Nation reels after

devastating terrorist attacks

The nation sat in stunned disbelief Tuesday, September 11 as they watched on video and late-breaking news reports the fall of the World Trade Center and the Pentagon bomb-

Four carefully planned hijackings of commercial airliners resulted in the total destruction of the trade center, and at press time the Pentagon in Washington D.C. was still burning. Thousands are reported dead in the wake of terrorism, and rescue workers work ceaselessly around the wreckage.

Locally, dozens of families scrambled to find out if their loved ones were safe in New York or Washington, D.C.


Bobbie Bailey, Deport native re-

Bogata Council OK's surveying donated land

Approximately 27 guests, Mayor Kennedy and all members of the Bogata City Council attended the regular meeting on Monday, September 10.

A public hearing on the proposed budget was held.

In the regularly scheduled meeting, the council agreed not to change the agreement with James Hale, who teaches TaeKwondo at the Community Center.

They voted to freeze a high water bill for a customer for six months, and at that time she will pay an average bill which will include the large water bill.

Minutes of the previous meetings were approved as well as bills and final water bill accounts.

Reports from Police Chief Charles Clegg and Fire Marshal Wayne Martin were heard. Police Officer John Davidson was promoted to the rank of Corporal. Water Superintendent Wendell Davis gave a report of the past month's activities of 68 work orders including 10 water leaks, six sewer stops, mowing, patching, ten dogs picked up and five returned to owner. Three fire hydrants have been repaired, and council approved reLonnie Hyder were reappointed to the Crime Control Board with four councilmembers voting yes and Councilman Strickland abstaining.

One bid was received on the sale of the 19567 Galion road grader.

Four councilmembers voted to accept the bid from Mark Hare Cattle Company in the amount of \$3250 with Councilmember Garretson voting not to accept the bid.

The proposed budget was approved with four councilmembers voting for and Councilmember Lewis voting no. The tax rate for 2001 was set at .64144/\$100 with four councilmembers voting for and Councilmember Lewis voting no.

Council voted to table the appointment of a replacement for Jack Crane on the Red River Appraisal Board of Directors.

Council voted to allow the Assistant City Secretary Kay Neading and the Court Clerk, Angie Burgess, to work 32 hours per week for the next budget year. They voted to amend the double rates ordinance for water/ sewer customers outside city limits by charging the basic rate for 2,000 gallons of water at \$16.00 and \$3.50

Council voted to amend the Advisory Fire Marshal Ordinance #91-06, to provide for an annual salary of \$600 to the Fire Marshal beginning October 1. Council voted to amend ordinance #99-09 to raise the Court Technology Fee from \$2.00 to \$4.00 and they voted unanimously to approve an ordinance to assess and collect a Building Security Fee of \$3.00 from a defendant upon conviction for a misdemeanor offense in the Municipal Court.

A maintenance agreement for the office copy machine was approved, and no action was taken on filing a grievance for electric bills and television cable. Council voted to check prices with three different attorneys. They voted unanimously to have the tree trimmers cut some dead trees in the park.

An ordinance was approved requiring all water customers to pay for trash pickup service. Random drug testing for employees was tabled pending more information. Councilmembers Allen and Screws voted against tabling this item. coun-

The group also has Rebel caps for sale. They will be available at home football games.


Garrison wins afghan

They sounded very good and I thought, well this is the season for those pear preserves, so here are a few other pear recipes. A lot of folks in this area make pear preserves and know the trouble they go to prepare these are well worth itunless you burn or scortch (is that the correct spelling it sure doesn't look like it!) them and then well, the process starts over. It is very easy to do this and preserves have to be watched constantly and cooked at a low temperature for several hours.

Sue always has an abundance of pears and enjoys sharing them with others. She and her husband Eddie own and run Eddie's Service Center in downtown Deport. She enjoys just visiting and meeting folks and enjoys her grandkids. Her youngest, Ty, began school this year in Kindergarten, and she sure has some stories to tell about him! He is a doll!

In our area, the sugar pears are best for baking and the late summer pears are best for pear preserves.

Anyway, pears originally came from Europe and Asia and the first cultivated varieties were cultivated



from the wild varieties in the prehistoric ages. How they know this, I'll never know !!!!!!! The Romans knew in the beginning of 6 cultivated varieites and later mention 56. The late medieval Italian list mentions 232 varieties

Around 1640 in England, only 60 varieties were known. In 1842 more than 700 were known. The American author, T.W. Fields mentions 850 varieties in the 1860's.

In large bowl, combine first 8 ingredients. in another bowl, beat eggs, oil and vanilla. Add the pears and zucchini. Stir in dry ingredients just to moisten. Fold in nuts. Pour into 2 loaf pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 50-60 minutes or until toothpick inserted comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes in pan and move to wire rack.






A TEAM EFFORT: Coach Keith Brown gave his Rebel team the high five during time-out at the football contest against the Alba-Golden Panthers last Friday night.





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

A Letter from Senator Gramm Jack Crane of Bogata has shared a letter from Senator Phil Gramm concerning the matter of liability

of Japanese companies who used American prisoners of war as forced labor during World War II. Dear Mr. Crane, Thank you for contacting me about the liability of Japanese com-

panies who used American prisoners of war (POWS) as forced labor during World War II. I appreciate having the benefit of your views on this important matter.

I cannot overstate my respect and appreciation for those brave men and women who were forced to endue untold suffering at a time when our liberties were in grave jeopardy. In these days of unprecedented peace and prosperity, it is all too easy for many Americans to forget that the wealth and security we now enjoy were purchased at a considerable price. An entire generation of Americans interrupted their lives to turn back the hand of tyranny in Europe and the Pacific, and many paid the ultimate price to ensure that their children and grandchildren would enjoy the blessings of freedom and liberty. The endurance of American prisoners of war, many of whom continued their country's fight from behind barbed wire in the face of Japanese atrocities, is a testament to the stubborn, fighting spirit of the American GI. During World War II, Japan captured and imprisoned roughly 36,000 Americans, of whom over one third died during their imprisonment. Many of those American POWs were forced to work during their incarceration for private Japanese companies under dangerous and op-

pressive conditions. As a result, many such veterans still suffer from long-term health problems.

In the current Congress, H.R. 1198, the "Justice for the United States prisoners of War Act of 2001", has been introduced to address the issue of privately-owned Japanese companies who forced prisoners of war to perform slave labor. This legislation would, in part, direct the federal courts not to interpret article 12(b) of the Treaty of Peace with Japan as a waiver of claims that would prevent U.S. POWs from pursing forced labor suits against Japanese individuals or private corporations. Additionally, the bill would insure that article 26 of the Peace Treaty with Japan should apply to forced labor suits by U.S. POWs. This bill has been referred to the House Judiciary, International Relations, and Government Reform committees for consideration.

We must never forget the sacrifice made by those who stood up to Japanese aggression, and we must always honor them in word and deed. As my colleagues and I debate the issues of our day, I can assure that such deliberations are conducted with the knowledge that our freedom was secured by the blood and sacrifice of those who stood in the way of advancing tyranny. You may be sure that I will keep your views foremost in mind should H.R. 1198 or other relevant legislation be considered by the full







PROPOSITION 13 (SJR 2)

Generally, a colonia is an economically distressed geographic area with inadequate public services (such as water supplies, sewer services, or paved roads) in a county without adequate resources to provide such services. These projects could include the construction of access roads, the acquisition of materials used in maintaining those roads, and projects related to the construction of those roads, such as road drainage. The Texas Transportation Commission, in consultation with the Governor, would be authorized to determine what constitutes a border colonia for purposes of selecting the counties and projects that would receive assistance.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of state general obligation bonds and notes to provide financial assistance to counties for roadway projects to serve border colonias."

PROPOSITION 3 (SJR 47)

Proposition 3 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to exempt green coffee and raw cocoa held in Harris County from property taxes in order to qualify Harris County as an exchange port for coffee by the New York Board of Trade. The authorization of exemption would not apply to any other county.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation raw cocoa and green coffee that is held in Harris County."

PROPOSITION 4 (HJR 1)

Proposition 4 would amend the constitution by setting the term of the fire fighters' pension commissioner at four years. The constitution currently provides that the duration of all offices not otherwise fixed by the constitution may not exceed two years.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for a four-year term of office for the fire fighters' pension commissioner."

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing municipalities to donate outdated or surplus firefighting equipment or supplies to underdeveloped countries."

PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 45)

Proposition 6 would amend the constitution to require the governor to call a special session of the legislature so that the legislature can appoint presidential electors when the governor determines that it is reasonably likely that the outcome of the election for a presidential candidate's electors will not be clearly determined in time for the appropriate electors to meet before the federal deadline to cast their votes. Under current law, when the people vote for a particular candidate for president, in reality they are voting for that candidate's electors who will meet to cast their votes for president. If the electors are not determined by the certification date, no electoral votes may be cast for the state. The proposed amendment ensures that the state's electoral votes will be cast.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring the governor to call a special session for the appointment of presidential electors under certain circumstances."

PROPOSITION 7 (HJR 82)

Proposition 7 would amend the constitution to authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell up to \$500 million of additional general obligation bonds to finance additional home mortgage loans to veterans. Additionally, the proposed amendment would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to use assets from the land and housing assistance funds to create, operate, and improve veterans' cemeteries

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for veterans' housing assistance and to use assets in certain veterans' land and veterans' housing assistance funds to provide for veterans cemeteries."

PROPOSITION 8 (HJR 97)

Proposition 8 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize the Texas Public Finance Authority to issue and sell up to \$850 million of general obligation bonds. The proceeds of the sale of the bonds would pay for construction and repair projects or for the nurchase of needed equipment by the General Services Commission, the Texas Youth Commission, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, the

Proposition 9 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide for filling vacancies in the legislature without an election if only one person is a qualified candidate in the election to fill the vacancy. Under current law, a special election must be held to fill a vacancy in the legislature even if there is only one qualified candidate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the filling of a vacancy in the legislature without an ty." election if a candidate is running unopposed in an election to fill a vacancy."

PROPOSITION 10 (SJR 6)

Proposition 10 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to exempt certain items of personal properfrom property taxation by political subdivisions of the state if the property is warehoused temporarily in a location in Texas to be assembled, stored, manufactured, processed, fabricated, or repaired and then forwarded to another location inside or outside Texas. The proposed amendment would authorize a political subdivision that imposes ad valorem taxes, at its option, to tax this type of property after a local public hearing on the matter.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote equal tax treatment for products produced, acquired, and distributed in the State of Texas by authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation tangible personal property held at certain locations only temporarily for assembling, manufacturing, processing, or other commercial purposes.'

PROPOSITION 11 (HJR 85)

Proposition 11 would amend the constitution to allow a schoolteacher, a retired schoolteacher, or a retired school administrator who serves as a member of a governing body of a school district, city, town, or other local governmental district, including a water district, to receive compensation for serving on such a governing body. Currently, state employees or other individuals who are compensated directly or indirectly from state funds are barred from receiving a salary for such service.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow current and retired public school teachers and retired public school administrators to receive compe sation for serving on the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, including water districts."

PROPOSITION 12 (HJR 75)

Proposition 12 would amend, repeal, or relocate several sections of the current

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to authorize the board of trustees of an independent school district to donate certain surplus district property of historical significance in order to preserve the proper-

PROPOSITION 14 (HJR 44)

Proposition 14 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize a taxing unit, other than a school district, to exempt travel trailers from property taxation as long as the travel trailers are lawfully registered with the state and are not held or used for the production of income

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to authorize taxing units other than school districts to exempt from ad valorem taxation travel trailers that are not held or used for the production of income."

PROPOSITION 15 (SJR 16)

Proposition 15 would amend the constitution to create the Texas Mobility Fund, which would be administered by the Texas Transportation Commission. The Fund would finance the construction, acquisition, and expansion of state highways and would pay a portion of the costs of public toll roads and other public transportation projects. The legislature may reserve specific sources of state revenue for the Fund and may authorize the Commission to guarantee the payment of any obligations or credit agreements with the full faith and credit of the state. The attorney general shall determine the legality of any such obligations or credit agreements.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas Mobility Fund and authorizing grants and loans of money and issuance of obligations for financing the construction, reconstruction, acquisition, operation, and expansion of state highways, turnpikes, toll roads, toll bridges, and other mobility projects."

PROPOSITION 16 (HJR 5)

Proposition 16 would amend the constitution to reduce the waiting period required for a valid home improvement lien on a homestead from 12 days to 5 days. Currently, a lien may not attach to a homestead for a home improvement loan if the homeowner executed a contract for the improvements less than 12 days after applying for the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would

claim to certain state land and to clear title defects for persons who claim title to those lands. The proposed amendment would apply to land whose owners have disputed title to the land, but for which no patent from the state, giving clear title to the land, was ever issued. Among other requirements, all of the taxes due on the land must have been paid. Under current law, there is no procedure allowing the state to settle title disputes without a constitutional amendment for each piece of land in dispute.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to settle land title disputes between the state and a private party.'

PROPOSITION 18 (SJR 49)

Proposition 18 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to create a program to consolidate and standardize the collection, deposit, reporting, and payment of criminal and civil court fees. If the legislature creates such a program, any new fees imposed by the legisature may not take effect before January 1 of the following year, unless an earlier effective date is approved by a vote of two-thirds of the members of each house of the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote uniformity in the collection, deposit, reporting, and remitting of civil and criminal fees

PROPOSITION 19 (HJR 81)

Proposition 19 would amend the constitution to allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue up to \$2 billion of additional general obligation bonds. The Board issues bonds to pay for water supply projects, water quality enhancement projects, flood control projects, state participation in water and wastewater facilities, and projects for economically distressed areas. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the Board can issue.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$2 billion."
