Long-time readers may recall that Thomas and I have tried everything to see a bear in the wild. When I commented on that fact I was deluged with stories, photos and tales of all the bears people have seen.

Well, I've decided that it's a nation-wide conspiracy.

Thomas, his sister Mary, and myself took a quick trip to the **Great Smoky Mountains this** past weekend.

First, I read in the park guide about the extremely large number of bear cubs born this past year. Park sightings are way up, and they estimate there is now a bear per square mile of the park. Hooray, we thought, a good chance to see a

Over the weekend as we diligently toured the park here are a FEW of the bear stories we heard.

One couple we talked with at a gorgeous scenic overlook told us all about seeing a mother bear in a hickory tree at Cades Cove ripping off chunks of branches and throwing them down to her two cubs.

Another woman told us about how she was standing in the dark filming the lights of Gatlinburg below when she heard a rustle in the leaves and looked into the eyes of a bear not three feet from her.

Keeping the game interesting were



(NAPS)—America's national system of parks is in danger, according to a report just released by the National Park Trust.



To protect our national parks, citizens need to ask the government to purchase the private lands being held inside national

This report, based on public documents from the National Park Service, shows that 200,000 of the total 6 million acres of privately-held land within the boundaries of our parks are in danger of being lost to development or sale and neither federal nor state park agencies can do much to protect it.

"The danger that this land could be sold for development, bulldozing, clear cutting or for other destructive purposes constitutes the single greatest threat to the nation's cherished system of national and state parks," said Paul Pritchard, president of the National Park Trust (NPT).

The NPT is the only land conservancy dedicated to preserving America's national system of parks, wildlife and historic monuments.

By helping fund park land purchasing by environmental groups and encouraging the government to buy land inside its parks as well, Americans can be part of the solution.
