
choices, and so many of them look interesting.



Some have some very interesting stories behind them...but I won't go into those. . . . ask the girls when you see them!

If people are able to know that Christians are Christ's disciples by seeing the love which we have for each other (John 13:35), then children may also see Christ demonstrated to them by seeing the love which their parents have for each other. Children have opportunity to fathom God's love as it is perfected in the love which parents have for each other (1 Jn. 4:11-12). Thus, parents need to love each other in ways that the child can see. 12). Thus, parents need to love each other in ways that the child can see. That love between parents provides the backdrop for the love that the child experiences

child experiences.



## Hunter saftey course offered

## Wildfires are a big concern

Record-breaking temperatures, sustained drought, and wildfires burning almost 6,000 acres in just the last two days have the Division of Emergency Management putting all the resources of the state on increased alert. The State Emergency Operations Center (EOC) in Austin is at Level III, Escalated Response, and will remain on active status until the threat diminishes.

"The State of Texas has committed every available resource to control the spread of these fires and to meet the threat," said Tom Millwee, Division of Emergency Management state coordinator.

The resources on duty throughout the state currently include:

\*Texas Forest Service (TFS) Prevention Teams and TFS Suppression Divisions are conducting initial response to fires and managing the overall fire suppression efforts.

\*The Texas Army National Guard (TXARNG) has fifteen helicopters, with water buckets, activated and responding, and 8 Dozer strike teams engaged in ground fire suppression.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT) has Dozer teams in strategic locations and is providing critical water re-supply operations to insure continuous helicopter

# \*The Texas Department of Crimi-

nal Justice (TDCJ) has 18 "offender hand crews" of especially trained offenders to keep the fire from re-igniting and spreading, and is assisting with equipment including Dozers and transporters.

\*The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is providing law enforcement assistance and regional emergency management coordination through state Disaster Districts.

\*The Civil Air Patrol (CAP) is flying reconnaissance and emergency supply missions.

The majority of wildfires in Texas are caused by carelessness, and over the Labor Day weekend the Division of Emergency Management recommends the following precautions be

\*Follow Burn Ban restrictions; the leading cause of wildfires is burning

\*Put cigarettes out in the ashtray; not out the window

\*Don't drive or park on dry grass. Vehicle exhaust systems are hot enough to start a fire

\*Keep weeds and shrubs trimmed for at least 30 feet around structures \*Keep garden hoses connected to

outside faucets for emergency use \*Know emergency exits from your house and your neighborhood

## TRMC Wellness Task Force Advocates 5 A Day

"Less than 25 percent of Americans eat five or more daily servings of fruits and vegetables," says Neva Grieves, RD, LD and Director of Nutrition Services at Titus Regional Medical Center. But she and a group of concerned TRMC employees would like to change that. The newly formed Wellness Taskforce of Titus Regional Medical Center is trying to get the "wellness message" out, and

that includes eating at least five fruits Many people are unaware of how many fruits and vegetables they eat in a day. Wellness Taskforce Chairperson, Jack Pruitt, says he thought he ate a lot. "That was until we recently put out our employee survey and I actually counted. I was getting only two a day and didn't realize it. Now I 'carry a banana' in my back pocket, so to speak. I don't always meet five a day, but I'm working on

Grieves says "Your body does not function properly without the correct fuel - protein, carbohydrates, fats, vitamins and minerals. Fruits and vegetables are critical to good health. That's why during the National Cancer Institute's 5 A Day Week, September 10-16, we want to encourage area citizens to Count 5. Studies are conclusive: the more vegetables and fruits you eat, the lower your risk for many diseases, including your cancer risk, especially colon and breast cancers. Vegetables and fruits provide vitamins, minerals and phytochemicals, some of which act as antioxidants to inhibit damage to DNA, an essential step in the cancer

Grieves notes that people who eat more lowfat plant-based meals also find it easier to stay trim. "Many vegetables contain 50 calories or even fewer for a whole cup. By contrast, there are 50 calories in only 5 potato

chips or a small cookie. If you satisfy your appetite with hearty servings of fruits and vegetables, you will eat smaller portions of the highercalorie meats and desserts. And if you eat more fruits and vegetables, you automatically reduce your risk of heart disease, high blood pressure and stroke. Vegetables and fruits supply soluble fiber which helps lower cholesterol and homocysteine, another risk factor for heart disease. The recently released DASH (Dietary Approaches to Stop Hypertension) Diet, which is heavy on plant foods, delivers a punch to reduce blood pressure."

Grieves adds another benefit for diabetics: "Fruits and vegetables seems to raise blood sugar less than other foods which contain carbohydrates, and their fiber can slow the absorption of sugar into the blood."

For all these reasons, the Wellness Task Force at TRMC plans a Count 5 initiative at TRMC's own cafeteria for the week of Sept. 11-15. During the lunch hour, they will be offering samples of heart healthy fruit and vegetable dishes (no French fries), along with recipes and nutritional information. Each day will feature a different dish on the hospital's menu and some suggestions for how to Count 5 if you're not used to eating that many fruits and vegetables.

Need some ideas for Counting 5? Have a glass of juice at breakfast or for an afternoon snack. Put fresh fruit on your cereal. Have a salad. Buy a bag of baby carrots to snack on. Put a small package of raisins in your lunchbox. Eat a vegetable for dinner. Have spaghetti with vegetables instead of meat in your sauce. Fill a bowl with fresh, mixed fruit and top it with a scoop of fat-free frozen yogurt. Bake apples for dessert.

## Vaccine shortage

A projected delay and shortage in this year's supply of influenza vaccine could force some Americans to rethink their flu strategies for the upcoming season.

Individuals considered "at risk" should schedule their shots as soon as the vaccine is available. Manufacturing problems for one of the flu strains could lead to a delay in vaccine distribution. In addition, the total doses available could be lower than last year according to Dr. Paul Glezen, an epidemiologist with the Influenza Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Flu vaccines typically available in September, might not be widely distributed until after November 15. Groups considered "at risk" are seniors ages 65 and older, pregnant women, people with chronic heart

and lung diseases, people with diabetes, kidney disease or a weakened immune system.

While the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practice have recommended that highrisk groups get vaccinated, they encourage health-care providers, health organizations, companies and others planning to launch organized vaccination campaigns for the general pu lic to delay them. The purpose is to make sure that enough vaccine is available for the individuals most susceptible to the flu.

The flu season typically runs from mid-December through early March. Between 70-76 million Americans are considered "at risk" for complications from flu.






