Welcome Moisture Falls On Area

STRATFORD, SHERMAN COUNTY, TEXAS 79084

The rains finally came, not near as much as the area needed, but perhaps the clouds have been primed so more will come.

The City of Stratford officially received .61 of an inch over the weekend according to Horace Sneed's official gauge. All morning on Saturday the city area was blessed with a slow drizzle and not one morsel ran away.

Harry Lowe, about 12 miles east of town, reported they received .60 of an inch on Saturday and more Monday evening but he hadn't checked his gauge when The Star called Tuesday morning.

Bob Scott, up at Kerrick Farm Supply, told us that they got about a half inch in Kerrick over the weekend but none fell there on

Mrs. Ed Crabtree reported they got .80 of an inch on Saturday and another .30 of an inch Monday night at Conlen then down south at the Don Dietrich farm that area received 1.40 Monday night and another .75 of an inch on Saturday.

Keith Green reported they got .30 of an inch on Saturday but missed the rain on Monday night.

The area has been in the midst of a drought as severe as any in the history of the area since last September. The conditions have been severely dry and no moisture of any kind reported during the past 30 days to amount to anything.

Most farmers have been able to get their plowing all done and are only waiting on moisture to begin planting wheat.

FOR 287 PROJECT Representatives Meet With Highway Officials

Eight members of the Sherman County area met with Packers plant, located at the Texas Highway Department last week concerning plans for the four-laning of Highway 287 north from the Moore County line to Stratford.

The Sherman County delegation was comprised of County Judge W.S. Frizzell Jr., Commissioners Joe Everett and Robert Ferguson, City Councilmen Ron Hager and Ed Moore Manager George Jeffcoat. Other local citizens at the meeting included Greg Pye, of Delta Industries, Inc., and V.O. Lasley.

Two representatives of the Dumas Chamber of Commerce were also on hand for the

Purpose of the meeting was to try to get a definite committment on a date for beginning the four-lane project for Highway 287. The segment from Dumas north to the county line has already been set in by the highway department and local representatives were trying to get a concrete date for the segment from the Moore County line northward into Stratford.

The Sherman County Commissioners Court has made preliminary work on right-ofway for the project and before taking the issue before the voters to approve bonds for the purchase of the land they wished to be able to say just when the project would get

The new American Beef Cactus, has already made an impact on traffic between Stratford and Dumas and when the plant gets into full production later this year the need for four-lane highway will get even worse.

'We got a real nice reception in Austin," said County Judge Frizzell. "We didn't get a date from the highway department, and Chamber of Commerce but now they know we are all vitally interested and we feel they will be meeting our request with more favor than before," Judge Frizzell added.



NO SPECIAL SESSION -Gov. Dolph Briscoe rejected requests for a special legislative session on state employee pay raises and sup-plementary school financial

He said a special session at the tag end of an exhausting Constitutional Convention would not be practical, and the most pressing problems can be met by emergency action in the next regular legislative session

Specifically, Briscoe committed himself to these emergency goals in 1975, which will cost approximately \$216 million in general revenue:

- A 10 per cent cost of living pay raise for all state employees effective Feb. 1, 1975. (Legislative Budget Board has recommended \$285 million in pay and fringe benefit increases for state employees during the 1976-77 fiscal period).

- An increase of \$40 per student in average daily attendance for maintenance and operation of public schools, with distribution arranged to benefit "poor" districts most.

Fall seeded waterways should be drilled to wintergrasses between August 15 and September 15 on dryland and August 15 and October 15 on irrigated land. Although moisture conditions are not adequate (at this time, it may be advisable to go ahead and plant western wheatgrass or other wintergrasses early and increase chances of getting it up and growing this year. Western wheatgrass can be planted with a grain drill and does not have to be seeded in a dead litter crop if seeded before September 15.

Grassed waterways are not a loss of land but a needed land use change that will result in the conservation of surrounding cropland. There are needless acres and inches of top soil that work down the creek during periods of high rainfall. This can be avoided in the future by establishing protective outlets of permanent grassses such as western wheatgrass in grassed

July's dry weather caused Stratford residents to set new records in all phases of local water consumption pumped through the City of Stratford's Water Department, announced

During July residents used a total of 33,666,000 gallons of water. This is an increase of over 6 million gallons over the previous highest month which was June, 1973, when a total of 27,575,000 gallons were pumped by the city.

Stephenson added that during July residents used over one million gallons of water for 23 days. This record was more than double the previous record, also set during June, 1973, when the city pumped over one million gallons per day for only 11 days. The average daily pumping

during July, 1974, for the city's wells was a whopping 1,086,000 gallons. The highest gallonage pumped during one day was on July 18, 1974, when the city


