Attorney for the plaintiffs in the suit, Jim D. Lovett met with the council and the council agreed to put into action several of his recommendations

The city was named as a co-defendent with Red River County and four law enforcement officers in a lawsuit alleging that plaintiffs Gene Shadid and Peggy Mitchell were subjected to police brutality while being held in the Red River County Jail.

On Tuesday, January 13, Jim D. Lovett met with Red River County officials to discuss the county joining with the city on the points decided upon. He was also scheduled to meet with the Red River County Commissioners on Wednesday, January 14, at 1:30 p.m. The commissioners will have the final say as to whether the county accepts or rejects the proposal.


Registration for the threecredit-hour course will be January 15-17 at ETSU, and the tuition cost is \$85.75.




