The Star will be closed this weekend for Thanksgiving as will most businesses in the city. George Jeffcoat, chamber manager, dropped by Monday to remind us that most Chamber members will be observing the Thanksgiving holiday and be closed.

Looks like we finally got that first snow of the year. We got quite a chuckle out of Lieu Hoang, our "other son" from Vietnam who is living with us.

Lieu has been asking every cold morning "When is it going to snow?" In his country the temperature never drops below about 50 degrees so you can see how different the Panhandle has been for him.

At any rate, we woke up Lieu this morning and told him to look outside and he was quite excited. He ran around looking out all the windows, then he and the other two boys, David and Tom ended up in a snowball fight before they left for school.

We have been telling Lieu that it will snow, don't worry about it, but think he had figured we were pulling his leg up until now. We would bet he gets tired of snow before it is all over this winter.

Commodity prices Tuesday morning showed wheat selling for \$4.14 per bushel, grain sorghum at \$4.05 and corn selling for \$2.59 on local markets Tuesday morning.

The season's first snowfall hit the area early Tuesday morning accompanied by winds gusting up to 40 mph and temperatures as low as 20 degrees.

The snow was very light with little moisture in most places. A check of the area Tuesday revealed that in many cases some drizzle had fallen before the snow resulting in icy road conditions early in the day. It seemed the further south the more ice, especially around the Dumas, Vega, Hartley and Amarillo areas.

The road north of Kerrick between there and Boise City, Okla., was blocked by Department of Public Safety officials in Texas and the Highway Patrol in Oklahoma due to a track-tractor accident about 9 a.m. Tuesday morning.

The trailer truck was loaded with liquid lead which produces a poisonous gas. Although there was no report of the liquid escaping officials were taking no chances with the ticklish situation and all through traffic was being stopped at Kerrick on the south.

Bob Steward, of the DPS at Stratford, said the tractor-trailer had jackknifed due to the slick highway and overturned.

No immediate details were available as to the destination or injuries to any occupants at presstime.

In the Sherman County area the snow did not amount to much except to say it has snowed. Cattle were turning their tails into the wind but the snowfall had not accumulated enough to be a problem as this issue goes to press.

Fred McDaniel up at Kerrick told The Star Tuesday morning that there were no drifts to speak of in their area, but the visibility had been "Comming and Going" due to the high wind and blowing snow.

Highway 287 was pretty slick due to a coating of ice and snow and traveler's warnings were in effect for the Oklahoma Panhandle early in the day.

Mrs. Betty Green, of the Green Ranch located 18 miles west of Stratford toward Dalhart, reported snow early but no drifting problems although the temperatures were down in the 20's and wind blowing hard.

Luckily, most of the area's maize harvesting was just about over prior to this first snow of the season.

A check with area elevators revealed that this year's maize harvest is virtually completed.

James Spurlock of Stratford Grain, told The Star Tuesday that if combines had been able to work Tuesday they would've completed practically all the maize left in the area.

The harvest had been going at full steam for the past several

weeks and most farmers had been able to get 90 percent or more of their grain out of the field without the trouble encountered a year ago.

Last year winter came early to the High Plains and combines had to work in the most miserable conditions. Many completed harvesting after January 1 working early in the morning on frozen ground, using pickup attachments and much of the valuable grain was lost due to lodging and fallen stalks.

Winds, snow and miserable weather plagued the 1972 harvest from the very beginning.

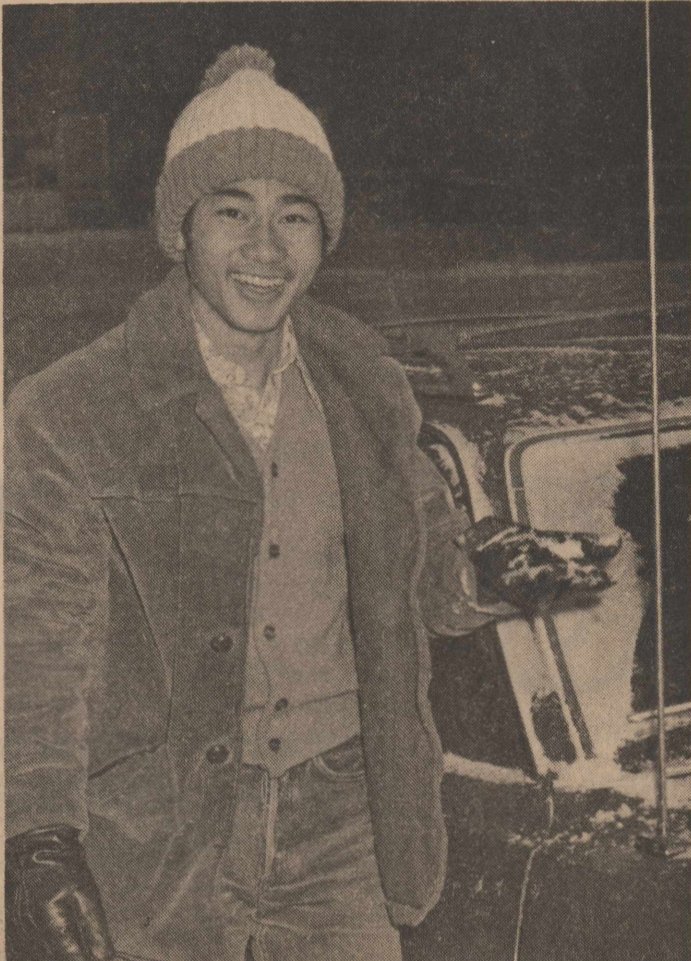

New Alcohol Policy Adopted By Trustees

A new policy concerning students using alcoholic beverages on school property or school sponsored trips; report on area special educational programs; insurance coverage for school buildings; and a report by state lunchroom supervisor occupied members of the board of trustees of the Stratford Independent School District at their meeting Thursday night.

The board discussed and approved a new school policy concerning the use of alcoholic beverages by students.

The new policy, which was approved, is as follows: "No alcoholic beverages will be allowed on the school premises. Students that have consumed alcohol, or have in their possession alcoholic beverages of any kind, will be suspended from school until their principal arranges a conference with the parents and the student for readmission.

"This applies to both schools and extra-curricula activities.

"Sponsors of the various organizations, such as FFA, FHA, Band, Pep Club, Senior Trip, ect, will handle the problem if it happens during their sponsored activities."

The board also heard a report by Supt. E.L. Bass concerning a new program for special education for any child between the ages of 3 and 6 with any type of learning problem.

This new program is made possible through a Federal Grant and will be administered over a three-county area, including Sherman, Dallam and Hartley counties. Any child who has any type of handicap which would hinder their learning will be eligible for special education through this new program, Bass pointed out. Anyone desiring information on the program or enrolling their child in the program is urged to contact Supt. Bass.

The SISD lunchrooms were inspected by a state lunchroom

supervisor this past week and a glowing report on their service was forwarded to Supt. Bass and the trustees. Mrs. Minnie Reeder and her staff were commended for their work in this area.

Insurance coverage for buildings and contents within the SISD was discussed and the board approved a motion to split the insurance between Smith Insurance Agency and First State Agency in order to take advantage of a 20 per cent deviation for the district.

John Pileh, high school science instructor, brought a curricula report to the board and explained new additions now offered students in the areas of math and science in the high school program.

All members of the board were present at the meeting.

Richter is a native of Washington and a graduate of Washington State University holding master's degrees in both agricultural economics and animal science. Prior to entering the feedlot business, Richter worked for Upjohn Corp. and was in charge of their Western United States territory. After leaving Upjohn, Richter went to Arizona where he got his first experience in cattle feeding operations and moved to Stratford about 18 months ago and was named manager at Stratford Feed Yards.

FINAL SEASON GAME

Elks Horn Panthers In Shutout 30 - 0

Stratford's Elks shut out the Panhandle Panthers in the final game of the 1973 season by a 30-0 score at Elk Stadium Friday night.

The victory closed the most successful season in Elk football history since back in 1964. The Elks finished this year in third place in District 1AA standing with an overall record for the year of 6-3-1.

The Elks had taken the ball on the opening kickoff Friday night and proceeded to march 56 yards in seven plays for their initial score in the game.

Quarterback Mark Beaty swept left end on a keeper to move from the Elk 44 to the Panhandle 39 on the first play, following a penalty, Beaty then hit Willie Mungia for a 36 yard pass to put the ball at the Panther 9-yard line then Brady heil moved to the 2-yard line where on third and goal, Beaty sneaked over for the score. Beaty's PAT boot was good and the Elks owned a 7-0 lead with 9:57 left in the opener.

For the next two quarters neither team was able to score although the Elks were held out late in first at the Panther 9-yard line but the threat was blunted because of penalties.

A see-saw battle continued until late in the third quarter when the Elks stopped the Panthers at the Stratford 23 on downs.

On the last play of the third stanza, Heil picked up 10 yards to move out to the Elk 33. Following the switch of ends of the field, Heil got the number and took a quick handoff up the middle and was into the secondary before the Panthers knew what was happening. Shaking away from one tackler, Heil outran two other defenders, carrying the ball all the way (67 yards) for the second Elk td. Beaty's PAT boot was good and the Elks lead 14-0 with 11:49 left in the game.

Following an exchange of punts after the resulting kickoff the Elks held the Panthers deep in their own end of the field and a big rush on the Panhandle punter resulted in a short punt and the Elks took over at the Panther 34. Steve Williams picked up 11 yards on a counter then Beaty hit Mungia in the end zone for a 25 yard touchdown strike with 5:27 left. Beaty swept on the PAT to get two more points and the Elks lead 22-0.

It took only 25 seconds for the

Elks to strike again. This time David McReynolds stopped the Panhandle receiver deep on the kickoff and the gambling Panthers took to the air on their first play from scrimmage.

Alert Brady Heil reached up into the air, gathered in the aerial and moved unmolested for a 24 yard scoring return. Beaty then threw to Steve Barrett in the end zone for another 2 point conversion to make the score 30-0 with 5:05 left in the game and put it out of reach 30-0.

Panhandle managed to move the ball on the ground to midfield after the kickoff using up most of the time on the clock and a fourth down gamble backfired and the Elks took over with 1:27 left in the game.

Willie Mungia was named Offensive Elk of the Week with Brady Heil named Defensive Elk of the Week for their participation in the final game of the year.

Mungia caught three passes for 74 yards, one a touchdown and the one setting up the Elk's first score. Heil lead Elk tacklers with 20 tackles in the game, intercepted two passes, one of

Purpose of the meeting will be to discuss paving of cart trails for next year. All cart owners are urged to be present.

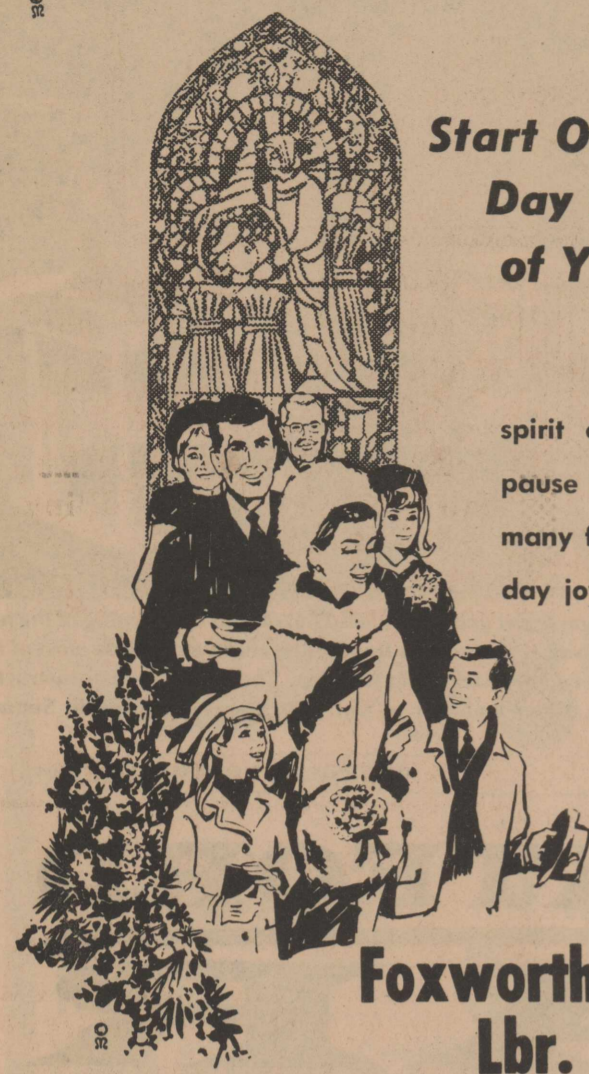

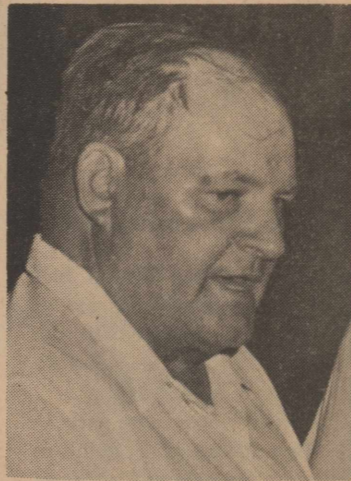

Funeral services for Arlyn Haile, 58, were held Monday from the First Baptist Church of Stratford at 2 p.m. with the Rev. Bruce Mitchell, pastor, officiating.

Mr. Haile was dead on arrival Thursday morning at the Stratford Clinic after suffering an apparent heart attack at his farm.

A native of Dickens County, Mr. Haile had moved to Sherman County in the 1920's with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. L.B. Haile. They farmed on land located about 12 miles southeast of Stratford since that time.

Mr. Haile attended school in Stratford, graduated from Stratford High School where he

played football, and later entered service during World War II. As a member of the 1st Calvary Division, he saw action in the Pacific.

After service, Mr. Haile returned to Sherman County where he and his brother, Lorel, began farming and ranching together and continued until Arlyn's attack this past Thursday morning.

He was a member of the North Plains Water Board for 15 years, member of the First Baptist Church where he served as a Deacon and Head Usher, member of the American Legion and served as head cook for the Stratford Jamboree Barbeque for many years.

Survivors include his wife, Dorothy, of the home; one daughter, Sue Etta, a student at Tarleton College; and one son, Jack, a senior at Stratford High School; and one brother, H.L., of Stratford.

John Connally Will Speak At Price Benefit

Former Texas Governor John B. Connally will be the principal speaker at a \$100-a-plate fund-raising dinner for U.S. Representative Bob Price at the Amarillo Civic Center Coliseum December 18 the Congressman's office announced. A reception is planned to begin at 7 p.m. with a banquet following. Tickets are expected to be available through local Republican County Chairmen in each of the 35 counties in the 13th Congressional District. Sherman County Republican chairman is Mrs. Frances Watson.

"Governor Connally is a man who has put his nation's needs for leadership above party partisanship," Price commented. "As a governor of a major state and with experience in the formulation of both military and

economic policy, he has been a man of independence serving in high governmental councils and advising administrations of both political parties.

"I am honored that Governor Connally is coming to the 13th District in my behalf," Price said. "I know that Northwest Texans are anxious to greet him and to hear his comments."

Connally became a Republican last May after being a life-long Democrat. He has most recently served as a Presidential advisor and was Secretary of the Treasury in 1971. Ten years earlier, he had served as Secretary of the Navy under President Kennedy. In 1962, Connally was elected Governor of Texas and was subsequently re-elected twice, giving him the record of serving longer as governor than anyone else in Texas history.

Price will be the first Texas Congressman that Connally has appeared for since his party switch.

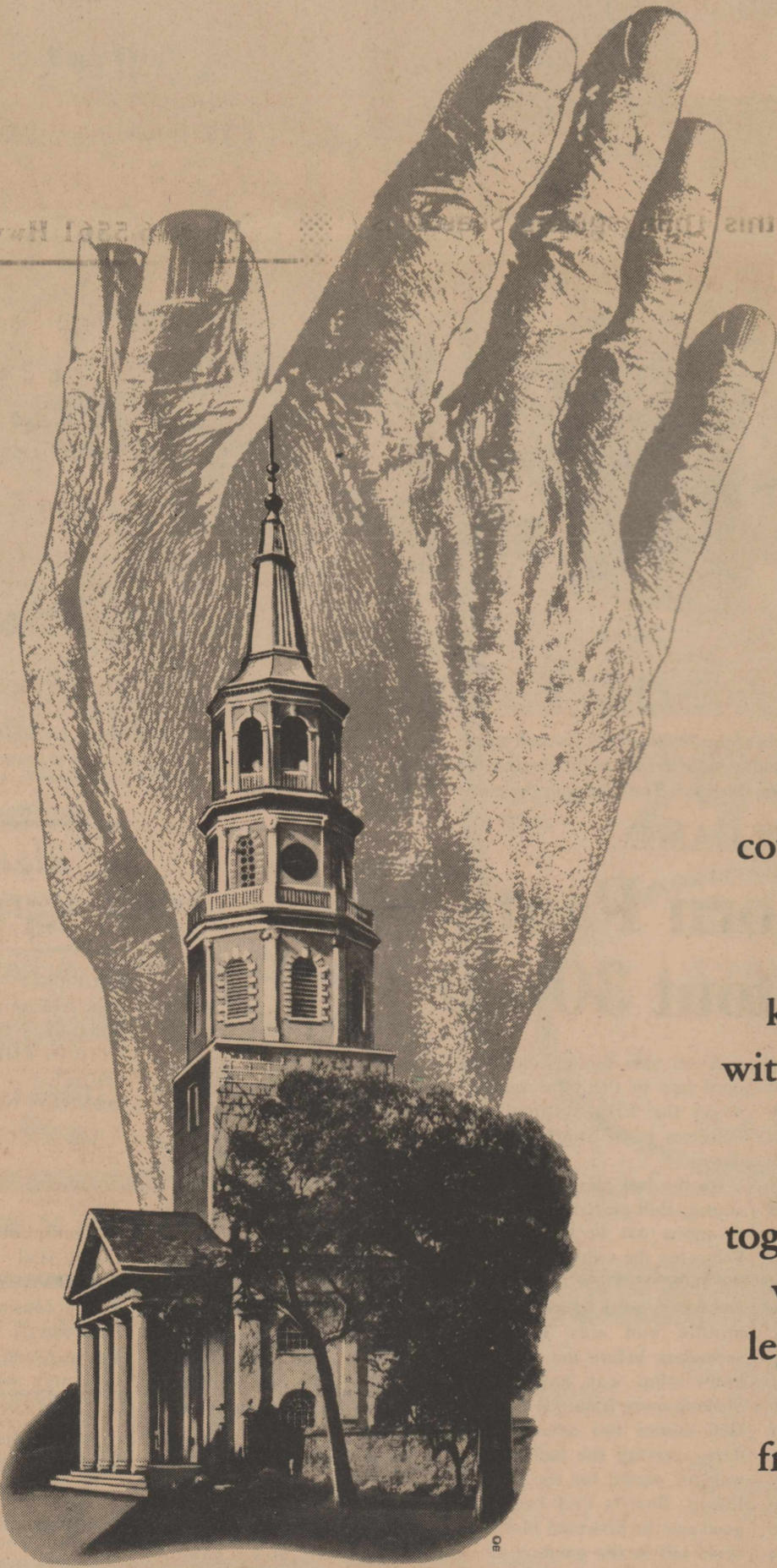

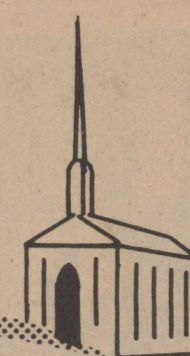

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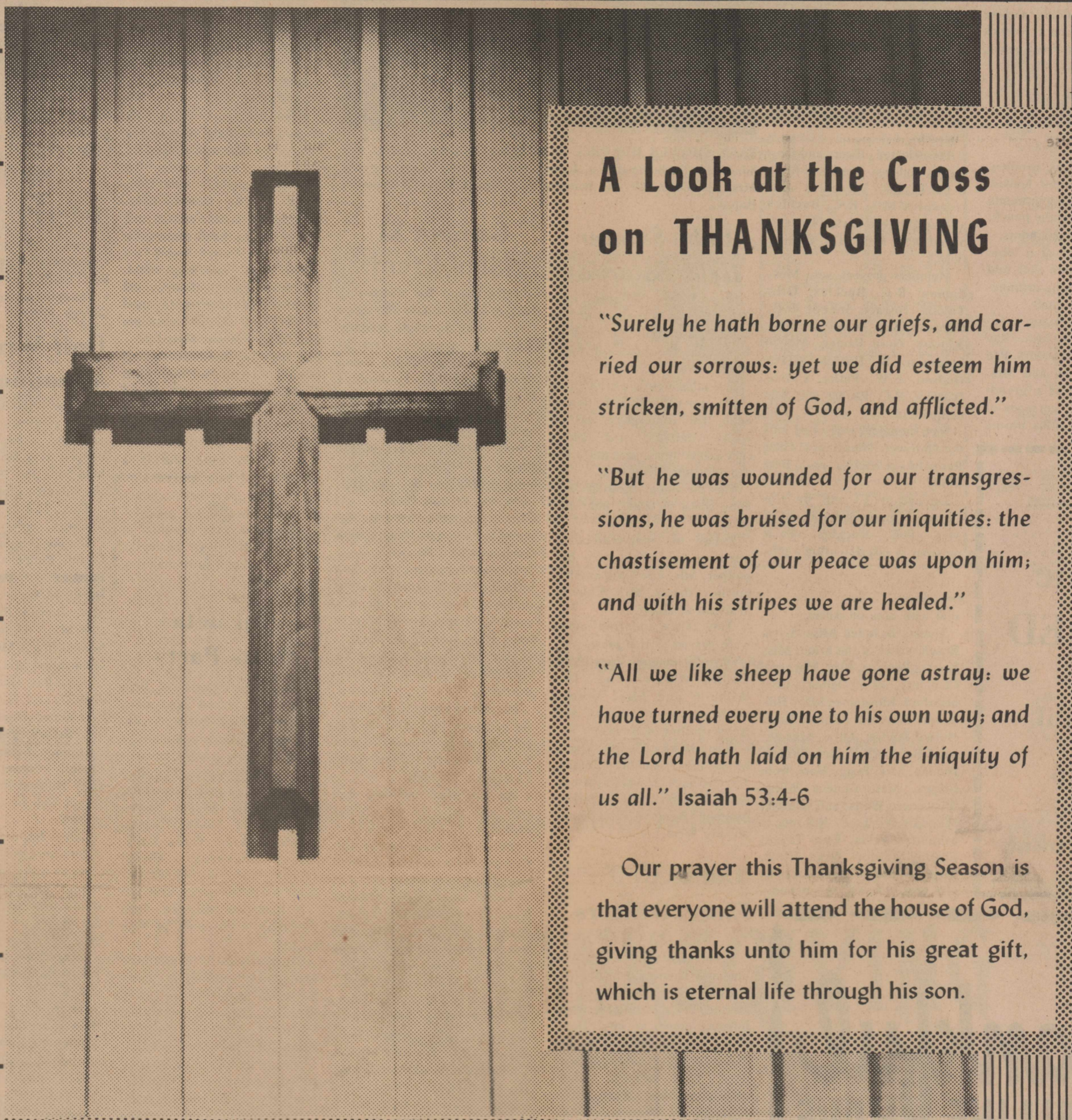
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A Look at the Cross on THANKSGIVING

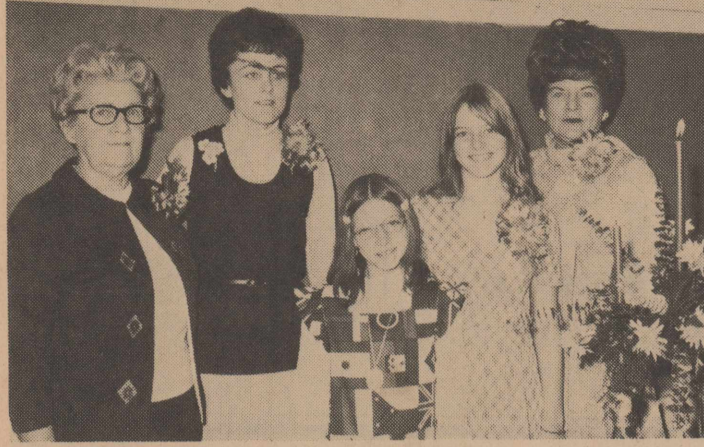

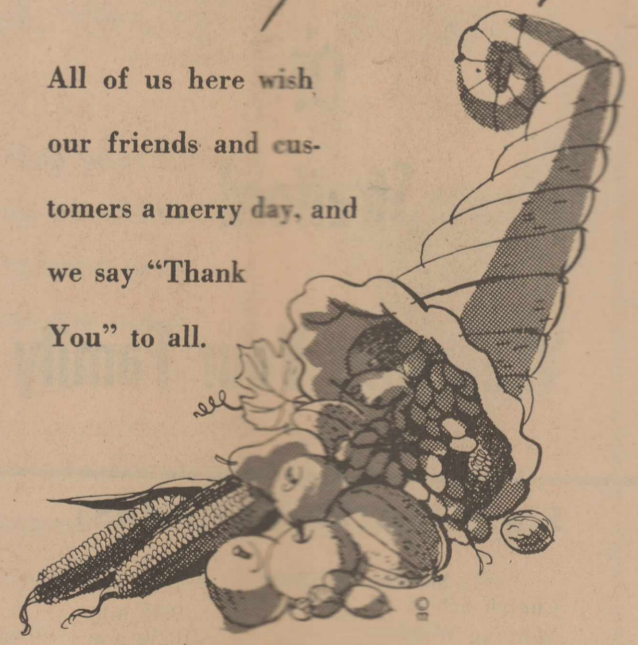

ORANGE BREAD

- 1 large thick skinned orange-boiling water
- 1 c. raisins and chopped dates
- 1 t. soda
- 1 c. sugar
- 1 T. shortening
- 1 t. vanilla
- 1 beaten egg
- 2 c. flour
- 1 t. baking powder
- 1/4 t. salt
- 1/2 c. nuts

Squeeze the juice from the orange-grind the orange peel and add the raisins and dates to make one cup. But in a bowl. Add enough boiling water to the

orange juice to make 1 cup. Pour over peel mixture. Add the soda, shortening, sugar and vanilla. Add the beaten egg, then the flour that has been mixed with the salt and baking powder. Beat thoroughly. Add nuts and bake in a greased loaf pan for 50 minutes at 350 degrees.

OSGOOD PIE

- 2 eggs
- 1 c. sugar
- 1 c. pecans
- 3/4 c. raisins
- 1 t. vanilla
- 1 9" unbaked pie crust
- 1 t. cinnamon
- 1 t. all spice
- 1 t. cloves
- 1 T. vinegar
- 1 T. butter

Mix dry ingredients. Beat eggs well and add them to the dry mixture. Add vinegar, vanilla and melted butter. Add nuts & raisins. Pour in pie shell and bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Serve with whipped cream. This is very rich, so you won't need six of these.

OATMEAL COOKIES

- 1 c. raisins
- 1 c. shortening
- 1 c. sugar
- 3 eggs
- 2 c. flour
- 1/2 t. soda
- approximately 6 T. raisin liquid
- 1 t. cinnamon
- 1/2 t. all spice
- 1/2 t. cloves
- 2 c. old fashioned oats
- 1/2 c. dates
- 1 c. nuts

Boil raisins in a small amount of water for 5 minutes. Drain, but save the liquid. Cream shortening and sugar, add the eggs. Mix Well. Sift dry ingredients and mix with oats, nuts and dates. Add to first mixture with enough raisin liquid to make the dough soft enough for drop cookies. Drop by teaspoonfull on a cookie sheet. Bake 10 to 12 minutes at 350 degrees.

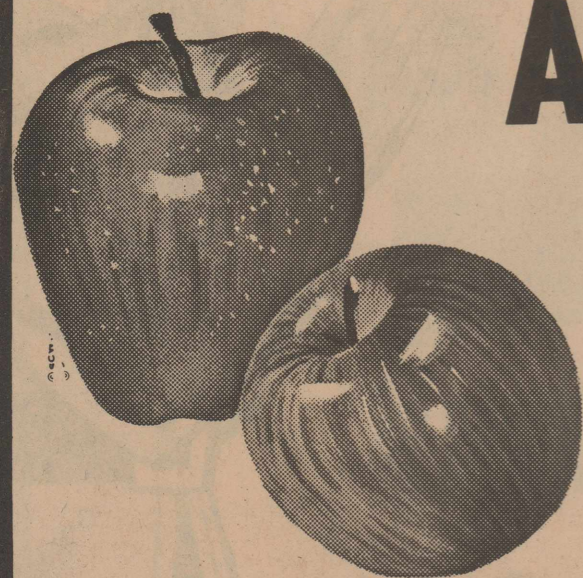

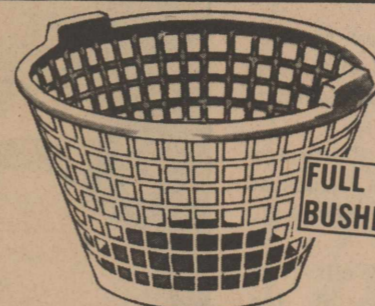

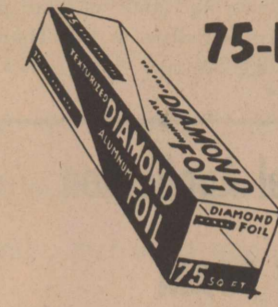

Water Inc Member Drive Underway

The annual quest for members for Water, Inc., is underway in almost every county in Western Texas and Eastern New Mexico. The membership drive continues through Dec. 15.

"Many area residents have become dejected about the future possibilities of obtaining adequate supplemental water," said A.L. Black, Friona, president of Water, Inc. "Most of the negative attitude stems from preliminary findings of a study of the Mississippi River," he said. "But those who have been close to the study are optimistic."

Although the import study has never been released, a preliminary report indicated there was surplus water in the Mississippi and demonstrated the feasibility of design and construction of a facility to transport the water to the High Plains area. It concluded, however, that "under traditional standards" for evaluating water resource development projects, it was not economically feasible.

"Water, Inc.'s primary and immediate goal will be to inform the nation and the world of our current food, fiber and fuel contributions to world supplies, and more importantly, our capabilities with adequate supplemental water," Black said.

He issued a plea for all area residents to join Water, Inc., noting that "the strength of our voice in telling the High Plains story depends directly on strength of our membership."

Wheat Meeting In Amarillo

With more acres sowed to wheat than in recent years--wheat growers from throughout Texas will gather in Amarillo, November 28 & 29 for a two-day look at current and future problems and opportunities facing their crop and their wheat income. Amarillo is the headquarter location for their organizations, Producers Association and Producers Board.

The Producers Association's Twenty-third Annual Meeting is scheduled Wednesday, November 28. A parade of speakers from Washington, D.C., Nebraska, North Dakota and here in Texas will cover subjects from changing Markets to Transportation and Farm Programs to Texas Constitutional Changes. Christmas Seal Lagging Behind

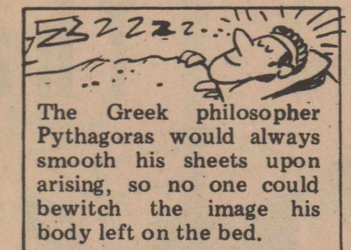

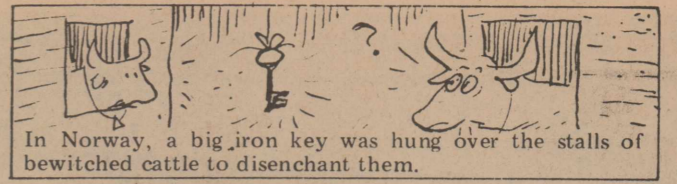

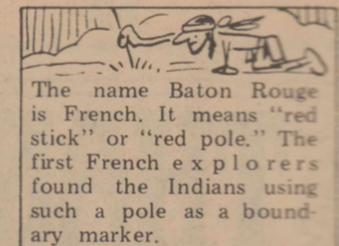

many others in the 45 minute demonstration using a variety of materials.

A model home, complete with special visual effects was used to trace electric current from the generator, thru transformers, transmission lines, service entrance and "oversized" wall outlets.

Using special props, such as demonstration models of an "electro-graphic" man, electric drill, and toaster, Smetana pointed out where hazardous accident producing situations occur both inside and outside our homes as a result of using "faulty electrical equipment."

Some of the accident producing situations graphically illustrated, included standing on damp ground or wet concrete, using or touching any grounded

tool or appliance, or in contact with any piping system and allowing ordinary household current to pass thru your body from defective equipment or accidental contact with conductors.

Continuing with the props having "special lighting effects", Smetana warned his audience of the hazards associated with failing to unplug the toaster before cleaning, using an aluminum ladder near electric lines, flying a kite with wet or metallic threads in the string near electric lines, and the dangers of a borken electrically charged line which has fallen over or near an automobile that has just crashed into.

Friona's JV girls won the warmup contest handily downing Stratford JV girls 58-35 with Farwell leading scorer for the winners with 18 points.

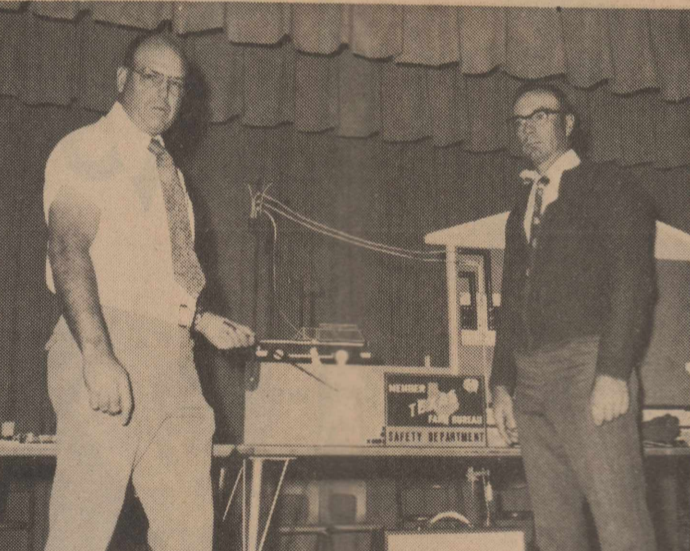
Carrie Cummings was high for Stratford with 27 points followed by Rhonda Fortenberry with 11 and Kim Cotney with 7.

Social Security News

Q. I am over 65 years of age. Social security is the only income I have. Is there any way I can get more money?
A. Congress recently passed a new law which includes payments called Supplemental Security Income. You might qualify under this new program if your income and resources are low.

Q. I am receiving Public Assistance payments. When can I apply for Supplemental Security Income?
A. If you are now drawing Public Assistance, you do not need to apply for Supplemental Security Income. Persons now on Public Assistance rolls will be converted to the new Supplemental Security Income Program.

Q. I own my own home and have a little money in the bank. Can I qualify for Supplemental Security Income?
A. If the value of your home and bank account is not above a certain limit, you could qualify if your income level is low enough.

Q. I recently read something about social security taking over welfare payments. Is this true?
A. Only partly true. Under the new law, social security will take over the aged 65, blind and disabled categories.

"The Social Security Administration is charged with the responsibility of informing people about their rights and responsibilities under the Social Security law," said Robert H. Schaller of the Guymon social security office today.

One way the office does this is to provide speakers, films, and written materials to organizations and groups that request them.

"An organization can schedule a speaker from our office on very short notice," said Schaller. "and with a little advance notice, an interesting film can be shown to the group.

Clubs, classes or groups which want to know more about social security can schedule a speaker or a film - of both - by calling the social security office.

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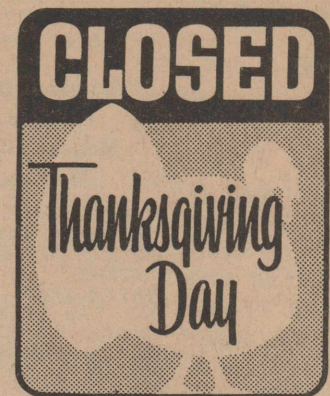
