Angel Hair Pasta with Chicken
1 teaspoon olive oil
1/2 teaspoon minced garlic
1/4 cup chopped onion
1 can Italian-style tomatoes
1/2 pound grilled chicken-bite size pieces
1 package broccoli, cauliflower, carrots
4 ounces angel hair pasta-cooked
3 tablespoons shredded parmesan cheese
In skillet, cook onion and garlic over medium heat for 2-3 minutes or until onion is soft. Add tomatoes and frozen vegetables; cover and cook for 5-6 minutes. Stir in chicken and continue cooking another 2-3 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Place pasta on large platter; spoon tomato-vegetable mixture in center; top with shredded cheese and serve immediately.

Favorite Cabbage Salad
1 small head cabbage-shredded
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1/2 cup chopped onion
3 tablespoons mayonnaise
2 tablespoons vinegar
1 tablespoon sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
4 bacon strips-cook and crumble
In large bowl, combine cabbage, pepper and onion. In small bowl, combine mayonnaise, vinegar, sugar and salt. Pour over cabbage mixture and toss to coat. Cover and refrigerate for at least 4 hours. Stir in bacon just before serving.

Italian Seasoned Vegetables
1 tablespoon butter-melted
1/4 cup dry bread crumbs
2 tablespoons grated parmesan cheese
1/2 teaspoon Italian seasoning
1/4 teaspoon salt
dash pepper
1 package broccoli, green beans, onions & red peppers
Cook vegetables according to directions; set aside. In small bowl, combine butter, crumbs, cheese, seasoning, salt and pepper and sprinkle over vegetables. Serve immediately as a vegetable side dish.

Toasted Almond Cheesecake Pie
1-1/4 cups cold milk
1/4 teaspoon almond extract
6 ounce shortbread crust
2 packages cheesecake flavor instant pudding
18 ounce Cool Whip
1/2 cup sliced almonds-toast and divide
Beat milk, extract, pudding and 1/2 of Cool Whip in medium bowl with wire whisk for 1 minute. Sprinkle 1/4 cup of almonds onto bottom of crust. Spread pudding mixture over almonds in crust. Spread remaining topping over pudding in crust. Garnish with remaining almonds. Chill.

Sweet and Sour Chicken Salad
2 fully cooked chicken breasts
1 can mandarin oranges-undrained
1/3 cup sweet and sour sauce
1/2 teaspoon freshly grated ginger
1 can water chestnuts-drain and chop
1/2 cup thinly sliced green onions
1/2 green bell pepper-1 inch pieces
1/2 red bell pepper-1 inch sliced
4 cups Romaine lettuce
1/4 cup thinly sliced almonds
2 cups chow-mein noodles
1 tablespoon sesame seed-toasted
To make dressing, drain oranges and reserve 1/3 cup juice; set aside segments and juice. In large glass bowl combine juice, sweet and sour sauce and ginger. Add chicken; stir well. Add water chestnuts, green onion s, peppers and lettuce to chicken mixture. Toss and mix well. Gently stir in reserved oranges and almonds. Serve salad with noodles and top with sesame seed.

Four-Layer Coconut Cake
3 cups all purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup shortening
1/2 cup butter or margarine-softened
1 cup milk
2 teaspoons coconut extract
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
5 large eggs
6 ounce frozen flaked coconut-thawed
2 cups whipped cream
1/4 cup powdered sugar
toasted coconut shavings
Beat first 7 ingredients at medium speed with an electric mixer until well blended. Add extracts, beating well. Add eggs, one at a time, beating until blended after each addition. Pour batter into 4 greased and floured pans. Bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes or until wooden pick is inserted and comes out clean. Cool on wire racks and frost. Combine whipping cream and powdered sugar until blended. Beat at high speed until cream forms soft peaks. Spread between layers and sides of cake.

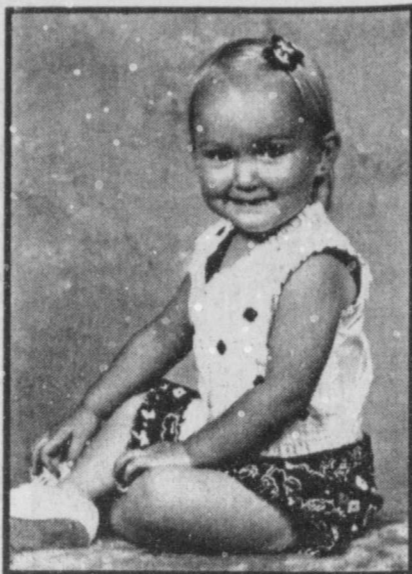

Sometime between July 7-8, two 4-wheelers were taken from Gary Townes residence near Lane's Chapel off FM3390. The chain to the entry gate of the shed was cut to remove them. The 4-wheelers were then driven through the fence that had been cut. They then proceeded through the pasture and to a second fence that had been cut to gain access

HINTS FOR HOMEOWNERS

Make Plans To Clean Air Ducts
(NAPS)—It may be a healthy idea to add cleaning your air ducts and ventilation system to your list of cleaning chores.

The Environmental Protection Agency estimates that air pollution levels can be 100 times higher indoors than those outdoors. Pollutants include cooking fumes, dust, tobacco smoke, bacteria, pollen and fungi—which may enter your home through your air ducts.

Air ducts and ventilation systems naturally accumulate fine dust particles and other contaminants, including pet hair or even tobacco smoke residue, promoting mold growth and bacteria colonies.

To see if your heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) system needs cleaning, use a screwdriver to remove the register from the floor or wall vent. Insert a mirror into the duct and hold it at a 45° angle; shine a flashlight straight into the mirror. Looking into the mirror should reveal some of the air ducts' contents.

If you see accumulated dust, mold or mildew, it may be time to call a professional HVAC system cleaning contractor. Contractors should come to the home to perform a system inspection and give a price quote. Avoid advertisements for "\$150 or less whole house specials." Make sure the company is a certified member of the National Air Duct Cleaners Association (NADCA), an organization that tests the knowledge of contractors for safe and effective HVAC system cleaning.

Safe debris burning helps save lives

Fires caused by careless debris burning sear thousands of acres annually in Texas, destroying natural resources and endangering lives and property. Firefighters put themselves in danger every time they respond to a call.

The Texas Forest Service suggests taking precautions to help reduce the risk of starting an unwanted fire while debris is burning. Before burning, contact your local fire department or sheriff's office to make sure there is not a burn ban in place. If debris burning is done while there is a burn ban in effect, fines may be assessed.

Since it only takes a second for a fire to get out of control, never leave

a fire unattended. Burn in a cleared area, preferably in a burn barrel with a screen to contain the fire and its embers. Keep a garden hose, a bucket of dirt and a shovel nearby, in case they are needed. Make sure that weather conditions allow safe burning. Burning should be done in the morning hours on days that are not windy.

Have a phone within easy access while debris burning to call for help in case of an accident. If a fire does escape, call 911 immediately to have a fire department respond.
