A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office...or you may draft a similar form.
Who must file a rendition? rou must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income--such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.
Are there any advantages to you?
The advantages of filing a rendition are

- You give your opinion of your property's value If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation the value of your property in 1999. The district解 What's the deadline?
