

Upon the first day of the week let everyone of you lay by him in store, as God hath prospered him;" "For if there be first a willing mind, it is accepted according to that a man hath, and not according to that he hath not;" "Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity; for God loveth a cheerful giver" (1 Cor. 16:1 2; 2 Cor. 8:12; 9:7; cf., Acts 4:34-37; Rom. 15:26; 1 Cor. 9:6-14; 2 Cor.

These directions are clear. All funds utilized in the work of the church are to be contributed by its members based upon their own inventory of personal finances. This means that bake sales, bingo games and on-the-air pleas for viewer contributions are unauthorized, inappropriate and unacceptable to God. One day He will call to account those who have angered him by "supposing that godliness is a way to financial gain" (1 Tim. 6:5) and "through covetousness...with feigned words make merchandise of you" (2 Peter 2:3; cf., John 2:126).

8, 2000 Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Bogata, Texas: CHAPTER 1. NOISE CONTROL

Section 1.01. Making of noises detrimental to life or health prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any person to make, cause to be made, or allow noise of such character, intensity and duration as to be detrimental to the life or health of any

individual in the City.

Section 1.02. Noises interfering with the enjoyment of property or public peace

No person shall make, cause to be made, or allow any unreasonably loud, disturbing and unnecessary noise in the City which is offensive to the ordinary sensibilities of the inhabitants of the City, which noise renders the enjoyment of life or property uncomfortable or interferes with public peace and comfort.

Section 1.03. Same-Enumerated The following acts, among others, are declared to create loud, disturbing and unnecessary noises, and shall be deemed a

violation of this Ordinance, but such enumeration shall not be deemed to be exclu-(a) The continued or frequent sounding of any horn or signal device on any automobile,

LAW ENFORCEMENT PROCEDURE 1. A law enforcement officer may stop and detain persons whom the officer has developed reasonable suspicion to believe have committed a violation of this ordinance. A law enforcement officer shall attempt to ascertain insofar as possible that the persons are not:
