Area Cities provide varying amounts to fund their fire departments

budgets, determining how much funding they will be providing their volunteer fire departments

Coming off of one of the worst summers for grass fires, this budgeting is more crucial than ever, since most department have depleted their limited resources because of the fire season. Some places have gone 84 days without a trace of rain. This has resulted in some fire departments actually being in debt for repairs that had to be made to equipment in order to keep operating.

Three of the largest cities in the area that receive their fire protection from volunteers are Bogata, Blossom and Reno.

Bogata has a population of just over 1,400 citizens. It serves it's fire department by paying for the Class "A" pumper truck as well as purchasing a new rescue truck. With the formation of First Responders throughout the area, help is available in emergencies long before ambulances can arrive at the scene. But, that also means that more money is needed for equipment, training and supplies.

In addition to the purchase of the pumper truck and the rescue truck, Bogata also pays all utilities, insurance, fuel bills, maintenance and a portion of the department's training. They do this as a matter of course. In addition, they pay the Bogata VFD \$198.00 per month as a donation from the city of Bogata. The total budget from the City of Bogata to the Fire Department last year was \$29,300.

The City of Blossom also has a population of just over 1,400. Blossom paid out a total of \$8,926,89 for their fire protection last year. According to City Manager Tony Chance \$2,396.75 went for the city

Area cities are finishing up their of Blossom's half of the payment on the Class "A" pumper truck. The total also includes utilities, metered water, insurance, two sets of bunker gear and a payment of \$737.60 truck repair bill. Chance says the city has budgeted \$7,000 for the new budget year, which also includes the city's half of the payment on the Class "A" pumper

> Reno, population about 2,800 has a budget of \$19,000 to pay for the city's Class "A" Pumper truck. Citizens of Reno also make donations every month on their water bill to help fund the department's needs. Between the city budget and the water bill contributions, Reno is able to provide an extremely comprehensive rescue unit as well as fire equipment.

The City of Deport, which has a population of just over 700, also pays for the city's Class "A" pumper truck, and helps pay for the department's grass and rescue truck. The city of Deport pays for the fire department's utilities, insurance, fuel, all maintenance on equipment, insurance on building contents. City residents make donation on their water bill monthly to help pay for these needs.

The City of Detroit, also about 700 in population, has no equipment payments at this time. The city pays all the fire department's utilities and sets their budget at \$7,000 per year.

In Talco, a city with a population of 592 pays for the pumper truck completely, plus paying insurance, utilities, fuel and all equipment repairs. Talco is also fortunate in that Titus County provides a new grass truck for each department in the county every three years.

department's ability to operate. However, with the rapidly rising costs of fire and rescue equipment, it is difficult for suppers and auctions to raise enough money.

At this time departments are having to seek more funding from the county and cities in order to keep up with their operating expenses.

Fire departments do not only provide fire fighters. They also are dispatched immediately after a 911 call is made, filling the gap between the call and ambulance arrival that is so crucial. First responders are taking courses of 80 to 100 hours to learn first aid, rescue techniques, CPR and AED skills.


This service has added greatly to the load on volunteeers. In addition, the state is mandating that First Responders have ID, be certified through State Department of Health (another words pay a fee to do volunteer work!), and have certain pieces of equipment. All of this is expensive.

In addition, a volunteer fireman can more than likely still get a cat out of a tree. They have been known to take injured dogs to a veterinarian, or put up livestock out on the roads. In short, they provide many services.

In addition to the departments within small incorporated cities, there are numerous volunteer fire departments in communities. They have an even more difficult time functioning because they are more dependent upon donations for their needs.

Insurance rates are determined by many things, among them, having a Class."A" pumper truck within city

It has been said before, but must be said again, the importance of the services a volunteer fire department provides cannot be underestimated.

Cuthand VFD qualifies for funding aid

Cuthand Community Volunteer Safety program, departments can Fire Department has joined many other rural fire departments as the beneficiary of cost-sharing aid from a federal-state cooperatively funded fire protection program. The department obtained \$5,000 in cost-sharing aid toward the purchase of a truck through the Rural Community Fire Protection (RCFP) program. The program is administered by the Texas Forest Service, the state forest resource and rural firefighting agency.

Fire organizations also may be able to obtain free trucks and other firefighting apparatus such as pumps, tanks and portable generators through the Texas Forest Service via the Federal Excess Personal Property (FEPP) program. Under the FEPP program, equipment acquired through the military is transferred to qualifying fire

departments at no cost. Volunteer fire departments also can obtain several other kinds of aid from the state rural firefighting and forest

obtain firefighter clothing, hand tools and water handling accessories at discount prices. A self-insurance, vehicle liability insurance pool administered by the Texas Forest Service offers liability coverage for \$250 per vehicle, ambulances excluded. Passage of legislation minimizing liability to industrial companies that donate used firefighting equipment through the Helping Hands program for volunteer fire department use has made additional free equipment available. Regional fire coordinators located throughout the state train volunteer firefighters in wildland firefighting techniques and assist fire departments with obtaining equipment and cost-sharing aid.

In 1920 the pecan tree was taken up and brought to Bogata when the Harden family moved into a house just north of the present location. The place was owned by his father and Mr. Harden transplanted the tree there A year later in 1921, Mr. Harden ordered a ready-cut-house package. He rolled the small house on logs to the present location and added his new house to it. He transplanted the pecan tree again to it present spot. After three locations, it finally got to stay put and grow...and grow it did!

Mr. Harden, as lots of folks will remember, raised the best watermelons in East Texas. His fields attracted lots of theives and there are many a watermelon story out there.

Three of Mr. Harden's daughter still live in Bogata, Maggie Lee, Ruby Sistrunk and Ruth Couch. The Harden



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


