### Letter From the Editor

From the Editor:

A news article comparing the budgets for area fire departments that ran in this paper last week left some residents surprised at the amount needed to operate a fire department each year. Others were awed at the conditions of fire departments in some of the cities. While some of the cities in our coverage area are supported fully by their city government, and have adequate facilities and efficient equipment, others barely have adequate facilities and are operating with equipment nearly thirty years old and unre-

While almost all cities pay for things like pumper trucks, maintenance and commonly accepted expenses such as utilities, insurance and fuel, some others don't.

Even though some of the budgets might seem large, the cities with volunteer fire departments are extremely fortunate to have fire protection, first responder medical support, weather alert and the new Amber alert program to help locate missing children.

Equipment costs have skyrocketed, as has fuel and other necessary things. These volunteer departments have

twenty or more members who are on call twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. How much would that kind of ser-

vice cost tax payers if those members didn't volunteer their time and even pay for much of their equipment, training and supplies themselves? Indeed, what would life be like

without the protection these departments give us all?

The fire south of Bogata a couple of weeks ago is a good example of the bargain we receive.

According to Bogata Fire Chief Charles Don Lewis, the figures from the U.S. Forestry Service estimated the dollar amount SAVED from the fire at \$660,000. The amount lost was \$190,000.

Compare this amount saved at just this one fire to the size of the budgets reported last week.

Then consider the price of a life. What is that worth? Blossom, Deport, Bogata and Talco all have been credited with saving lives. Ask the families of those people if the local volunteer fire departments receive enough funding each year. For that matter, ask the families who have not had to go through the loss of a loved one alone the same question.

Did you know that September was NATIONAL HONEY month? In honor of this, we are giving you some great honey recipes. . .but first. . .did you know that honey is condensed nectar from flowers. It has very little moisture, only 12-17% by weight and that the rest is an assortment of simple sugars? Did you know. . . it takes about 12-13 pints of nectar to make one pint of honey? The bees put the nectar in open cell of a comb and fan it with their wings to drive off excess moisture, . It can be kept indefinitely because it does contain less moisture than yeasts and bacteria do. It is important to protect honey's

## Drug bust in Red River County

with the Regional Controlled Substance Apprehension Program, while acting on anonymous information, discoverd a large scaled methamphetamine lab on FM1699, two miles south of English in Red River County.

Investigator Danny Powell located a school bus that had been converted into a camper sitting about 50 yards

off FM1699 in a grove of trees. Investigator Powell, along with other investigators from the RSCAP, made contact with the resident of the camper who was identified as Janice

On September 29, investigators Ann Miller, age 44 of Tyler. Upon approaching the camper, investigators could smell a strong chemical odor coming from the camper and the area around the camper. A large amount of chemicals used in the production of methamphetamine were found at the location, along with a felony amount of methamphetamine and marijuana inside the camper, and

three firearms. Miller was arrested at the scene and charged with Attempt to Manufacture Controlled Substance and Possession of a Controlled Substance, both felony offenses. Investigators also learned that Miller was wanted by the U.S. Marshals for three outstanding Federal warrants, all stemming from manufacturing meth-

amphetamine int he past. Also involved in the bust were Red River County Chief Deputy Larry Spangler and Red River County Constable Tim Shimpock and a number of Clarksville City Police. An unidentified male and female were arrested in Clarksville in connection with the production of the lab.

According to Spangler, several thousand dollars of product were seized from the lab.

## Boundary dispute is settled

Texas Land Commissioner David Dewhurst congratulated the U.S. Senate for giving its consent Tuesday to the Red River Boundary Compact between Texas and Oklahoma.

Dewhurst commended U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas and U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry, R-Clarendon for


shepherding the compact through Congress. He also praised the painstaking work of the Texas Red River Boundary Commission, chaired by Bill Abney, which spent several years

"The Red River Compact does not affect ownership of property," Dewhurst stressed. "It only affects political boundaries."

WORLD WAR II MEMORIAL-this proposed memorial will be located in front of the Lincoln Memorial in Washington D.C. Up until now there has not been a national monument recognizing veterans of World War II. Area funeral directors will participating in a plan to raise \$3 million for Texas' portion of \$10 million to be raised nationwide by the National Funeral Directors Association. The total costs of the monument will be \$150 million. \$100 million has been allocated by President Bill Clinton and the rest will come from private donations.

## Area Funeral Directors helping raise funds for WWII memorial

A concerted effort of the National Funeral Directors is underway in the United States to raise \$10 million of the \$150 million needed to erect a World War II Memorial in Washington D.C. adjacent to the Lincoln Memorial.

President Clinton has already committed \$100 million to the project and \$50 million will come from private donations.

The national World War II Memorial is an overdue tribute to the individual Americans who helped win World War II, the largest war of all time and the defining event of the twentieth century. The memorial honors the veterans who bravely fought to defend freedom, those on the home front who contributed to the war effort and the high moral

purpose that motivated the nation's call to arms.

Funeral Directors of Texas have committed to raise \$3 million of the \$10 million committed by the Funeral Directors Nationwide, including all area funeral homes.
