I was struck by just how individualistic we are here in East Texas. Indeed, we are that way all over this nation. In other countries the houses are frequently built one after another exactly alike. The individuality usually occurs in the back yard, where the family sits out.

But, flamboyant as we are, here we put our differences out front as well as back!

The houses themselves were all different. Ranging from simple frames to mobile homes, elaborate bricks or combination of brick and frame, they were from one story to two.

There were old fashioned farm homes, huge Tudor style houses, and every imaginable type in-between.

Yard care speaks a lot about those who live within the house, too. Some yards must be groomed two or three times a week, they are so perfect, while others are kept "Mowed but not much

else". A few (very few) are unkempt, with Dallis grass growing around the foundation and weeds sprouting everywhere.





Country Cooking By Liz Irwin

Well, guess what October is known for no, not just Halloween but popcorn! This is National Popcorn Month! So here is a little history of one of the most popular snacks known to man.....POPCORN!

The oldest ears of popcorn were found discovered in the Bat Cave of West Central New Mexico in 1948 and 1950. Ranging from smaller than a penny to about 2 inches long, the oldest Bat Cave ears are about 4,000 years old.

Popcorn was and integral part of the 16th century Aztec Indian ceremonies

of popcorn when he invaded Mexico and came into contact with the Aztecs. Popcorn was an important food for them, as they used it for decoration for ceremonial headresses, necklaces and ornaments on statues of their gods, including Tlaloc, the god of maise, rain and fertility.

An early Spanish account of a ceremony honoring the Aztec gods who watched over fishermen stated that they scattered the







Web based tool available to landowners from FSA

teractive web based tool for landowners and operators to use in evaluating and calculating base and yield options for direct and counter cyclical payments. The web-based calculator can be found at http://www.fsa.usda.gov/ pas/farm bill/tools.asp.

The 2002 Farm Bill affords producers the opportunity to update bases and yields allowing them to take advantage of yield improvements due to improved technology resulting in government payments that are more in line with actual production.

Base and yield data currently on file at USDA service centers has been frozen since 1985.

The new tool is based on software developed by Texas A&M University's Agriculture Food and Police Center. The analysis program helps producers evaluate the economic consequences of selecting different base and yield options on a case by case basis for each of their respective operations. When using the analyzer program, producers will need to provide information including planted acres, yields an types of crops grown.

Without the web based tool, producers would be confronted with an impossible task.

FSA recognizes that there are numerous on line base and yield calculators available to producers, but the Texas A&M model is the

only program that has been certified and adopted by FSA an is therefore the only version that FSA supports with confidence.

Landowners interested in receiving direct and counter cyclical payments may begin to sign up for the 2002 and 2003 crop years on October 1, 2002 and have until April 1, 2003 to make base and yield elections for the new farm program. If no election is made by the April 1, 2003 deadline, the farms' bases will default to the 2002 base, plus oilseeds if applicable. This is especially important for those farms that did not participate in the 1996 farm program and whose records currently show no base acres.

Although the decision to change existing base and yield data is ultimately that of the landowner and FSA or its employees cannot make those decision for a producer, they will be more than willing to assist producers. They







Many of that number do not have a family physician and, instead, rely on the ER for their routine medical needs, a very expensive process for both the patient and the hospital. That's one area in which they ask your help by utilizing Christus St. Joseph's Minor Care, when possible, if your illness or injuries are not severe.

Minor Care will be staffed with a physician 24-hours a day, seven days a week and will be housed in the former emergency department area on the North Campus.

Christus St. Joseph's is due increased reimbursements from the federal government next year, something expected to help regain financial footing. Their long range plans provide that all hospital services be consolidated into an expanded facility on the North Campus.

Dear Governor Ratliff: I would like to register my concern that the 2002 State Water Plan, adopted in January by the Texas Water Development Board, relies too much on billion dollar projects like the Marvin Nichols dam and too little on conservation. If reasonable water conservation measures were implemented in the Dallas/Ft. Worth area, where 80 percent of the water from the proposed project would go, the Marvin Nichols dam would be unnecessary.

Dear Editor,

A letter from the Sulphur River Basin Authority (SRBA) member shows exactly why our regional water planning group has found it necessary to amend our regions water plan. They need to restrain the SRBA from developing the Marvin Nichols I Reservoir. The SRBA misses the big picture and ignores plain facts.

The member states that the SRBA would bean no cost in building the lake, choosing to ignore the fact that a minium 235,000 acres would be taken form our county and school district rolls. Our schools are already running on a shoestring. Our school districts would be forced to raise taxes on people's property that was not taken for the reservoir. We would , in effect, be forced to pay a type of water welfare to Dallas-Ft. Worth for their access to our water. There is no free lunch for anyone.

Another reason that our regions water planning group has been forced to reign in the SRBA is their lack of understanding of mitigation. They have misinformed people by saying that there would be development all around the Marvin Nichols I Reservoir. In addition to the tremendous cost, projects such as this will cause permanent damage to our natural heritage, destroying thousands of acres of wildlife habitat-as well as family farm and ranch land.

I strongly urge you to work with other lawmakers to ensure state funding and state permits for water development be granted only to those applicants who can demonstrate that water needs cannot be met through conservation. At a time when money is scarce and rivers are being depleted, Texas can't afford wasteful projects like Marvin Nichols.

Marvin Nichols I would flood 35,000 acres of high priority land and another 15,000 acres of medium priority land as compared with less than 6,000 acres of priority land that Cooper Lake flooded. After mitigation law was enforced, there would be no opportunity for development around the Marvin Nichols I shoreline, just like Cooper Lake.

We can't afford the Marvin Nichols I Reservoir. We would lose most of our water, lose a big chunk of our tax base for operating our schools, sheriffs' department and county road maintenance and we would lose all of the jobs tied to all the land we lose. This is why our entire region of 19 Northeast Texas counties has been forced to work on an amendment to our regional water plan. We have to be protected from the bad choices of the SRBA.

I han k you for your recent letter regarding the Marvin Nichols site for a reservoir on the Sulphur River. I appreciate knowing your position on this future project.




