This reader, who shall, at here request, remain nameless, is working on a garden of "common" and unappreciated plants.

"Buttercups" (primrose) were for sale at a local nursery where she lives, as is wisteria at quite a price.

She began to ponder that it seems that the only "value" a plant has is it's rarity.

Where buttercups and wisteria line the roadsides they are largely ignored, but where they have to be babied and guarded from the e cold they are valued highly!

Our reader is planted honeysuckle, mimosa, pokesalet (poke weed), trumpet vine and more. All of them are considered nuisances, but all have beautiful scents, berries, blooms and benefits.

We both consider just how many plants, trees, shrubs, grasses and wildflowers we take for granted.

Our world is filled with things such as "pepper" trees, which have knobby bark and a spicy tang, bois'd'arc trees, which are thorny but feed multitudes of wild creatures such as squirrels and live where only the hardiest of trees would dare to drop a root.

There are wildflowers so tiny they almost go unnoticed, and bushes they provide nesting spots for hosts of wild birds, food for the birds and other

creatures such as raccoons. Grasses feed deer and grow in soils and moisture levels ranging from super dry to su-

per moist. We pay them little attention, and seldom know their

If these items were potted in little plastic containers, and held high price tags, we'd appreciate them, study their needs and habits, and culti-

vate them carefully And, this brings me to another thing. If we don't appreciate plants because they are "common" do we to other

things the same way? Do we fail to appreciate those people around us who do nothing spectacular, but are always there doing little things to bring kindness, peace and joy to the world we live in?

Do we only pay attention to those who demand it, or claim it due to their spectacular beauty?

I hope not. I know that I'm going to try and look at people as well as plants in a little different light, trying to appreciate them more. Give it a try, it never hurts to look a little closer at the world around us



Wrapped Chicken teaspoon hoisin sauce green onion-chopped l teaspoon parsley 2 tablespoons soy sauce teaspoon vegetable or peanut

skinless, boneless breast of chicken

Combine all ingredients except chicken. Cut chicken into bite-size pieces and place in marinade for one hour. Cut eight 4"x4" squares of aluminum foil and wrap marinated chicken, careful to seal edges. Have ready a wok or iron skillet with enough hot oil to immerse packets of wrapped chicken, turning once if packet is not covered. Cook 2-3 minutes and thenremove to paper towel. Serve on warm bowl; do not unwrap.

Fried Rice vegetable oil or peanut oil cooked meat-either ham, bacon, chicken, pork or shrimp 2-3 green onions-chopped prepared snow peas-optional 2 cups cooked rice soy sauce

Heat in wok or skillet 2 tablespoons oil and add peas. Stir in meat and add rice and stir until heated through. Add and stir in green onion and then add soy sauce to taste. Turn into heated bowl and top with egg sheet prepared thusly: Heat a small skillet with enough oil to loosen egg sheet. Beat egg with fork and pour thin layers into skillet. Cook just long enough to "dry" egg. Remove from skillet and roll up into small rolls. Slice narrow strips and lay over rice and serve hot.

Stir Fried Snow Peas 3/4-1 cup prepared snow peas 1-2 green onions-chopped 1-2 tablespoons peanut or vegetable oil

I clove garlic-sliced 1-2 tablespoons soy sauce

Into wok or skillet add oil and saute garlic to lightly brown; remove from oil. Add snow peas, onion and fry about 5-6 minutes stirring often to prevent browning. Take out onto paper towels and turn into hot bowl and drizzle with soy sauce to taste. Serve hot.

Gingered Carrots

3-4 carrots I tablespoon butter 1 tablespoon brown sugar 1/4 teaspoon ginger

Wash and scrape carrots and slice into thin strips or discs. In small stew pot bring I inch of water to boil. Add carrots and cook until barely tender and drain. In same pot, melt butter and add brown sugar and ginger; stir constantly until bubbly. Return carrots to pan and stir to coat and cook 1-2 minutes more. Turn into hot bowl and serve.

Jello Dessert I box strawberry jello I box orange jello small can crushed pineapple 1-1/2 cup frozen or fresh strawber-

2 medium bananas small can mandarin oranges

Cool Whip
Mix orange jello according to package using the quick-set method with ice cubes. Into bowl with orange jello add oranges, drained and sliced bananas. This will be the bottom layer of dessert, using individual compotes or bowl. Set until congealed. When set, cover with layer of Cool Whip. Top with be strawberry jello to which has been added strawberries and drained pienapple. Pour this over orange jello mixture and return to refrigerator to congeal until firm. May be topped with Cool Whip. Cover with plastic wrap if kept for next

Vinegaroni pie crust-unkabed margarine granulated sugar cinnamon-optional 1 cup water 1/3 cup vinegar 1/2 cup sugar

Roll crust to thin layer and cover with thin layer of margarine and sprinkle with sugar. Cinnamon may be sprinkled on top of this. Rollus as a jelly roll and slice half through to serving size and place in lightly greased baking pan; set aside. Boil water, vinegar and sugar and pour over top of rolled pie crust. Sprinkle lightly with sugar over top. Bake at 400 degrees for 30-40 minutes until golden brown and bubbly.

West Nile Virus detected in Harris County

that was euthanized Saturday, their illness. June 29, near Katy in far west Harris County, indicate that the animal was infected with West Nile Virus (WNV), a form of "sleepton. According to the Texas Department of Health (TDH), another 29 infected birds have since been found.

"We were notified today (July 3) that tests run on samples of the horses's blood and spinal fluid were positive for WNV. The tests were run both at the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory (TVMDL) in College Station, and at the National Veterinary Services Laboratory (NVSL) in Ames, Iowa," said Dr. Linda Logan, Texas' state veterinarian and executive director for the Texas (TAHC), the state's livestock health regulatory agency.

"The NVSL is running additional confirmation tests on the blood samples, but more than likely, we are seeing Texas' first case of West Nile Virus in a horse. Diagnosing WNV must be based on laboratory confirmation, as the signs of the disease, including staggering or the inability to rise, can mimic other diseases, including rabies, or other encepalitic diseases, such as Western Equine Encephalitis (WEE) and Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE)."

WNV was unheard of in North America until 1999, when it was detected in birds in New York. The virus, which can cause brain swelling and severe illness in horses, previously had been confined to Africa, Europe, Asia, and spread to 20 US states, following the migratory flight patterns of birds along the Eastern Seaboard and west as far as Texas. In 2001, members of the equine family

There have been no documented cases of animals or humans spreading the disease. Dogs and cats appear to be resis-

tant to the disease.

'Home and stable owners the state. should take precautions to prevent mosquito bites," said Dr. Joe Garrett, a veterinarian with the TDH's Zoonosis Control Division. "Get rid of stagnant water, drain flowerpots, keep bird baths clean and cut weeds down to discour-Animal Health Commission age mosquito breeding grounds. screens to protect your home or stable from being 'invaded' by mosquitoes. There is no vaccine for people, but fortunately, human cases of WNV are extremely rare. However, see your physician immediately if you develop signs of the disease, which include fever, headache, body aches and swollen lymph glands. More severe infection may be marked by headache, high fever, neck stiffness."

"We continue to work with other agencies to urge horse owners to have their animals vaccinated against WNV, and with the diagnosis of this disease in the Houston area, all possible preventive efforts are import to stop the spread of this disease," said Dr. Richard Ferris, area-veterinarianin-charge for the U.S. Department the Middle East. "If your horse becomes ill and goes off feed, sways, develops 18 on the northwest side of Hous-quitoes ingest the virus, and about head tremors, muscle twitches or cannot rise, contact your veterinarian, so he or she can collect and send in samples to us for diagnostic testing," said Dr. Lelve Gayle, executive director of the TVMDL. Laboratory confirmation of cases is particularly important for tracking the movement of WNV within

Dr. Garrett said the TDH is continuing its WNV disease surveillance statewide, which includes testing mosquitoes, dead crows, blue jays, hawks and sampling zoo birds. Dead crows, blue jays or hawks can be submitted for laboratory examination, by calling the Apply insect repellents, and put up nearest regional Texas Department of Health office or the Texas Department of Health in Austin at 1-512-458-7255.

"If you are picking up a dead bird, wear gloves and wash your hands afterward," explained Dr. Garrett. "The bird could have had parasites of other illnesses, and it's always advisable to keep a barrier---like gloves--between you and the dead bird."

Dr. Logan reminded livestock owners that, as always, the TAHC operates a 24-hour hotline at 1-800-550-8242 for taking reports of unusual signs in livestock, in-

did some shopping. They drove through the scenic Austrian countryside on the way back to Schwabish Hall.



Dress Code set for Rivercrest

Each student at Rivercrest High School must comply with the following dress code for the 2002/ 2003 school year:

1. Clothing that is extreme (revealing, tight, baggy, excessively long pants, etc.) will not be permitted. This includes failure to wear an article of apparel, as well as inappropriate article or both.

2. No type hat, sunshades or cap will be worn in the building or classrooms during regular school

3. All articles of apparel and exposed tattoos must be free of disruptive, suggestive. obscene or objectionable words, phrases, advertisements or pictures.

4. Open-mesh or fishnet blouses or shirts are not permitred.

 5. shirts and blouses must be buttoned within one button of the throat. All shirts, which are designed to be worn inside, should be tucked inside.

6. Students dressed for athletoics (cheerleading, physical education etc.) must remain in their designated areas.

7. See-though, bare midriff, halter, tank top or sun blouses are not permitted. Shirts, blouses and t-shirts must have sleeves.

8. Shorts will be allowed provided they are knee length, walking style shorts. Athletic shorts,

bicycle shorts, cutoffs and etc. shall not be permitted. Shorts must be hemmed, must be loose fitting, not tight or revealing.

9. Girls dresses and skirts must

be knee length. 10. Hair must be maintained in

a neat and clean fashion and should not obstruct the student's

11. Beards and mustaches must be neatly trimmed.

12. Any clothing, jewelry or other ornaments that depict, advertise or glorify Satan or satanic rites or that indicate a prepccupation with death, sadism or evil is prohibited.

13. Body piercing jewelry is alloweed in ears only.

14. Shoes must be worn. 15. Shoes with cleats or metal taps are prohibited.

16. Baggy clothing in prohib-



The following ordinance is hereby published in part as public notice. The entire ordinance may be reviewed or copies re-ceived at the Blossom City Hall, 1240 W. Front Street, Blossom, Texas ORDINANCE NO. 02-006

(Supersedes Ordinance 6-1-93) An ordinance of the governing body of the City of Blossom, Texas, regulating recreational vehicles, mobile homes and manufactured housing as a permanent or temporary residential dwelling; providing for repeal of all existing ordinances, or amendments thereto, in conflict with the terms and conditions of this ordinance; providing for an application procedure, establishment of certain fees and standards for issuance of permits; providing for enforcement of the ordinance to include punitive sanctions for violations of the ordinance; providing for a severability clause; providing for this ordinance to take effect immediately upon its passage, the public welfare requiring such.

WHEREAS, Texas Manufactured Housing Standards Act authorizes municipalities to regulate by ordinance the installation of mobile homes and manufactured housing as permanent residential struc-

SECTION II. Adoption of Texas Manufactured Housing Standards Act-The City of Blossom, Lamar County, Texas, hereby adopts the Texas Manufactured Housing Standards Act as an integral section of this ordinance as though fully copied herein. SECTION V. Application for Permit-Aplication for the City to consider approval for placement or replacement of any mobile structure to be utilized as a temporary or permanent residential structure shall be presented to the City as follows:

A. Application must be presented to the City on a form provided for such purpose and shall be signed by the property owner and/or the owners of structure proposed to be moved onto such property. but could warrant some modifications in B. Application must be fully completed,

detailing the following information: 1. Name, address and telephone number of the property owner, and name, addresses and telephone number of the owner of the manufactured home proposed for consideration for installation

2. Location of property proposed for installation of manufactured home and size

and dimensions of the property. 3. Specifications of proposed manufactured home and size and dimensions of the same; including make, model and year of

manufacture.
4. Name, address and license number of the proposed licensed installer.

C. Application must be completed and presented to the Blossom City Hall a minimum of ten (10) working days prior to the next regular meeting of the City Council. D. Incomplete applications, or applications for mobile structures obviously in non-compliance with regulations established within this ordinance, shall be rejected at the administrative level. Appeals to such rejection may be considered by the City Council, when such appeal is filed with the City.
SECTION VI. Application/Installation/

Inspection Fees A. Non-refundable application fee for completed and acceptable applications shall be \$20.00, and shall be paid with the completed application prior to consideration of the same by the City Council.

B. A plumbing inspection fee, as required by existing City ordinance, in the amount of \$40.00 shall be paid subsequent to approval by the City Council, but prior to installation of the structure. All plumbing connections to City service must be in compliance with existing City ordinances and TNRCC regulations

SECTION VII. Installation

A. Any HUD code manufactured home permitted by regulations established within this ordinance must be installed in compliance with this ordinance, permanently installed by a licensed manufactured home dealer or installer, skirted to specifications established by the manufacturer of the structure and installed to specifications and standards established by the Texas Manufactured Housing Standards Act. B. Failure to comply with installation requirements established herein shall cause any such prior permit by the City to be null and void, and the City may file appropriate removal orders for mobile structures not

properly installed. C. The City shall not provide new or continuing water and other utility service to structures not installed in compliance with

SECTION VIII. Mobile Structures Prohibited-Subsequent to the passage of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful to install, move in, or utilize any mobile structure, listed within this section, as a permanent residence within the City of Blossom, or onto any property, regardless of location, served by the City Water Supply System:

A. Except as permitted by the City Council as a temporary dwelling, as defined by SECTION XI below, any type or size of recreational vehicle isprohibited.

B. Any mobile home, as defined in Section IV, paragraph B is prohibited. Any recreational vehicle, mobile home or HUD-code manufactured home, to be utilized a sa permanent second residence

on any lot or property, less than one acre in

size, is prohibited. D. Installation of any mobile structure either as a temporary or permanent residence, in Flood Zone A, as defined b FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Map,

SECTION IX. Replacement of Existing Mobile Home with HUD-Code Manus factured Home-After proper application process, a HUD code manufactured home to be utilized as a replacement for mobile home previously legally permi ted and used or occupied as a residen dwelling shall be permitted by the Ci contingent upon the following cond

A. Application must be completed and presented in compliance with SECTION and VI of this ordinance.

B. The City must be provided certification that proposed mobile structure was manufactured after June 15, 19767 and was manufactured to HUD-code stan-

C. Proposed mobile structure must be sound, in good condition and must meet all existing health, safety and fire stan-

D. Such HUD-code structure must be established within this ordinance.

installed in compliance with regulations E. Such installations must meet setback requirements established by City ordi-

nance or, at least, setbacks shall not exceed setbacks of existing structure. F. Water and sewer installations mu meet established requirements of all existing City ordinances or State regula

G. Relating to properties on which mobile homes were previously installed, if previous structure has been moved for more than 90 days, or structures that have not been occupied for more than 90 days such properties do not automatically qualify for approval under this section. SECTION X. Specific use Permit for Placement of HUD-Code Manufactured Home-The City Council of Blossom Texas may consider the application for a specific use permit for placement of a HUD-Code manufactured home, not otherwise authorized in SECTION IX above, based upon the following conditions and standards established herein: A. Application must be completed and presented in compliance with SECTION and VI of this ordinance.

B. HUD-code manufactured home proposed to be utilized as a permanent rest dence, acceptable for consideration for a specific use permit, must have been manufactured subsequent to November 3, 1998 and must incorporate a minimum of 864. square feet of heated living space. C. The City must be provided certifica-tion that proposed mobile structure was

manufactured after November 3, 1998; and was manufactured to HUD-code star D. The City shall properly post and hold a public hearing by the City Council to

consider such approval. All property owners or residents, who are known to the City and whose properties are adja cent to the property or whose properties are within 400 feet of the property pro posed for placement of manufactured housing, must be notified. E. Applicant must circulate a petition to

property owners, detailed in paragraph D above, and provide the response to such petition to the City Council at the public hearing held to consider approval for specific use permit to install a manufac tured home.

F. Subsequent to the required public hearing, the City Council, meeting in legally posted public session, must approve or disapprove the application for specific use permit based on the addiional following conditions and standards

1. Property or lot size must meet or exceed 80 feet by 100 feet or the reasonable equivalent thereof, 2. Compliance with all City ordinances,

to include, but not limited to those pertaining to plumbing inspection and water and sewer taps,

3. The percentage of property owners, defined in paragraph D above, who are in agreement with application for spe-4. The application for a specific use

permit shall not be approved unless twothirds of the elected alderman (4 mem bers of the City Council) vote e in favor of a motion to approve the application based upon a roll call vote. SECTION XII. New or Continuous City

Water and Utility Services to Recreational Vehicles, Mobile Homes or Manufactured Housing

A. The City shall not provide new or continuing water or other utility service to any structure not in compliance with this ordinance or to any recreational ve hicle, mobile home or HUD-code manu factured home not permitted or installed n compliance with regulations established herein. The City shall, after 10 days notice, curtail water and sewer service to any mobile structure or residence not in compliance with this ordinance. B. No property owner or resident may furnish water or sewer service to any mobile structure not permitted or installed in compliance with regulations estab lished herein. The City shall, after 10 days notice, curtail water and sewer service to any property, resident, or owner who furnished such water or sewer service or violates any of the regulations established within this ordinance. SECTION XX. Penalty and Enforce-

A. Failure to properly apply for approval of the City Council for permit for installation or placement or any mobile struc ture, as defined within this ordinance, as a temporary or permanent residence or dwelling, or any other violation of any section of this ordinance, shall be subject to a fine of up to five hundred dollar (\$500.00). Each day of any violation shall constitute a separate offense.

B. The City is entitled to injunctive relief and recovery of damages and any other enforcement procedures in order to bring about compliance with any section of requirement of this ordinance SECTION XXI. Ordinance in Immedi-

ate Effect/Emergency Clause-In order to protect the public safety, health and gen eral welfare of its citizens, the governing body of the City of Blossom, Texas hereby declares that this ordinance shall take effect immediately, and shall be in force from and after its passage

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
