





Potatoes can even be added to use the thin-skinned boiling potatoes and not the Russets or other







Cook 7-10 minutes until oysters begin to curl on edges. Drain in colander. Combine oyster mixture, rice, sausage, parsley and seasonings to taste. Bake at 350 degrees until heated thru.


