Choir working towards fantastic gospel singing!

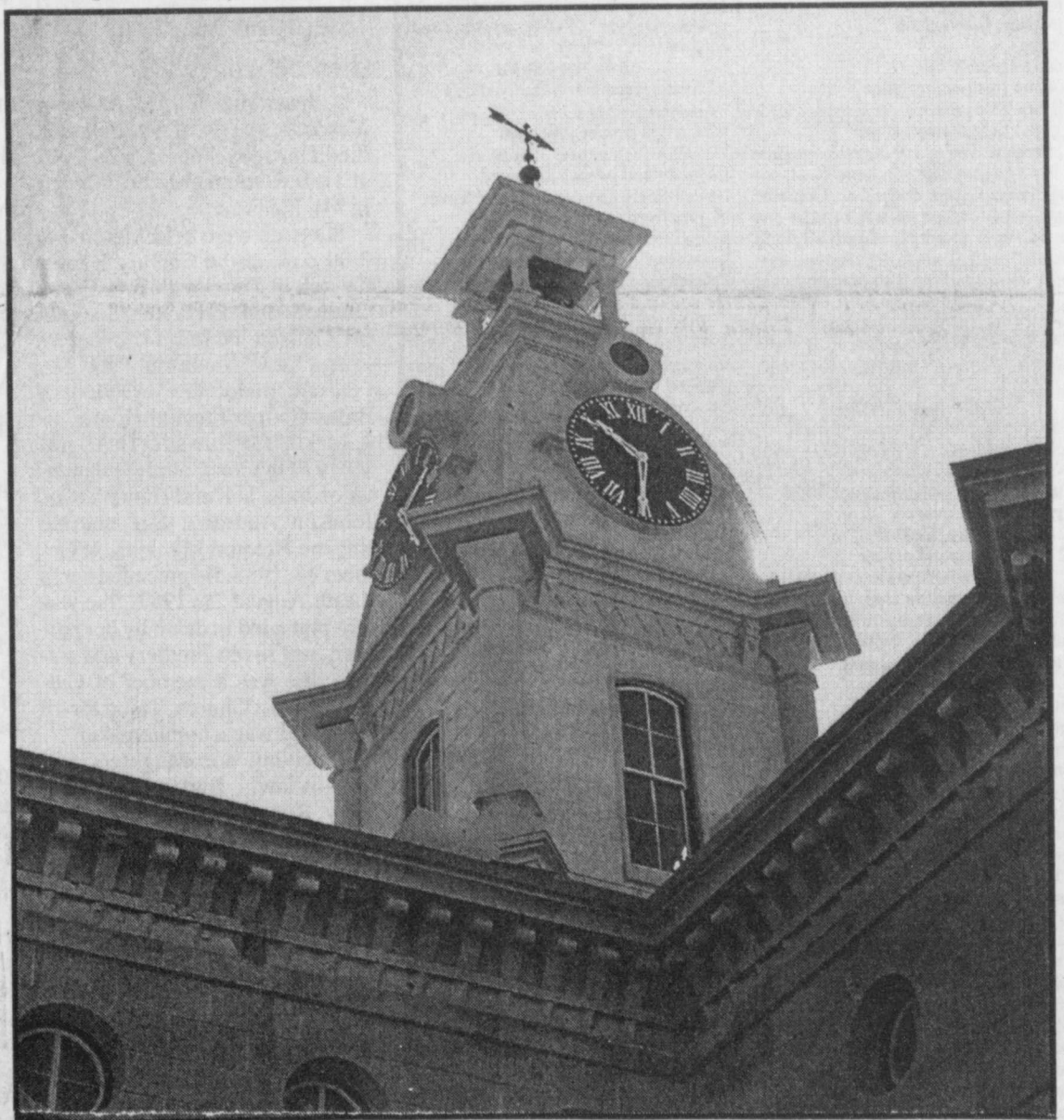

Flashes.....Massey's Pit Bar B Q

The sign just off Highway 37, "PIT Q", is now old and weathered and partly hidden on one side by a small but growing cedar tree. In years gone by, the sign once proudly proclaimed the roadside home of Massey's Pit Bar B Q restaurant located just about midway between Bogata and Clarksville.

Massey's long ago cooked the last pound of beef brisket. The small one room building of light green shingles, three single windows trimmed in white and a white roof is now all but abandoned. No longer does the flapping screen door invite customers to come in and enjoy that special flavor only Massey's knew how to provide. The gravel, oval driveway remains and the pit chimney and two smoke pipes still stand tall on top of the fading building, but the torn curtains hanging from the windows tell you that pit barbecue is there only in memory.

I was only a kid when I made my first trips from Deport to Massey's. It was practically a Sunday morning ritual for me and my daddy to crank up that 1954 Royal Blue Chevy pickup truck and drive the farm-to-market road

through Fulbright to Massey's. If Bud Nobles only knew, at an early age, driver's license or not, it was pretty exciting for me to learn to drive on occasion on that road, behind the wheel of that old Chevy.

Anyway, I suppose Massey's was open on other days of the week, but our day for barbecue

was Sunday. I remember pulling into that oval driveway and at times seeing Mr. or Mrs. Massey tripping out of the back door of their house which was located just about thirty paces beyond the carport from the restaurant. Going inside the restaurant front door, you quickly met up with the counter and the old cash register. Behind the counter were the obligatory chip rack and the old Coke wall menu proclaiming beef and pork by the pound or by the sandwich.

Mrs. Massey, grandma-like and always smiling, usually handled the counter and the customer service, while Mr. Massey, always serious about his product, was busy in the pit. You don't find barbecue like the Massey's much anymore. The sauce was a deli-

icious, special clear vinegar based blend of spices and heavy on red pepper. It was sweet, yet with the right spicy bite. It was always

tough to choose between the pork and the beef, so we usually just got both.

What made a trip to Massey's really special was the preparation of the "to go" order. Folks, it was pre-styrofoam times. Then, they packed both the sauce and barbecue in what we know today as those neat, white cardboard Chinese food boxes complete with the little wire handles. Just drop those into a brown paper bag and you were on your way.

Once we got home with barbecue by the pound, Mother would toast "hamburger" buns to perfection with just the right touch of browned edges from an old black iron skillet. Those buns were good for mopping up the sauce that dripped off your sandwich. That was the best part. We just added chips and bottled Dr. Pepper to our Massey's on Sunday. That was all you needed to enjoy an old family tradition--one for days gone by supplied by the Massey's for our house.

Country Cooking

Our recipes this week deal with Key Limes. Those of you that don't know about Key Limes.....well, here is a short history lesson. There are two principal varieties and they are the Key Lime or Mexican or West Indies Lime and the Persian or Tahiti Lime. The Key Lime was cultivated in the Indo-Malaysian region and made its way all around the Mediterranean by way of Christopher Columbus. Go Chris! The lime or Citrus aurantifolia; Rutaceae family, was touted as the lifesaver of the British Navy in the 18th century. It was discovered that a daily dose of lime juice reduced the incidence of scurvy which is a deficiency of Vitamin C. Thus they became known as "limeys".

The Key Lime was spread to Southern Florida where it became an abundant crop for farmers, particularly in the Florida Keys, thus the name, Key Lime.

The Florida lime groves were destroyed by hurricanes in the early 1900's and most Key Limes now come from Mexico. They are about the size and shape of a golf ball, with a thin skin and are harvested while immature. This is when the acid is at its highest level. When the fruit turns yellow, the acid levels drop and they become sweeter. It is used for sauces, gar-

nishes, syrups, preserves and the Key Lime Pie.

The Persian Lime is also grown extensively in Florida. The fruit is larger with a thicker skin and is more durable than the Key Lime. This makes it more desirable to commercial growers and is more widely produced than the Key Lime. We hope you enjoy the recipes this week and give some of them a try.....we will see you in the kitchen!!!!!!

KEY LIME PIE-avoid using aluminum pans as the high-acid content tends to give the pie an undesirable taste and can turn it a grayish color!

TROPICAL LIME CAKE-uses a lemon cake mix along with orange and lime juice!

GARLIC LIME CHICKEN-make extra as this is great sliced into chicken salad for later!

LIME SOUP-chicken stock, diced chicken and the juice of two limes makes a light and tasty soup to go along with a sandwich!

LIME BARS-this can also be doubled and made into a 9x13 baking dish!

STRAWBERRY SALSA-recommended for grilled fish, shrimp or chicken dishes!

KEY LIME CHEESECAKE-using Key Limes gives the cheesecake an aromatic and citrusy flavor!

Thursday, March 7
Key Lime recipes

Key Lime Pie

- 10-inch graham cracker crust
- 14 ounce can Eagle Brand Milk
- 1/2 cup Key Lime juice
- 16 ounce Cool Whip

In large bowl, combine milk & lime juice; mix well. Fold in Cool Whip, mix until smooth. Pour into crust, refrigerate 1 hour before serving.

Tropical Lime Cake

- 1 package lemon cake mix
- 1 package lime gelatin
- 5 eggs
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 3/4 cup fresh orange juice
- 1/2 cup lime juice
- 2 cups confectioner's sugar

Preheat oven to 350 degrees, prepare a 9x13 baking dish. In large bowl, stir together cake mix & gelatin. Combine eggs, oil & orange juice in blender and blend for 5 minutes. Gradually add blended ingredients to dry mixture, beat for 5 minutes. Pour into prepared pan. Bake 40-45 minutes or until center is done & springs back. For glaze, combine sugar & lime juice, beat until smooth. Pour over hot cake, let it soak in.

Garlic-Lime Chicken

- 4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- 1/2 cup soy sauce
- 1/4 cup fresh lime juice
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 2 garlic cloves-minced
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon ground pepper

Mix all ingredients except chicken well. Pour marinade over chicken and refrigerate for 30 minutes or more. Drain and discard marinade. Grill until chicken is tender and done throughout.

Key Lime Soup

- 1 ounce butter
- 1 onion
- 1 tomato
- 1 small green pepper
- 1/2-1 teaspoon minced chili
- 6 cups chicken stock
- 2 limes
- 7 ounces diced cooked chicken

Finely chop onion and peel and diced tomato along with pepper. Peel the zest or rind off of one lime and squeeze juice out of one half. Slice remaining lime thinly. In large saucepan, melt butter and add chopped onion and sauté for 3-4 minutes. Add tomato, pepper and chili and cook for another 2 minutes. Pour in chicken stock and add the lime peel and juice. Cover and simmer for another 5 minutes. Remove peel. Add chicken and heat through. Serve garnished with thinly sliced lime.

Key Lime Bars

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup powdered sugar
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine

Mix together & cut in butter until crumbly. Spread dough in 8x8 pan, bake at 325 degrees for 20 minutes or until lightly brown. While crust is baking prepare topping layer.

- 2 eggs
- 2 tablespoons fresh lime juice
- 1/2 teaspoon grated lime zest
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 4-5 drops green food color

In mixing bowl, beat eggs. Add lime juice, zest, sugar, flour & food color. Mix well & pour mixture over hot baked crust. Bake 20-25 minutes at 325 degrees. Remove from oven, sprinkle with powdered sugar. Cool & cut into small squares.

Strawberry Salsa

- 1/2 medium red onion-thinly sliced
- 1 jalapeno pepper-diced
- 1/2 red bell pepper-julienned
- 1/2 yellow bell pepper-julienned
- 1/2 green bell pepper-julienned
- 1/4 cup finely shredded cilantro leaves
- 1/2 pint fresh strawberries-sliced
- 1/4 cup fresh orange juice
- 2 tablespoons fresh lime juice
- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 1 salt and fresh ground black pepper

Place all ingredients in large mixing bowl, toss to combine. Cover & refrigerate at least 2 or up to 4 hours. Fifteen minutes before serving, remove & let dish lose some of its chill.

Key Lime Cheesecake

- 3 cups graham crackers crumbs
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 2/3 cup butter-melted
- 1 cup fresh lime juice
- 1/4 cup water
- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
- 1-1/2 cups sugar
- 5 eggs-slightly beaten
- 2 teaspoon grated lime rind
- 1 stick butter at room temperature
- 16 ounces cream cheese at room temperature
- 1/2 cup heavy cream-chilled

To prepare crust stir in first 3 ingredients of crumbs, sugar & melted butter in medium-size bowl. Press over bottom & up sides of 9-inch spring form pan. For filling combine lime juice & water in small saucepan; sprinkle gelatin over top. Let stand for 5 minutes to soften. Stir in sugar, eggs & lime rind into pan. Cook, stirring over medium-heat until almost boiling about 7 minutes or thermometer reads 160 degrees F. Do not boil, remove from heat. Beat butter & cream cheese until well mixed. Gradually beat in lime mixture until well blended. Refrigerate, stirring occasionally, until mixture thickens enough to mound slightly when dropped from spoon, about 45 minutes. Beat chilled cream in small bowl until stiff peaks form. Fold in lime mixture. Pour into prepared crust & refrigerate until firm, 3-4 hours. Run knife around inside of pan & loosen sides. Remove from pan, garnish with whipped cream & lime slices if desired; refrigerate.

Mrs. Moore retired in 1999 after 63 years on the board of the Henry Luce Foundation, which finances projects in Asian affairs and other fields.

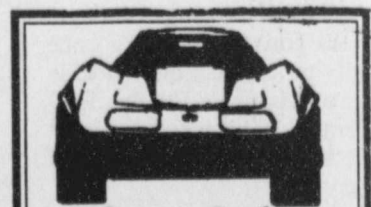
The organizations in which Mrs. Moore served included Wellesley College, her alma mater, and the United Board for Christian Higher Education in Asia.

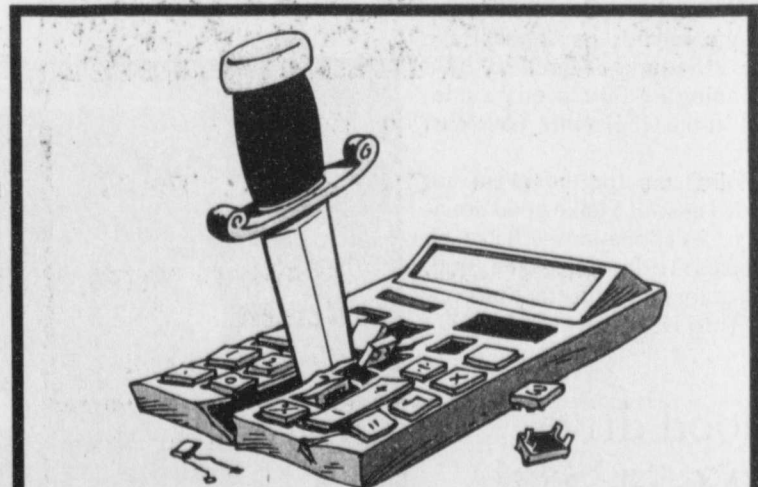

Help needed for newspaper preservation

Red River County Genealogical Society began a newspaper preservation project last year with a grant received from the Lennox Foundation.

Thirty-nine years of the *Deport Times* were preserved on microfilm as were numerous copies of the Clarksville Times. A collection of previously filmed Detroit and other local papers were purchased by the society and made available to local researchers.

Though *Deport* is located in Lamar County, researchers found a total of 2,784 Red River County obituaries. Of this total, only 183 were interred in Lamar County.

Upon learning that it would not be receiving a grant from the Lennox Foundation this year, the genealogical society decided to begin a fund drive to continue

work on the restoration project.

Copies of the Bogata News, beginning in 1909, have not been filmed and are currently stored in the attic of that paper's building. The older copies are already yellow and brittle with age. A miscellaneous collection of papers from various years has also been gathered from individuals and libraries and are ready to be filmed. Numerous years of the Clarksville Times no longer exist, however, other small town papers often reprinted items from the paper so some news from the lost years may be salvaged.

The society does not currently have enough money to film these papers and they will continue to deteriorate until the money is forthcoming. The genealogical society has no funding other than

its yearly membership dues, which is used to print and mail its quarterly publications for the most part.

The Red River County Genealogical Society was established in 1986 and has been a tax exempt organization since 1991. All donations to the society are tax deductible. A separate fund has been created for donations that are made to the newspaper preservation project and those funds may not be used for any other purpose. A request for donations that was recently sent out via e-mail has already resulted in several donations.

Rivercrest Relays held Thursday, February 28

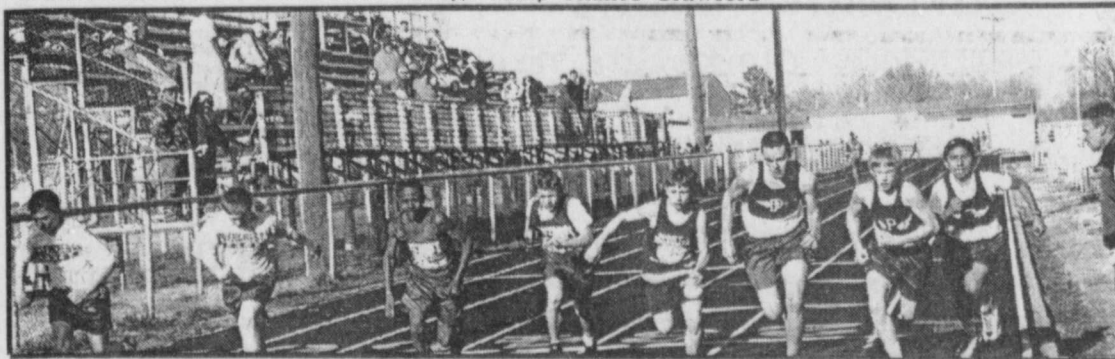

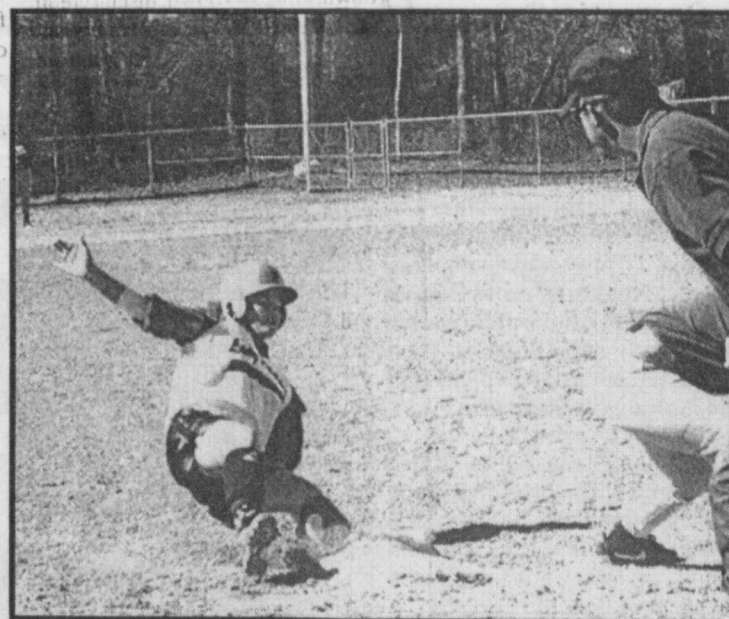
