last Friday night at Indian Field. The Mavericks received the opening kick-off and looked as if they were going to do what most predictors had forecast. During the first 10 minutes of play, the Tribe managed only

when a dirge of Indians led by Robin Colbert blocked a 15-yard field goal attempt.

With only about two minutes left in the first period, the Indians began their first scoring drive. Junior fullback Jim Pippin began the drive with an 8 yard run. Quarterback Tim Pringle next handed off to Charles Alexander who broke several tackles and romped 31 yards to the Eastland 17. After short gains by Colbert and Randy Ivy, Pringle connected with sophomore Chris Love for an 11 yard touchdown pass. PAT failed.

On the first Maverick play, Raymond Rodella recovered a fumble on the Eastland 12 yard line, to set up the first in a series of four Randy Ivy touchdowns. Ivy's kick was good and the Tribe led 13-0 at the end of the first quarter.

Second period action began as Love recovered a Maverick fumble. On the next play Ivy carried the ball 19 yards for the third Indian score. Extra point run failed. These three touchdowns all occured in a span of only 45 seconds.

Eastland was forced to punt on their next possession and after three plays the Indian offense also punted. Adam Sanchez recovered the fumbled punt in mid air and set up another Ivy touchdown from the

the fields - and super-stock tractors, with modified engines and turbo-chargers will be in competition.

The tractors must pull a special skid (that transfers weight from the wheels to the skid) and the further it goes, the harder it is to pull. The contest

will be run on a 350 foot track inside the rodeo arena at the fair grounds. There'll be a pacetractor running alongside the track at six miles an hour. The only two ways a tractor can be disqualified, is if the driver gets off the track, or if he passes the pace-tractor.

In most contests, there is a big push to get the super-modified tractors. Haskell County Fair will have some of those, but will emphasize the local tractors, right out of the fields. Any contestant can run in

There will be three classes: 7-9,000 pounds, 9-12,000 pounds, and 12-15,000 pounds. The official National Tractor Pullers Association rules will be used.



The 60 day ses-sion could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days;

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular session or special session;

Provide that no appro-priation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the pro-posed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the mem-bers of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."
