such as class stize, quality of close room materials and experience affect teacher retention.
size of only five studen averag a 2.3 percent increase will turnover,", says Carl Doerfler, study coauthor.
In addition to class size, the study found the cost of living in each particular district is significant. Districts with a relatively high income
have a greater problem with teacher retention because teachers can find better paying work outside of teaching. The TEEP study found that district income is relevant in teacher
