Blast Off Rally will be Sept. 6

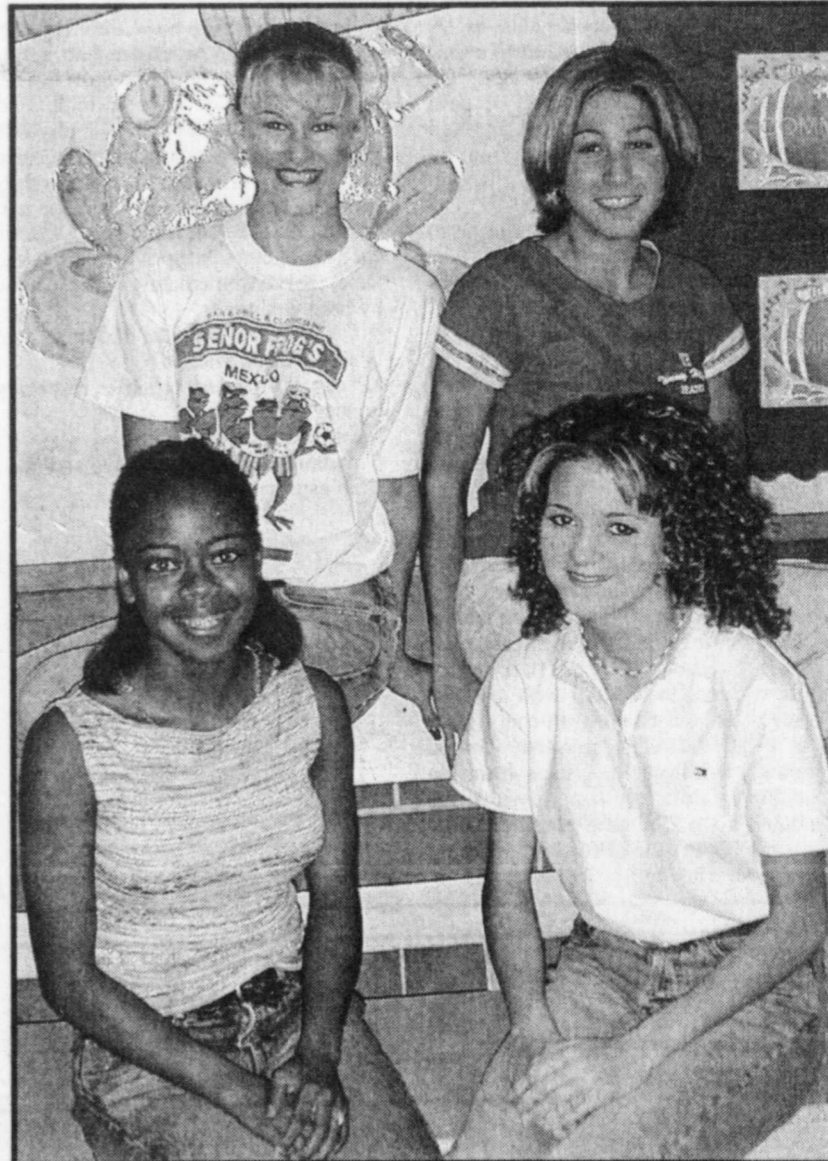
The Bogata Missionary Baptist Mission Discovery Bible Club and Teen Discovery Club will hold a Blast Off Rally balloon launch and

All area churches are cordially invited to attend and help celebrate the occasion.

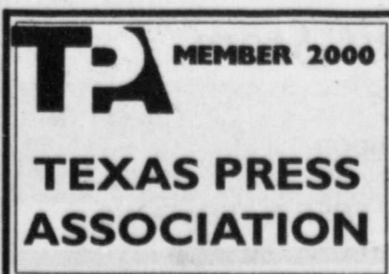
RHS Band students attend camp

Grilled Tomatoes with Vidalia Onions-if you like tomatoes and you like sweet onions grilled. . this is for you!
Corn on the Cob with Mexican Butter-grill the corn and then slice it with this great butter!
Grilled Peaches Melba-what better way to eat peaches than with a thick, rich sauce!

August 31, 2000 Labor Day Weekend Recipes

- Labor Day Burgers
2 pounds fresh ground sirloin
1-1/2 teaspoon anchovy paste
1-1/2 tablespoon lemon juice
1-1/2 tablespoons Dijon mustard
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
2 teaspoons capers-drained
sea salt
freshly ground pepper
6 round buns-split
olive oil for brushing
3 peeled and halved garlic cloves
1/3 pound parmesan cheese-shaved
sliced ripe tomatoes
lettuce leaves
Combine sirloin, paste, lemon juice, mustard, Worcestershire, capers,salt and pepper in mixing bowl. Using hands blend together and shape into patties. Place on grill and cook to your preference. Brush buns with olive oil and grill until golden brown. Immediately rub each half with clove of garlic. Assemble burgers.
Grilled New Potatoes with Parsley-Chive Pesto
1/2 cup parsley sprigs
1/2 cup minced chives
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese
1/3 cup olive oil
sea salt
ground pepper
12 small red new potatoes-scrubbed
For pesto, puree parsley and chives in food processor to make paste. Add lemon juice and cheese and process again. With machine running, pour olive oil through tube until thoroughly incorporated. Season with salt and pepper and transfer to two bowls. Slice each potato at 1/8" intervals to crate accordion-like slits; not slicing all the way through. Use pastry brush and brush half of pesto generously in between slices and over the outer skin. Make packets from foil and wrap potatoes in foil to grill until tender about 25-30 minutes. Remove from foil and brush with remaining pesto.
Summer Shrimp Cocktail
2 tablespoons powdered wasabi or prepared horseradish
2 tablespoons water
1 jar chili sauce
1 teaspoon fresh ginger-minced
2 tablespoons lime juice
3 tablespoons minced fresh cilantro
2 pounds tail-on extra-large, peeled and deveined shrimp
In small bowl mix together wasabi and water to form paste. Lit it sit covered for 10 minutes. Stir together mixture, chili sauce, ginger and lime juice. Reserve 1/2 cup. Add cilantro to remaining sauce. Store covered in refrigerator until ready to use. One half hour before grilling, toss the shrimp with reserved sauce (without cilantro) to coat lightly all over. Cove and marinate for 30 minutes in refrigerator. Place shrimp on cooking grate or grill, turning with tongs about 1-1/2 to 2 minutes per side. Serve shrimp hot off the grill with remaining sauce for dipping.

- Grilled Tomato and Vidalia Onion Salad
2 large beefsteak tomatoes
2 large Vidalia onions
olive oil
sea salt
fresh ground pepper
1/2 pound Societe blue cheese
2/3 cup pecan halves-toasted
1/4 cup apple cider vinegar
1 heaping teaspoon Dijon mustard
1/2 cup good-quality olive oil
Slice tomatoes and onions into large sliced 1/2 inch thick. Coat lightly with olive oil; season with salt and pepper. Set aside. Crumble cheese and toast pecans. To mix vinaigrette, whisk together vinegar, mustard, salt and pepper to taste and whisk in olive oil; making sure it is emulsified before adding more oil. Continue until all oil is incorporated. Set aside. Place onions on grill and grill 5 minutes each side. Add tomatoes and grill 2 minutes on each side. Place 2 sliced of tomatoes and 2 sliced of onion on each plate and top with cheese, pecans and a drizzle of vinaigrette.
Corn-on-the-Cob with Mexican Butter
8 tablespoons unsalted butter-room temp
1-1/2 teaspoons medium-hot chili powder
1/2 teaspoon dried oregano
1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
2-1/2 tablespoons minced fresh cilantro
12 ears husked corn
2-3 tablespoons olive oil
sea salt
lime wedges
In small mixing bowl, mix together the butter, chili powder, oregano, cumin and cilantro. It should be soft, but not melted. Set aside at room temperature. Brush corn lightly all over with olive oil. Place on cooking grate and grill turning occasionally until kernels are lightly browned and blistered all over, about 8-10 minutes. Brush Mexican Butter on each ear of corn and sprinkle with salt to taste. Serve immediately accompanied by lime wedges.
Grilled Peaches Melba
1 cup balsamic vinegar
1/2 cup Chambord or other raspberry liqueur
1 tablespoon brown sugar
6 medium-ripe peaches-half and pit
2 tablespoons olive oil

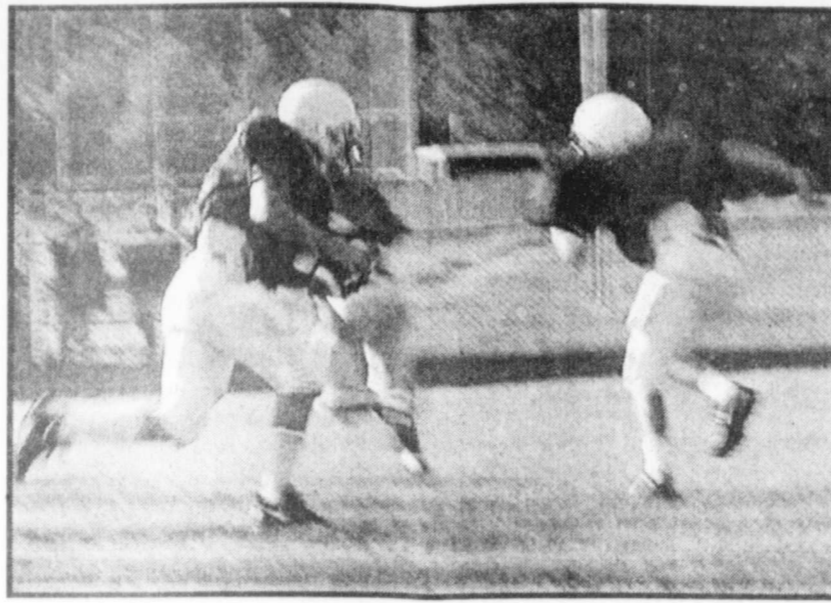

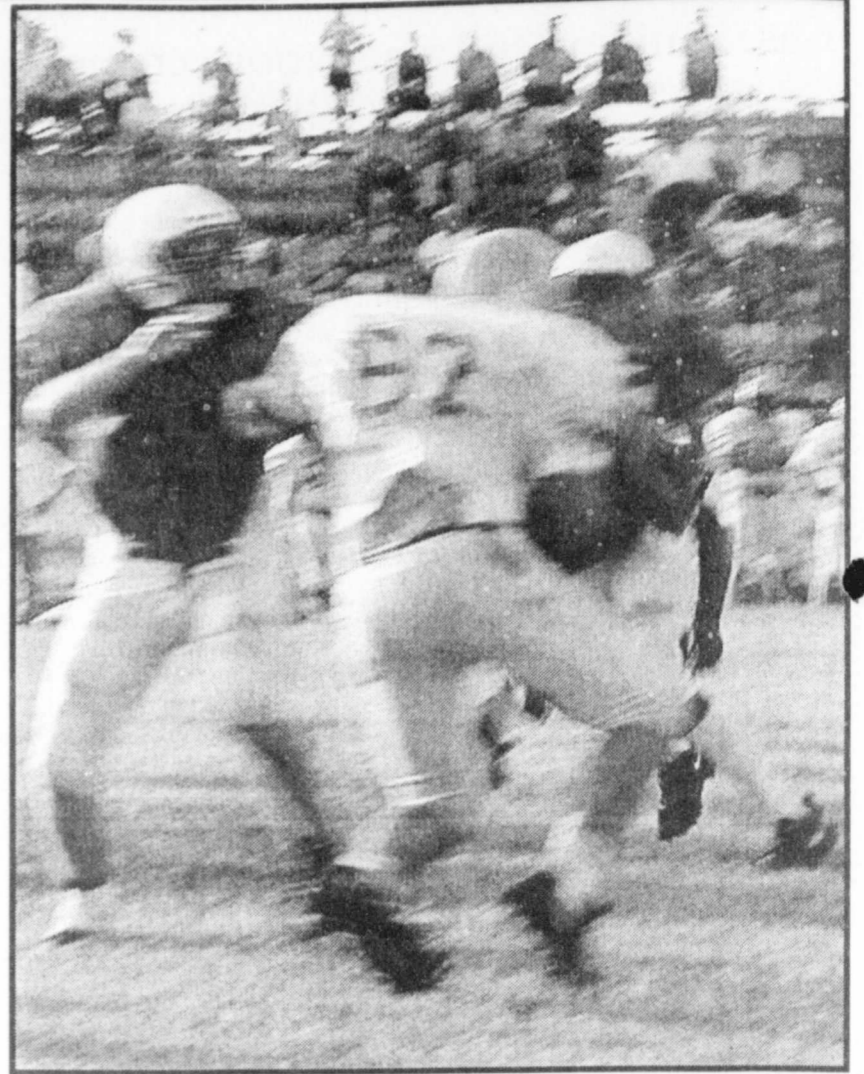

Hunter safety course offered

ORDINANCE FOR ADOPTION OF A DROUGHT CONTINGENCY PLAN
ORDINANCE NO. D-08-00

An ordinance of the City of Talco, Texas, adopting a drought contingency plan; establishing criteria for the initiation and termination of drought response stages; establishing restrictions on certain water uses; establishing penalties for the violation of and provisions for enforcement of these restrictions; establishing procedures for granting variances; and providing severability and an effective date.

WHEREAS, the City of Talco, Texas recognizes that the amount of water available to the City and its water utility customers is limited and subject to depletion during periods of extended drought;

WHEREAS, the City recognizes that natural limitations due to drought conditions and other acts of God cannot guarantee an uninterrupted water supply for all purposes;

WHEREAS, Section 12.1272 of the Texas Water Code and applicable rules of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission require all public water supply systems in Texas to prepare a drought contingency plan; and

WHEREAS, as authorized under law, and in the best interests of the citizens of

Talco, Texas, the Talco City Council deems it expedient and necessary to establish certain rules and policies for the orderly and efficient management of limited water supplies during drought and other water supply emergencies;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF TALCO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That the City of Talco, Texas Drought Contingency Plan attached here to as Exhibit "A" and made part hereof for all purposes be, and the same is hereby adopted as the official policy of the city.

SECTION 2. That all ordinances that are in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance be, and the same are hereby repealed and all other ordinances of the City not in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 3. Should any paragraph, sentence, subdivision, clause, phrase, or section of this ordinance be adjudged or held to be unconstitutional, illegal or invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole or any part or provision thereof, other than the part so declared to be invalid, illegal or unconstitutional.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage and the publication of the caption, as the law in such cases provides.

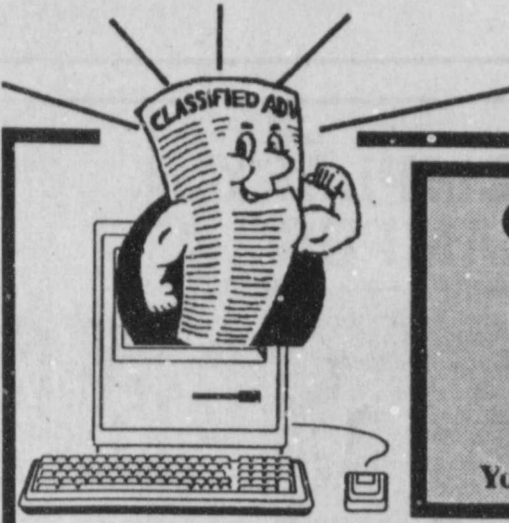

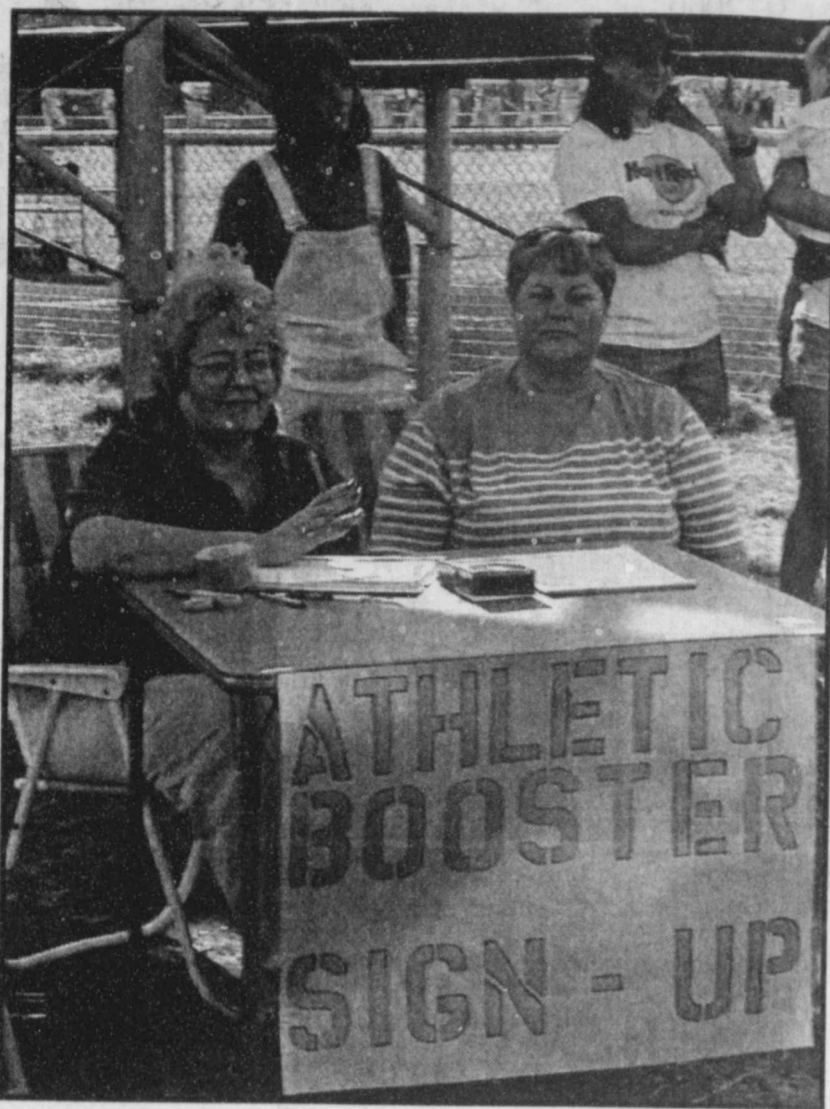


Do I Need Foot Surgery?

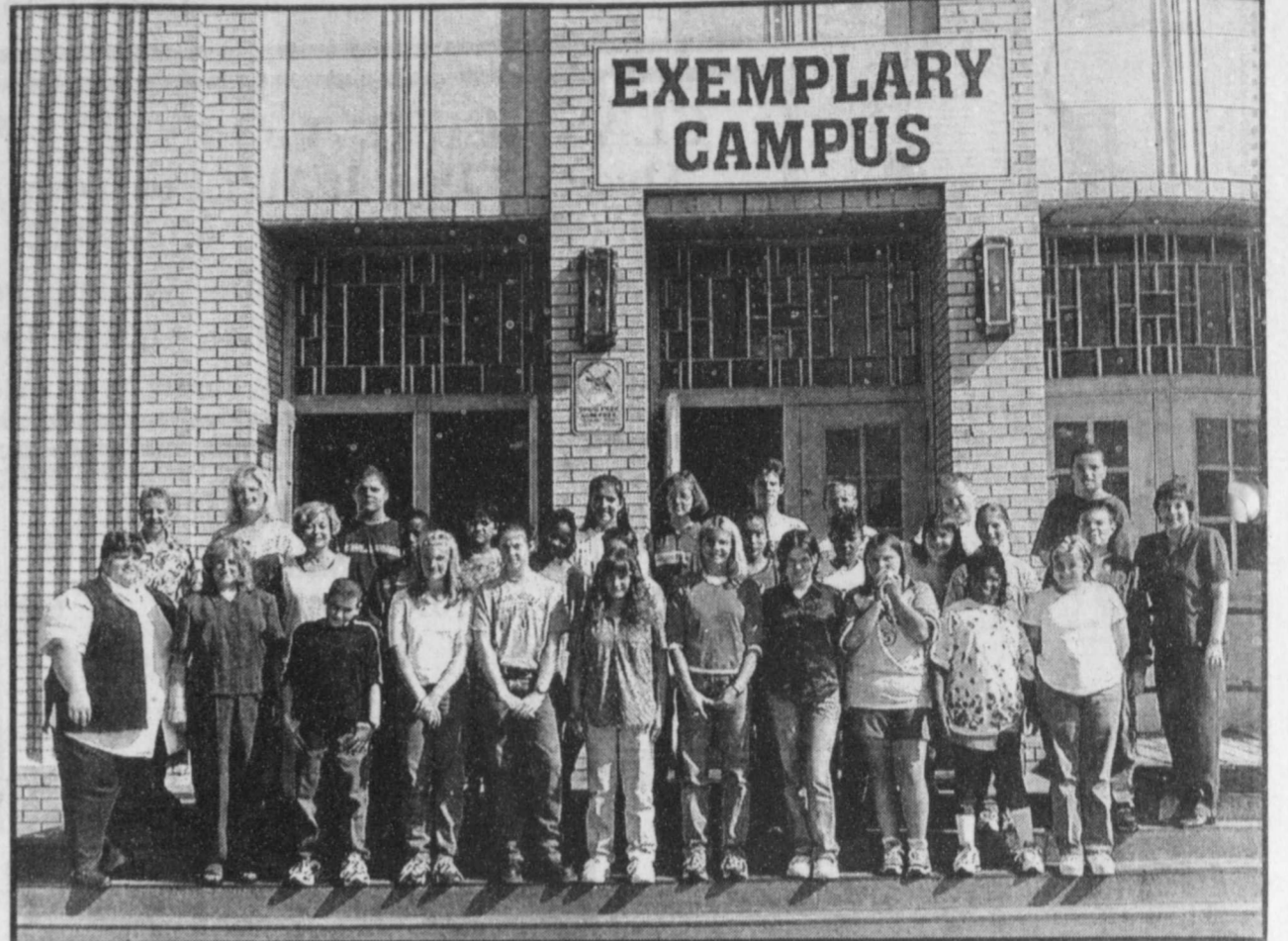
