Red River County Sheriff Bob Edrington recently announced his candidacy for re-election to the office of County Sheriff.

Sheriff Edrington was born and raised in Red River County, and is the son of D.D. and Edith Edrington of Annona. He attended school in Annona and graduated from Clarksville High School in 1969. He attended the University of Texas in

Edrington and his wife, Linda, live south of Avery. They have two children, Amy and Matthew, who attend school in Avery.

"I think we have made a lot of rogress in the last seven years while I have been in office," the Sheriff said. "In the last three years, the county has contracted with Wisconsin and has received \$2.5 million to house their inmates.'

"We have used those funds to pay for the new jail with no taxpayers' money spent on it or for its operation. I am also very pleased with our inmate work program which has helped do work for many organizations and towns in our county."

"There is more that I would like to do to keep improving my office," Edrington said. "I hope the voters will give me the opportunity to continue making improvements.'

Edrington said he is proud of the officers and personnel at the Sheriff's Department. "Without their efforts, it would have been impossible to make the improvements that we've

made so far. "I appreciate your continued support of my office," Edrington concluded, "and the support given me during my seven years as your Sher-

November was another good month for us. The rain gave time to get the oil changed in all of the equipment and vehicles and also to prepare them for winter. A lot of roads have been bladed and trees trimmed off several roads this month. 30 loads of rock were hauled to county roads 1245, 1270 and 1305 and 2 culverts were installed.

In Commissioners Court this month we approved voiding resolution No. 10 on "Struck Off" property since the Talco-Bogata School District did not accept bid on property and resolution No. 2 since Renee Harvey and Hughie James withdrew their bid. We also approved M.C. Johnson as a member of the Child Protection Services Board, approved revisions of the County Purchasing

Policy Manual, approved a request from Precinct 2 to borrow \$10,000 from the main road and bridge fund to be paid back by the beginning of the next budget year, authorized the purchase of equipment for Precinct 2, approved the sale of equipment from Precinct 2 and 4 and approved purchase of a trailer for Precinct 3.

We also met with Representative, Tom Ramsey to discuss possible legislation to help counties obtain more revenue from the state and also possible legislation on overweight trucks and the damage they cause to county roads. Hopefully, we can get some help in these areas.





Ankle sprains may be the most common acute orthopedic injury. People often sprain their ankles during athletic activities, but it can happen stepping off a curb or into a hole. 





during the holiday season, the number of alcohol-related traffic deaths increases dramatically.

In 1997, Texas led all other states in the number of alcohol-related traffic fatalities. These deaths accounted for about half of all traffic fatalities in Texas, well above the national average of 39%.

About 1/4 of alcohol-related deaths in Texas involved blood alcohol levels of less than .10, the previous standard for legal intoxication.

As a person's blood alcohol concentration (BAC) increases, his or her abilities are impaired. Many tests report that the vast majority of drivers exhibit impairment of critical driving tasks with a BAC of .08. This impairment can result in problems with attention, reaction time, speed control, etc., substantially increasing the risk of a crash.

During this year's legislative session, lawmakers passed a bill that changes the definition of legal intoxication to a BAC of .08 or more.

The law defines "Intoxicated" as not having the normal use of physical or mental faculties as a result of alcohol, a controlled substance, a dangerous drug or a combination of these substances.

It is hoped that a lower BAC level will serve as a deterrent for those who might consider driving after drinking. In addition, the lower BAC standard will result in more drivers being eligible for Driving While Intoxicated charges.

Currently, approximately 16 states have .08 BAC laws. Several of those

With all of the parties that occur states saw significant decreases in the number of alcohol-related fatalities after adopting the lower BAC

A first time offense of driving while intoxicated is a Class C misdemeanor with a minimum sentence of 72 hours in jail. If the driver is found to be intoxicated AND has an open container of alcohol in the car, the mini-

mum sentence is increased to six days. A second-time offense is a Class A misdemeanor and carried a minimum 30-day sentence. A third Driving While Intoxicated conviction results in a third degree felony charge. Keep in mind that these sentences are only for driving while intoxicated. They do not address any additional charges that may result if an intoxicated driver injures or kills someone.

In addition to safety reasons for adopting the lower standard, Texas now qualifies for additional National Highway Safety Administration grant money which can be used for highway safety or construction projects.

Regardless of what the law classifies as legally impaired, no one should ever drive a car after drinking. No one should ever ride in a car with a driver who has been drinking or allow someone who is impaired to drive. Get the keys and call a cab or have a designated driver.

Many cities offer free cab rides for drivers who have had too much to drink, and many bars and restaurants offer free sodas for designated driv-



William and Frances Rozell...AKA Bonnie & Clyde?

Frances Rozell, a lifetime in Bogata, She's even been mistaken for Bonnie Parker

ful age of 83, has lived these years in Bogata with the exception of three years in Paris. Her parents were Dr. Harley D. Roach and Florence Grant Roach. Dr. Roach was one of nine children. He was born in 1876 in Halesboro, Texas, son of Francis Lee and Mary Elizabeth McCulloch Roach. He grew up on the family farm however he did not like farming. He taught school for awhile in the Lake Drain school. He wanted to be a doctor. His father gave him his inheritance which he sold in order to go to Vanderbilt University in Tennessee to study medicine. He came home when his father died in April of 1906 and missed his graduation exercise from medical school.

France's mother was Florence Grant, daughter of George Wooten and Frances Scaff Grant. They were two of the first settlers of Rugby and helped establish the Presbyterian Church and the community. Florence graduated from Trinity University at Waxachatchie. She and Dr. Roach were married in 1913 and live in the house Dr. Roach had built on South Main St.

in Bogata. Frances was born in September of 1916 in her parents home. She said " my Daddy delivered me." She had one brother who lived only 3 months. Another brother, Donald, was born the day The Armistice was signed, Nov. 11, 1918. Donald was given the nick name of "Whistle Britches" when he was small and it was later shortened to "Whiss". He was quite the star on the Bogata Bulldog football team. He was coached by Dixon Hatcher. He went to Paris Junior College on a football scholarship. He played three seasons there and was selected All State Left End. His nick name was changed to Whizz at PJC. Coach Hatcher went on to coach many more years at PJC and taught even longer. As many years as he was there he gave a Whizz Roach Scholarship. Donald enlisted in the Naval Air Force serving in World War II. He was commissioned in 1942 a fighter pilot. He was in service in Alaska and New Guinea. He participated in many air attack in the Soloman Islands in the South Pacific and was shot down over the water near Rendova Island July of 1943.

Lelia Ward, an orphaned colored girl, came to live in the Roach home the year Frances was born. With the exception of four years she lived with the family until 1950, when she married a widower, Mr. Cottel Smith.

Frances said her daddy took her with

or wherever. "Many older friends and dent of the First National Bank in relatives say that Daddy allowed me to do exactly as I pleased. They said I was a spoiled little girl. In most homes we went to, I would ask for a biscuit if I wasn't offered one first." she explains.

She says that one day Dr. Roach told her she could not go with him. She went out and lay down in front of his car. Her Uncle Statem Griffin was there, he picked her up and put her in the

Frances says "I remember a lot of daddy's patients. One I remember, a couple brought to our house one night. They had been to Talco to a dance and this one young man got into a fight. His throat was cut, just missing his jugular vein."

Frances says she went through the eighth grade in the red two story brick building. The new high school was ready her freshman year. (It's the currently the junior high). She graduated in 1933. She recalls that Mr. Branson, teacher and superintendent, came to Bogata when she was a 7th grader and Mr. Cody, principal and teacher, came when she was a senior.

Frances married William Rozell in September of 1933. She said they went to Hugo, Oklahoma in William's 1928 Ford Touring Car and were married in the Methodist parsonage there. When they left home that morning they were on their way to Sunday School. William's sister, Margaret, told the family that they had really gone to get married. When they returned to Bogata that afternoon they learned that Mrs. Bob Lawson had died. They had to go back to Paris to the telegraph office to send messages to family and friends.

Later that year William, Frances and her brother Donald took off to Dallas to attend the State Fair. They went in William's open touring car. Donald was fifteen. They had four flats going to Dallas and got back to Paris late that night, about 2:00 a.m. They were driving around, trying to find a place to buy gas when the Paris Chief of Police, Rupert Marx and another officer pulled them over and pointed their guns at them. They mistook them for Bonnie and Clyde! The Paris Police had been alerted to be on the lookout for the notorious outlaws. Mr. Marx had grown up in Bogata, though and knew the Roach and Rozell names, and was convinced they weren't Bonnie and Clyde and let them go.

William's daddy, Morgan Rozell, died at 52 in 1928. He was a farmer and rancher. William was only 14 at the time, but he carried on the farm and

Frances Roach Rozell, at the youth- him everywhere he went...house calls ranch operation. Morgan was Presi-Bogata from 1924 until his death.

Frances and William lived with his mother several years. She was Anne Lee Howison Rozell, daughter of Neil and Mary Frances Clatterbuck Howison. Frances said their son Neil was born at home while they lived with Mrs. Rozell. Dr. Roach delivered him. After a few years, they moved into their home, just across the driveway, where Frances lives today.

Williams started to work in the bank in 1954. Frances says back then this was really farm and ranch country.

William knew and understood the problems facing farmers and ranchers so he worked well with the people. William was president of the bank when he died in 1967 at the age of 53.

Frances said "we enjoyed square dancing in Bogata, Clarksville, Paris, all over the area. We square danced six nights a week lots of weeks. William did a lot of the calling. I go out to eat in this area several times a week with a group of ladies. We often see some one who squared danced with William and



She has recently retired after serving more than twenty years as a director of the Red River County Farm Bureau. For several years she was a director of First National Bank in Bogata. She served several years on the Child Protective Board of Red River Co. Today she serves as an officer of the Bogata Cemetery Assn. and the Bogata Lions Club.

Yes, Frances is a vital, active person, with interesting stories to tell, but the favorite has to be being mistaken for Bonnie and Clyde.

Bad fads! Keys to weight loss still exercise and balanced diet

When fad diets make the cover of Time magazine, something is going on. Something big-and not just waist sizes. Diets like the Cabbage Soup Diet and the Grapefruit Diet along with low carbohydrate diets are sweeping the nation and that has some nutrition experts concerned.

In a nutshell, "fad diets set people up for failure", said Dr. Jenna Anding, a registered dietitian and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Many fad diets are so restrictive or boring that people tend to stay on them for only a short period of time. Most fad diets are not healthy and run counter to what long term research has shown about weight loss. For successful long-lasting weight loss to happen people need to adopt a life-style that includes a healthy diet and regular physical activity.

The high protein/low carbohydrate diets that are the hope of so many dieters can actually be very harmful. Some fad diets are based on the idea that by reducing carbohydrates (sugars), the body is forced to burn fat reserves for energy. The problem is some parts of the brain need carbohydrates to function along with other parts of the body. When you run out of carbohydrate stores, the body initially starts to break down muscle but then switches to body fat for energy. On the surface, this seem like a good thing because it preserves valuable protein. Unfortunately without carbohydrates, the body cannot effectively use the fats that are being broken down. As a result, these fats are turned into ketone bodies. As the body tries to use fat for fuel, the level of ketone bodies build up in the blood and can cause ketosis. Ketosis is not a normal state and can lead to some unpleasant and potentially serious side effects including nausea, dizziness, bad breath, headache and dehydration. In the first week or so, many fad diets appear to work but the weight loss is usually water weight. And some people will lose weight, but usually it is because they are taking in fewer calories, not because they're


eating less of a certain food group. There is a desire for a quick fix but losing weight and keeping it off is difficult. Healthy eating and exercise should be made permanent behaviors to promote healthy life-styles. People should set realistic goals and commit to eating healthy and obtain a regular physical activity. Incorporate fruits, vegetables and whole grains in place of high fat foods and snacks. Also watch portion size. People can still have cake, ice cream and other "forbidden" foods, just eat less of them. Chose a physical activity that is enjoyable to the individual and in addition, try to identify and control events, such as stress or social situations, that encourage eating even when not hungry. Understanding the relationship a person has with food and finding out the importance of food in their lives is very important. If food is a comfort or way or relieving stress, find another alternative that is satisfying, yet easily accessible like listening to music, needlepoint, walking or writ-
