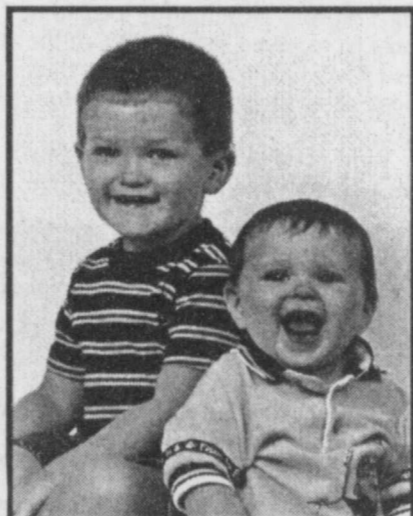

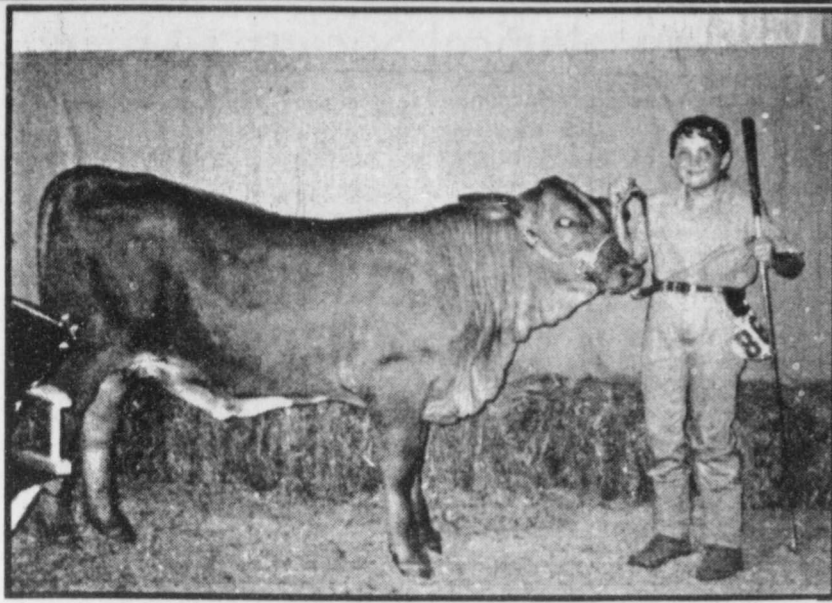

Little Bit and Morgan have great first show

Morgan Branch of Paris recently attended her first livestock show to exhibit Little Bit, her six-month-old Beefmaster heifer. The show was the Junior Beefmaster Breeder's Association (JBBA) Fall Classic 2000 in Tyler that was being held in conjunction with the East Texas Fair. Though they both lacked experience, they walked away looking like seasoned veterans of the show ring.

In the first class of the day Little Bit showed her potential by placing second among five quality heifers. The calf that won the class was later chosen as the Grand Champion Spring Heifer which automatically brought Little Bit back into the show ring to be judged for the Reserve Grand Champion. After a long look by the judge, the award went to the heifer that was slightly older but left Little Bit nothing to be ashamed of.

As for Morgan, to say that she had a good day would be an understatement. In her first show ever, she (along with her brother, Metz) was able to prepare her calf for the show by bathing and using quality grooming techniques. She then marched Little Bit into the show ring and displayed the calf in a manner that captured the

judge's eye. All of the effort paid off, because at the end of the day, Morgan was awarded the Jr. Showmanship title. This award went to the best exhibitor under the age of eleven that best used the proper showman techniques in the ring. With the title came a director's chair, displaying the name of the show and the title of Jr. Showmanship Champion embroidered on the back. But, she isn't finished yet. The JBBA awards points on how well a heifer, or heifers place in their class. With the total points on all of a competitor's animals they will determine the top twenty exhibitors and present awards. Morgan, though competing against youngsters with more than one entry, was able to capture sixteenth place due to the quality finish from Little Bit. She was presented a canvas tote bag that had been donated by Cavender's of Tyler.

FSA seeking committee rep

The Red River County office of the Farm Service Agency is soliciting nominations for the local administrative area (LAA)-1 place to serve on the county committee.

Nominating petitions may be picked up at the county FSA office located at 313 North Locust Street in Clarksville or by contacting the office by writing P.O. Box 1017, Clarksville, TX 75426, 903-427-2288.

The LAA-1 is bounded on the north and west sides by the county line and on the east by SH37 north from the Red River to Clarksville. The south boundary is US Hwy. 82 from Clarksville, moving west to the county line.

Owners and operators of agricultural and or fresh land located within the area of LAA-1 are eligible to nominate persons to the committee vacancy as well as vote in the upcoming election. Nominating petitions must be received in the office of the Red River County FSA no later than close of business, 4:30 p.m., Monday, October 30, 2000.

Valid petitions must include only one nominee. The nominee must sign

the petition to certify that he or she is willing to serve if elected.

Eligible voters may circulate or sign nominating petitions for as many individuals as they choose.

People eligible to become a committee member must meet the following criteria:

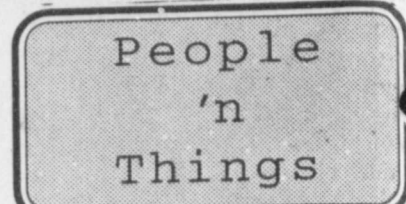
Must have an interest as an owner, operator, tenant or share cropper in a farm or ranch in the LAA for which they are nominated.

Be of legal age and meet either of two conditions: be eligible to vote as an individual or member of a general partnership or other joint operation in the LAA, or represent a legal entity, other than a general partnership or joint venture, that is eligible to vote in the LAA.

Must not have been removed or disqualified as a committee member alternate or as a county office employee.

Must not have been removed for cause from any public office or have been convicted of fraud, larceny, embezzlement or any other felony.

Must not have been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the armed services.

Drug bust in Red River County

On September 29, investigators with the Regional Controlled Substance Apprehension Program, while acting on anonymous information, discovered a large scaled methamphetamine lab on FM1699, two miles south of English in Red River County.

Investigator Danny Powell located a school bus that had been converted into a camper sitting about 50 yards off FM1699 in a grove of trees.

Investigator Powell, along with other investigators from the RSCAP, made contact with the resident of the camper who was identified as Janice

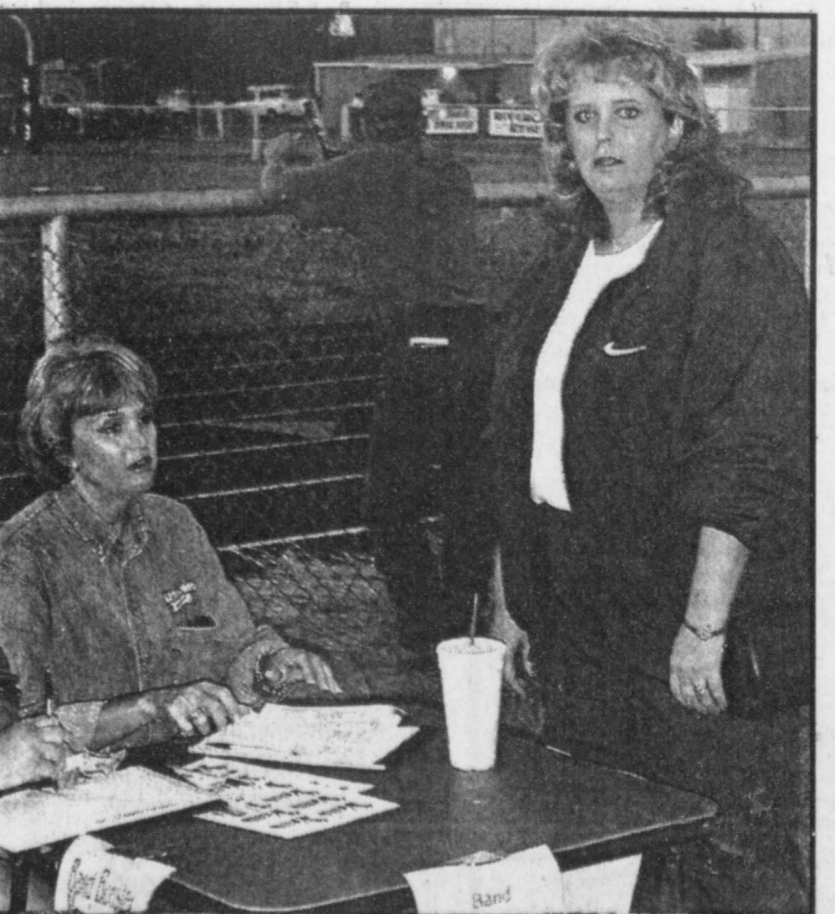
Ann Miller, age 44 of Tyler. Upon approaching the camper, investigators could smell a strong chemical odor coming from the camper and the area around the camper. A large amount of chemicals used in the production of methamphetamine were found at the location, along with a felony amount of methamphetamine and marijuana inside the camper, and three firearms.

Miller was arrested at the scene and charged with Attempt to Manufacture Controlled Substance and Possession of a Controlled Substance, both felony offenses. Inves-

tigators also learned that Miller was wanted by the U.S. Marshals for three outstanding Federal warrants, all stemming from manufacturing methamphetamine in the past.

Also involved in the bust were Red River County Chief Deputy Larry Spangler and Red River County Constable Tim Shimpock and a number of Clarksville City Police. An unidentified male and female were arrested in Clarksville in connection with the production of the lab.

According to Spangler, several thousand dollars of product were seized from the lab.

Boundary dispute is settled

Texas Land Commissioner David Dewhurst congratulated the U.S. Senate for giving its consent Tuesday to the Red River Boundary Compact between Texas and Oklahoma.

"I am extremely pleased the U.S. Senate took the critical step of giving consent to the Red River Boundary Compact," Dewhurst said. "This agreement will clarify the boundary between Texas and Oklahoma, removing uncertainty from the minds of property owners and government entities along the river."

Dewhurst commended U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas and U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry, R-Clarendon for shepherding the compact through Congress. He also praised the painstaking work of the Texas Red River Boundary Commission, chaired by Bill Abney, which spent several years negotiating details of the agreement.

Dewhurst and state Rep. James Dunegan of Oklahoma signed the Texoma Area Boundary Agreement in Dallas on July 28, finalizing the last unresolved stretch of the Red River boundary between the two states.

"The Red River Compact does not affect ownership of property," Dewhurst stressed. "It only affects political boundaries."

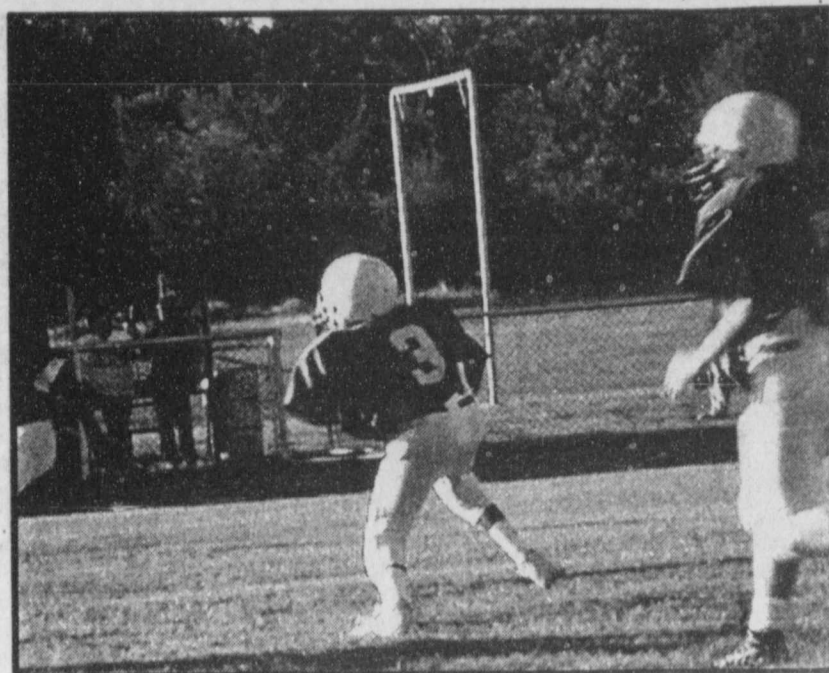

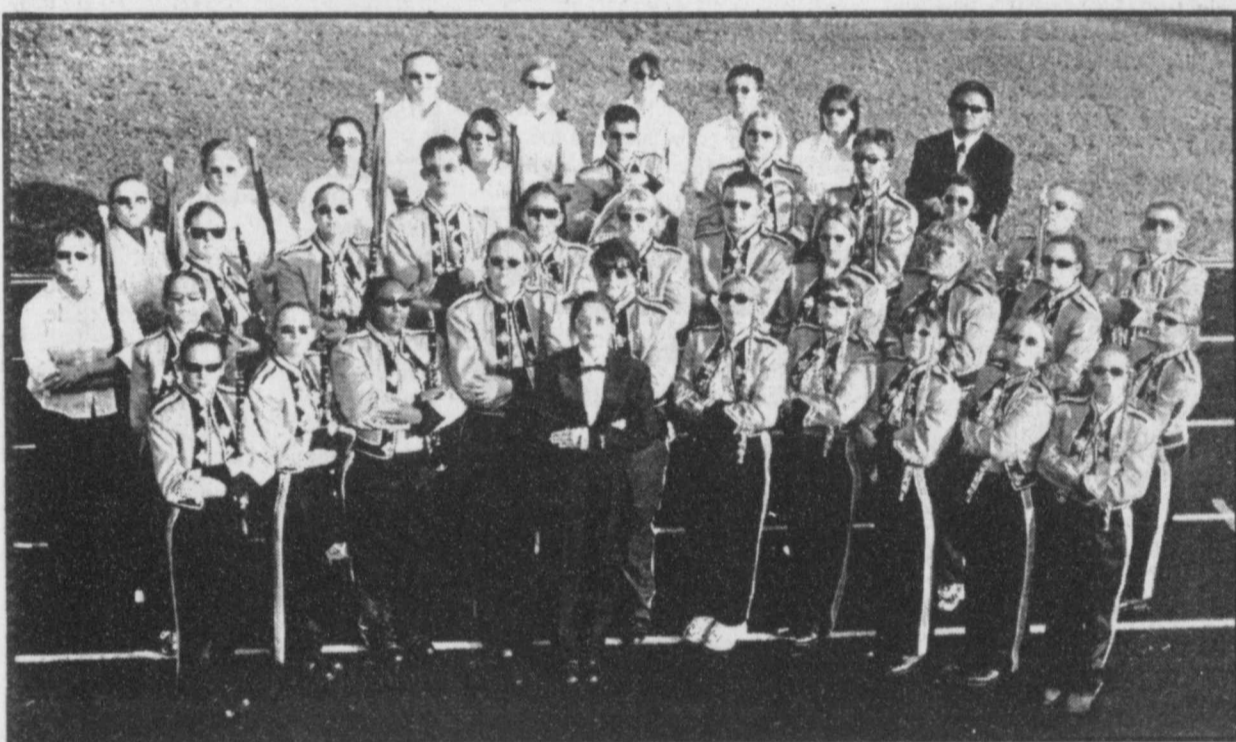

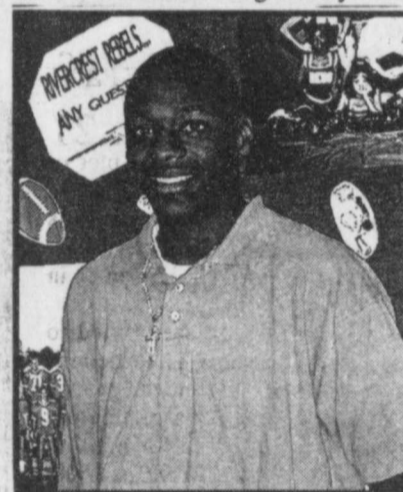
Rivercrest Band to compete at 4-States invitational

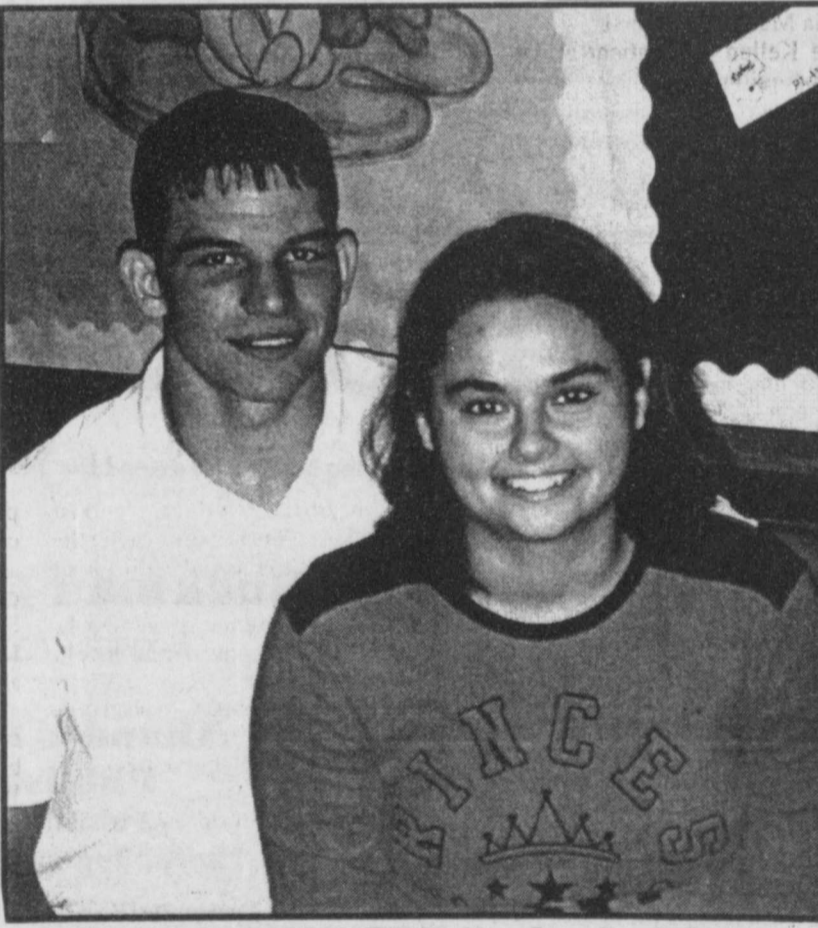

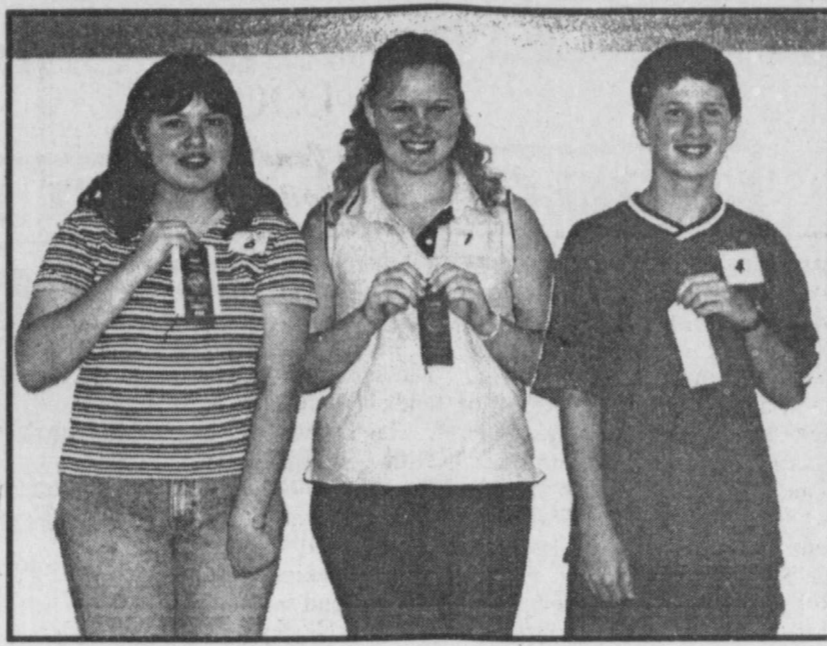

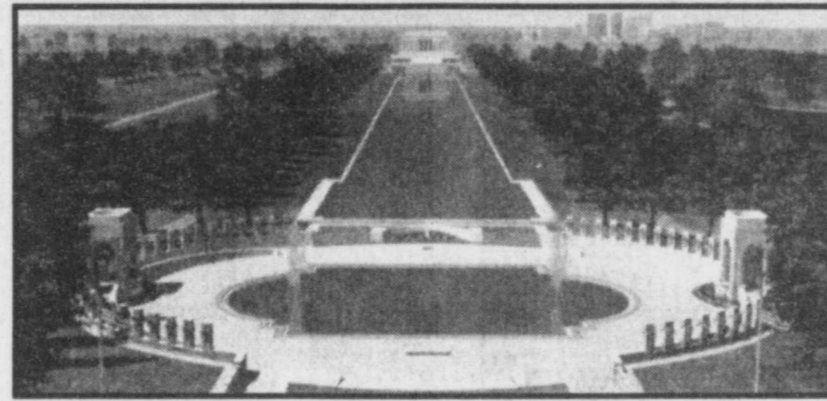

WORLD WAR II MEMORIAL-this proposed memorial will be located in front of the Lincoln Memorial in Washington D.C. Up until now there has not been a national monument recognizing veterans of World War II. Area funeral directors will participating in a plan to raise \$3 million for Texas' portion of \$10 million to be raised nationwide by the National Funeral Directors Association. The total costs of the monument will be \$150 million. \$100 million has been allocated by President Bill Clinton and the rest will come from private donations.

Area Funeral Directors helping raise funds for WWII memorial

A concerted effort of the National Funeral Directors is underway in the United States to raise \$10 million of the \$150 million needed to erect a World War II Memorial in Washington D.C. adjacent to the Lincoln Memorial.

President Clinton has already committed \$100 million to the project and \$50 million will come from private donations.

The national World War II Memorial is an overdue tribute to the individual Americans who helped win World War II, the largest war of all time and the defining event of the twentieth century. The memorial honors the veterans who bravely fought to defend freedom, those on the home front who contributed to the war effort and the high moral

purpose that motivated the nation's call to arms.

Funeral Directors of Texas have committed to raise \$3 million of the \$10 million committed by the Funeral Directors Nationwide, including all area funeral homes.

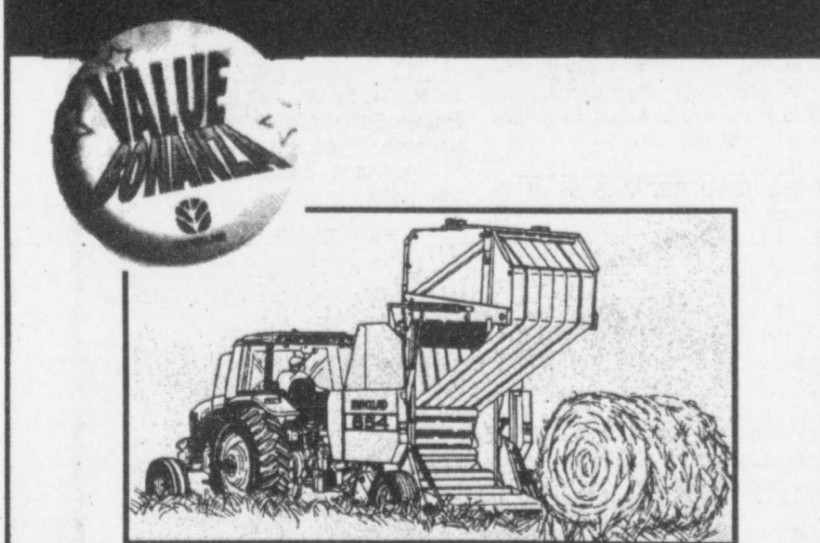

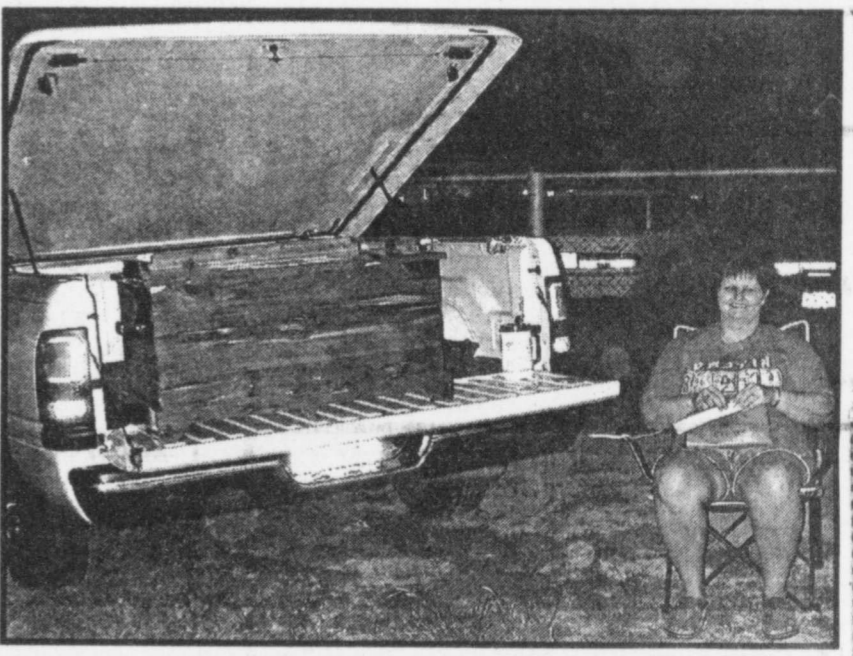
Linda Eilers to coordinate St. Jude Children's Research Hospital fund-raiser

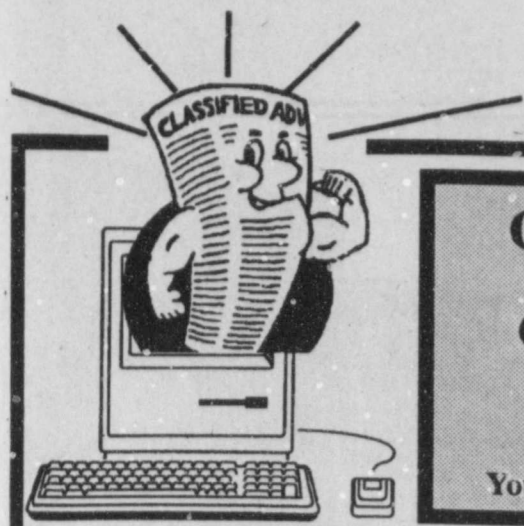
