Council appoints committee to research new community center

The Bogata City Council met in High School Cafeteria. regular session Monday, February 12 with Mayor Jack Crane presiding and all councilmembers present. Seven staff members and eleven citizens also attended.

Invocation was given by Councilman John Haynes. Council heard the audit report from Bob Arnold of Arnold, Walker, Arnold & Co. After hearing from David Rozell about researching the building of a new community center, the council voted to pass a resolution to form a committee consisting of David Rozell, Robert Rhoades, Nancy Jack Ewald, Wendell Davis, Randy Kennedy and Mayor Jack Crane to check into this project.

Council heard from a citizen concerning a payment plan for a high water bill due to a leak.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved, as well as bills and final water bill accounts. Water Superintendent Wendell Davis gave his monthly report which included 103 work orders. He reported that all brush has been picked up except for about 25 piles and is being chipped up. If anyone wants some wood chips to use as mulch, please call City Hall at 632-5315 and the City will load them at no charge. Wendell reported that the Park is all cleaned up, the oil has been changed in all fire trucks, and ten dogs and seven pups were picked up. He also reminded the public that abandoning dogs is a Class B misdemeanor and fines can be levied up to \$4,000 per animal.

Council heard the report from the Fire Marshal, Randy Lemme. He thanked everyone for the appreciation dinner for the VFD and showed a new foam machine which was provided by money from the Lennox Foundation. He said the Bogata VFD has been nominated for the Organization of the Year by Red River County Chamber of Commerce and there will be a dinner on Friday, February 16 at 6 p.m. at the Clarksville

Police Chief Charles Clegg made his report and told Council that he has presented three cases to the Grand Jury and they made three indictments. Officers Thornsberry and Goodwin no longer work for the City and Jeff Jackson has been hired. Chief Clegg reported that approximately \$30,000 is left in the COPS grant that ends in November. A workshop to explore avenues for income for the Police Department was tentatively set for March 13.

Council voted to file a lien against a landowner for cost of clean up of his property, and tabled action on another property pending more information. The tax attorneys will file suit against the landowners of some abandoned houses on Grayson Street. The City has been reimbursed by the insurance company for the fire hydrant that was damaged. The hot check policy will be taken care of at the March meeting in the form of an

Council voted to appoint Jack Crane to fill the unexpired term of W. T. Harbison to Red River Appraisal Board of Directors, since Michael Garretson is not eligible to serve because he is an appointed officer. They approved the recommendation of Shirley Vickers to take Paul Reynolds' place on the Red River Appraisal Review Board. They tabled the Drug Policy until the next meeting and approved the hiring of a new employee for Water/Street work. The mayor reported on the Morrison Creek Project and FEMA. Council approved the David Rozell contract

What would you like to see accomplished in your community? Be a party and attend the meeting.









Why The Eighth Day?

A close examination of the Bible reveals startling proof of its inspiration. Sometimes that proof comes in the form of prophecy-always minutely foretold and completely fulfilled. Sometimes the proof comes in the form of scientific facts which were placed in the divine record hundreds of thousands of years before there were known to the modern scientific mind. This article deals with the latter-an important piece of scientific foreknowledge found with the biblical text, yet completely unknown to man until fairly recently.

In Genesis 17:12, God specifically directed Abraham to circumcise new born males on the eighth day. Why the eighth day? In 1935, Professor H Dam proposed the name "vitamin K' for the factor in foods which helped prevent hemorrhaging in baby chicks. We now know vitamin K is responsible for the production (by the liver) of the element known as prothrombin. If vitamin K is deficiency, there will be a prothrombin deficiency and hemorrhaging may occur. Oddly, it is only on the fifth through the seventh days of the newborn male's life that vitamin K (produced by bacteria in the intestinal tract) is present in adequate quantities. Vitamin K, coupled with prothrombin, caused blood coagulation, which is important in any surgical procedure. Holt and McIntosh, in their classic work, Holt Pediatric, observed that a newborn infant has "peculiar susceptibility to bleeding between the second and fifth days of life... Hemorrhages at this time, though often inconsequential, are sometimes extensive; they may produce serious damage to internal organs, especially to the brain, and cause death from shock and exsanguination" (1953, pp. 125-126). Obviously, then, if vitamin K is not produced in sufficient quantities until days five through seven, it would be wise to postpone any surgery until some time after that. But why did God specify day eight?

On the eighth day, the amount of prothrombin present is actually elevated above 100 percent of normal, and is the only day in the male's life in which this will be the case under normal conditions. If surgery is to be performed, day eight is the perfect day to do it. Vitamin K and prothrom-bin levels are at their peak. In his book, None of These Diseases, Dr. S.I.

McMillen observed: We should commend the many hundreds of workers who labored at great expense over a number of years to discover that the safest day to perform circumcision is the eighth. Yet, as we congratulate medical science for this recent finding, we can almost hear the leaves of the Bible rustling. They would like to remind us that four thousand years ago, when God initiated circumcision with Abraham...

Abraham did not pick the eighth day after many centuries of trial an error experiments. Neither he nor any of his company from the ancient city of Ur in the Chaldees had ever been circumcised. It was a day picked by the Creator of Vitamin K (1963, P. 21, Emp. in original).

Moses' information, as recorded in Genesis 17:12, was not only scientifically accurate, but light years ahead of its time. How did Moses have access to such information? The answer of course, is provided by the apostle Paul in 2 Timothy 3:16- "Every scripture is inspired of God.
