Funeral services for A.C. "Cam" Jackson who died last Thursday morning following a brief illness, were held Saturday morning, August 24, at 11 a.m. from the First Christian Church at Lubbock.

Cam Jackson came to Stratford with his folks in 1901. He graduated from Stratford Schools and was one of the first Stratford boys to go off to World War I. He served overseas. After the war he returned to Stratford and when he married Mildred Turner of Kansas City in 1923, they made their first home in what is now the Gene Hudson Home on Main Street. In 1926 Cam was hired by the Lubbock school system as business manager tax assessor.

The best way I know to explain our market is by quoting several actual representative sales as follows:

14 WF Steer Calves Av. Wt. 302# at \$41.50 per cwt.; 45 WF Heifer Calves Av. Wt. 434 # at \$31.30 per cwt.; 37 Blk Steers Av. Wt. 702 # at \$30.80 per cwt.; 51 WF Heifers Av. Wt. 668 # at \$29.60 per cwt.

Plainer kinds of calves and yearlings were lower and harder to sell. Many of the light weight southern calves were several dollars lower and sure looked cheap to me. If someone would take them home, take care of them, they would have to be money-makers.
