Council appoints committee to research new community center

The Bogata City Council met in regular session Monday, February 12 with Mayor Jack Crane presiding and all councilmembers present. Seven staff members and eleven citizens also attended.

Invocation was given by Councilman John Haynes. Council heard the audit report from Bob Arnold of Arnold, Walker, Arnold & Co. After hearing from David Rozell about researching the building of a new community center, the council voted to pass a resolution to form a committee consisting of David Rozell, Robert Rhoades, Nancy Jack Ewald, Wendell Davis, Randy Kennedy and Mayor Jack Crane to check into this project.

Council heard from a citizen concerning a payment plan for a high water bill due to a leak.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved, as well as bills and final water bill accounts. Water Superintendent Wendell Davis gave his monthly report which included 103 work orders. He reported that all brush has been picked up except for about 25 piles and is being chipped up. If anyone wants some wood chips to use as mulch, please call City Hall at 632-5315 and the City will load them at no charge. Wendell reported that the Park is all cleaned up, the oil has been changed in all fire trucks, and ten dogs and seven pups were picked up. He also reminded the public that abandoning dogs is a Class B misdemeanor and fines can be levied up to \$4,000 per animal.

Council heard the report from the Fire Marshal, Randy Lemme. He thanked everyone for the appreciation dinner for the VFD and showed a new foam machine which was provided by money from the Lennox Foundation. He said the Bogata VFD has been nominated for the Organization of the Year by Red River County Chamber of Commerce and there will be a dinner on Friday, February 16 at 6 p.m. at the Clarksville

High School Cafeteria.

Police Chief Charles Clegg made his report and told Council that he has presented three cases to the Grand Jury and they made three indictments. Officers Thornsberry and Goodwin no longer work for the City and Jeff Jackson has been hired. Chief Clegg reported that approximately \$30,000 is left in the COPS grant that ends in November. A workshop to explore avenues for income for the Police Department was tentatively set for March 13.

Council voted to file a lien against a landowner for cost of clean up of his property, and tabled action on another property pending more information. The tax attorneys will file suit against the landowners of some abandoned houses on Grayson Street. The City has been reimbursed by the insurance company for the fire hydrant that was damaged. The hot check policy will be taken care of at the March meeting in the form of an ordinance.

Council voted to appoint Jack Crane to fill the unexpired term of W. T. Harbison to Red River Appraisal Board of Directors, since Michael Garretson is not eligible to serve because he is an appointed officer. They approved the recommendation of Shirley Vickers to take Paul Reynolds' place on the Red River Appraisal Review Board. They tabled the Drug Policy until the next meeting and approved the hiring of a new employee for Water/Street work.

The mayor reported on the Morrison Creek Project and FEMA. Council approved the David Rozell contract for clean up of trees and limbs, which will be paid from FEMA funds. Mayor ordered the City election on May 5, to elect three councilmembers. Terms expiring include Randy Kennedy, Kelley Boyd and Edd Spencer. First date to sign up for a place on the ballot is February 19 and the last day is March 21. The meeting adjourned at 10:10 p.m.

Drug lab busted near Johntown

On February 2, 2001 at approximately 8:00 a.m. investigator Danny Powell of the Regional Controlled Substance Apprehension Program (DTF) was notified that Sheriff Bob Storey had received information of a suspicious bag located in the woods near Johntown.

Investigator Powell and Chief Deputy Larry Taylor went to the area and located a duffel bag containing items used in the manufacture of methamphetamine. Also in the bag was an active methamphetamine cook in progress.

Investigator Powell stated, "Mobile methamphetamine labs are on the rise and anyone finding something looking suspicious should contact either the Sheriff's Department, Drug Task Force or Local Police Departments. The items should not be handled due to the toxic hazards associated with methamphetamine labs". Commander Almond stated, "This is another fine example of the Sheriff's Department and Drug Task Force working together to eradicate drugs in our area".

Did you know how Valentine's got started? Well, there are varying opinions. Some experts say that it originated from St. Valentine, a Roman who was martyred for refusing to give up Christianity. He died on February 14, 269 AD, the same day that had been devoted to love lotteries. Legend also says that St. Valentine left a farewell note for the jailer's daughter, who had become his friend and signed it "From Your Valentine!"

Other aspects of the story say that St. Valentine served as a priest at the temple during the reign of Emperor Claudius. Claudius then had Valentine jailed for defying him. In 496 AD, Pope Gelasius set aside February 14 to honor St. Valentine.

Gradually, February 14 became the date for exchanging love messages and St. Valentine's became the patron saint of lovers. The date was marked by sending poems and simple gifts such as flowers and candy. There was often a social gathering or ball.

In the United States, Miss Esther Howland is given credit for sending the first valentines. Commercial valentines were introduced in the 1800's and now the date is very commercialized.

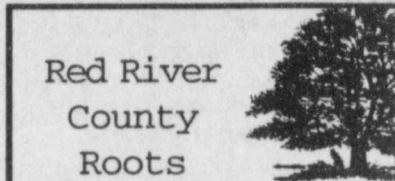

Valentine's Sugar Cookies

1-1/4 cups granulated sugar
1 cup Crisco shortening
2 eggs
1/4 cup corn syrup
1 teaspoon vanilla
3 cups flour
3/4 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt

Icing:
1 cup confectioner's sugar
3 tablespoons water
red food coloring
decorative candies

Combine sugar and shortening in bowl. Beat at medium speed until well blended. Add eggs, syrup and vanilla. Beat until blended and fluffy. Combine 3 cup sflour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Add gradually to creamed mixture at low speed; mix until blended. Divide dough into quarters. Wrap and refrigerate for at least one hour. Preheat oven to 375 degrees and cut in various heart shapes. Ice with frosting.

Strawberry Almond Hearts

1-1/4 cups granulated sugar
1 cup Crisco
2 eggs
1/4 cup corn syrup
1 tablespoon vanilla
3 cups flour
3/4 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup finely-chopped blanched almonds
1/3 cup strawberry jam

Combine sugar and shortening in bowl and beat at medium speed until well blended. Add eggs, syrup and vanilla; beat until fluffy. Combine 3 cups flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Add gradually to creamed mixture at low speed. Mix until well blended. Stir in almonds. Divide into quarters and refrigerate for one hour. Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Cut cookies with heart-shaped cutter and place on ungreased cookie sheet to bake for 6-8 minutes. Remove cookies to cool and spread jam over hearts. Top cookie with smaller shaped baked heart cookie. Sprinkle with confectioner sugar.

In Love With Chocolate Cookies

1-1/2 cups firmly-packed brown sugar
2/3 cup Crisco
1 tablespoon water
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 eggs
1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1/3 cup cocoa
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups miniature semi-sweet chips
6 ounces white chocolate
12 candied pineapple hearts

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Combine sugar, shortening, water and vanilla in large bowl. Beat at medium until well blended. Beat eggs into creamed mixture. Combine flour, cocoa, baking soda and salt. Mix into creamed mixture at low speed until blended. Stir in chips. Divide dough into half and spread dough into 2 ungreased round cake pans. Bake one pan at a time for 10-12 minutes. Do not overbake. Cool 5 minutes in pan. Cut with 2-inch heart shaped cookie cutter with points toward center to make six cookies. Remove to cool. Chop white chocolate into 1/2-inch pieces. Place pieces in microwave on HI for 30 seconds. Stir. Repeat until melted. Spread top of cookies with melted mixture. Top each cookie with candied pineapple heart.

Sweet Potato Butterscotch Chip Cookie

3/4 cup mashed sweet potato
1-1/4 cups firmly packed brown sugar
1/2 cup Crisco
1 tablespoon vanilla
1 egg
1-3/4 cups all-purpose flour
3/4 teaspoon salt
3/4 teaspoon baking soda
2 cups butterscotch chips

Preheat oven to 375 degrees and combine sweet potato, brown sugar, shortening and vanilla in large bowl. Beat at medium until well blended. Add egg and beat until blended. Combine flour, salt and baking soda. Add to creamed mixture at low speed. Stir in chips. Drop by rounded spoonful onto ungreased baking sheet. Bake for 7-8 minutes and cool.

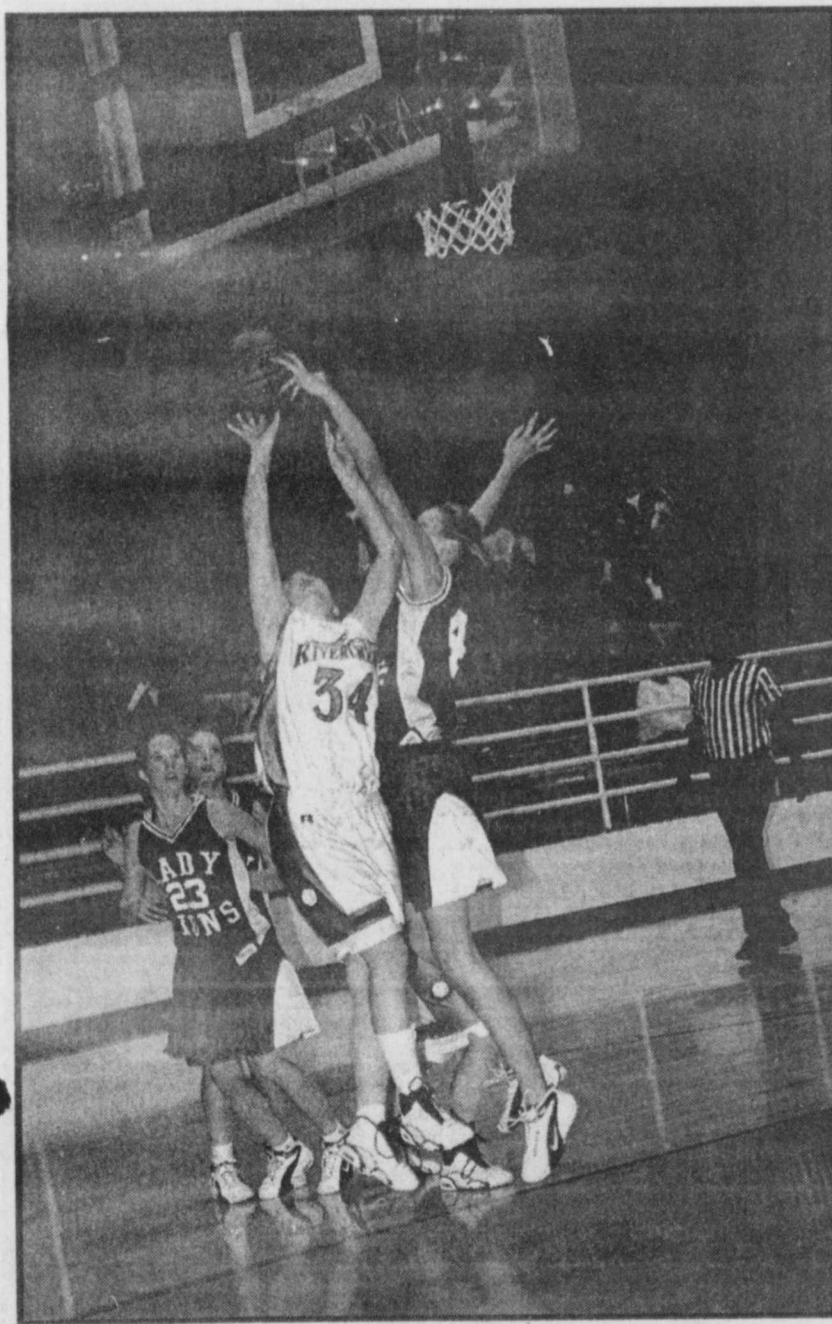
report to the community, complete with Resource Team member's personal recommendations and providing post resource team support and follow up.

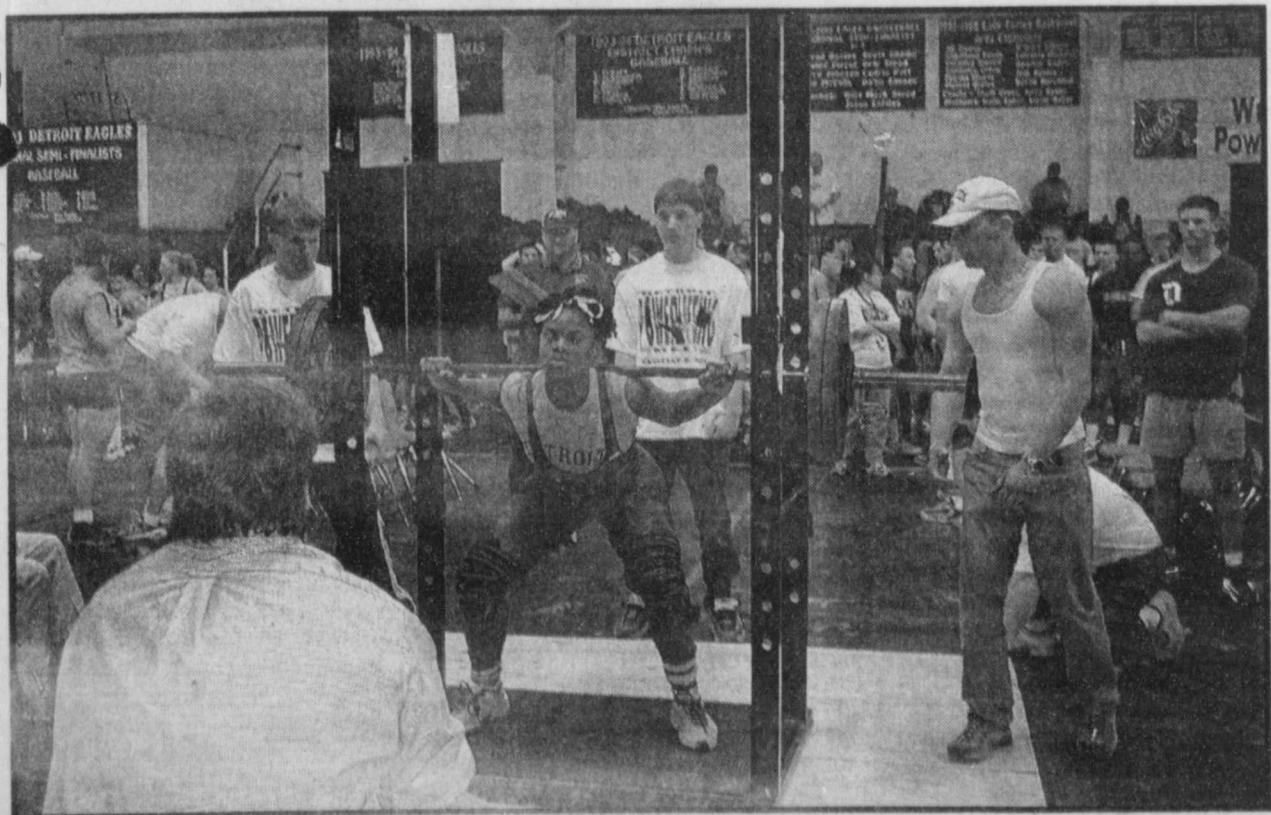

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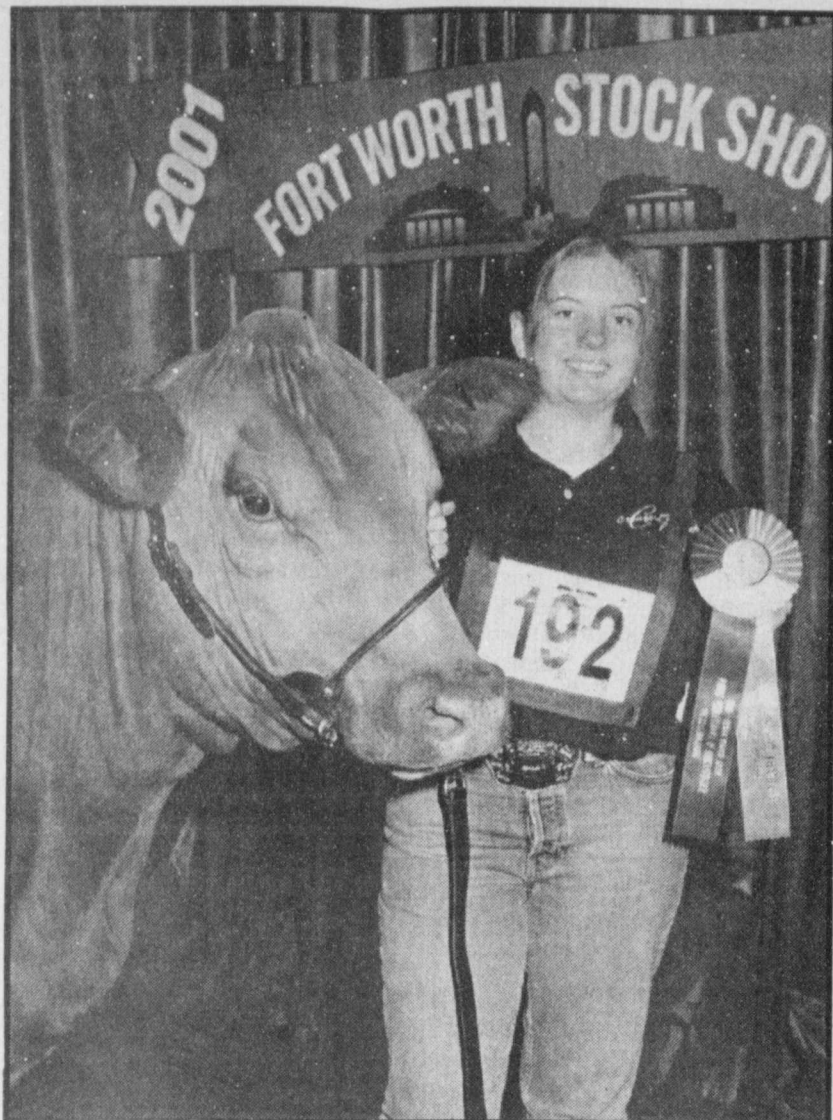
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Rebels post district play

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Why The Eighth Day?

A close examination of the Bible reveals startling proof of its inspiration. Sometimes that proof comes in the form of prophecy-always minutely foretold and completely fulfilled. Sometimes the proof comes in the form of scientific facts which were placed in the divine record hundreds of thousands of years before there were known to the modern scientific mind. This article deals with the latter-an important piece of scientific foreknowledge found with the biblical text, yet completely unknown to man until fairly recently.

In Genesis 17:12, God specifically directed Abraham to circumcise new born males on the eighth day. Why the eighth day? In 1935, Professor H. Dam proposed the name "vitamin K" for the factor in foods which helped prevent hemorrhaging in baby chicks. We now know vitamin K is responsible for the production (by the liver) of the element known as prothrombin. If vitamin K is deficiency, there will be a prothrombin deficiency and hemorrhaging may occur. Oddly, it is only on the fifth through the seventh days of the newborn male's life that vitamin K (produced by bacteria in the intestinal tract) is present in adequate quantities. Vitamin K, coupled with prothrombin, caused blood coagulation, which is important in any surgical procedure. Holt and McIntosh, in their classic work, Holt Pediatric, observed that a newborn infant has "peculiar susceptibility to bleeding between the second and fifth days of life...Hemorrhages at this time, though often inconsequential, are sometimes extensive; they may produce serious damage to internal organs, especially to the brain, and cause death from shock and exsanguination" (1953, pp. 125-126). Obviously, then, if vitamin K is not produced in sufficient quantities until days five through seven, it would be wise to postpone any surgery until some time after that. But why did God specify day eight?

On the eighth day, the amount of prothrombin present is actually elevated above 100 percent of normal, and is the only day in the male's life in which this will be the case under normal conditions. If surgery is to be performed, day eight is the perfect day to do it. Vitamin K and prothrombin levels are at their peak. In his book, None of These Diseases, Dr. S.I. McMillen observed:

We should commend the many hundreds of workers who labored at great expense over a number of years to discover that the safest day to perform circumcision is the eighth. Yet, as we congratulate medical science for this recent finding, we can almost hear the leaves of the Bible rustling. They would like to remind us that four thousand years ago, when God initiated circumcision with Abraham...

Abraham did not pick the eighth day after many centuries of trial and error experiments. Neither he nor any of his company from the ancient city of Ur in the Chaldees had ever been circumcised. It was a day picked by the Creator of Vitamin K (1963, P. 21, Emp. in original).

Moses' information, as recorded in Genesis 17:12, was not only scientifically accurate, but light years ahead of its time. How did Moses have access to such information? The answer of course, is provided by the apostle Paul in 2 Timothy 3:16- "Every scripture is inspired of God..."

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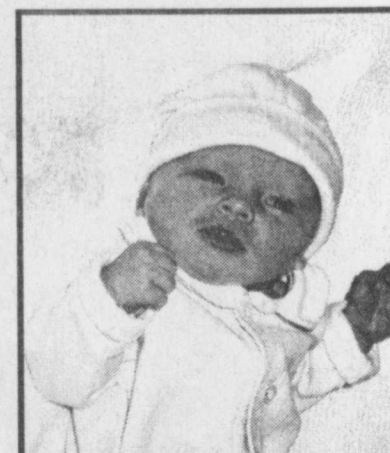
