I desperately tried to grip the crane, which was gaining pounds with each step, I swear. Finally, though, we reached the checkpoint. I realized everyone behind me was smiling and laughing as I finally set that blasted thing down. Then, I realized everyone was wondering what I wanted with anything so hideously painted, anyway! So, I began babbling that I was going to repaint it. One gentleman said "Thank heavens!". It was all, to say the least, a bit embarrassing. But, at least there is no proof it ever happened. When I get a chance I'll paint it up nicely, and then everyone is invited to come see my treasure. One thing's for sure...I earned it!

It was perfect for making snowmen, and school kids rushed home after classes to begin making them in abundance.


Wednesday, the area was incredibly beautiful, and there was a chance of additional snowfall, while roads were reasonably good.
