# Light Turnout Locally For State Amendment Elections

Sherman County voters turned down six of the nine proposed Constitutional Amendments in a light turnout at the polls on Tuesday.

Just a few more than 200 voters took time to cast their ballots on Tuesday as the county approved only Proposals No. 2 and 3, both dealing with the homestead act and extension of \$3,000 exemptions for single

adults, then okayed No. 5, which deals with bonds for seawalls in areas along the Texas Gulf Coast.

Number 2 was approved in the county by a vote of 177 to 41. Number 3 was approved by a margin of 165 to 54 and Number 5 was approved by a vote of 134 to 78.

The amendment which was the most violently opposed

locally by voters was Number 6 which would provide for changes in the Probate Court system. This proposal was turned down by a vote of 189 to 29.

Proposed Amendment 1, which would provide for annual sessions of the State Legislature and to also provide for the salary of Legislators to be boosted to \$15,000 per annum, was voted

down by almost a 3 to 1 majority. A total of 170 voted against the proposal with 49 voting in favor.

Taking all the proposals in order and their vote in the county is as follows: Number 1, annual sessions and salary increases, defeated 170 to 49.

Number 2, homestead protection extended to a single adult,

passed by a vote of 177 to 41. Number 3, providing \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption for a single adult, passed by a vote of 165 to 54.

Number 4, concerning the okay by cities and counties for measures pertaining to conservation and reclamation districts, was turned down by a vote of 149 to 65.

Number 5, granting authority

for cities along the coast to pass bond issues to build seawalls, was passed by a vote of 134 to 78.

Number 6, change in the probate system, failed by a vote of 185 to 29.

Number 7, dealing with veteran land bonds, failed by a vote of 113 to 101 in the closest margin of all the proposals.

Number 8, ad valorem tax levies

for cities and towns, was defeated by a vote of 162 to 54. Number 9, granting non profit water systems tax exempt status, failed by a margin of 156 to 63.

A total of only 221 qualified voters cast ballots in the election. A total of 19 voted in Precinct 1, 25 voted in Precinct 2, with 38 voting in Precinct 3 and only 139 in Precinct 4.

# Dalhart Downs Elks 13 - 6 In Cliffhanger

Dalhart Fortune turned her back on the Stratford Elks Friday night and a rolling inside kick by Dalhart turned the tide as the Wolves downed the Elks 13-6 to snap the Elks' string of District 1AA wins.

The Elks had outplayed and outplayed the Wolves until late in the final period when Dalhart tied up the game 6-6. The Elks' defensive unit had blocked a go-ahead PAT try and as the Wolves lined up for the kickoff it was apparent that they intended to try an inside kick.

The short boot went rolling along the ground and just as Tackle Jack Haile started to pounce on the ball it shot right up into the air and over his head. That still wasn't so bad as Willie Mungia was right behind Haile and grabbed the pigskin, but just as he began to gather it in a Dalhart tackler hit him, knocking the ball loose again and Dalhart recovered.

Momentum quickly changed in the game and two plays later Wolf Ted Higgins broke loose for a go-ahead touchdown run of 54 yards.

The Elks played the favored Wolves right down to the wire, giving all they had throughout the game and had not that outside kick bounced the way it did, things could have been different.

Regardless, the Elks turned in one of their finest performances of the year handing the District 1AA pre-season favorites all they wanted and more for over three quarters of play.

Stratford had scored first in the game, only to have it nullified by a holding call and ended up trying for a field goal which went wide of its mark. This action came early in the second quarter.

The Wolves were held on downs following the attempted

field goal and Stratford took over at their own 40 after the Wolf punt.

Using Steve Williams for 13 yards, Rick Howard for runs of 22 and 10 yards, Steve Barrett went for 10 yards and the Elks moved quickly to the Wolf 15 two plays later Howard got to the Wolf 1-yard line and Brady Heil bulled his way in for the touchdown with 1:45 left in the second. An attempted two-point conversion by Howard fell short and the Elks went in at the half with a 6-0 lead.

The Elks fumbled the third

quarter kickoff but the defensive unit refused the Wolves running room and forced them to punt. This exchange of punts continued through the third quarter as neither team was able to mount any type of serious threat.

Late in the third quarter, the Wolves set up shop midfield following a 15 yard penalty against the Elks. Higgins broke loose for 13 yards then Quarterback Myron Grantham kept to move to the Elks 25. Two plays later Grantham hit Halfback Bob Beaver for a

22-yard scoring play to tie the game with 9:52 left. An attempted PAT was blocked by Coats and the teams lined up for the fatal kickoff all knotted at 6-6.

Following the run by Higgins, Stratford drove for two first downs before having to punt the the Wolves got three first downs to drive out to their 38 where they had to punt.

With time running out the Elks took over at their own 33 and drove to the Wolfpack 22 before time ran out.

Rick Howard was the Elk's leading rusher for the night carrying the ball 10 times for 56 yards. Steve Williams picked up 26 yards for four carries while

Admission for the Hootenanny will be \$1 for adults and 50 cents for pre-school and students.

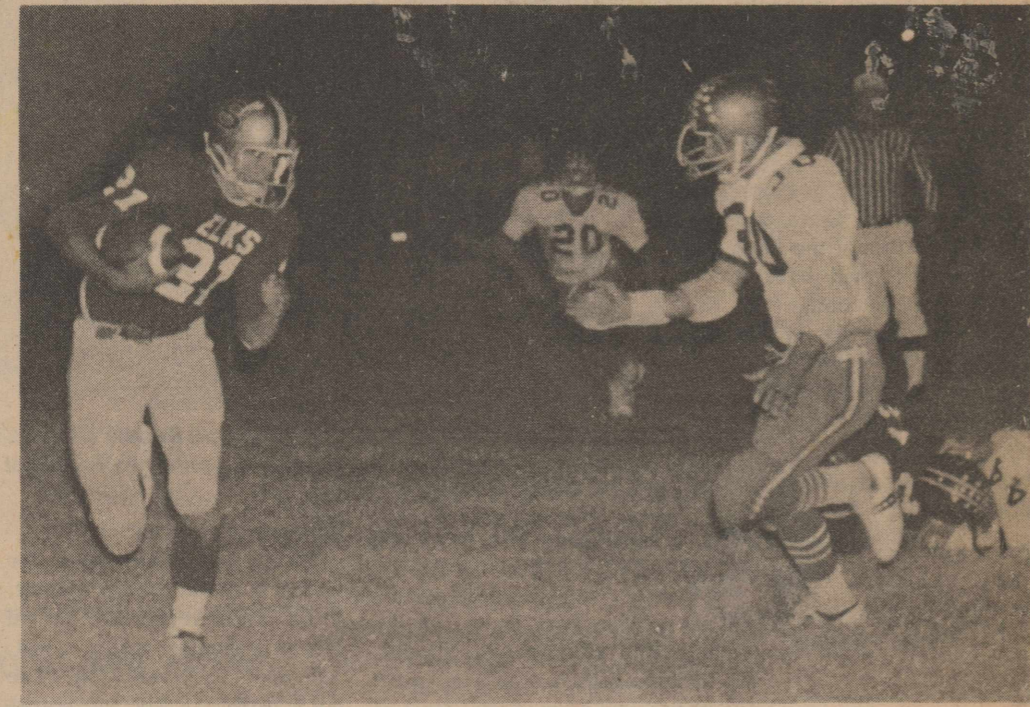
### Lions Club Hears Riley

### Grain Harvest Efforts Stopped By Moisture

Area grain harvesting efforts ground to a halt Saturday with the encroachment of the first real cool spell of the season which also brought fog and drizzle to the Plains region.

Temperatures fell to below freezing over the weekend and Monday morning most areas had a small coating of ice over vehicles and stock tanks.

A check with area elevator operators shows that the maize and corn harvest for the season is nearing the halfway mark as of the weekend.

Don Riffe, Stratford Grain Company, along with Von Haggard of Paul Allison Grain and Warren Miller of Kerrick Elevator, all agreed that the harvest was nearing the midpoint this weekend.

All three operators indicated this is certainly no record year

### Gas Shutdown Only Rumor Over Area

There is no valid basis for a rumor which has been circulating to the effect that irrigation gas for farmers will be shut down this winter, according to sources available to The Star Monday afternoon.

Acting upon the rumor that "one of the natural gas companies" supplying natural gas for irrigation in the Sherman County area had warned farmers their supply would be cut off this winter until March 1, The Star contacted Southern Union Gas Co., Emerald gas company and People's Natural Gas company spokesmen and found no basis for the rumor.

The Star talked with Marvin Walters of People's Natural Gas Co., Amarillo; Bob Hembree, Emerald Gas Company, Amarillo; and Doug Reese, office manager for Southern Union Gas Company, Stratford, and learned that none of the three were aware of any such notice being sent out by their organizations.

Both People's Natural Gas and Emerald Natural Gas told The Star they were not taking on any new irrigation gas customers at this time, but they were not aware that their companies had made any announcement of curtailment of existing contracts with farmers.

Hembree, of Diamond Shamrock Corp., parent company for Emerald Gas., told The Star, that "it would be pretty hard to cut off a customer if he owned the land where the production was located."

The rumor had been circulating over the area for the weekend, but as far as could be ascertained Monday it was completely unfounded.

where yields are concerned, but the quality of both maize and corn was good as were prices.

The operators all agreed that milo on irrigated land was running about average or a little below depending upon weather conditions in a particular area.

Up around the Kerrick area there had been quite a bit of hail damage this year and yields are showing the results.

Corn harvesting this year is nearing the 90 percent completion point with maize probably about 50 percent finished.

Milo on irrigated land is turning out an average of about 5,000 to 6,000 pounds per acre and corn running from 120 bushels to 130 bushels per acre.

The outstanding thing about this year's harvest has been the price received by farmers. In the past, the average price paid during this time of the year has run less than \$2 per cwt for milo. This year the price has been holding at around \$4 per cwt even with the harvesting in full swing.

Last week prices fell to the lowest point they have been in quite some time, but still the price is quite a bit above the \$1.60 per cwt average that grain sorghum has received locally for quite a number of years.

Dollar wise, this year will prove out to be way above normal in returns to the farmers regardless of the average or below yields.

All operators echoed that "what we need now is sunshine and a little wind to dry the grain" so combines can get back to work.

Plans for the 1973 Community Thanksgiving Service were announced by members of the Stratford Ministerial Alliance this Monday.

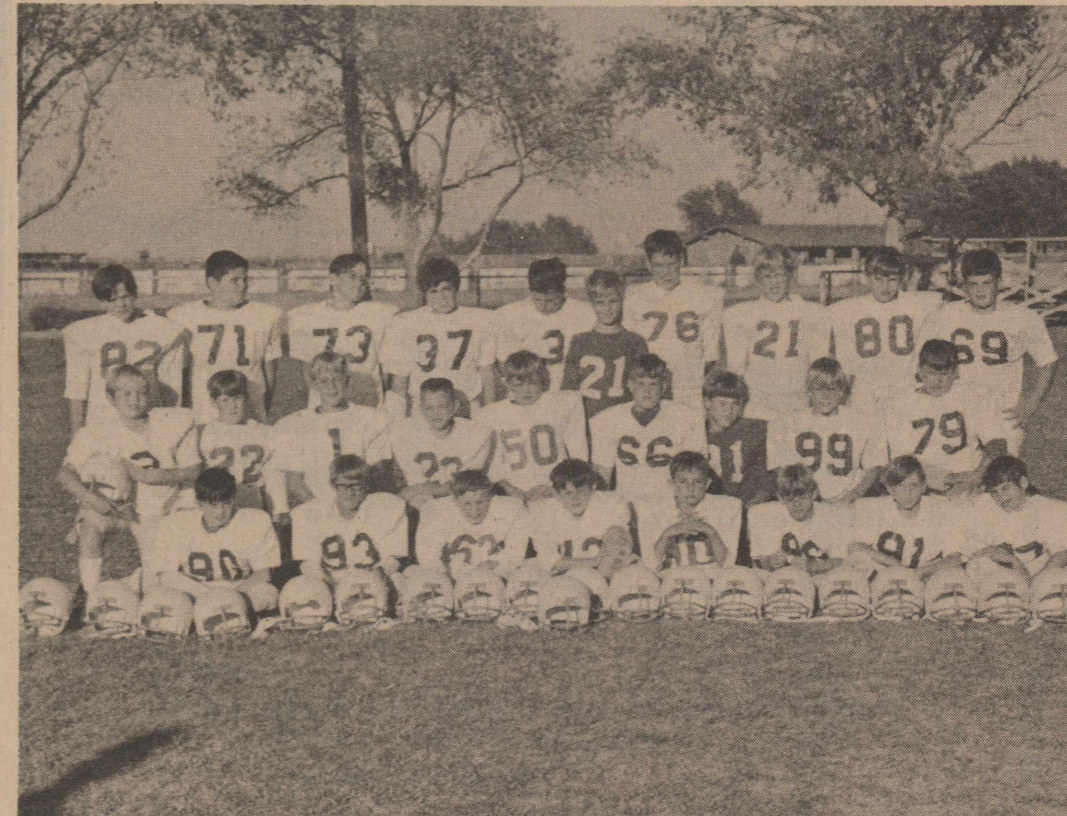
The annual Thanksgiving Service will be held Sunday evening, November 18, at 7 p.m. in the First Baptist Church in Stratford.

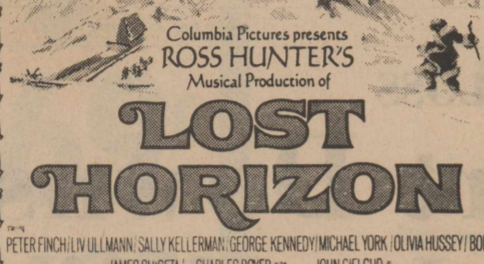

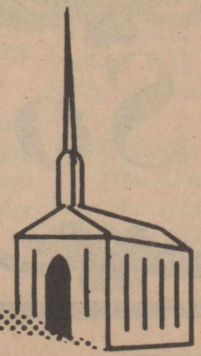

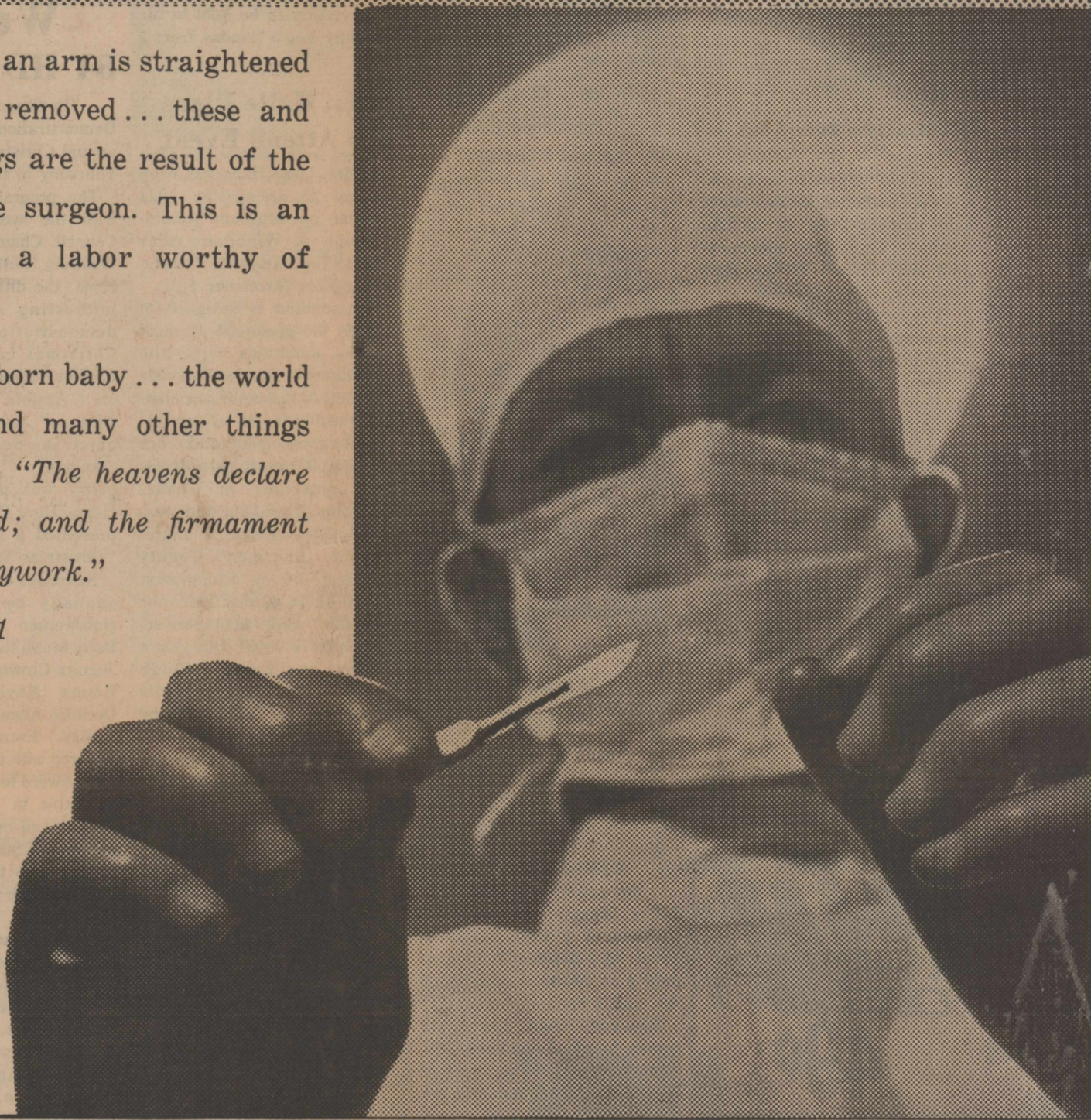

1 stick butter 1/2 c. shortening 2 c. sugar 5 egg yolks 2 c. flour 1 t. soda 1 c. buttermilk 1 t. vanilla 1 small can coconut 2 c. nuts 5 egg whites

Cream butter, shortening and sugar until smooth. Add beaten egg yolks, (mix soda and buttermilk separately) and add alternately buttermilk mixture and flour. Stir until smooth and add coconut and nuts. Add beaten egg whites last. Bake in loaf pan or layer. Irene prefers this baked in a sheet pan as the icing keeps it moist longer for lunches. Bake at 350 degrees until golden brown.

ICING

18 ozs. cream cheese 1/2 stick butter or oleo 1 box powdered sugar 1 t. vanilla

1 c. chopped nuts Cream cheese and butter well. Add other ingredients and stir until smooth. Ice cool cake.
