

It all looks alike

This weekend we went to Amarillo to visit with my cousin, as we usually do. It's over 400 miles there, so there is lots and lots of time travelling down the highway to look at the towns and country passing by. And I noticed something this trip that I hadn't thought about before. Where has our individuality in building gone?

Along the roadsides are countless derelict buildings that were once thriving service stations. That was back when a service station meant just that. Someone gassed up your vehicle, washed the windshield, and would even check your oil if needed. There was a air hose handy, as well as water. Somewhere along the way we lost the full service to the less expensive self-service system. We also lost individuality in the buildings that house stations.

We passed beautifully crafted natural stone buildings with sturdy rock pillars. We went by brick buildings with intricate patterns in red, white and blue, or in tans and browns. There were stucco buildings made like adobe structures with pole awning covers, and modest frame structures with ordinary tin roofing.

Some have been converted into craft shops, others into auto repair businesses, but most, especially those out on the roadsides, are empty, the grass growing in the graveled drives, the wind blowing through the car port area, the broken glass winking out distress signals in the sunshine.

In almost all of them the gas pumps are gone, whether collected by the oil companies they belonged to or by collectors of antique gas pumps, I

don't know . Looking at the old stations got me to looking at the new ones. I discovered that all the new ones look alike. All metal, almost invariably white with some bright colored trim, they are faceless, anonymous and

...dare I say it....boring. Of course, they usually offer everything from hot dogs to latte coffee, making them a one stop travel stop, but they lack a lot in character.

There is no friendly attendant to pass the time of day and comment on the weather. There are no themes in today's service stations, unlike the old days when indians, cowboys or other regional themes could be found.

Once again we have sacrificed American individuality for American need for speed!

Fast is better in today's culture. Perhaps it is. I avail myself of it in many ways. But it really is a shame to see those stations from the past rotting




Talco First Baptist to hold "Full Meal Deal"





Everyone above the age of 12 that passes the exam with a minimum score of 70 at the conclusion of the course will receive a lifetime hunter education certificate that is recognized by Texas and other states. Those below 12 years of age must take the course over again for proper certifi-

She and her family try to eat healthy foods, so when she comes along with some healthy recipes, she forward them on to Nancy. Recently she sent her some fish recipes, telling her that fried fish is not the only way to prepare fish. . . try some of these.

Dianne does suffer from allergy problems and considers the clear, crisp Colorado air a blessing. When she comes back this way, she can really tell the difference with the hot weather and high humidity.




Fred Madison Clemmons, age 85 of Talco died Sunday, August 20 in Mt. Pleasant, TX.

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





Plan for winter pasture establishment

It isn't too early for area cattlemen to make plans for winter pasture establishment and supplemental feeding of cattle.

This is a good time of year to run soil tests on pastures where winter forage will be established. A soil test through the Texas A&M University free of charge at the County Extension Office. Soil test results will show the soil pH, and residual nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, sulphur, calcium and magnesium. Lime and fertilizer decisions can be based on the results saving money and helping ensure a proper balance of nutrients are available for the forage crop.

ryegrass growth and development. Fall applications of lime to ryegrass pastures with a soil pH below 5.5 can be very beneficial and economically justified, especially where stocker cattle are being run.

Where wheat and rye are part of the system. The required amount of nitrogen increases to about 200 pounds per acre. Investment in nitrogen fertilizer can be split into two or more applications depending on the year and rainfall. One half the required amount could be applied this fall at planting time and the other can be applied around February 15.

The other two main nutrients, phosphorus and potassium, are not very mobile in the soil, however, where hay operations have been conducted, it is important to replace these important nutrients.

Meat adjustment program is available

The U.S. Sheep industry has experienced a continual drop in profitability and loss in equity. In light of these conditions, UISDA has announced a 3 year, \$30 million dollar program of direct cash payments tied to production practicers and quality incentives to asssist U.S. lamb and sheep farmers to achieve sustained competitiveness. The allocated funds of \$30 million are to be distributed over the next 3 years equally.

Year one of the program involves the following payments and payment

Rams up to \$100 per head, not to exceed \$2500 per operation. Sheep up to \$.50 per head, not to

exceed \$500 per operation. Sheep facilities at 20% of cost of

sheep and lamb facility improvements, not to exceed \$2500 per operation. These payments shall be limited to

rams and sheep purchased between July 11, 1999 and September 30, 21000 and facility improvements made during the same period.

Year two and three involve two categories of sheep and payment rates with no maximum payment over herd limit. The two categories and payment rates are: feeder lambs at \$3 per head and slaughter lamb carcasses at \$5 per carcass. Those payments shall be limtied to sheep and lambs marketed between August I 2000 and July 31, 2002.



"That's Just Your Interpretation"

What do people mean by the statement, "That's just your interpretation?" Many mean: "You've got your view of what the passage means and I've got mine, so who's to say mine's wrong and yours is right?" The matter is further muddled when one considers the fact that on any given religious question, there are knowledgeable, sincere authorities on both sides of the issue. Nevertheless, the Bible portrays a completely different picture.

God has given man a written revelation with the understand that it can be correctly comprehended. This means that for every teaching, there is a meaning that God originally intended to convey. It is our task to ascertain that one correct interpretation. There is only one such interpretation to any given passage, the right one. God's view? God made clear that we can arrive at the proper view. Jesus said, "You shall know the truth..." (John 8:32). Paul said, "Speak the same thing...be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment" (1 Cor. 1:10). Peter said, "If any man speak, let him speak as the oracles of God" (1 Pet. 4:11). Paul said, "rightly divide (i.e., handle aright) the word of truth" (2 Tim. 2:15). Luke said of the Bereans, "They received the word with all readiness of mind and searched the scriptures daily, whether those things were so" (Acts 17:11). Paul said to Festus, "I...but speak forth the words of truth and soberness" (i.e., things that are both true and reasonable (Acts 26:25). John declared, "Believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God" (1 John 4:1). Notice that all of these passages are predicated upon the presupposition that individuals can, with proper study and logical reasoning, arrive at the conclusions that God intended to transmit.

So there is no such thing as my interpretation and your interpretation. There is only God's meaning and with diligent, rational study, we can arrive at the truth on any subject that is vital to our spiritual well being. Rather than shrug off the conflicting views and positions on various subjects (e.g., baptism, instrumental music, divorce and remarriage) and dismiss religious differences as hopeless, unresolvable, and irrelevant, we must be about the business of studying and searching God's book (cf., Acts 17:11; 1 Thes. 5:21). We must cautiously refrain from misinterpreting and misusing Scipture (cf., 2 Cor. 4:2; 2 Peter 3:16). We must carefully consider both sides of every issue (1 John 4:1; Prov. 14:150. We must "take heed therefore how (we) hear" (Luke 8:18), i.e., make certain our hearts are genuinely receptive to the truth (Luke 8:15).

We must also realize that there are those who are "ever learning, and never able to come to the knowledge of the truth" (2 Tim. 3:7) and not permit such to deter us from being convinced that we can know the truth. Having given sufficient attention to these important keys to ascertaining God's will, we can be certain of our ability to come to the knowledge of the truth (1 Tim. 2:3-40). in Talco.

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

A recent program on NBC's Dateline revealed the connection between pet stores that sell puppies and the puppy mill industry. I am still haunted by the graphic footage of dogs living in absolutely horrible conditions cramped in small wire cages for their entire lives. Thousands of dogs, many with severe health problems from unforgivable neglect, are bred until exhaustion. When breeding is no longer possible, they are sold at auctions, sold to labs, or shot to

Forget strengthening laws in tended to regulate puppy mills. These laws are rarely enforced. Besides, I cannot imagine the thought of an animal held her entire life in a tiny cage only to breed litter after litter until death.

Each year, puppy mills and pet stores are breeding and selling hundreds of thousands of puppies and kittens simply for profit. At the same time, millions of dogs and cats are killed annually in our nation's shelters for want of a good home. It doesn't take a genius to realize that something is very wrong here.

So what is the solution? I will do my part by never again buying a dog or cat, puppy or kitten. I will not support the greed and callousness of the puppy mill and pet shop industries, which contribute to so much animal suffering and death.

It is tempting, but I promise not to buy that "puppy in the window." My friends and family are also letting pet stores know that we will not shop there as long as they continue to buy and sell puppies and kittens. Instead of buying animals from pet stores, I urge your readers to save a life and adopt their next dog or cat, puppy or kitten from a local shelter, humane society or animal rescue group. Sincerely,
