I've had about four calls from people saying "Hey, you got your wish". And wasn't it nice, hearing all that weather while we were tucked away in our beds?

But, having said that I will go on to a subject that is irritating me. That subject is "20-20 hindsight"

Am I the only person getting a little weary of hearing the television reporters and programs telling us exactly HOW everything should done....after the fact?

Okay, I'll grant you that the first Mars shot that fouled up was for a really, really stupid reason. But when the last flight didn't "call home" the media (notice I'm excluding US) started jumping up and down, wanting to scrap the whole process, and postulating exactly what NASA should have done. Should we simply stop all research because we sometimes get the wrong results?

Another example...how about those shows interviewing people involved in some type of tragedy who are raving and ranting about what the police, or fire departments, or doctors should have done to save mom, or dad, or children, or whomever. I'm sorry they suffered a tragedy, I really am.

But, having been around emergencies with people working hard doing the very best

they can, these stories are particularly irritating to me.

It is so easy to sit back at leisure, with no pressure, no time ticking away, no blood pouring or flames blazing or gasoline leaking from a wreck, and calmly spell out the exact steps that someone should have taken.

I'm not talking about senseless stupidity when someone has the wrong kidney removed during surgery. I'm talking about emergencies when people are doing their very best to help and there is no time to make these at-leisure decisions that someone makes after the fact. Yet night after night television is filled with horror stories that imply that if things had just been done "right" these things wouldn't happen. Sadly, losses occur. People die, they die tragically. And they cannot always be saved.

By the way, I've had experiences in my own family that could have resulted in a huge lawsuit. We chose not to do so, knowing that all in question had done the best they could.

I say it is time to quit making it look like all things could turn out right if we just did the exact right thing. It's not true, tragedies will always occur. Failures occur. That is the way the world is. Quit trying to find someone to blame! We must take responsibility for our own actions, something I fear we are being encouraged to


