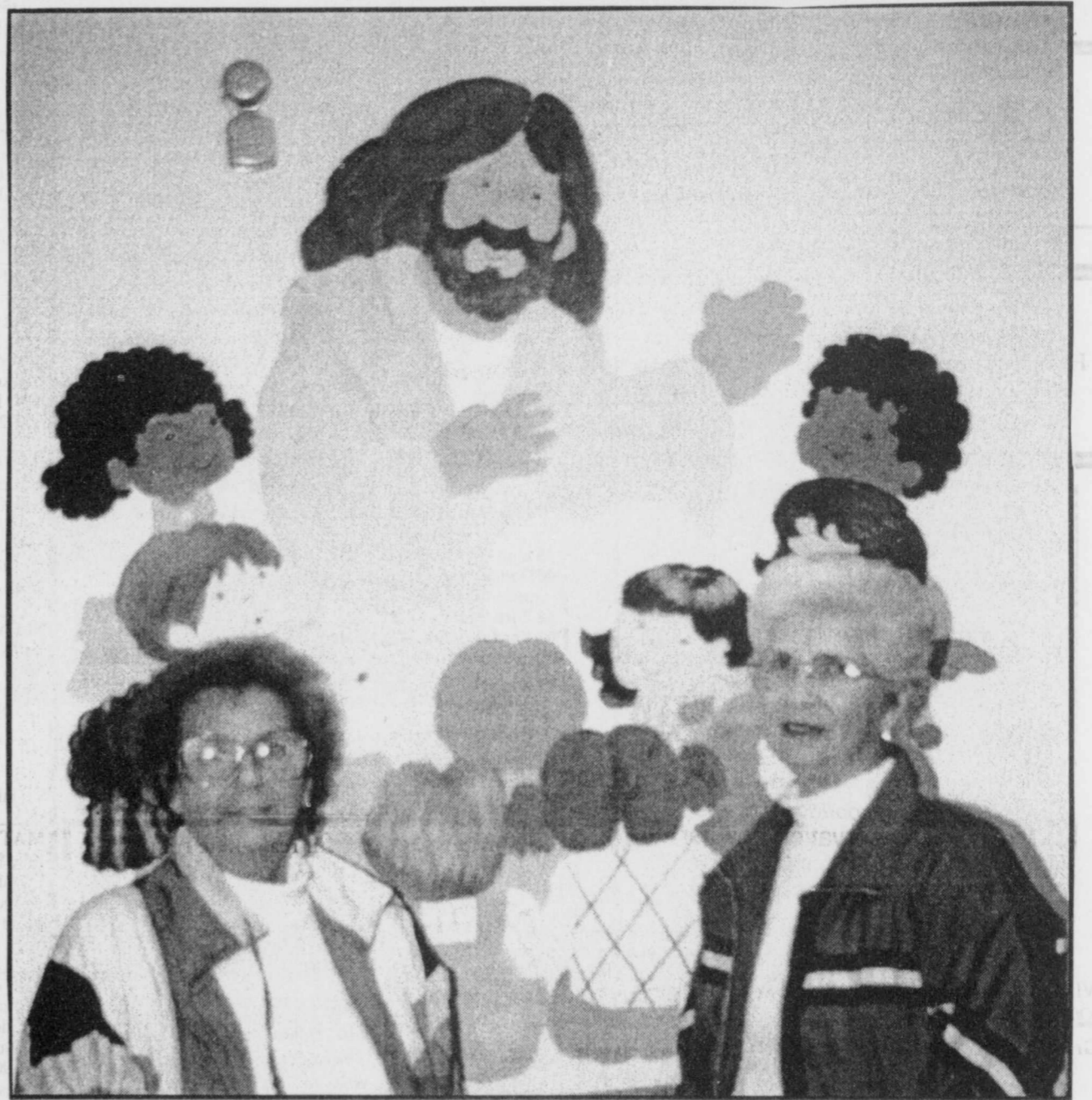

Janice Martin is reported doing well after suffering a compression fracture on her left foot.

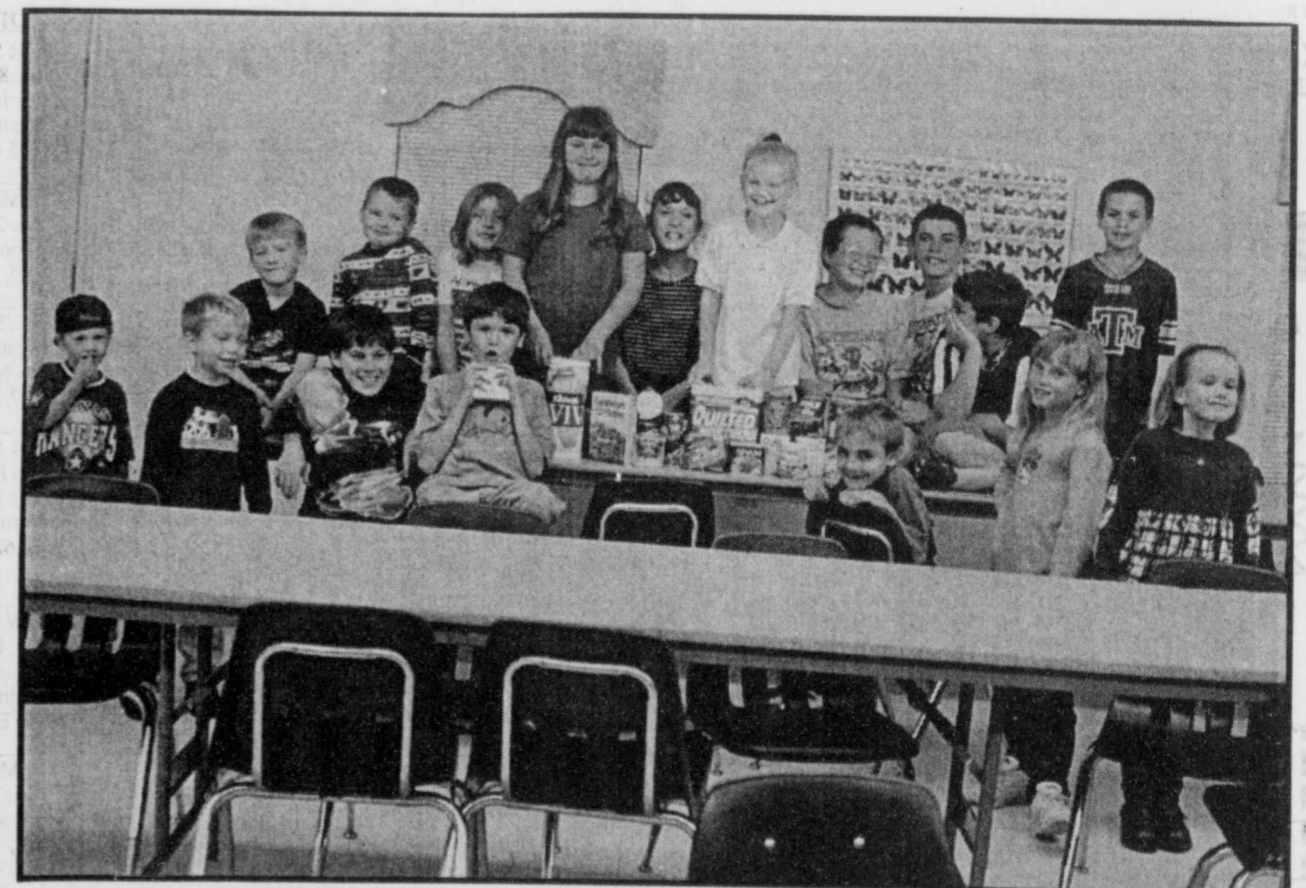

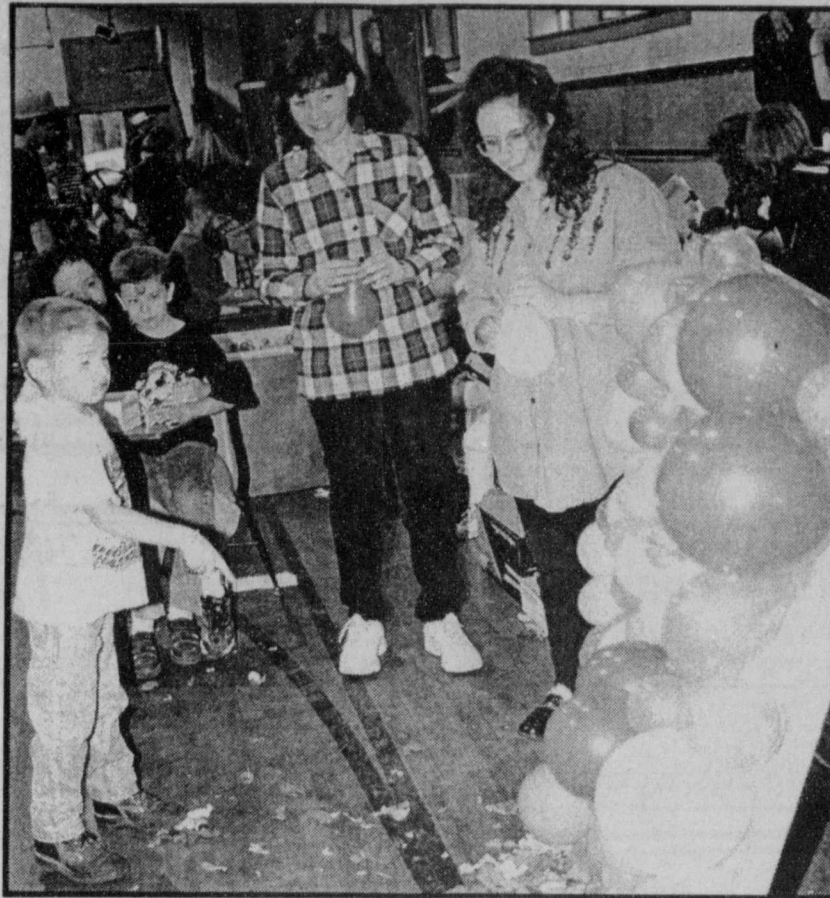
