# **Bond Election Would Provide** New Buildings For All Campuses

bond election for January 31, or cover inflated prices. renovation of some existing buildings.

The two story buildings at Blossom and Deport Elementary campuses will be torn down and replaced with new buildings, housing new and additional classrooms. The present junior high building and gym at Deport will be renovated with all classrooms at the Blossom and Deport Schools being centrally cooled and

There will be a band hall and two or three classrooms constructed at the high school campus.

The proposed plan of the Prairiland School Board is to sell the necessary amount of bonds to cover this work. Plans are to sell the bonds on a twenty year term with the interest rate as low as possible. At the present time, short term bonds are selling at a lower rate of interest than long term bonds.

The board decided it was best to go the twenty year term in order to keep the tax rate as low as possible. Interest charged for school bonds depends on the financial rating of a school district and their ability to retire the bonds. There is a state law which limits the rate of 10 percent interest

The Prairiland CISD has a taxing base of \$45,029,025. The present tax rate paid per \$100.00 evaluation is \$.53. If the board sells one and a quarter million dollars in bonds at a nine percent interest, it will require about \$.35 tax increase to retire the bonds. This means the rate of tax on the one hundred dollar evaluation would be approximately \$.88 cents. If bonds are sold for 10 percent interest rate, the increase in taxes will be about \$.38 per hundred dollars making a total tax rate of \$.91 cents.

The tax rate of \$.88 or \$.91 cents does not cover ad-
