## Bogata council listens to report on ice storm, damage, more

Mayor Crane, four council members come on Jan. 9 to look at damage on and approximately twelve citizens present.

At one time, as many as two hundred fiftyeight people were working on roads, etc.. FEMA officials were here Saturday, Jan. 6 to survey the damage. Council voted to confirm the letter from the Mayor to the Governor asking for assistance in the recent emergency caused by the ice storm.




## Rebels host Mustangs January 5




