It sounded like a lot of money!

Three hundred and sixty million dollars! Wow, that sounds like a lot of money. It is, actually, a lot of money. But, it isn't nearly as much as you might think.

As most of my readers know, I'm devoted to the cause of volunteer fire departments.

As such, I found myself recently staying up until midnight working on a FEMA grant application.

After September 11, three hundred sixty million dollars was released to help fire departments obtain better fire fighting equipment, vehicles, emergency medical services, or fire prevention programs.

I think I knew the money was going to be pitifully short when it took six or seven hours just getting through on the internet to FEMA!

Now, the procedure isn't through yet. No one knows whether they are getting any grant money or not.

But, here's how things stack up.

Requests for this three hundred sixty million totalled Two point two BILLION dollars!

That's right, there were 19,500 requests for funds for a total of \$2.2 BILLION.

I can't count high enough, or even begin to grasp the concept of that much money.

Fifty eight percent of the grant money requested was for fire operations and firefighter safety...that means things like protective clothing (bunker gear) radios, boots, jaws of life, etc.

Fire fighting vehicles (usually the most expensive item a volunteer fire department has) made up 37% of the applications, and emergency medical services and fire prevention made up the rest of the applications.

In addition, volunteer departments must compete with paid and combination volunteer/paid departments, located in urban, suburban and rural communities.

300 fire service personnel are currently going over these applications to determine who gets what. I don't envy them their job.

What does all this mean? It means that, as always, small town volunteer fire departments must have the support and help of the people they serve.

Because getting grants isn't a reliable way to obtain funds for things such as gear to keep a volunteer from being burned, or medical equipment to save a life.

Whenever grants are open, volunteer departments MUST apply for them. Otherwise it gives the appearance that they aren't trying. But, in reality, the chances of getting much help through the process are very, very slim.

Shooting results in one injury in Bogata

On Wednesday, May 29 at approximately 7:00 p.m., Dustin Mauldin and his wife, Alicia Coggins were involved in a physical altercation in the front yard of her sister's residence on Second Street in Bogata.

David Kelly of Bogata, who was driving by at the time of the argument, witnessed Mauldin's physical abuse of his wife, stopped and prevented Mauldin from any further assault on his wife.

Mauldin left that residence and went directly to his father, Wade Mauldin's residence where he obtained a .22 revolver and immediately returned to his sister-in-law's.

Mauldin approached Kelly, who was still standing in the front yard, and shot at Kelly, hitting him twice in the legs. Mauldin then fled the scene, got his wife's car and apparently drove to the Paris area where he later made a call from a pay phone to his father while Red River County Sheriff's Deputies were present at the residence.

The deputies were able to ascertain that the call was placed from a Paris phone number and notified the Paris PD and Lamar County Sheriff's Department, who began searching for Mauldin.

An off-duty Lamar County Deputy spotted Mauldin in the Patonville area and began following him in his personal vehicle, using his cell phone to give Mauldin's location. He continued following as Mauldin drove south on US 271 and turned on FM1149 in Deport, then back south on FM410. Red River County Sheriff Jerry Conway and Deputy Rocky Womack were able to intercept and block Mauldin on FM410 about one mile north of Rugby and arrest him without further incident.

Cooperation between the Bogata Police Department, Paris PD, Lamar County Sheriff's Department and the Red River County Sheriff's Department made it possible to bring a bad situation to a fast and good ending.

Bogata Missionary Baptist celebrate

On Sunday afternoon, June 2, 2002, the Bogata Missionary Baptist Church held a note-burning service to celebrate the blessings of God on their church in making it possible to pay off the note on the building.

In July 1997, a group of people met together to discuss starting a mission work in Bogata. After prayer and consideration they decided to ask Hughes Springs Missionary Baptist Church to extend an arm to begin a mission and the members of Hughes Springs agreed to sponsor this work.

In September, the Bogata Mission and the sponsoring church called Billy Daniels as missionary. The mission was meeting in the Rosalie store building. They

soon became overcrowded and purchased a mobile home to use as Sunday School space.

Discussion began concerning the possibility of building a permanent meeting place, with the help of Bro. Marion Reed, an architect who does volunteer work for the churches, a plan was soon agreed upon with a cost estimate of \$350,000 if built under a contract with a builder. A loan application was submitted and approved by a loan institution for \$194,000.00 However, with the help of Texas Mission Builders, Texas Mission Development, Texas State Ladies Auxiliary, the sponsoring church and other churches and individuals, the final note on the building was 130,000.

The first payment was made on the 30 year note in July 1999. In May 2002, the final payment was made! The church now has a nice building, parking area and two and one half acres of land, and is debt free!

During this time, the church members have paid all expenses plus extra payments on the loan from the beginning, as well as sending regular monthly offerings and special offerings to other mission works. All funds received from other sources have gone toward the construction of the building and the principle on the note.

The members are very appreciative of all the help received during this time and are thankful for God's blessings on His work through this church.

Federal funding aids local fire departments

Federal dollars for the Ice Storm Recovery Program are assisting with wildfire suppression efforts. With this funding, 490 pair of Nomex coveralls were dispersed to 35 volunteer fire departments in Bowie, Cass and Red River counties to protect firefighters when battling wildfires on May 29 when representatives of the volunteer departments were on hand at the New Boston Courthouse to collect the donated gear.

Former President of Bowie County Firefighters Association Richard Engle said the coveralls are a vital piece of safety equipment since bunker gear is not designed for fighting wildfires.

Federal dollars will also fund seasonal firefighters and fire prevention messages in Northeast

Texas. Increasing public awareness of hazards posed by storm damaged timber and brush will aid in reducing the occurrences of wildfires.

The Ice Storm Recovery Program is providing a total of \$2.7 million Federal dollars in technical and cost share assistance for reforestation efforts, urban forestry projects and fire protection to landowners and communities who were impacted by the ice storms. The Texas Forest Service is the state agency responsible for allocation of technical assistance and these cost share funds.

Dear Editor,
The purpose of this letter is to give your readers some information about the Bogata Cemetery and how it operates.

The cemetery covers an area of approximately ten acres in the northeast part of Bogata. As of February 2002 there were 3,327 people buried there. The governing body consists of 14 directors with the official name of The Bogata Cemetery Association. It is the responsibility of the directors to maintain cemetery property in a manner that will show the respect that the citizens of Bogata hold for the people buried there and reflect the pride we have in our community. These directors serve with no compensation.

Keeping the cemetery grass mowed, trees trimmed and maintain the pavilion is an expensive undertaking. During the

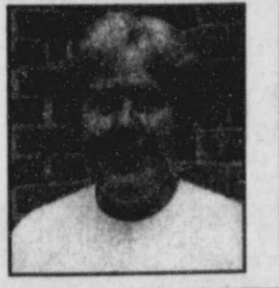
year 2001, \$12,000 was spent on mowing and maintaining the property.

The only source of income to the cemetery is the sale of burial plots and cash donations. For the past several years, the annual expense far exceeds the annual income. The long range plan is to accumulate enough money so that the interest from investments would provide perpetual care.

Country Cooking

Well, the gardens are growing up a storm now that the weather has turned of dry and warmer.....or should I say hotter! Anyway, the ground is warming up now and the veggies are going great guns! We had our first cucumbers and bell peppers this week. I cut them up and sliced some onion and mixed it with salt, pepper, garlic salt, fresh garlic, vinegar and oil.....they were so good! So I got to thinking, where did the cucumbers originate.....so now you know where I am going! It is time for a history lesson again this week.....so here we go!

It is believed that the cucumber was native to India and evidence shows that it was cultivated in western Asia for 3,000 years.....how do they determine that? From India, it headed on into Greece and Italy and on into China. It probably was introduced to the other parts of Europe by the Romans with records of early cultivation in France in the 9th century, England in the 14th century and in North America by the mid-16th century.

The Spaniards brought them to Haiti in 1494. They made their way into Canada and thanks once again to the Native Americans, mainly the Iroquois, they became a mainstay for us. Though cucumbers were brought early from the

Old World and grown in many gardens, nothing is found to be said about varieties until 1806. Modern cucumbers gradually evolved from the main European varieties without planned hybridization or much selection until 1872. Much interest has been shown since the 1880's to the present about the breeding of the various types.

So, there you go.....and here are the recipes for this week. Everyone has their favorite pickle recipe, so I want bore you with those, but you may want to try out some of these and well, it is a good thing you have a preference! We will see you in the kitchen!!!!!!

GEORGIA CUCUMBER JELLY-this is one of the favorite ways to prepare cucumbers for a lot of people!

STUFFED CUCUMBERS-this is a main dish, stuffed with pork, with a sauce poured over!

CUCUMBER RELISH-always a great side dish for your favorite meats!

FISH TACOS WITH CUCUMBER SALSA-I am not sure about this one!

CRUNCHY CUCUMBER SPREAD-spread on crackers or dip with chips!

FRIED CUCUMBERS-fry like you would a green tomato!

PET TALK

The family cat may not be the only thing threatening your Tweety bird.

Your home may actually have hidden dangers that can prove fatal for pet birds, and from an unlikely source - harmful fumes. Nonstick cookware is just one of the many commonly used products that may threaten your bird's life.

According to Dr. James Johnson, a veterinarian in the College of Veterinary Medicine, Zoological Medicine Section, at Texas A&M University, birds have extremely efficient respiratory systems capable of absorbing oxygen from the air much more effectively than humans. Unfortunately, this also makes them far more susceptible to contaminants, even if humans are unaffected by those contaminants.

"When heated to very high temperatures, the nonstick coating on cookware, irons, bread makers and other appliances emits fumes that are fatal to birds," said Johnson.

"These fumes are odorless and harmless to humans but can cause a bird's lungs to hemorrhage within minutes. Bird owners are advised to avoid using nonstick cookware to avoid harming their birds."

If you do use nonstick cookware, be careful not to allow the pans to scorch. If they do overheat, quickly remove the bird from the house and ventilate the house thoroughly before returning your bird indoors, Johnson advises. The same is true for other harmful fumes.

Smoke, paint, household cleaners, pesticides and any other solvents can be dangerous to birds. Pet owners should remove their birds from any areas where these products are being used or even remove the birds from the house altogether until the fumes have dissipated, Johnson adds.

"Since birds are affected so quickly by household fumes, it is important to watch closely for symptoms such as wheezing, gasping for breath, open-beak breathing and sneezing," said Johnson. "The effects of household fumes are often treatable, but lung damage in birds is permanent."

Many birds that die from household fumes often die within hours or even minutes of exposure. If your bird does begin to show symptoms of toxic fume inhalation, take it to an emergency veterinarian immediately. Your veterinarian may want to keep the affected bird in an oxygen cage to manage the symptoms.

Johnson says that heat lamps and other unlikely items often have coatings applied by the manufacturer that emit odorless fumes when heated and can be harmful to a bird. Since these products are not harmful to people, it is unlikely that they will have warning labels that indicate a potential danger to pet birds.

Cucumber Recipes

Georgia Cucumber Jelly

6 medium size cucumbers
3 packages unflavored gelatin
1/2 cup cold water
2 cups boiling water
1/4 cup apple cider vinegar
1 teaspoon onion-grated
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 drops green food coloring
1/4 cup pimiento-chopped

Peel cucumbers, remove seeds and grate. Wrap in clean kitchen cloth to absorb all moisture for about 15 minutes. Sprinkle gelatin over cold water, add boiling water and stir until dissolved. Add vinegar, onion, salt and food coloring. Refrigerate until slightly thickened. Stir in grated cucumber and pimientos. Pour into eight 1/2-cup individual molds and chill for 4 hours or until very firm. Serve as an accompaniment to cold meat or fish.

Stuffed Cucumbers

2 cucumbers
1/2 pound ground beef or Italian sausage
1/2 cup bread crumbs
1 or 2 cloves garlic-crushed
1 egg
1 small jar spaghetti sauce
4 slices your favorite cheese

Peel cucumbers and cut in half lengthwise. Scrape away seeds with a spoon. Mix meat, bread crumbs, garlic and egg. Fill cucumber "boats" with this mixture. Place in microwave and pour tomato sauce over the stuffed cucumbers. Cover with a slice of cheese and microwave on HI for five minutes. Test for doneness and top with spaghetti sauce.

Cucumber Relish

4 medium cucumbers-diced
1/4 cup seasoned rice vinegar
2 tablespoons diced red onion
1 tablespoon vegetable oil
1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper

Mix ingredients in medium bowl. Makes about 2-1/2 cups.

Fish Tacos with Cucumber Salsa

1 egg
1/4 cup milk
1/4 cup water
1/4 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
2 pound white fish fillets oil for deep frying
24 corn tortillas
lime wedges
1 cup cucumbers-peel and dice
1/2 cup red onion-diced
1/2 cup tomato-diced
1 tablespoon fresh jalapeno-minced
1/4 cup red wine vinegar
1 tablespoon fresh cilantro leaves-gchopped salt and pepper to taste
Beat egg with milk and water. Add flour, salt, baking powder and mustard and beat until smooth. Cut fish into pieces about 2-1/2 inches long and 1 inch wide. Dip fish into batter until well covered. Fry in deep oil heated to 375 degrees until golden brown. Heat tortillas while frying fish. Combine all salsa ingredients and add salt and pepper to taste. Place each piece of fish on hot tortilla and top with salsa and serve with lime wedge.

Crunchy Cucumber Spread

8 ounces cream cheese
1/2 cup sour cream
1 tablespoon milk
1 teaspoon grated onion
1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1/3 cup finely chopped cucumber

Combine all ingredients except cucumber and mix until well-blended. Add cucumbers and chill for several hours.

Fried Cucumbers

Wash and dry cucumbers; peel and slice. Dredge in flour/meat mixture and fry in hot oil as you would a fried green tomatoe until golden brown.

PET TALK

Tiny hummingbirds that weigh a few ounces can give tons of pleasure to bird enthusiasts.

The minute creatures are among the most fascinating of all birds, both for their curious behavior and their somewhat mysterious mannerisms.

Don't think for a moment they would make good pets: as with many types of wild birds, it is against the law to keep hummingbirds as pets. But they can still be admired and observed, and hummingbird feeders are a good way to do both, says Dr. Ian Tizard, a bird specialist at Texas A&M University's College of Veterinary Medicine.

Tizard says the type of hummingbird you'll see in Texas depends on where you live. East of Interstate 35, residents will most likely see the Ruby-Throated hummingbird, while those west of I-35 will probably see the Black Chinned hummer. "Austin-area residents can see both," he says.

In South Texas, the Buff-billed hummingbird is common, while in West Texas, the aptly named Blue Throated and Magnificent hummingbirds are a common sight.

When springtime hits Texas, hummingbirds invade the state and their arrival can be a time of wonder for those interested in the birds.

Many residents install hummingbird feeders to attract the birds, and a wide variety of feeders is available at hardware stores. And hummingbirds will thank you for doing so: their rapid metabolism requires a lot of nourishment.

"Hummingbirds can have a wingbeat rate as high as 80 per second, although the normal rate is about 50 or so when flying," Tizard reports. "And their heart-beat rate has been recorded as high 1,260 beats per minute. So they need a lot of nourishment.

"The substance in feeders is sugared water, and the best mix is about one cup of sugar for every

Wait until you have a full load to run the dishwasher or washing machine. Use cold water wash and rinse, if possible.

Set the water heater at 120 degrees for normal use. For dishwashers without temperature boosters, set the heater at 140 degrees.

Clean refrigerator condenser coils at least twice a year.

If you're in the market for a new home cooling system, look for units that have high efficiency ratings. An Energy Efficiency Ratio for 11 or more for window units, and a Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio of 14 or more for central units. It pays the buy the most efficient equipment you can afford.

five cups of water. Don't use red dyes. They will not attract hummingbirds and are not good for birds."

Tizard says it's best to have several feeders spaced away from each other. The reason: hummingbirds won't think twice about tussling with others for a food source.

"They are extremely territorial, especially the males," Tizard adds.


"Hummingbirds are known for fighting among themselves for food. That's why it's best to have more than one feeder out. A tree is an ideal place because hummingbirds will get a drink, fly away for a few seconds, and almost surely return."

Tizard says hummingbirds must have solid food besides the quick sugar fix they get from feeders. Unlike other birds, they will not eat birdseed but prefer tiny insects.

"Their rapid movement requires that they eat almost constantly," adds Tizard. "If they don't, they can easily starve to death."

Although hummingbirds give people a natural entertainment show, the tiny birds do have some enemies. They include owls, hawks, cats, lizards, snakes and even praying mantises and spiders.

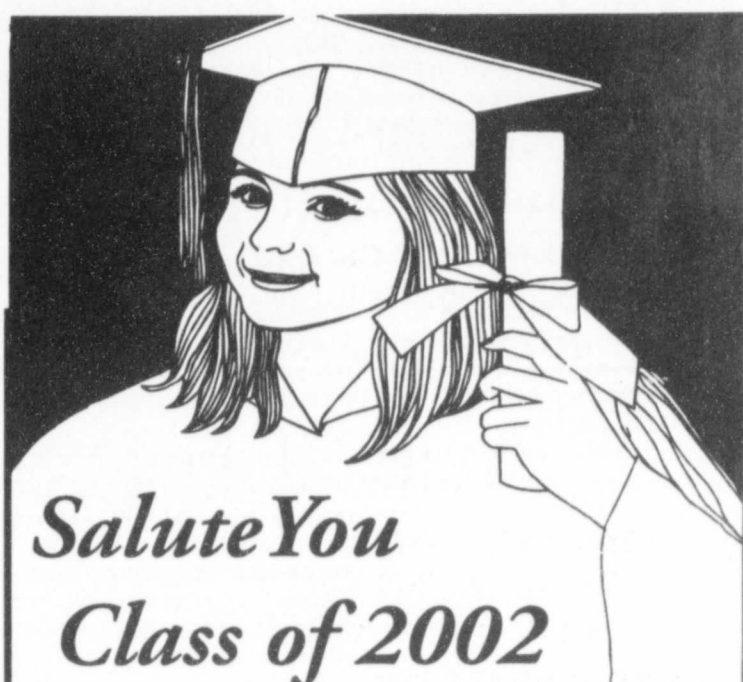

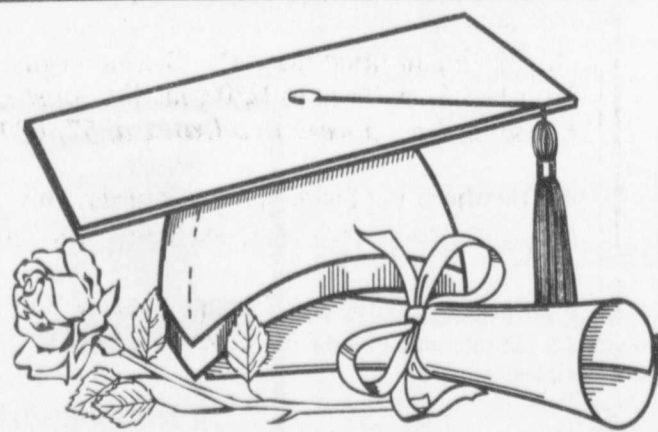

Common tomato problems

By Lynn Golden, County Extension Agent

Tomatoes are by far the most popular home garden vegetable in Texas. I have noticed several gardens in our area where the tomatoes are reaching shoulder height and really blooming and setting fruit. Gardeners can successfully grow both spring and fall tomatoes here but there are several potential problems that can occur. A short description of the most common problems seen in tomatoes follows:

Blossom-end rot: It first appears on the bottom of the tomato as a large, dry, brown or black sunken area. It affects both green and ripening tomatoes and is primarily caused by a fluctuating moisture supply. The rot is likely to appear on the earliest tomato fruits of the season and starts when the plants are putting on quick growth and are suddenly exposed to a hot, dry spell or in some cases, excessive moisture. Maintaining uniform soil moisture and applying a mulch around the plant will help reduce blossom end rot.

Insect damage: Stink bugs, spider mites and pin worms are the most destructive insect pest of tomatoes. Control measures must begin early if these pests are to be controlled.

Fruit cracking: is often a severe problem, especially when the weather changes from hot and dry

to sporadically rainy. The best way to avoid this is to keep the moisture supply as steady as possible throughout the season. Again, mulching helps.

Catfacing is another type of tomato cracking or scarring. This is not a disease and it is caused by abnormal development of the female part of the tomato flower at bloom time. Fruit that sets when temperatures are 55F or below often exhibit catfacing.

Blossom drop plagues gardeners during both cool and hot conditions. You might consider planting a few Small Fry or Red Cherry tomatoes to insure both early and mid-season fruit set.

Sunscald occurs when green or ripening tomatoes get too much exposure to the sun. Growing tomatoes in cages is an excellent way to avoid most problems associated with sunscald.

Foliage disease control begins with variety selection. Grow only tomatoes that are listed as being VFN, which means they are resistant to verticillium wilt, fusarium wilt and nematodes. Spraying your plants with an approved fungicide, begun when your first fruit are about 50% their expected size and continued at 7-10 day intervals will provide good protection and control of early blight and most other foliage diseases.

Federal funding aids local fire departments

Federal dollars for the Ice Storm Recovery Program are assisting with wildfire suppression efforts. With this funding, 490 pair of Nomex coveralls were dispersed to 35 volunteer fire departments in Bowie, Cass and Red River counties to protect firefighters when battling wildfires on May 29 when representatives of the volunteer departments were on hand at the New Boston Courthouse to collect the donated gear.

Former President of Bowie County Firefighters Association Richard Engle said the coveralls are a vital piece of safety equipment since bunker gear is not designed for fighting wildfires.

Federal dollars will also fund seasonal firefighters and fire prevention messages in Northeast

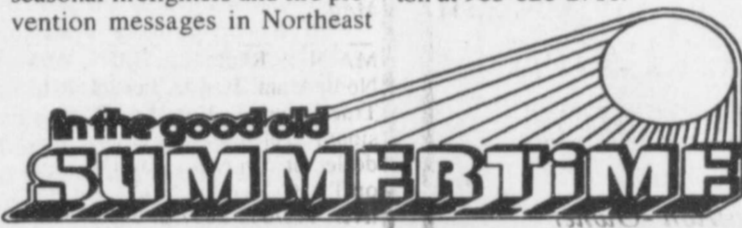

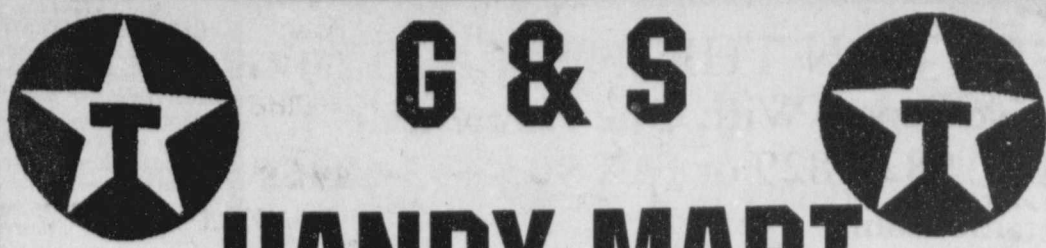

Grasshopper outlook turned around

A dry, mild winter has encouraged a large hatch of grasshoppers in Central Texas, but recent rains should help keep the pest from becoming a severe problem for the next few weeks in East Texas.

Dr. James Robinson and other entomologists with Texas Cooperative Extension are reluctant to predict what will happen during the next few months. Much depends on summer rainfall and the availability of natural food sources for the grasshoppers.

If the rains are adequate, many of the grasshoppers will feed on weeds and other foods and they will stay away from crops. Along with adequate rain comes better forage production, allowing grazing by livestock and hay to be produced. An added benefit of adequate rain, is it will keep the hoppers in their natural habitat and away from gardens and home landscapes.

Grasshoppers are not currently a problem in East Texas except for isolated areas. A couple of weeks ago, it was a different story. There were reports of Central Texas farmers finding the ground under their feet squirming with grasshopper nymphs. Reports of grasshopper infestations were also coming in from the Athens and Canton areas.

Farmers were concerned about the infestations because with soil moisture already below normal in many parts of the state, hay and forage could be at a premium during the months ahead.

Though the grasshoppers are small, many farmers elected to treat early. It was an expensive enterprise, but one which was probably wise, considering the past effects of adult grasshoppers on pastures.

At this time of year, the majority of grasshoppers are in the nymphal (young) stage. These small grasshoppers are easier to control when compared to the larger adult stage.

Grasshopper hatches are normally held in check by a fungus

which attacks their overwintering eggs in the soil. During a dry winter, the fungus does not flourish and more grasshopper eggs hatch to become nymphs.

Producers are usually advised that it becomes economical to treat when they can count 25 grasshoppers per square yard. Twenty-five grasshoppers may not sound like a big number, but over an acre, this count could equal 120,000 grasshoppers. At this concentration, the grasshoppers can eat as much forage as a mature cow.

Chemical controls for grasshoppers in improved pastures are relatively cheap when products are used at their lowest rates. Sevin XLR and Malathion 57 EC have proven effective on grasshopper nymphs in bermudagrass pastures at their lowest rates. Cost of these products will range from nearly \$5 to as much as \$7 per acre.

Which insecticide used depends upon more factors than cost, however, Malathion has no grazing or harvest restrictions. Sevin has a 14-day grazing restriction.

The highly toxic insecticide methyl parathion is also labeled for grasshopper control. Because of its toxicity level, Robinson recommended that it be applied either aerially or by a commercial applicator using an enclosed cab machine.

I do not recommend that methyl parathion be applied by farmers with an open air tractor cab and spray rig. It's just too dangerous.

Methyl parathion has a 15-day waiting period for hay harvesting and grazing.

Dimilin can be used for control of grasshopper nymphs only in rangeland and non-cropland. There will not be a special permit allowing the use of this product on pastureland.

The choice of insecticides for grasshopper nymphs in pastureland remains to be carbaryl (Sevin), malathion or methyl parathion.

Robinson emphasized that insecticide products are complicated and allowed usage will vary among formulations of the same chemical. Applicators should read the label carefully before mixing or applying. For example, producers should note that the restrictions listed above are for beef cattle only. Restrictions for use on dairy pastures vary considerably.

Sevin, a commonly used insecticide, has another restriction. It can only be used twice in a calendar year. In addition to controlling grasshoppers, it is also effective with another scourge of East Texas pastures, the fall armyworm, which has been a problem in recent years.

You might consider using one of the other products for grasshoppers now and holding Sevin in reserve in case they have a problem with armyworms this fall.

Homeowners shouldn't worry about grasshoppers damaging lawns. Vegetable gardens at ornamental landscape plants can be a target, however. For safe control in vegetable gardens, use Sevin or malathion.

For home owners, insecticides containing bifenthrin and lambda-cyhalothrin provide the fastest knockdown and longest residual control. Products containing permethrin cyfluthrin, and esfenvalerate should also provide good control. Be sure to read label instructions carefully before using a product on home vegetable gardens.

Robinson has put together a fact sheet on the various grasshopper control products and their formulations and distributed it to county agents throughout East Texas. Producers needing more specific information are advised to contact their local county Extension office.
