Red River County Sheriff Bob Edrington recently announced his candidacy for re-election to the office of County Sheriff.

Sheriff Edrington was born and raised in Red River County, and is the son of D.D. and Edith Edrington of Annona. He attended school in Annona and graduated from Clarksville High School in 1969. He attended the University of Texas in Austin.

Edrington and his wife, Linda, live south of Avery. They have two children, Amy and Matthew, who attend school in Avery.

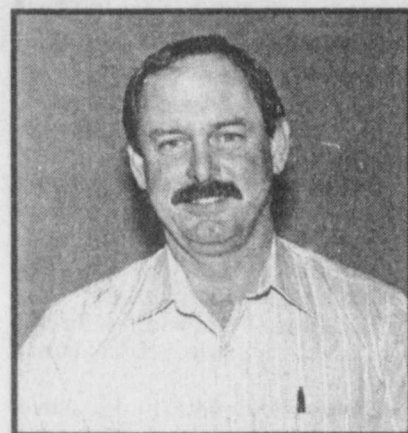
"I think we have made a lot of progress in the last seven years while I have been in office," the Sheriff said. "In the last three years, the county has contracted with Wisconsin and has received \$2.5 million to house their inmates."

"We have used those funds to pay for the new jail with no taxpayers' money spent on it or for its operation. I am also very pleased with our inmate work program which has helped do work for many organizations and towns in our county."

"There is more that I would like to do to keep improving my office," Edrington said. "I hope the voters will give me the opportunity to continue making improvements."

Edrington said he is proud of the officers and personnel at the Sheriff's Department. "Without their efforts, it would have been impossible to make the improvements that we've made so far."

"I appreciate your continued support of my office," Edrington concluded, "and the support given me during my seven years as your Sheriff."

This week we are preparing you for the "candy" season! That's right. . . CANDY. . . the ultimate in kitchen flops! Now, don't tell me that you never made a batch of candy that failed! Everybody has. . . RIGHT! You either have to break it with a hammer or eat it with a spoon! Well, I have come across some recipes that will change all of this. Except. . . **DO NOT MAKE CANDY WHEN IT IS RAINING! WATER IS THE ENEMY OF ALL HOMEMADE CANDIES!**

Anyone who has ever attempted candy-making when the humidity is high, knows this! So lets take a trip down Candy Lane with these few handy tips!

1) Don't be afraid to add character to your candy! Instead of the old stand-by chocolate, use butterscotch, vanilla or a variety of the chocolate flavors. There are many!

2) Line pans with foil or waxed paper, butter or spray with butter-flavored cooking spray. This will make it easier to remove from the

pan and you are able to cut nice, uniform squares for gift giving or just plain old eating!

3) Gather all of your needed ingredients and tools before you start to cook your candy! This is a must, because it is very hard to chop and dice when your candy is boiling and it calls for you to stir constantly.

4) Use a wooden spoon! Plastic melts and metal conducts heat and seems to burn your hand! Burns are not good!

5) You can use a hand mixer while mixture is hot! Saves your muscles and makes candy creamier!

6) Don't rely on the temperature of your stove. All stoves are different and will cook at varied heat. Use the "soft-ball" method. With metal spoon, drop small amount into spoon and lower into a small amount of cool water. If mixture form a soft-ball, candy is ready.

7) Try to prepare your candy when weather is clear and sunny. Although, candy can be made during high-humidity days, dry is better!

8) Keep candy in airtight containers such as ziplock bags or covered containers. Candy will keep up to two weeks!

Fudge Mania!**

Lunatic Fudge

1/4 cup butter or margarine (1/2 stick)
2-1/2 cups sugar
2/3 cup evaporated milk
10-12 ounces semi-sweet chocolate chips or milk chocolate chips or chocolate mint chips or white chips
peanut butter chips or butterscotch chips
6-7 ounces marshmallow creme or you may substitute 2 cups mini marshmallows
1 cup walnuts or pecans chopped
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
Line 9x9 pan with aluminum foil (makes for easier removal). Place flavor chips, vanilla and nuts into a 3 quart saucepan or bowl and set aside. Set butter aside to warm. Heat milk at medium setting until warm and then add sugar. Bring to a rolling boil, while stirring constantly with wooden spoon. Add marshmallow creme. Bring back to a boil for 5 full minutes by the clock (start once the boil resumes). The mixture will start to turn brown during the boil. If brown flakes begin to appear, turn down heat. Remove from heat, mix in butter and pour hot mixture over chips, vanilla and nuts without scraping the sides of the hot pan. Mix thoroughly and pour into prepared pan. Cool at room temperature. Remove from pan and cut into squares.

Crazy Mamie's Fudge

1/4 cup butter (1/2 stick chilled)
4-3/4 cups sugar
12 ounces evaporated milk
12 ounces semi-sweet chocolate chips
11.5 ounces milk chocolate chips
13-14 ounces marshmallow creme or 4 cups mini-marshmallows
2 cups nuts-chopped
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 teaspoon imitation butter flavor
Line 13x9 pan with foil, butter and set aside. Place chips, flavorings and half of marshmallow creme and nuts into large pan and set aside. Brings milk and sugar to rolling boil while stirring constantly with a wooden spoon or single stem mixer. Add remaining half of marshmallow creme. This will stop boiling process. Bring back to rolling boil for 8 minutes. The mixture will expand and start to turn brown during the boil. Remove from heat, mix in butter and pour over chips, vanilla and nuts without scraping sides of pan. Mix thoroughly and pour into prepared pan. Makes 4 pounds of fudge.

Popcorn Fudge

1/8 cup butter or 1/4 stick
2-1/2 cups sugar
2/3 cup evaporated milk
10-12 ounces chocolate chips
5-6 ounces marshmallow creme
1 teaspoon vanilla
4 cups popcorn-popped
Prepare popcorn and set aside. Line 9x13 pan, butter sides and set aside. Heat milk and sugar at medium until warm. Bring to rolling boil while stirring constantly with wooden spoon. Add creme and bring back to full rolling boil. Remove from heat and add remaining ingredients and mix until thoroughly melted. Add popcorn and pour into prepared pan. Cook and remove from pan to cut squares.

Penuche Fudge

1/8 cup butter or margarine (1/4 stick chilled)
1-1/2 cups sugar
1 cup brown sugar
2/3 cup evaporated milk
4-5 ounces marshmallow creme
1 cup walnuts or pecans (optional)
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
Line a bread loaf pan with foil, butter and set aside. Heat milk to medium and then add sugars. Bring to rolling boil while stirring constantly with wooden spoon. Add marshmallow creme and bring back to rolling boil for five full minutes. Remove from heat and add vanilla, nuts and butter. Let set unstrirred for about 2 minutes. The butter should start to melt. Add chips and mix thoroughly and pour into prepared pan. Cool at room temperature. Remove from pan and cut into squares.

California Fruit and Nut Fudge

1/4 cup butter or margarine (1/2 stick)
2-1/2 cups sugar
2/3 cup evaporated milk
12 ounces white chips
7 ounces marshmallow creme
1/2 cup California dried dates
1/2 cup California dried apricots
1/2 cup California dried grapes or raisins
1/2 cup California chopped nuts
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
Line 9x9 pan, butter and set aside. Place flavor chips and vanilla in glass bowl and set aside. Set butter aside to warm. Heat milk to medium and then add sugar. Bring to rolling boil and stir constantly with wooden spoon. Add creme and butter. Bring back to boil and boil 5 minutes. Remove from heat and pour mixture over chips and vanilla without scraping sides of pan. Fold in nuts and fruit. Mix thoroughly and pour into prepared pan. Cool and cut into squares.

Fruity Fruitcake Fudge

3 teaspoons butter
6-7 ounces marshmallow creme
2-1/2 cups sugar
2/3 cups evaporated milk
10-12 ounces white chocolate chips
1/2 cup walnuts or pecans chopped
1 teaspoon rum extract
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 teaspoon lemon or orange extract
1/2 cup green candied cherries
1/2 cup red candied cherries
1/2 cup Ocean Spray Craisins or Sun Maid raisins
Line 9x9 pan with foil, butter and set aside. Place chips and extracts into glass dish and set aside. Set butter aside to warm. Combine all fruits and nuts in small bowl and set aside. Total volume of fruit and nuts should not exceed 2 cups. Heat milk and add sugar. Bring to rolling boil and add creme and butter and stir constantly with wooden spoon for five minutes. Remove from heat and pour hot mixture over chips without scraping sides of pan. Mix all chips until mostly melted. Microwave fruit for 30-40 seconds and then add to hot mixture. Mix thoroughly and pour into prepared pan. Cool and cut into squares.

Key-Lime Fudge

1/4 cup butter or margarine (1/2 half stick)
2-1/2 cup sugar
2/3 cup evaporated milk
10-12 ounces white chocolate chips
6-7 ounces marshmallow creme
1/3 cup key Lime juice
1/2 cup almonds or macadamia nuts-chopped
1/4 teaspoon rum extract
1 teaspoon lemon extract
Line 9x9 pan with foil, butter and set aside. Place chips, extracts and nuts into glass dish and set aside. Set butter aside to warm. Hat milk until warm and add sugar. Bring to rolling boil and add marshmallow creme and butter. Mix until creamy. Add Key Lime juice. Bring back to boil and boil five minutes. Remove from heat and pour hot mixture over chips without scraping sides of pan. Mix until chips are melted and then mix in nuts. Pour into prepared pan. Cool and cut into squares.

From the smallest to the largest, federally insured financial institutions have been working to make sure their computer systems will operate smoothly in the Year 2000 (Y2K). In addition, federal and state regulators are closely monitoring the progress of the institutions they supervise to make sure Y2K issues are being addressed. Despite the best efforts of the industry and the regulator, no one can guarantee that everything will work perfectly. That's why financial institution customers may want to consider taking steps in anticipation of the date change. You can refer to the following checklist to prepare yourself for Y2K.

Educate Yourself About Y2K

Keep Copies of Financial Records

Pay Attention to Your Finances

Make Prudent Preparations

Be on Guard Against Y2K Scams

Review Your Deposit Insurance Coverage

Find out what your financial institution is doing to address consumer concerns. If you have questions, speak with a representative who knows about the institution's Y2K program.


As always, keep good records of your financial transactions, especially for the last few months of 1999 and until you get several statements in 2000

As always, balance your checkbook regularly. When you receive a transaction receipt from your institution, check it for accuracy and save it to compare against your statement. It's also smart to review your credit report to make sure it doesn't contain inaccurate information.

Remember all your payment options (checks, credit cards, debit cards, ATMs and tellers) in the event that one doesn't work as planned. The Federal Reserve has plans to ensure that there will be sufficient cash available for consumers. If you withdraw money, make reasonable decisions based on solid information; don't put yourself at risk of being robbed or losing valuable interest payments.

Be skeptical if someone asks for your account information or tries to sell you a product, service or investment that's supposedly Y2K "safe". Protect your personal information, including your bank account, credit card and Social Security numbers.

The federal government's protection of insured deposits will not be affected by Y2K. If you have more than \$100,000 in an insured bank, thrift or credit union, you may want to make sure you understand the insurance rules. Check with your financial institution or call the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation at 1-800-934-FDIC (for banks and savings institutions) or the National Credit Union Administration at 703-518-6330 (for credit unions).

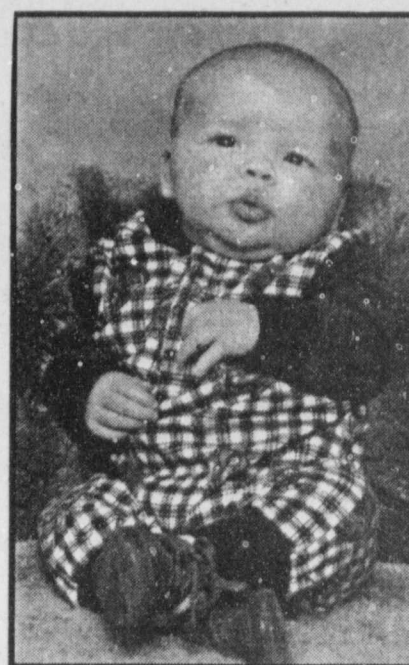
ANKLE SPRAINS

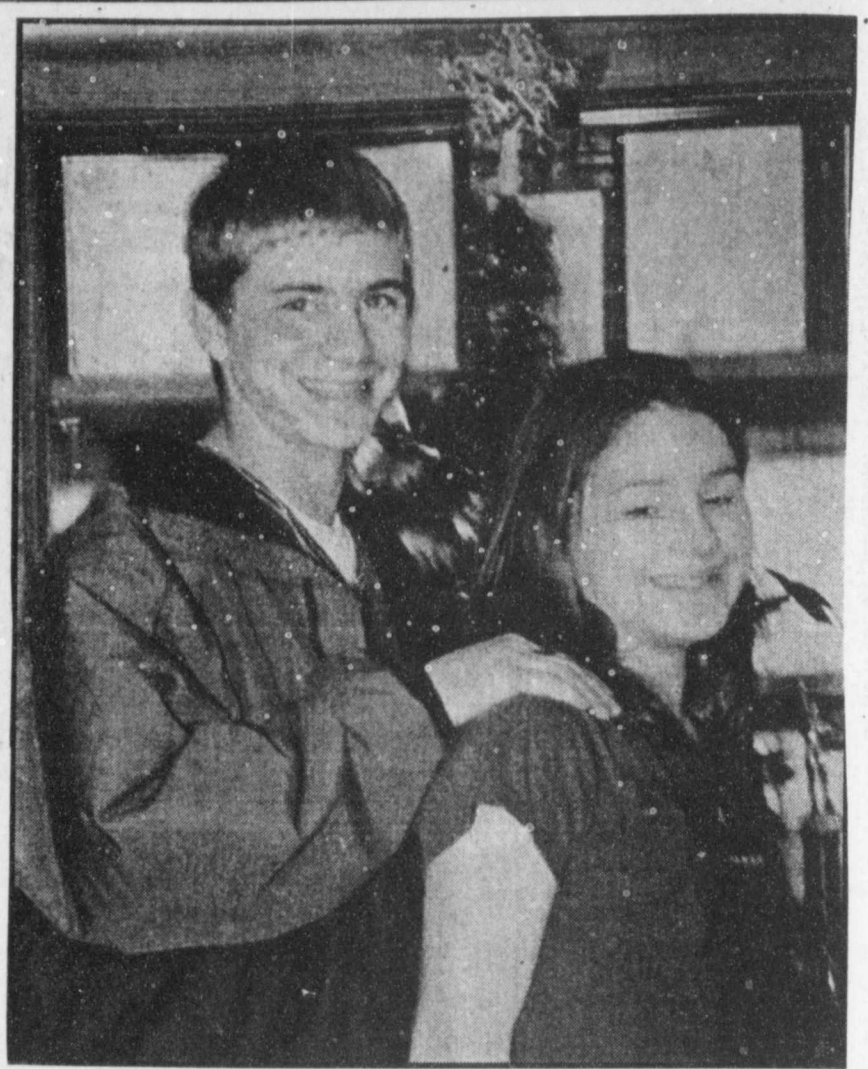

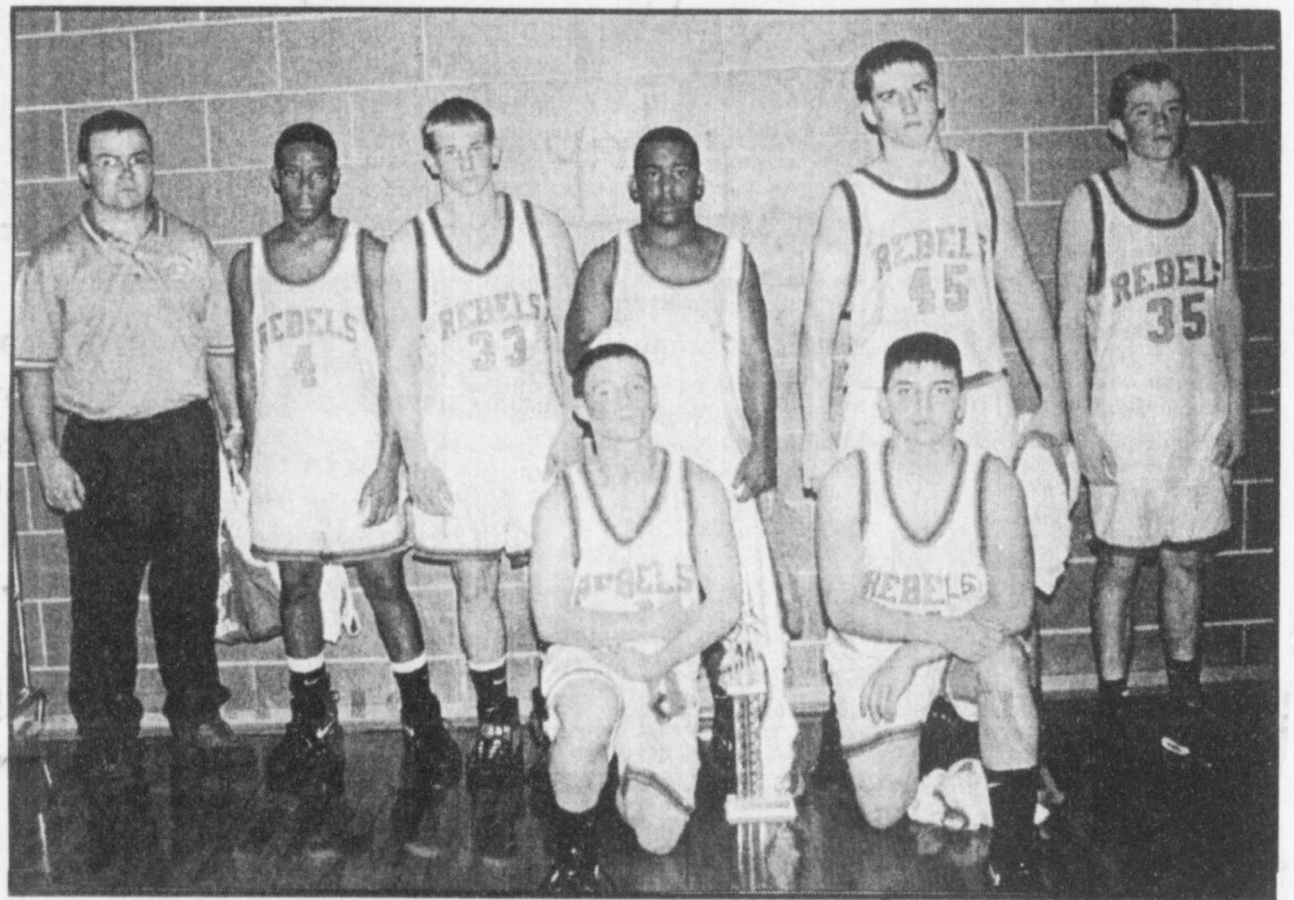

"I Wish"
I wish you could see the sadness of a business man as his livelihood goes up in flames, or that family returning home, only to find their house and belongings damaged or lost for good.

I wish you could know what it is like to search a burning bedroom for trapped children, flames rolling above your head, your palms and knees burning as you crawl, the floor sagging under your weight as the kitchen below you burns.

I wish you could comprehend a wife's horror at 3 a.m. as I check her husband of 40 years for a pulse and find none. I start CPR anyway, hoping to bring him back, knowing intuitively it is too late. But wanting his wife and family to know everything possible was done to try and save his life.

I wish you knew the unique smell of burning insulation, the taste of soot-filled mucus, the feeling of intense heat through your bunker gear, the sound of flames crackling, the eeriness of being able to see absolutely nothing in dense smoke...sensations that I've become too familiar with.

I wish you could understand how it feels to go to work in the morning after having spent most of the night hot and soaking wet at a structure fire.

I wish you could read my mind as I respond to a fire, "Is this a false alarm or a working fire? How is the building constructed? What hazards await me? Is anyone trapped?" Or to an EMS call, "What is wrong with the patient? Is it minor or life threatening? Is the caller really distressed or is he waiting for us with a 2x4 or a gun?"

I wish you could be in the emergency room as a doctor pronounces dead the beautiful five-year old girl that I have been trying to save during the past 25 minutes. Who will never go on her first date, or say the words, "I love you Mommy!" again.

I wish you could know the frustration I feel in the cab of the engine or my personal vehicle, pressing hard on the pedal, pushing again and again on the horn, as people fail to yield the

right-of-way at an intersection or in traffic. When you need us however, your first comment upon our arrival will be, "It took you forever to get here!"

I wish you could know my thoughts as I help extricate a girl of teenage years from the remains of her automobile. "What if this was my sister, my daughter my wife, my girlfriend or my friend? What were her parents reactions going to be when they opened the door to find a police officer with hat in hand?"

I wish you could know how it feels to walk in the back door and greet my family, not having the heart to tell them that I nearly did not come back from the last call.

I wish you could realize the physical, emotional and mental drain or missed meals, lost sleep and forgone social activities, in addition to all the tragedy my eyes have seen.

I wish you could know the brotherhood and self-satisfaction of helping save a life or preserving someone's property, or being able to be there in time of crisis, or creating order from total chaos.

I wish you could understand what it feels like to have a little boy tugging at your arm and asking "Is my Mommy okay?" Not even being able to look in his eyes without tears from your own and not knowing what to say.

Or to have to hold back a long time friend who watches his buddy having rescue breathing done on him as the ambulance pulls away from the wreck caused by a drunk driver. And all along, you know no one had their seat belts on.

Unless you have lived with this kind of life, you will never truly understand or appreciate who I am, who we are, or what our job really means to us...I wish you could, though.

Don't drink and drive

With all of the parties that occur during the holiday season, the number of alcohol-related traffic deaths increases dramatically.

In 1997, Texas led all other states in the number of alcohol-related traffic fatalities. These deaths accounted for about half of all traffic fatalities in Texas, well above the national average of 39%.

About 1/4 of alcohol-related deaths in Texas involved blood alcohol levels of less than .10, the previous standard for legal intoxication.

As a person's blood alcohol concentration (BAC) increases, his or her abilities are impaired. Many tests report that the vast majority of drivers exhibit impairment of critical driving tasks with a BAC of .08. This impairment can result in problems with attention, reaction time, speed control, etc., substantially increasing the risk of a crash.

During this year's legislative session, lawmakers passed a bill that changes the definition of legal intoxication to a BAC of .08 or more.

The law defines "Intoxicated" as not having the normal use of physical or mental faculties as a result of alcohol, a controlled substance, a dangerous drug or a combination of these substances.

It is hoped that a lower BAC level will serve as a deterrent for those who might consider driving after drinking. In addition, the lower BAC standard will result in more drivers being eligible for Driving While Intoxicated charges.

Currently, approximately 16 states have .08 BAC laws. Several of those

states saw significant decreases in the number of alcohol-related fatalities after adopting the lower BAC standards.

A first-time offense of driving while intoxicated is a Class C misdemeanor with a minimum sentence of 72 hours in jail. If the driver is found to be intoxicated AND has an open container of alcohol in the car, the minimum sentence is increased to six days.

A second-time offense is a Class A misdemeanor and carried a minimum 30-day sentence. A third Driving While Intoxicated conviction results in a third degree felony charge. Keep in mind that these sentences are only for driving while intoxicated. They do not address any additional charges that may result if an intoxicated driver injures or kills someone.

In addition to safety reasons for adopting the lower standard, Texas now qualifies for additional National Highway Safety Administration grant money which can be used for highway safety or construction projects.

Regardless of what the law classifies as legally impaired, no one should ever drive a car after drinking. No one should ever ride in a car with a driver who has been drinking or allow someone who is impaired to drive. Get the keys and call a cab or have a designated driver.

Many cities offer free cab rides for drivers who have had too much to drink, and many bars and restaurants offer free sodas for designated drivers.

Let's have a safe and happy holiday season.

Texas-New Mexico Power Company, Cielo Power Market, LP and Big Wind, LP, announced finalized contracts that will let TNMP customers choose a renewable energy option as part of their power supply with energy supplied from a wind power project in West Texas.

The choice of renewable energy was factored into TNMP's voluntary transition-to-competition plan, which was approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas in July 1998.

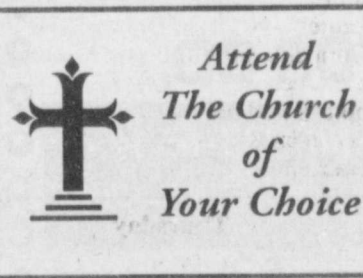

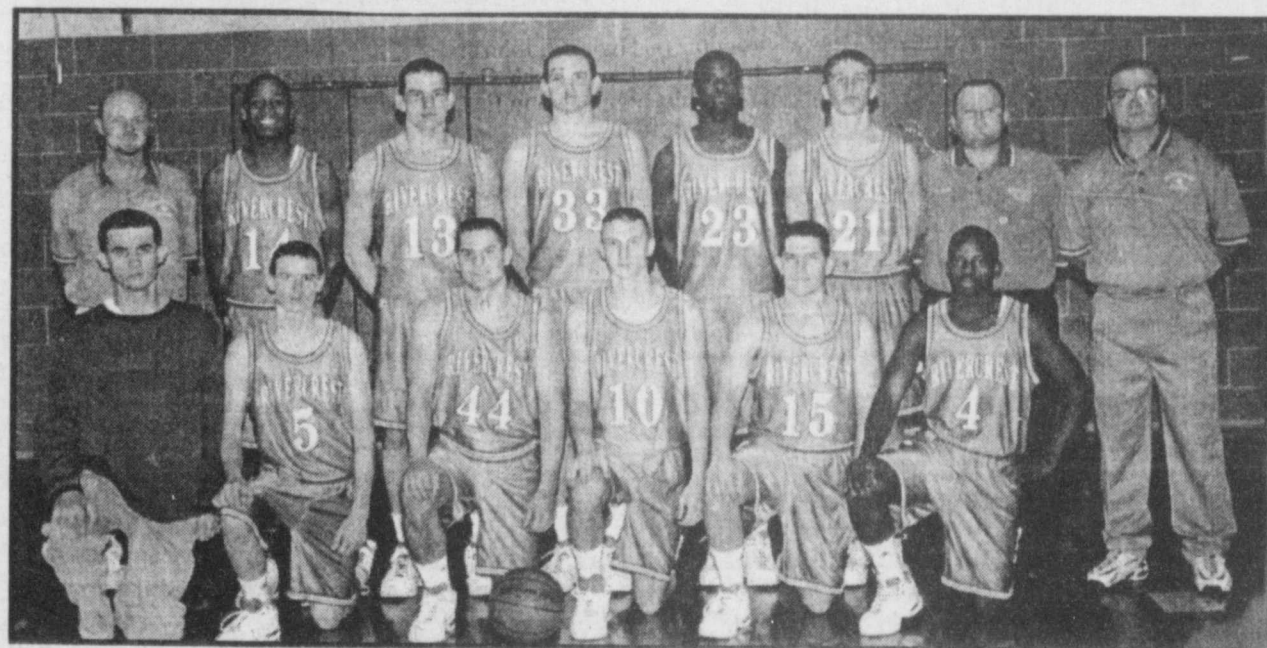

Legislation passed in the 1999 session requires all utilities in Texas to provide such an option for their customers as one of its environmental requirements.

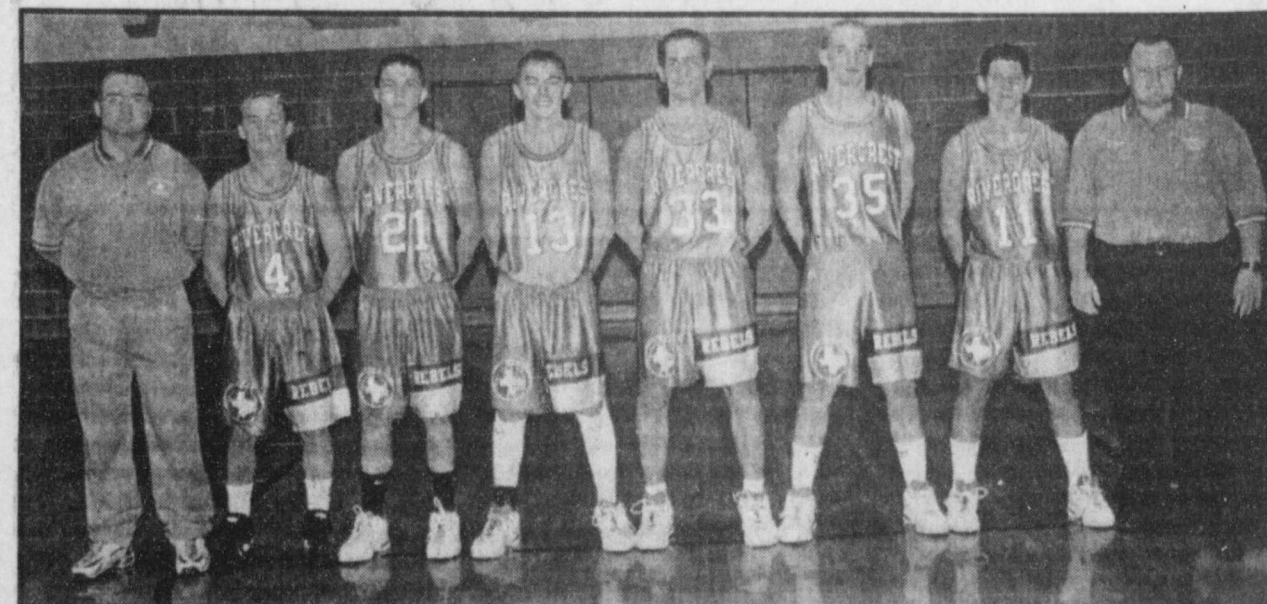

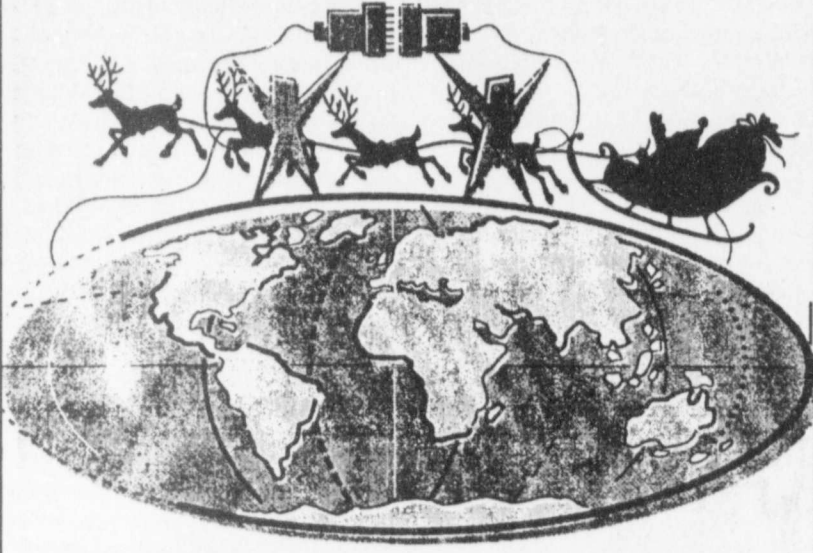

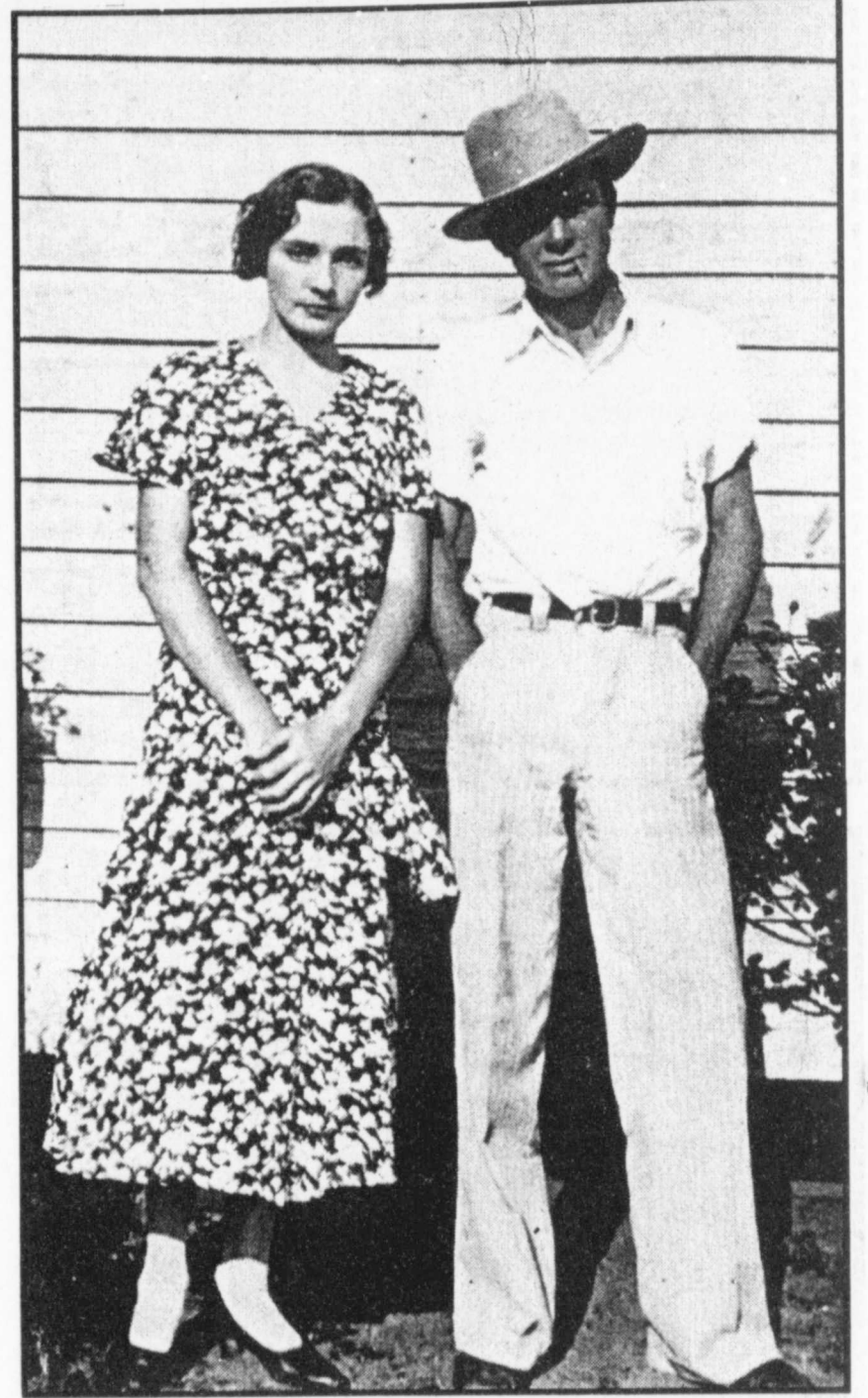

Frances Rozell, a lifetime in Bogata, She's even been mistaken for Bonnie Parker

Frances Roach Rozell, at the youthful age of 83, has lived these years in Bogata with the exception of three years in Paris. Her parents were Dr. Harley D. Roach and Florence Grant Roach. Dr. Roach was one of nine children. He was born in 1876 in Halesboro, Texas, son of Francis Lee and Mary Elizabeth McCulloch Roach. He grew up on the family farm however he did not like farming. He taught school for awhile in the Lake Drain school. He wanted to be a doctor. His father gave him his inheritance which he sold in order to go to Vanderbilt University in Tennessee to study medicine. He came home when his father died in April of 1906 and missed his graduation exercise from medical school.

Frances's mother was Florence Grant, daughter of George Wooten and Frances Scaff Grant. They were two of the first settlers of Rugby and helped establish the Presbyterian Church and the community. Florence graduated from Trinity University at Waxahatchie. She and Dr. Roach were married in 1913 and live in the house Dr. Roach had built on South Main St. in Bogata.

Frances was born in September of 1916 in her parents home. She said "my Daddy delivered me." She had one brother who lived only 3 months. Another brother, Donald, was born the day The Armistice was signed, Nov. 11, 1918. Donald was given the nickname of "Whistle Britches" when he was small and it was later shortened to "Whiss". He was quite the star on the Bogata Bulldog football team. He was coached by Dixon Hatcher. He went to Paris Junior College on a football scholarship. He played three seasons there and was selected All State Left End. His nickname was changed to Whizz at PJC. Coach Hatcher went to coach many more years at PJC and taught even longer. As many years as he was there he gave a Whizz Roach Scholarship. Donald enlisted in the Naval Air Force serving in World War II. He was commissioned in 1942 a fighter pilot. He was in service in Alaska and New Guinea. He participated in many air attacks in the Solomon Islands in the South Pacific and was shot down over the water near Rendova Island July of 1943.

Lelia Ward, an orphaned colored girl, came to live in the Roach home the year Frances was born. With the exception of four years she lived with the family until 1950, when she married a widower, Mr. Cotel Smith.

Frances said her daddy took her with

him everywhere he went...house calls or wherever. "Many older friends and relatives say that Daddy allowed me to do exactly as I pleased. They said I was a spoiled little girl. In most homes we went to, I would ask for a biscuit if I wasn't offered one first," she explains.

She says that one day Dr. Roach told her she could not go with him. She went out and lay down in front of his car. Her Uncle Statem Griffin was there, he picked her up and put her in the house.

Frances says "I remember a lot of daddy's patients. One I remember, a couple brought to our house one night. They had been to Talco to a dance and this one young man got into a fight. His throat was cut, just missing his jugular vein."

Frances says she went through the eighth grade in the red two story brick building. The new high school was ready her freshman year. (It's the currently the junior high). She graduated in 1933. She recalls that Mr. Branson, teacher and superintendent, came to Bogata when she was a 7th grader and Mr. Cody, principal and teacher, came when she was a senior.

Frances married William Rozell in September of 1933. She said they went to Hugo, Oklahoma in William's 1928 Ford Touring Car and were married in the Methodist parsonage there. When they left home that morning they were on their way to Sunday School. William's sister, Margaret, told the family that they had really gone to get married. When they returned to Bogata that afternoon they learned that Mrs. Bob Lawson had died. They had to go back to Paris to the telegraph office to send messages to family and friends.

Later that year William, Frances and her brother Donald took off to Dallas to attend the State Fair. They went in William's open touring car. Donald was fifteen. They had four flats going to Dallas and got back to Paris late that night, about 2:00 a.m. They were driving around, trying to find a place to buy gas when the Paris Chief of Police, Rupert Marx and another officer pulled them over and pointed their guns at them. They mistook them for Bonnie and Clyde! The Paris Police had been alerted to be on the lookout for the notorious outlaws. Mr. Marx had grown up in Bogata, though and knew the Roach and Rozell names, and was convinced they weren't Bonnie and Clyde and let them go.

William's daddy, Morgan Rozell, died at 52 in 1928. He was a farmer and rancher. William was only 14 at the time, but he carried on the farm and

ranch operation. Morgan was President of the First National Bank in Bogata from 1924 until his death.

Frances and William lived with his mother several years. She was Anne Lee Howison Rozell, daughter of Neil and Mary Frances Clatterbuck Howison. Frances said their son Neil was born at home while they lived with Mrs. Rozell. Dr. Roach delivered him. After a few years, they moved into their home, just across the driveway, where Frances lives today.

Williams started to work in the bank in 1954. Frances says back then this was really farm and ranch country.

William knew and understood the problems facing farmers and ranchers so he worked well with the people. William was president of the bank when he died in 1967 at the age of 53.

Frances said "we enjoyed square dancing in Bogata, Clarksville, Paris, all over the area. We square danced six nights a week lots of weeks. William did a lot of the calling. I go out to eat in this area several times a week with a group of ladies. We often see some one who squared danced with William and me."

Frances and William had two daughters Donna Anne Rozell, who built a home on the lot where Morgan and Anne Lee lived and Mary Elizabeth Park, who lives in Sulphur Springs. She had one son, Neil, who lives near Fulbright.

She had four grandchildren, David Rozell and Russell Rozell of Bogata, Kincaide Park of Austin and Anna Park of Sulphur Springs and four great grandchildren, Mallory and Morgan Rozell of Bogata and Aubrey Clark in college at Commerce and Cody Clark of Bogata.

Frances enjoys traveling. She and Robert Anderson went on a trip to Canada and Alaska. She and her daughter Mary Elizabeth went to England and Scotland in 1997.

Frances is a very active citizen of Bogata and Red River County. She is a member of the First United Methodist Church of Bogata. She has recently retired after serving more than twenty years as a director of the Red River County Farm Bureau. For several years she was a director of First National Bank in Bogata. She served several years on the Child Protective Board of Red River Co. Today she serves as an officer of the Bogata Cemetery Assn. and the Bogata Lions Club.

Yes, Frances is a vital, active person, with interesting stories to tell, but the favorite has to be being mistaken for Bonnie and Clyde.

Bad fads! Keys to weight loss still exercise and balanced diet

When fad diets make the cover of Time magazine, something is going on. Something big-and not just waist sizes. Diets like the Cabbage Soup Diet and the Grapefruit Diet along with low carbohydrate diets are sweeping the nation and that has some nutrition experts concerned.

In a nutshell, "fad diets set people up for failure", said Dr. Jenna Anding, a registered dietician and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Many fad diets are so restrictive or boring that people tend to stay on them for only a short period of time. Most fad diets are not healthy and run counter to what long term research has shown about weight loss. For successful long-lasting weight loss to happen people need to adopt a life-style that includes a healthy diet and regular physical activity.

The high protein/low carbohydrate diets that are the hope of so many dieters can actually be very harmful. Some fad diets are based on the idea that by reducing carbohydrates (sug-

ars), the body is forced to burn fat reserves for energy. The problem is some parts of the brain need carbohydrates to function along with other parts of the body. When you run out of carbohydrate stores, the body initially starts to break down muscle but then switches to body fat for energy. On the surface, this seem like a good thing because it preserves valuable protein. Unfortunately without carbohydrates, the body cannot effectively use the fats that are being broken down. As a result, these fats are turned into ketone bodies. As the body tries to use fat for fuel, the level of ketone bodies build up in the blood and can cause ketosis. Ketosis is not a normal state and can lead to some unpleasant and potentially serious side effects including nausea, dizziness, bad breath, headache and dehydration. In the first week or so, many fad diets appear to work but the weight loss is usually water weight. And some people will lose weight, but usually it is because they are taking in fewer calories, not because they're

eating less of a certain food group.

There is a desire for a quick fix but losing weight and keeping it off is difficult. Healthy eating and exercise should be made permanent behaviors to promote healthy life-styles. People should set realistic goals and commit to eating healthy and obtain a regular physical activity. Incorporate fruits, vegetables and whole grains in place of high fat foods and snacks. Also watch portion size. People can still have cake, ice cream and other "forbidden" foods, just eat less of them. Chose a physical activity that is enjoyable to the individual and in addition, try to identify and control events, such as stress or social situations, that encourage eating even when not hungry. Understanding the relationship a person has with food and finding out the importance of food in their lives is very important. If food is a comfort or way of relieving stress, find another alternative that is satisfying, yet easily accessible like listening to music, needlepoint, walking or writing a journal.
