The last time I actually wore them was when I was in the hospital two years ago. One thing about it, they last a long, long time.

In winter, when my coldnatured feet are turning blue I resort to terry socks with grip patterns on the soles. I still don't like houseshoes.

Do you go wading or swimming in lakes or rivers? If so, do you do so barefoot or with water waders?

Will you wear sandals? Some people won't even expose their pink piggies to that freedom!

On the other hand...or should I say foot (yes, I know that's a bad pun), I have a friend who virtually has to have at least an open toed shoe. She much prefers open back also. A fully enclosed shoe gives her the willies.

Proponents of the free feet theory say their feet are healthier, less prone to nasty things like foot fungus. Those how like the protected route point out that they don't have scars from cuts, bruises or nail holes! They also tend to think of themselves as more civilized.

They are probably right. I've never met anyone who was an "in between". Humans seems to be fully committed to one or the other way. You might say that we take a definite stand (oh, I did that bad pun thing again) on free feet versus safe feet.

Whichever you favor, I don't suppose it matters. But it is interesting. Take a count in your family. Are you all safe footed.? Free toed? Or is your family a mixture of both?

Bogata City Council voted to set a policy concerning a large water bill due to a leak. Customer will be required to pay a bill consisting of the large bill and the previous five water bills averaged together. A City employee will be dispatched to be sure the leak has been repaired.

The Preacher and Church Growth

If the church is not growing in numbers, it is concluded, the preacher is largely responsible. It is further assumed that such factors as the preacher's appearance, personality, preaching style and tone (as opposed to his message) are responsible for the preacher's success or failure.

Compare this scenario with Bibical truth. According to the New Testament, the preacher's function and God-ordained task is to preach the truth (2 Tim. 4:2; 1 Tim. 4:11, 13; Tit. 2:15). Consequently, it is NOT his responsibility to bring in the numbers! We further assume that if the preacher is coming across properly in his preaching, people are going to be converted and if people are not being converted, the preacher has gone haywire in his message and method. Where does such an assumption leave a "preacher of righteousness" (2 Pet. 2:5) like Noah? How does it compare with Jesus' preaching which caused "many" of His disciples to withdraw (John 6:66)? I fear that our job description of the preacher's task and God's definition do not match. Preacher in our day are hired on the basis of their appealing personality and their success in attracting numbers. How shameful that we could have strayed so far afield from divine

Paul may have been a penetrating writer, but he apparently was not very commanding in the pulpit in terms of his physical presence (cf., 2 Cor. 10:10; 1 Cor. 1:17; 2:3-5). He would not have fared very well in today's competitive shuffle for dynamic speakers to fill the pulpits of the "big" churches. Nevertheless, he is a proper model for preachers to emulate (1 Cor. 4:16; 11:1; Phil. 3:17; 4:9; 1 Thess. 1:6; 1 thess 3:9). He said that he planted i.e., put the truth out there for people to be confronted by (1 Cor. 3:6). GOD was responsible for anyone who responded properly to that message by embracing Christianity. HE gives the increase-not the preacher! consequently, if the truth is being preached in love (Eph. 4:15), and the numbers are not coming in, it's not the preacher's fault!

We must return to the practice of putting Bibical preachers (not cheerleaders, warmed over Dale Carnegies or excited P.R. men) in our pulpitspreachers who will expose people to all God's messages and the leave the increase (or lack of it) to God!




