
Methodist Set Goal At 101



In response to a motion Gazette. filed by Attorney Jim D. The motions which should be filed on Friday, February establish 27. 1981, precedence that no conflict of interest exists between the City of Clarksville and Officer Parks, and that the motion for disqualification be denied.

Further, and perhaps even more important was a motion regarding trial publicity. This motion asks "That throughout the remaining course of the litigation, all attorneys would strictly observe the letter and spirit of Disciplinary Rule 7-107(G) and would make no public statement relating to evidence regarding the occurrence or transaction involved, the character, credibility or criminal record of a party, witness, or prospective witness, the performance or results of any examinations or test or the refusal or failure of a party to submit to such, or his opinion as to the merits of the claim or defenses of any party, except as required by law or administrative rule or any other matter likely to interfere with a fair trial of the action.'
