vish Women and Equal Suffrage. BY A TENNESSEE WOMAN

While woman's position, particularly woman suffrage, is being agitated the world over at the present time, it would be of interest to take a glimpse of woman's position among that most ancient of all people; a people that has seen nations rise and fall and yet remain true to their God and lofty ideals—the Jewish people.

We find that the idea of woman's equal rights is by no means a new one, that woman's position among the Jews from earliest times unto the present day has been lofty and dignified. Among the Jews, woman is recognized as equal to the head of the house, as a business woman and as a person of intellect and intelligence. That we do not find the Jewish women given more space in ancient literature is because she took part in the pursuits of peace; and although the pursuits of peace are more lasting and beneficial than wartare, yet literature loves to display military valor and dramatic events. In neither ancient nor modern times was woman considered the slave of man, nor was she enclosed in a harem, but she was in every way regarded as equal to man. In the first two chapters of Genesis there are two records as to woman's origin, that describes woman as no less endowed than man. Genesis 1:27 "And God created man in His own image, and in the image of God created He him, male and female, created He them." Here woman is placed on the same pedestal as man. In Genesis 11:8 it is written that God said: "It is not good that man should be alone, I will make a helpmate for him." There are many beautiful stories in the Talmud as also sayings from the rabbis, showing the high esteem in which woman was held by them.

When an especially tender relation is pictured by the prophets, a mothers love is ofcen employed to symbolize the thought. The book of Proverbs is full of expressions of reverence for the mother who is the teacher of all virtues. A curse is foretold for the man who forgets to reverence his mother. The love of Jewish women for their holy faith burned with as strong and enduring a light in their breasts as in the breasts of their brothers. She often chose death for herself and a trial far more awful for her children than to submit to forceful baptism. No faith can show a longer or more noble list of willing female martyrs. One of the most heroic characters is Hannah, a Jewish princess, who saw her seven sons siain before her eyes, all the time urging them to remain true to the faith of their fathers. Hannah was made the subject of one of Longfellow's poems. In reciting e history of the Feast of Channkab this woman's name is honored.

A Jewish woman is a judge in one of the important courts of Australia. Before Maier Amechel Rothschild, the founder of the financial dynasty, died, he exacted a promise from his sons that they would undertake no matter of international magnitude without consulting their mother; and this promise they faithfully kept.

Miss Sadie American, who for many years has held the position of Secretary of the Council of Jewish Women, is connected with many philanthropic and civil movements, both in "general as well as in the Jewish community. Miss American has often lectured from the pulpit.

Mme. Bella Peysner is another brilliant Jewish woman who is a noted lecturer.


