The neighbor took first shift, as they watched and waited for the critter to head towards the hole under the house. Cindy took the late shift.



## Christus St. Joseph's & McCuistion sign letter of intent

Christus St. Joseph's Health System and Texas Health Resources, the parent company of McCuistion Regional Medical Center, recently signed a non-binding Letter of Intent designed to consolidate the two organizations. This action follows an evaluation of a community benefits study commissioned by both organizations.

The LOI calls for Christus St. Joseph's to purchase the buildings, equipment and certain services of McCuistion from THR. After paying any outstanding debts and other liabilities, THR will reinvest the net proceeds from the sale in a not-forprofit foundation designed to improve the health of the communities served by the two hospitals.

The LOI provides that THR will maintain an affiliation with Christus St. Joseph's Health system in order that many of the relationships between patients and physicians in Paris with hospitals and physicians in the Dallas area can continue uninterrupted.

Christus St. Joseph's has been a party of the Northeast Texas community for more than 100 years. McCuistion Regional Medical Center has served the health care needs of the residents of Paris and surrounding communities for 87 years. Both organizations say that their long standing commitment to meet the community's health care needs will continue and that this new arrangement will strengthen and stabilize health care services for the area.

Over the next several weeks, Christus St. Joseph's and THR representatives will work toward finalizing the transaction. They anticipate the transaction to be completed by this summer. Included in the final sale agreement will be a plan outlining how the two hospital campuses will coordinate services.




