



clothes and shoes tax free during the third annual back to school sales tax holiday August 3-5.

Beginning at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, August 3 through midnight Sunday, August 5, famileis will be able to purchase most shoes and clothes priced under \$100 for both children and adults without paying state or local sales tax.

The sales tax exemption on shoes and clothing also includes baby

clothes, belts with attached buckles, cowboy and hiking boots, choir robes, coats and wraps, diapers for adults and babies, dresses, jeans, jogging apparel, pajamas, raincoats and ponchos, shirts, socks, suits, underwear and work clothes and uniforms. The sasles tax holiday does not cover jewelry, accessories, handbags or specialty sportswear items.

Texans will not be charged sales tax on tax exempt items placed on lay away for future purchase.
