
We have to strike a balance, some sort of realitybased way of dealing with the huge amounts of information today's world has out there for us to "graze" on.


We must realize that this may go on for a long time, that we will never again be free of the threat of terrorism, which may take many forms.

Responding to Suffering

"Now as Jesus passed by, He saw a man who was blind from birth, and His disciples asked Him, saying Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" John 9:1-2

Making sense of suffering seems to be a universal pastime. Even Jesus' disciples looked upon an encounter with a blind man as an opportunity to discuss the theological significance of personal tragedy. Confusion on the issue was ingrained in the Jewish heritage. Their venerated poets also grappled to balance the goodness of God with the prosperity of wicked people (cf. Psalms 37:25; 73:3).

Perhaps the disciples reasoned that if anyone could resolve the issue, Jesus could; so they asked. Imagine their embarrassment when he responded: "Neither this man or his parents sinned, but that the works of God should be revealed in him" (vs. 3). The Lord approached it from a different perspective. They saw an issue to discuss; He saw a need to be met. Of course, the meeting of that need resulted in the accomplishment of a higher purpose (the generation of faith), and underscored the Lord's true identity (John 20:30-31). It should be placed upon what God can do in a suffering person's life-not upon why a person suffers.

Jesus further explained: "I must work the works of Him who sent Me while it was still day; the night is coming when no one can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." (John 9:4-5). He then gave sight to the blind man. Christians, as the current embodiment of Christ (Galatians 2;20; Colossians 1:24), bear the responsibility of shining Christ's light in their sin-darkened world. As long as they do, the world has a light to lead them from the misery of personal hardship to the joy of heaven.
