Fire ants won't even do me the favor of living in the one place I want them toy. Just how perverse is that?



James Arthur Minshew dies June 20


James Arthur Minshew, age 72 of Bogata died Thursday, June 20, 2002 in Christus St. Joseph Hospital South.

Total coliform bacteria are used as indicators of microbial contamination of drinking water because testing for them is easy. While not disease causing organisms themselves, they are often found in association with other microbes that are capable of causing disease. Coliform bacteria are more hardy than many disease causing organisms, therefore, their absence from water is a good indication that the water is microbiologically safe for human consumption.

Fecal coliform bacteria and, in particular, E coli, are members of the coliform bacteria group originating in the intestinal tract of warm blooded animals and are passed into the environment through feces. The presence of fecal coliform bacteria (E coli) in drinking water may indicate recent contamination of the drinking water with fecal material. West Nile virus confirmed in Texas

blue jays found in northwest Houston. Veterinarians at the (TAHC), the state's livestock health regulatory agency, are urging owners of horses, mules, donkeys and other

have been vaccinated against not only West Nile Virus (WNV), but also against Eastern and Western Equine Encephalitis (EEE) and (WEE), two common forms of 'sleeping sickness.'

The introduction of West Nile Virus into Texas isn't surprising, as we have monitored the south and eastward migration of the disease since it was first detected in North America in New York in 1999. Last year, WNV was reported in 738 equids in 20 states," commented Dr. Terry Conger, TAHC's state veterinary epidemi-ologist. He explained that staff members from the TAHC and the (TDH), which focuses on human health issues, have worked jointly to share laboratory and surveillance information and educational materials about this disease which can be transmitted from infected mosquitoes to humans and equids, causing brain swelling and severe illness. Until 1999, WNV was confined to Africa, Europe, Asia, and the Middle East.

Dr. Conger said that the cycle of disease for WNV requires two key players: birds, such as crows, blue jays or hawks, that act as a reservoir for the virus, and mosquitoes that become capable of transmitting disease after they take a blood meal from an infected bird. According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) in Atlanta, Georgia, there have been no documented cases of person-to-person, animal-to-person or animal-toanimal transmission of WNV. We consider humans and equids to be 'dead-end' hosts, because they can become ill but haven't been shown to spread infection.

Late last summer, infected birds were detected in Louisiana and Arkansas," said Dr. Conger. Now with the confirmation of infected birds in our state, the Texas Department of Health will probably find infected mosquitoes through their surveillance activi-

Vaccines are available to protect horses, mules and donkeys against WNV and other 'sleeping value if they aren't given prior to disease exposure," said Dr. Conger. "We are running out of time before we may see disease transmission, so get your equids vaccinated now. The vaccines require

Dr Conger reminded equid ownequids to ensure that their animals ers that an annual booster is required for continued protection of the animals.

"If your horse or other equid has signs of illness, such as staggering or an inability to rise, call your veterinarian immediately. It also is extremely important to rule out other causes of sickness with similar signs, such as rabies," asserted Dr. Conger. "If it is WNV, appropriate care must be provided quickly. Historically, about 20 percent of infected equids either died or had to be euthanized due

to their illness. To help reduce the possibility of WNV transmission, don't give mosquitoes a place to breed," said Texas Department of Health Dr. Conger. "Keep only fresh water in birdbaths and troughs and maintain optimal chlorination in swimming pools. Drain any flowerpots or other containers that hold stagnant water and keep roof gutters clean. Control puddles that collect around stables.

Dr. Conger commended the TDH on its WNV disease surveillance, which includes testing mosquitoes, dead crows, blue jays, hawks and sampling zoo birds. He said "freshly" dead crows, blue jays or hawks can be submitted for laboratory examination, by calling the nearest regional Texas

Department of Health office or the Texas Department of Health in Austin at 1-512-458-7255.

'Always wear gloves when handling a dead bird, and wash your hands thoroughly afterward," warned Dr. Conger. "The bird could have had parasites or other illnesses, and precautions are always advisable when handling animals that have died of unknown causes."


Dr. Conger reminded livestock owners that, as always, the TAHC operates a 24-hour hotline for taking reports of unusual signs in livestock, including:

1. staggering, falling, or inability to rise 2. illness affecting a large per-

centage of animals 3. sudden death loss 4. blistering around an animal's

lips, teats or hooves

5. unusual ticks or maggots we are always on guard, watching for a potential foreign animal disease, so we ask producers and veterinarians to watch for these signs and report them immediately to us at 1-800-550-8242," said Dr. Conger. "Immediate response is our best defense in the case of any dangerous dis-







Summertime brings barbecues and ball games, but this time of year can be no picnic for horses: Summer may also mean an increased risk for contracting equine encephalitis, an illness transmitted by mosquitoes.

"There are several types of mosquito-borne, equine encephalitis to which horses are susceptible," said Dr. Bruce Lawhorn, professor in the College of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A&M University and Extension Veterinarian for the Texas Cooperative Extension.

"These are Western equine encephalitis (WEE), Eastern equine encephalitis (EEE), Venezuelan equine encephalitis (VEE) and West Nile encephalitis (WNE). All can be prevented with vacci-

Lawhorn says symptoms of equine encephalitis may include loss of appetite, depression, fever, weakness of hind limbs, staggering, convulsions, inability to swallow, circling, extreme excitability or coma. An unvaccinated horse that contracts the illness typically takes five days to show any clinical signs, he adds.

This also is true of WNE, a relatively new disease to the United States. WNE has shown no predilection toward horses of any particular age, type or body size. regions where mosquitoes are more likely to proliferate," said


Lawhorn. The good news is that, in Texas, the illness is more restricted to East Texas counties and is not widespread throughout the state. In high disease years, there are, typically fewer than 20 cases of Eastern equine encephalitis, (Texas' most common) in Texas. In low disease years, there are very few cases. The bad news is that the first cases of WNE are anticipated to occur in Texas horses this summer and fall."


Given the nature of equine encephalitis, it is best to make use of preventive measures.


In addition to having your horse vaccinated every year prior to mosquito season, Lawhorn suggests creating an environment that limits the mosquito population density around your horses. If possible, avoid turning on lights in stable areas at night, house horses in screened stables during peak periods of mosquito activity (dusk through dawn), eliminate areas where mosquitoes breed (shallow, standing water) and use foggers or other mosquito repellents according to the instructions.

West Nile encephalitis kills some types of birds, so if you notice an unusual numbers of dead crows or blue jays, report it to your local or state health officials or the Texas Department of Health at (512) 458-7255.

Horse riding Disqualifications

An automatic disqualification in the bareback or saddle bronc riding occurs when the rider does not have his spurs over the horse's shoulder the first jump out of the chute in competition. Another disqualification occurs when the cowboy touches himself or the animal with his free hand during the ride.

Bull Riding Disqualification

Rules in the bull riding event are relatively simple, all you have to do is stay on until the eight second whistle sounds. The only way a cowboy can be disqualified is if he touches himself or the animal with his free hand during the ride, or is thrown off before the whistle







The team roping header must ride rom behind a barrier to give the steer head start. If the header breaks the barrier, a 10 second penalty is added to the team's total time. In average ropings, the teams are usually allowed three loops, meaning that the header can miss with his first loop and rebuild, or the heeler can rope the head and let the header rope the heels. Usually at one-headers, two loops are allowed, should either team partner miss, the team will receive a no time. If the heeler catches only one heel, a five secend penalty is added to the team's time. A total of 15 seconds in penalties can be added to the team's time, the highest penalty allowed for a broken barrier and picking up only one heel. A disqualification can also occur if the team doesn't "face" the steer to the judge's satisfaction; if the team andallies and rides up on the steer before the judge is allowed to make a decision; or if the head loop is in a figure-8 around the steer's head or horns. When you hear the announcer say "hold your dallies", this point of order is what they are referring to.
