

The contest, preformed on a ranch or in an arena, pits horse and rider against 15 to 20 head of cattle with a success time limit of two and a half minutes. Working without rider assistance, the horse obtains the desired challenge from one head of stock and after a "halt" signal from the rider, re-enters the herd to "work" another



You don't like venison?

Trace the events that take place from the crack of the rifle to the time of cooking and you may learn that the fault is not with the deer but with the hunter. So states Gus Albright, news editor for Arkansas Outdoors. He makes these points-

and they make sense. In the first place, accurate shooting provides the best venison. When a wounded animal runs off to die at a distance, his physical exertions send blood flowing fast through his body and into his muscles. This makes the meat tough and

Secret is to get the meat to the table in good eating condi-Many thousands of pounds are wasted, allowed to ruin, or are so poorly cared for that few people will eat it. And this should not happen.

Proper field dressing is important. Without that, regardless of later care, the cooked

meat will not be as it should A deer must be bled as soon as it is killed. In most cases an accurate shot will take care of this. But if it doesn't then a knife should be inserted at the base of the neck and the artery cut. Keep the wound open and free of clot.

With the insides removed (not difficult if done in a proper and orderly fashion) prop open the chest cavity and wipe with a clean cloth. Trim away any gunshot damaged flesh and allow to cool.

Flies are often a problem, says Albright, but black pepper applied to exposed flesh will keep them away. A common practice out West is to skin and wrap the deer in clean cheesecloth.

All blood and hair should be washed from the animal before transporting it home. Water won't hurt the meat if allowed to drain off



Length of the wood would be determined by the length of the leather. If a foot or more is available, give the leather down tight, then bore a hole in the wood, about an inch from one end and hang the "sharpener' in a convenient spot by the



They move on wind currents-usually from the southwest to the northeast-so that the first symptoms of disease will be on the south or southwest side of the wheat field. Spread is often to volunteer wheat and then to seeded wheat. The mite, like the virus, must have year round living plants for survival. Mites are blown a fairly short distance. Most will land within 2-300 feet and must find a live plant immediately upon land-

Disease symptoms in wheat are a severe stunting of plants with a very pale yellow mosaic color. Mosaic is a mixture of green and yellow areas on the leaves. Early infection causes weak plants which usually die early or freeze in winter. Winter nfection causes the same mosaic symptoms. The wheat plants may not die, they may not nead out, or they may have no grain in the heads. Late spring infection will cause minor losses. Plants will be discolored but losses of yield may be imperceptible.

We have known for years that early seeded wheat is subject to infection over a longer period of time before the summer hosts of mites and virus are killed by fall frosts. But wheat farmers were not willing to sacrifice early grazing for profitable stocker cattle to produce wheat grain of uncertain profit potential. 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
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
