The Bogata News has a mystery, and could use some help in solving it.

For ninety years the bound volumes of the Deport, Bogata and Talco Times, and later the Blossom Times and Detroit weekly, have been stored upstairs at the main office.

Through the auspices of the Red River county Genealogy Society the papers have slowly been being taken to Dallas to be microfilmed.

When it was time to begin with Bogata we discovered that about twenty years of the papers are missing!

They have never been allowed out of the office, and there doesn't seem to be an explanation for their

disappearance. The only thing we can figure out is that there was a six month's period when the ownership of the papers fell into the hands of a man who was less than scrupulous. Whether he took the early volumes or not will never be known.

At any rate, the Genealogy society and the Bogata News are requesting that if anyone has ANY issues of the Bogata News that dates back before 1946 to please get in touch with Johnny Lee at 982-5309 or Nanalee Nichols at 652-4205. These papers could then be microfilmed, adding to the valuable historical record they represent.

Dear Editor,

I am writing concerning the proposed Marvin Nichols 1 Reservoir. I just attended a meeting at Cuthand, Thursday, June 13, 2002. After reading a letter or article published last year in this paper about the "Lake" I was kind of excited. It stated that landowners would retain ownership right up to the water edge and that it would be an economic boom to our part of the country. I admit that I went to the meeting with a little skepticism but after hearing the facts, which are backed up with documentation, I am convinced that we have been misled. I learned what mitigation areas mean. I saw how it would affect our tax base, meaning much higher taxes. I learned a lot of facts and figures that we were not told about. It was a very interesting and informative meeting. I also learned that is not just a few people in the Cuthand area that it will affect, but from Texarkana to Bogata, from Naples to DeKalb, the whole Sulphur River Basin in our area. It will affect my family personally, and even if you do not own land in this area, the higher tax base will affect you. I also learned that our lack of industry is not because of

lack of water; it is because of lack of a good highway system in our areas. Our community is mostly agriculture and timber based. All these businesses, including the banking, feed, fertilizer, trucking and timber related will be greatly affected. Please take time to consider these facts. I urge the people affected directly or indirectly to go to one of these meetings and listen to the facts objectively and form your own opinions. I think if you do whether you agree or not at least you will understand a little better about what is taking place here. It changed my mind. There is still time to get this "Lake Proposition" defeated. There is a grassroots swell of people that oppose this and its numbers are growing. Thursday, June 20, 2002 Blackberry Recipes

Fresh Blackberry Cobbler
3-1/2 cups fresh blackberries
1 cup water
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons flour
2 tablespoons butter or margarine

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Pour berries into a 2-quart casserole dish and add water. Combine sugar and flour in small bowl. Stir to mix. Sprinkle over the berries. Dot with butter. Cut crust to fit top of dish or cut into strips for top. Bake for about 30 minutes and then reduce oven to 350 until crust is brown and juice begins to bubble and thicken.

Blackberry-Lemon Pie
double crust pastry
3/4 cup brown sugar
1 tablespoon lemon zest
4 cups fresh blackberries
1 cup white sugar
1/2 cup flour
1 tablespoon lemon zest
1 tablespoon butter

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Place bottom crust into pan. Crumble remaining crust into a bowl with brown sugar and 1 tablespoon lemon zest. Mix with hands until dough becomes pea-size and set aside. In large bowl, combine berries, flour, sugar and 1 tablespoon lemon zest. Fill bottom crust with berry mixture. Sprinkle crumb topping over mixture and dot with butter. Bake for 45 minutes to one hour. Let stand before serving.

Blackberry Bake
1 cup whole-wheat pastry flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1 tablespoon white sugar
1/2 cup low-fat buttermilk
2 tablespoons honey
1 tablespoon white sugar
1 tablespoon cornstarch
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 cup water
2 tablespoons lemon juice
3 cups fresh blackberries

To make biscuit topping: combine flour, baking powder, baking soda and 1 tablespoon sugar. Mix well and then stir in buttermilk just until all ingredients are moistened and dough forms a ball. Set aside. To make berry filling: in large saucepan combine honey, 1 tablespoon sugar, cornstarch, cinnamon, water and lemon juice. Mix until smooth and then add berries. Simmer over medium heat, stirring gently, until thickened. Spoon berry mixture into casserole dish and drop biscuit dough onto berry mixture by tablespoons. Bake in preheated oven at 400 degrees for about 20 minutes.

Blackberry-Oatmeal Cookie Bars
1/2 cup butter-softened
1/2 cup packed brown sugar
1 cup all-purpose flour
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/8 teaspoon salt
1-1/2 cups rolled oats
1-1/2 cup blackberry jam

Preheat oven to 350 degrees and

grease 9x13 pan. Combine butter, brown sugar, flour, baking soda, salt and oats. Press 2 cups of mixture into bottom of pan. Spread the jam over top and sprinkle remaining crumb mixture, gently pressing crumbs into jam. Bake at 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes and allow to cool before cutting.

Blackberry Jam Cake
1/4 cup butter
1 cup white sugar
2 egg yolks
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 cup buttermilk
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon unsweetened cocoa powder
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ground allspice
1 cup blackberry preserves
1 cup sifted confectioner's sugar
2 tablespoons milk
1 tablespoon butter-softened
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

Combine flour, baking soda, salt, cocoa, cinnamon and allspice. Dissolve soda in buttermilk and stir well. Cream butter or margarine and sugar, beating well. Add egg yolks, beating mixture well. Mix flour mixture into creamed mixture alternately with buttermilk mixture, beginning and ending with flour mixture. Fold in blackberry jam and pour batter into a greased and floured 10 inch bundt pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 45-50 minutes or until cake tests done. Cool in pan for 15 minutes; remove and cool completely. Combine confectioner's sugar, milk, butter and vanilla. Beat until mixture is smooth and spoon over cooled cake.

Very Berry Cheesecake
40 vanilla wafers-crushed
6 tablespoons butter-melted
2-8 ounce packages cream cheese-softened
3/4 cup white sugar
2 teaspoons vanilla extract
1 cup cottage cheese-creamed
1/4 cup cherry brandy
3 eggs
3-1/2 cups fresh blackberries
1 tablespoon cherry brandy
1 tablespoon white sugar

In medium bowl, stir together crumbs and butter. Press into bottom and 1-3/4 inch up the sides of an eight inch springform pan. Set aside. In large bowl, stir together cream cheese, 3/4 cup sugar, flour and vanilla. Beat with mixer on low speed until smooth. Set aside. Place cottage cheese in blender and blend until smooth. Stir into cream cheese mixture. Stir in 1/4 cup brandy. Beat in eggs on low speed until just combined. Preheat oven to 375 degrees and pour half of the cheese mixture into crust-lined pan. Spread 1 cup of fruit on top and top with remaining cheese mixture and 1/2 cup of fruit. Place in shallow pan in oven. Bake 40-45 minutes or until center appears set when shaken. Cool on wire rack for 15 minutes. Loosen sides and cool completely. Cover and chill for at least 4 hours or until ready to serve.

RRC Genealogical Society meets

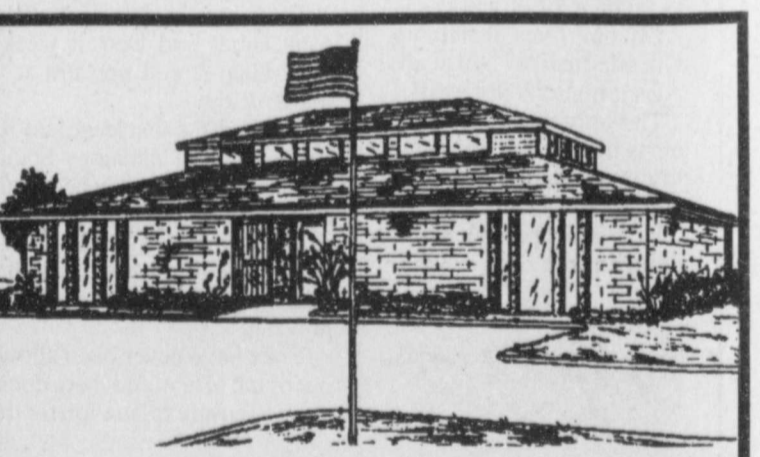

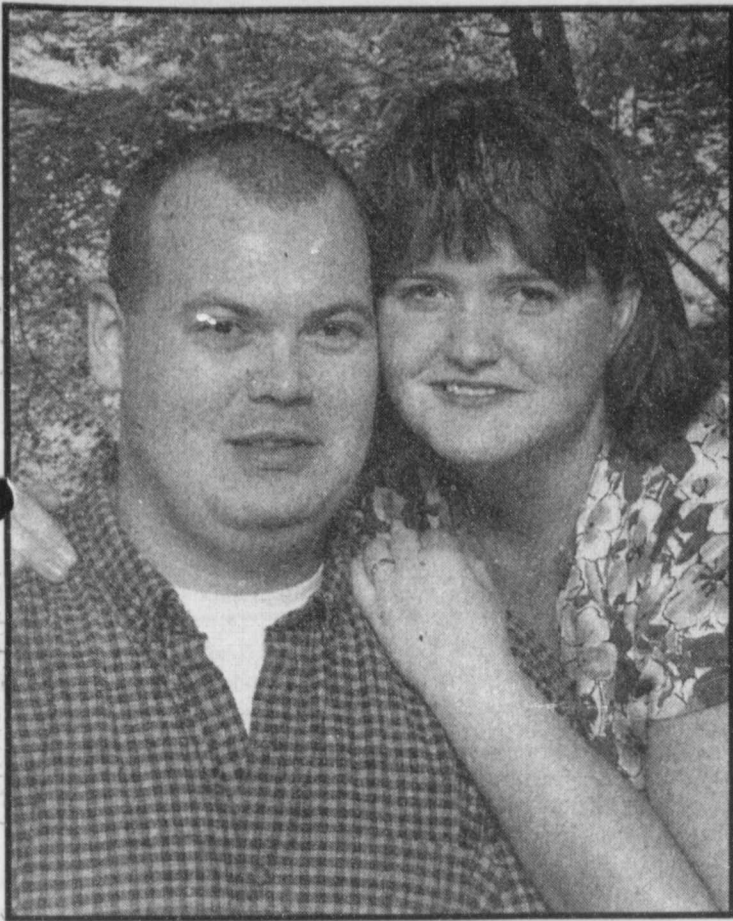

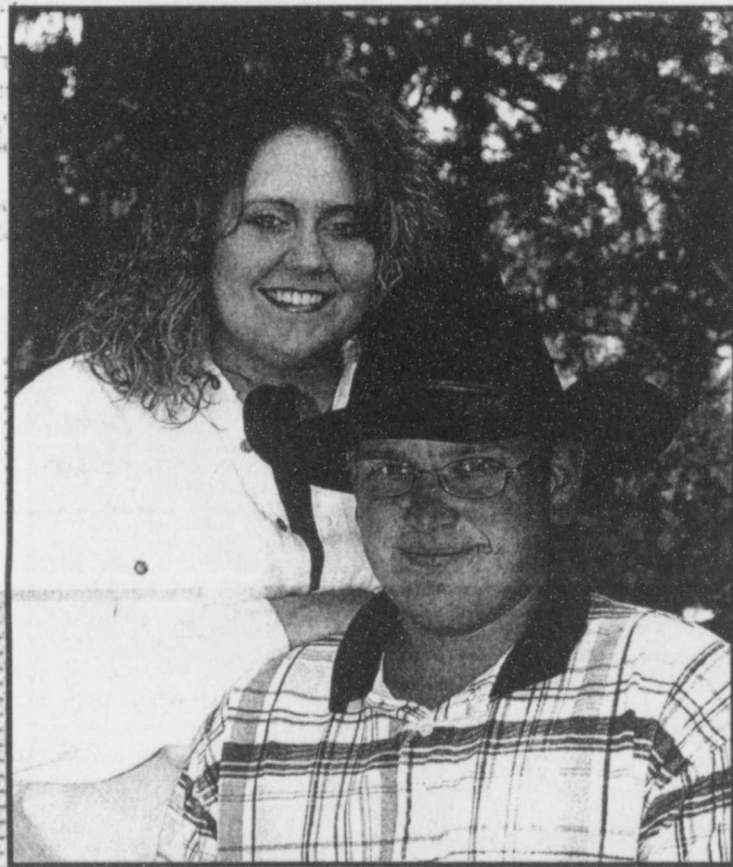

Among other changes are shorter contract lengths, 1-10 yrs., no need to bid down - applications will not receive a higher priority rating only because it would present the least cost to the program.

Common tomato problems

Tomatoes are by far the most popular home garden vegetable in Texas. I have noticed several gardens in our area where the tomatoes are reaching shoulder height and really blooming and setting fruit. Gardeners can successfully grow both spring and fall tomatoes here but there are several potential problems that can occur. A short description of the most common problems seen in tomatoes follows:

Blossom-end rot: It first appears on the bottom of the tomato as a large, dry, brown or black sunken area. It affects both green and ripening tomatoes and is primarily caused by a fluctuating moisture supply. The rot is likely to appear on the earliest tomato fruits of the season and starts when the plants are putting on quick growth and are suddenly exposed to a hot, dry spell or in some cases, excessive moisture. Maintaining uniform soil moisture and applying a mulch around the plant will help reduce blossom end rot.

Insect damage: Stink bugs, spider mites and pin worms are the most destructive insect pest of tomatoes. Control measures must begin early if these pests are to be controlled.

Fruit cracking: is often a severe problem, especially when the weather changes from hot and dry

to sporadically rainy. The best way to avoid this is to keep the moisture supply as steady as possible throughout the season. Again, mulching helps.

Catfacing is another type of tomato cracking or scarring. This is not a disease and it is caused by abnormal development of the female part of the tomato flower at bloom time. Fruit that sets when temperatures are 55F or below often exhibit catfacing.

Blossom drop plagues gardeners during both cool and hot conditions. You might consider planting a few Small Fry or Red Cherry tomatoes to insure both early and mid-season fruit set.

Sunscald occurs when green or ripening tomatoes get too much exposure to the sun. Growing tomatoes in cages is an excellent way to avoid most problems associated with sunscald.

Foliage disease control begins with variety selection. Grow only tomatoes that are listed as being VFN, which means they are resistant to verticillium wilt, fusarium wilt and nematodes. Spraying your plants with an approved fungicide, begun when your first fruit are about 50% their expected size and continued at 7-10 day intervals will provide good protection and control of early blight and most other foliage diseases.

Attention Clarksville area men: When detected early, prostate cancer is highly curable.

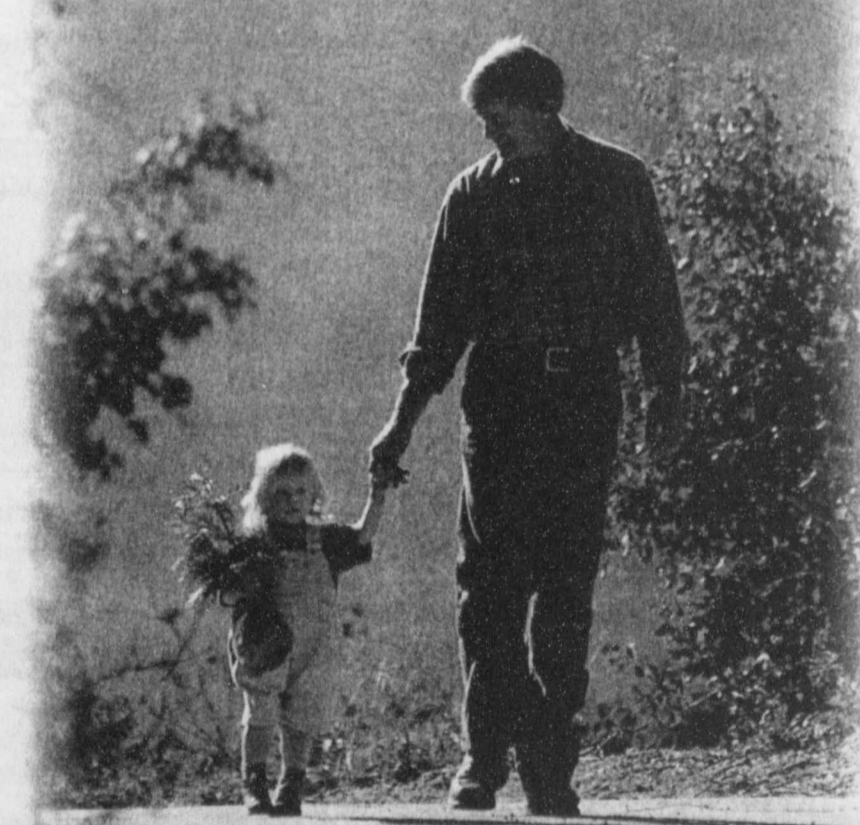

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Grasshopper outlook turned around

A dry, mild winter has encouraged a large hatch of grasshoppers in Central Texas, but recent rains should help keep the pest from becoming a severe problem for the next few weeks in East Texas.

Dr. James Robinson and other entomologists with Texas Cooperative Extension are reluctant to predict what will happen during the next few months. Much depends on summer rainfall and the availability of natural food sources for the grasshoppers.

If the rains are adequate, many of the grasshoppers will feed on weeds and other foods and they will stay away from crops. Along with adequate rain comes better forage production, allowing grazing by livestock and hay to be produced. An added benefit of adequate rain, is it will keep the hoppers in their natural habitat and away from gardens and home lawns.

Grasshoppers are not currently a problem in East Texas except for isolated areas. A couple of weeks ago, it was a different story. There were reports of Central Texas farmers finding the ground under their feet squirming with grasshopper nymphs. Reports of grasshopper infestations were also coming in from the Athens and Canton areas.

Farmers were concerned about the infestations because with soil moisture already below normal in many parts of the state, hay and forage could be at a premium during the months ahead.

Though the grasshoppers are small, many farmers elected to treat early. It was an expensive enterprise, but one which was probably wise, considering the past effects of adult grasshoppers on pastures.

At this time of year, the majority of grasshoppers are in the nymphal (young) stage. These small grasshoppers are easier to control when compared to the larger adult stage.

Grasshopper hatches are normally held in check by a fungus

which attacks their overwintering eggs in the soil. During a dry winter, the fungus does not flourish and more grasshopper eggs hatch to become nymphs.

Producers are usually advised that it becomes economical to treat when they can count 25 grasshoppers per square yard. Twenty-five grasshoppers may not sound like a big number, but over an acre, this count could equal 120,000 grasshoppers. At this concentration, the grasshoppers can eat as much forage as a mature cow.

Chemical controls for grasshoppers in improved pastures are relatively cheap when products are used at their lowest rates. Sevin XLR and Malathion 57 EC have proven effective on grasshopper nymphs in bermudagrass pastures at their lowest rates. Cost of these products will range from nearly \$5 to as much as \$7 per acre.

Which insecticide used depends upon more factors than cost, however, Malathion has no grazing or harvest restrictions. Sevin has a 14-day grazing restriction.

The highly toxic insecticide methyl parathion is also labeled for grasshopper control. Because of its toxicity level, Robinson recommended that it be applied either aerially or by a commercial applicator using an enclosed cab machine.

I do not recommend that methyl parathion be applied by farmers with an open air tractor cab and spray rig. It's just too dangerous.

Methyl parathion has a 15-day waiting period for hay harvesting and grazing.

Dimilin can be used for control of grasshopper nymphs only in rangeland and non-cropland. There will not be a special permit allowing the use of this product on pastureland.

The choice of insecticides for grasshopper nymphs in pastureland remains to be carbaryl (Sevin), malathion or methyl parathion.

Robinson emphasized that insecticide products are complicated and allowed usage will vary among formulations of the same chemical. Applicators should read the label carefully before mixing or applying. For example, producers should note that the restrictions listed above are for beef cattle only. Restrictions for use on dairy pastures vary considerably.

Sevin, a commonly used insecticide, has another restriction. It can only be used twice in a calendar year. In addition to controlling grasshoppers, it is also effective with another scourge of East Texas pastures, the fall armyworm, which has been a problem in recent years.

You might consider using one of the other products for grasshoppers now and holding Sevin in reserve in case they have a problem with armyworms this fall.

Homeowners shouldn't worry about grasshoppers damaging lawns. Vegetable gardens and ornamental landscape plants can be a target, however. For safe control in vegetable gardens, use Sevin or malathion.

For home owners, insecticides containing bifenthrin and lambda-cyhalothrin provide the fastest knockdown and longest residual control. Products containing permethrin cyfluthrin, and esfenvalerate should also provide good control. Be sure to read label instructions carefully before using a product on home vegetable gardens.

Robinson has put together a fact sheet on the various grasshopper control products and their formulations and distributed it to county agents throughout East Texas. Producers needing more specific information are advised to contact their local county Extension office.

Ryan Case returns home from sea

Upon his return to San Diego, California on May 28, 2002, MM3 Ryan H. Case could say he had traveled around the world. Ryan, son of Bruce and Tammie Case of Talco joined the Navy after his 2000 graduation from Rivercrest High School. Completing his nuclear training in Saratoga Springs, New York in December 2001 Ryan and his wife, Lisa, spent the Christmas holidays with family and friends before Ryan's reporting date in San Diego. After reporting in San Diego, Ryan was then flown to Norfolk, Virginia and then to his ship the John C. Stennis on January 21, 2001. Before September 11, 2001 the USS John C. Stennis was only preparing for their deployment set for January 2002, but, as the events unfolded that day the carrier and its battle group were deployed early for the North Arabian Sea. On December 15, the Stennis arrived where she would spend the next four months operating in support of Operation ENDURING FREEDOM and Operation ANACONDA.

The Stennis was the fifth carrier in the region but the first to launch strikes into Afghanistan. During the operations the crew had a constant reminder of the Twin Tower attacks as it flew an American flag found in the rubble of "Ground Zero". The ship conducted flight operations for 111 days, flying 10,600 sorties and dropped 275,000 pounds of ordnance. The ship conducted 30 underway replenishments, which was twice as many as the previous two years combined.

The ship and its crew sustained 100 days of continuous operations with only 4 days liberty in Bahrain, allowing the ship to anchor only once. While in Bahrain, Ryan and the other sailors enjoyed being on solid ground and found their way to a Hard Rock Cafe for "real" food. They were also exposed to a different kind of culture and landscape.

Back at sea, the Stennis had 33 distinguished visitors, which included Vice President Dick Cheney and the Chief Of Naval Operations. NBC news anchor Tom Brokaw also reported from the ship about the duties and op-

erations of the Stennis and what it was like to be a ship at war.

On their way back to the United States, the Stennis visited Perth, Australia and Hobart Tasmania. Ryan reported that both places were beautiful, with very friendly people. The sailors enjoyed playing golf, shopping, eating at restaurants and sleeping in full sized beds and taking a long soaking bath before returning to the ship. Their last stop before returning to the mainland was Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. The ship moored across from the USS Arizona Memorial. Ryan was able to tour the memorial, which gave him a deeper appreciation of the sacrifices made by the sailors of WWII.

The ship was met by thousands of family members, friends and well-wishers as it returned to homeport in San Diego. Among those waiting for Ryan were his wife, the former Lisa Shirley, his parents, sister Rachel and grandparents Buster and Sis Case. Ryan is also the grandson of Durwood and Shirley Hare of Sulphur Bluff and great grandson of Jesse and Dorothy Haley of Mt. Vernon.

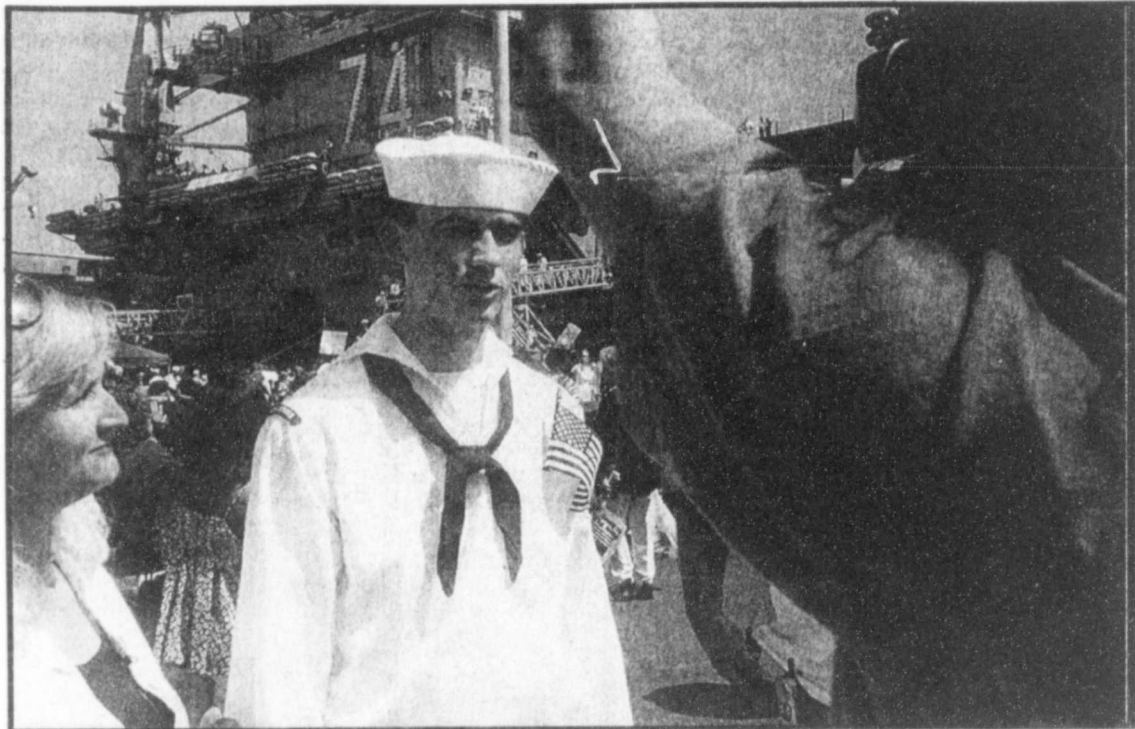

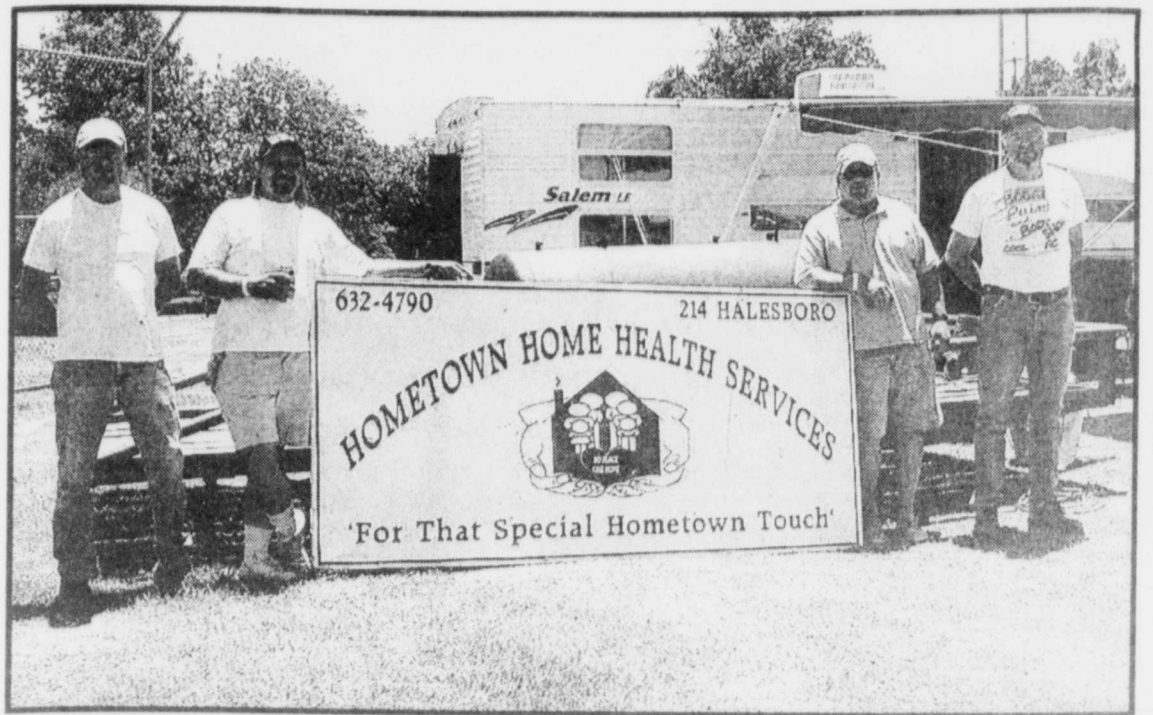

Neighbors..... Velma Westbrook

Velma Mae Westbrook was born seventy-four years ago in Cuthand, Texas. She was one of eleven brothers and sisters, including her identical twin sister, Thelma. Her family also includes her son, David Brooks, and his wife Nicki and their daughter Brandi, all of Paris.

Velma's early years growing up in a large family in the Fulbright area saw her spend a lot of time in supporting the family in cotton farming. She remembers that her family moved to Deport many years ago when they located to the Charlie Barnard place to farm.

Velma smiles when remembering her days in Fulbright. One of her favorite things to do was to go to the traveling picture show. In the mid 1950s once a week a "theater" would be set up in one of the old Fulbright downtown buildings for the showing of a motion picture. She recalls paying about ten cents admission. Her favorites were the westerns starring heroes Gene Autry, Tex Ritter and Roy Rogers.

Velma married the late Bill Brooks in 1951. Bill was a mechanic from Mt. Vernon. They moved to Deport in 1956 after having lived for a while in Milton. Bill worked in Deport and Paris as a mechanic for Ford and Chevrolet dealers. For a number of years he and Velma had their own auto repair shop on Main Street in Deport.

Those were good years. Velma has lived in her current home since 1961. She reminisces that most afternoons at that home young son David would eagerly hop off the school bus, throw down his school satchel in the ditch, and immediately start flipping and turning summersaults in the yard. She smiles at the memory and says he usually was having so much fun she would have to fix him sugar cookies to entice him to come in the house.

Bill passed away in 1974 and Velma had never really worked outside the home. But since February 1975 Velma has worked at the Deport Nursing Home. She says, "One of the best things to ever happen in Deport was the nursing home. It put a lot of people to work."

In 1977, local farmer and carpenter Octavus "Tater" Westbrook

and Velma were married. Tater passed away in 1991, but Velma fondly thinks about how he was handy with his hands. She tells how he liked to build stuff, that he was always working on cabinets and shelves and that he would do a good job with anything he tried.

Velma's family always enjoys getting together at Christmas and, since about 1975, probably the most exciting time of the year for Velma has been the Varner Family Reunion. Usually there are between fifty and one hundred family members getting together for good times.

One Christmas, her twin sister Thelma's son, Ray expressed the real meaning of family and caring. His Grandma Varner shared her special gift for Ray and the other grandchildren as she presented holiday wrapped buttered cornbread. As he left for home thinking about all the things he had in the world while appreciating the cornbread, Ray said, "I am so thankful for all my blessings."

When asked what she would like her grandchildren to remember about her, she has quite a story to tell. Her young granddaughter Brandi used to love to look into the refrigerator. So, when Brandi was small Velma would get a bar of chocolate candy and wrap a quarter around it and place it in the refrigerator for Brandi to find. This little "hide and seek" activity has been a joy to Grandmother and Brandi over the years. Brandi has recently graduated from Paris Junior College and Grandmother Velma now laughs that Brandi coyly requests a dollar to be wrapped around the refrigerator candy bar.

One of the most disappointing times in the past for Velma was when the Deport First Methodist Church burned. She recalls, "It had the most beautiful stained glass windows. Pastor Hensley was there for a while and we enjoyed Mr. John Crabb, the former variety store owner, who played the violin." Velma's favorite hymn is "What a Friend We Have in Jesus."

The farthest Velma has ever been from Deport is Ulysses, Kansas. She went there to visit one of her brothers. Her dream vacation

would be to go to Hawaii. She has seen the beautiful pictures, but she says with a wink of the eye, "I won't get there. At my age, it is too far away from my doctor. I would have to walk to Hawaii too. I have never flown and I am afraid of planes and trains now."

Yet, Velma has gotten around somehow. She is somewhat of a collector. She has dozens of dolls, ceramic bells and hundreds of ceramic salt and pepper shaker sets. In fact, she displays a variety of over three hundred fifty sets of salt and pepper shakers she has collected since about 1965. She is proudest of the Elvis shaker set. While she never met Elvis, she surely enjoys his sacred music recordings.

Anybody who knows Velma can tell you that she lives that every single day.

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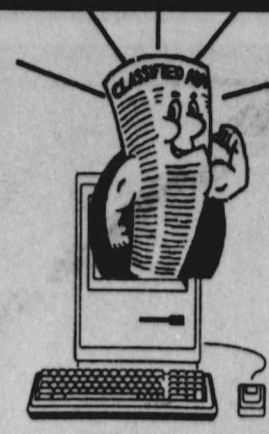

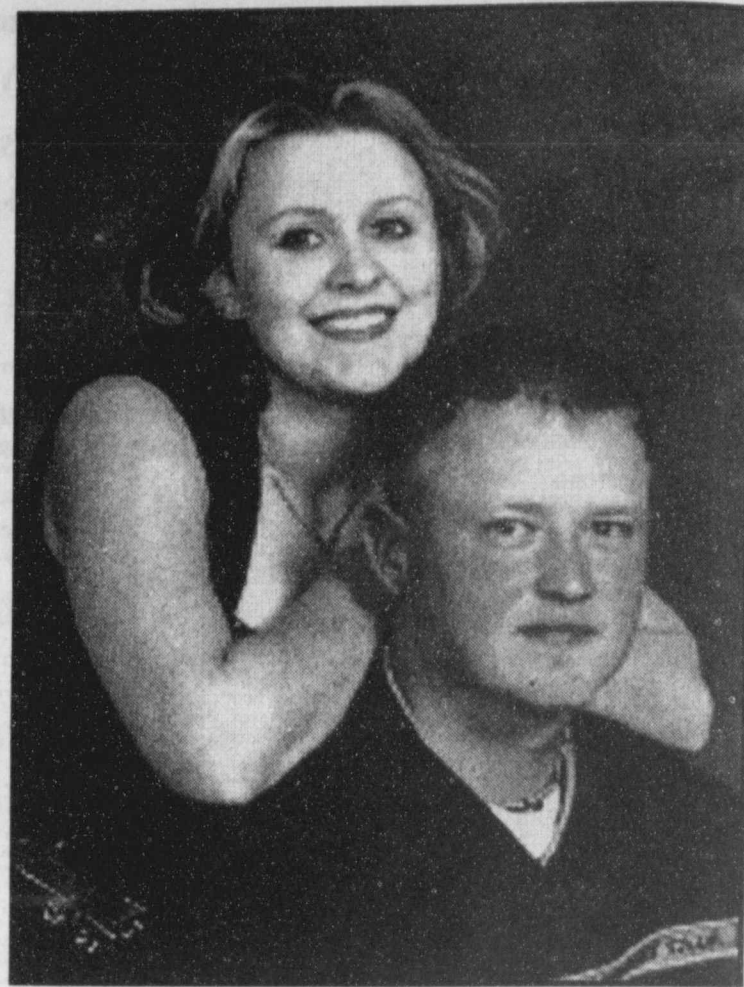
