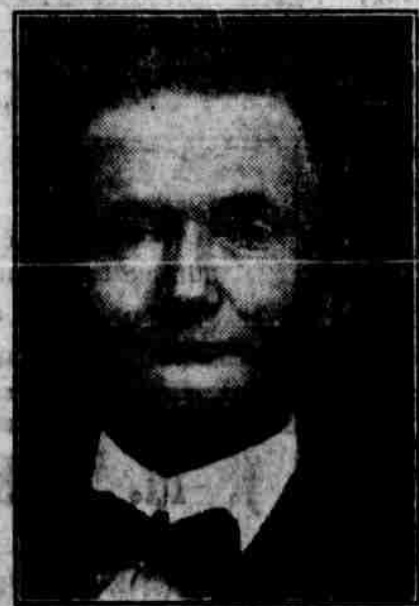



The American Germans, headed by their congressman from St. Louis, have begun organizing the Germans into what they call the German League, for the purpose of controlling American politics. All of the leading papers are criticizing the Germans for doing this. So far as we are concerned, we do not think America would lose anything even if the Germans succeeded in Germanizing this country. They have proven more honest

than Americans when they have held office, are individually more provident, and they have more patriotism. While we do not sympathize with them for wanting to defeat Wilson if he should run for the presidency in 1916, yet if the American people split up, and it is possible for the Germans to win, they deserve to do so. We will wager ever get control of this government, the Asiatics and immigrants from Southern Europe will quit coming to this country. We have had Germans in the Legislature, and they were patriotic and honest. No man has ever made a better public servant than Judge Weinert. And it was a German, Boelmer that passed the bill to prevent Mexicans from being used by unscrupulous politicians for debauching the government along the Rio Grande, and it was Colquitt who vetoed the bill. The German may not be willing to give up his beer and vote for prohibition, but he is honest, progressive and patriotic, and this is more than can be said of several large classes of natives. It was Jake Wolters a German, who was big enough to balk the unscrupulous American politicians, who wanted to fight Sheppard, after he had won in the primaries. When we consider the record of the Germans, there is a reasonable hope that if they assert themselves in American politics, it will clean us up some.

Haskell made a great mistake when it scattered the public school buildings. These buildings should have been placed in a central place. We believe it will pay to begin to work to correct the mistake.

Haskell county has been visited by a good shower that is making the farming prospects look bright.

The deceased was born on April 19th, 1829 and would have been 86 years old at his next birthday. He leaves four sons, R. C. Montgomery of this city, John, Will and Tom, who live in Chicago. His wife died some years ago.

We know his sudden death was a great shock to both his son and Mrs. Montgomery, who have done all that filial duty demands to make their father happy and contented in his old age, and all their neighbors admired the ideal relations existing between father and son, and a most dutiful daughter-in-law.

The deceased is the last of his fathers family, and it is fitting that while his spirit completes the family circle of his parents in the great beyond.

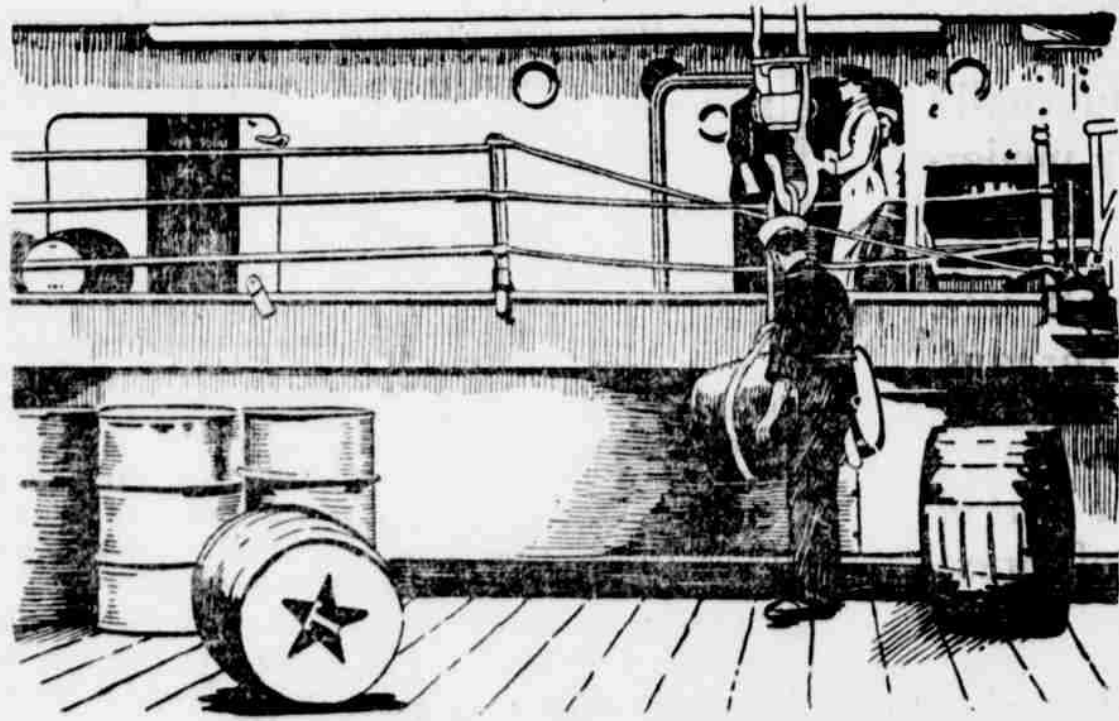
